Judge rules all ballots postmarked by Election Day must be counted

Hoosiers may not know election results until weeks after the Nov. 3 election, now that a federal judge ruled any mail-in absentee ballot postmarked by Election Day must be counted.

The federal judge said close to 2,000 ballots cast in the primary election in Marion and Hamilton counties were thrown out because they arrived after the deadline,

Hamilton County has sent out more than 36,000 mail-in absentee ballots, and as of Wednesday more than 9,000 have been returned.



CARMEL - The results of this year's IHSAA girls golf state finals proved – as it does every year – that there is never a shortage of new talent making its mark in the Hoosier

Two freshmen from Hamilton County schools made an impact at the state meet, which finished up last Saturday at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel. Michaela Headlee was the individual runner-up and helped the Greyhounds to another podium finish. "It feels really good," said Headlee. "I was really working for this tournament and now I just feel like my work's paid off."
