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'Want to hear both sides' of pit plan, says Jensen

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen last week said he is not taking a position on the controversial proposed gravel pit between Allisonville Road and White River just south of Potters Bridge Park.

"I want to hear both sides," Jensen said of the project. He stressed that at the present time it remains a County Parks Department matter on property that is within county jurisdiction except for planning and zoning over which the city has jurisdiction.

Eventually the proposed gravel extraction plan is expected to come before the Noblesville Plan Commission and city council. Bever Materials, Inc. announced plans in recent weeks to open a pit on acreage across Allisonville from the Potters Woods subdivision.

Many residents of the subdivision have expressed opposition saying the noise, dust and truck traffic coming from an extraction operation will affect property values and the peace and quiet of the area.

Beaver has pledged to give the property, with a new artificial lake, to the county parks department to enable the enlarging of Potters Bridge Park to the north. \$12,000 grant will benefit Sheridan youth

Sheridan Youth Assistance Program (SYAP) is the recipient of a \$12,000 Hamilton County Community Foundation grant, which will support an after school tutoring program for students who attend Sheridan Elementary School, Sheridan Middle School and Sheridan High School.

The after school tutoring program will provide students a place to rebuild their skills as learners following the closure of schools in spring 2020 due to COVID. Although students were provided virtual and online learning opportunities, students missed the exposure to school leadership and support systems provided by teachers, which occurs naturally in a classroom and school-based setting.

Many students returned to school in August with learning gaps in skill development and in need of academic encouragement.

The tutoring program will be available three days each week for students who have fallen behind, who struggle academically, or who have been recommended to attend the program. Tutoring will be facilitated by licensed teachers, school staff or trained individuals. Transportation will be provided for students at no cost to the participating families.

The new road is scheduled to be finished in late fall 2021, with intermediate completion dates throughout 2021 to accommodate ongoing developments in the area.

Carmel adopts lower budget

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard presented a balanced 2021 budget to the Carmel City Council during its

regular meeting on Oct. 5. A public hearing was held prior to the Council adopting the budget.

The Gener-Fund Budget for 2021 is \$110,115,430, which is 2.1 per-

cent lower than this year's budget. The City uses financial information from its six-year fiscal plan, updated constantly for the past 24 years, to project future revenues and expenses. It also allows the department directors to prioritize expenditures while being aware of the long-term impact of their decisions. The City maintains \$11.3 million in the Rainy Day Fund, which is the second-highest fund balance of its kind in the State of Indiana.

"It has always been our goal to provide Carmel residents and businesses with the highest level of service at the lowest possible cost and this budget will once again accomplish both those goals," Mayor Jim Brainard said. "This is a key part of our economic development strategy of keeping the cost of living down and the quality of life up, helping us attract more corporate headquarters, jobs and a highly qualified workforce. We are in a very competitive battle with cities across the country for companies that are increasingly seeking new locations away from other states and communities where both taxes and the cost of living, not to mention commute times, are much higher than what we offer in Carmel." The Carmel Police Department has released a video summary of the offioccurred on July 27 in the Spring Creek neighborhood in Carmel.

According to police, three individuals involved in the shooting were arguing inside a residence in the 14300 block of Riverrock Court. A 911 call was

Barlow made during this cern that the suspect, Julio Cesar Virula, 26, was armed with a gun and threatening suicide. The argument continued as the subjects went outside the residence.

Responding found Taylor Cox, 28, deceased with multiple gunshot wounds. The second victim, a 66-year-old woman, was located a short distance north of the residence, also with multiple gunshot wounds. She was transported to a local hospital and later released. Virula was later shot and killed during an encounter with a Carmel police officer.

The video released by CPD provides an overview of the incident and includes video, audio and 911 record-

ings. Police warn the video contains graphic images and language and viewer discretion is advised. The video cer involved shooting that can be viewed at tinyurl. com/y38l7jrj.

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

forward. 'It is a bigger cost overrun than any of us have ever seen. It is an ongoing project and it ain't done," said At-Large member Brad Beaver.

Beaver continued, saying, "The City of Fishers is the lead agency on a combined effort. We are not extremely happy about it either. It is a big project and big projects sometimes go over. I'm not happy with it, but we are going to hold up our end of the log.'

Glynn says he wants to see a stopgap put in place on the project.

"His [Beaver's] vote is to hold up the end of it. Just for the record, that's his vote, one vote," Glynn said. "I am not supporting it in its current form. We need some type of stopgap because there is no guarantee that even that number is not going to get hit. For me to go forward supporting this, I need to see a reduction on the county end. We could commit to this, and in another year, they could want another \$10 million dollars."

Council President Rick McKinney also expressed his concern with Fishers. "I'm highly disappointed with the lack of progress and lack of communication between the council and Fishers project coordinators."

McKinney asked Davis about 126th Street, the first intersection scheduled for completion. Davis indicated motorists should expect to see that intersection open in early November.

Dr. Paul M. Waitt, 90, Sheridan, passed away on Saturday morning, October 3, 2020 at Wellbrooke of Westfield where he and his wife have resided since 2016. Born on February 25, 1930 in rural Marion Township of Boone County, he was

Webster punched the ball in from the one-yard line with 3:51 left in the first quarter to get the 'Rocks on the board, then rushed in for a 13-yard score late in the period.

"I knew we were going to be able to score," said Gilbert. "Defensively, we have not started games well the last few weeks. We got to fix that. But we have absolutely adjusted and then played well.'





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
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
