Yard signs stolen as political season heats up

In August, the City of Noblesville contracted with Indianapolis-based consulting firm Hiron's for \$20,000 to design a new city logo and to refresh Noblesville's brand.

The new design would replace the current logo that features the historic courthouse that sits in the middle of Noblesville's downtown square.

At the time of the announcement, Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen said, "The city is seeking to do a whole refresh of our brand to highlight both the history of Noblesville, as well as promote the progress made and growth to come."

As part of ongoing public input for the selection of the new logo, the City would like to gather residents' input on which of the five logo options is preferred.

Emily Gaylord, Communications Director for the City of Noblesville, said, "We just thought it was time for a new brand because the current one is a building that belongs to the county. We'd like something

that shows a city with a rich history that is ripe for progress."

Police are investigating. The signs mostly supporting GOP candidates were apparently taken Saturday night in areas around Smoky Row Road and Ironwood Drive in Carmel.

Chevy Camaro missing for decades found in Geist Reservoir

A 1987 Chevrolet Camaro stolen decades ago was found and recovered Tuesday at Geist Reservoir.

Fishers Police Department released a photo of the recovered car and said it was reported stolen July 8, 1988. Police provided no additional information about that case.

A local fisherman with sonar spotted the car near the Fall Creek Road Bridge by the marina. A towing company crew recovered the vehicle, which was found upside-down in several feet of silt.

Fishers police said in a Facebook post, "Sadly the owner is now deceased and never was able to find out what happened to their car. It is hard to imagine the vehicle sat underwater over thirty years undetected."

Hamilton County EMA offering amateur radio tests this Saturday

Amateur Radio license examinations will be given on Saturday, Oct. 17 at the Hamilton County Emergency Operations Center.

Starting at 10:30 a.m., applicants for any or all of the three levels of Federal Communication licenses – the entry level Technician class, the intermediate General class, and the most technically oriented Amateur Extra class – may take the multiple-choice test instruments.

The tests for both the technician and general exam consist of 35 multiple-choice questions; the Amateur Extra exam has 50 questions. All exams will be graded by ARRL Volunteer Examiners on site. There is a \$15 administrative fee

for the exam and license processing by the ARRL, the National Association of Amateur Radio. Two forms of identification (one with photo) will be required.

The session will be conducted by ARRL VEC examiners from the Hamilton County Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) and the Central Indiana Amateur Radio Association (CIARA). Participants are requested to review the ARRL Technician License Manual and take free online practice exams at these websites prior to the Sept. 12 session: arrlexamreview.appspot.com; cham.net/exams; or qrz.com/hamtest.

Topics covered will include: FCC Rules, descrip-

tions, and definitions for the Amateur Radio Service, operator and station license responsibilities; operating procedures; radio wave characteristics: properties of radio waves; propagation modes; amateur radio practices and station set-up; electrical principles: math for electronics; electronic principles; Ohm’s law; station equipment: common transmitter and receiver problems; antenna measurements; troubleshooting; basic repair and testing; modulation modes: amateur satellite operation; operating activities; non-voice and digital communications; antennas and feed lines; electrical safety: AC and DC power circuits; antenna installation;

and radio frequency hazards. When bad weather is forecast to roll across Hamilton County, the meteorologists of the National Weather Service, local television stations, and the Hamilton County Emergency Operations Center rely on a trained cadre of severe storm spotters to provide the “ground truth” of dangerous, damaging weather phenomena. Many of them are first responders and licensed radio amateurs transmitting real time observations directly to the command center using their base, mobile or handheld VHF and UHF radios. Seating will be in accordance with social distancing guidelines and participants may use their own masks.

Masks and hand sanitizer will be available. The Emergency Operations Center is located on the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Campus at the Emergency Management Agency, 18100 Cumberland Road in Noblesville. Information will also be available about volunteer opportunities with RACES, Emergency Management and joining the Central Indiana Amateur Radio Club. thefts are disheartening in an election campaign where citizens should be able to demonstrate their support for their favorite candidates without harassment. Meanwhile, thousands of Hamilton County residents have exercised their right to vote, lining up at the Government and Judicial Center and fairgrounds Exposition Building each day for a week. The early voting will be extended to satellite locations next week as the turnout is now certain to break all previous records. The political parties are

working to get their identified voters to the polls or supplied with absentee ballots when needed. Unfortunately, only a few local candidates have spoken out on specific issues, apparently feeling doing so is not either necessary or wise. Republicans will hold their Fall Dinner rally on Oct. 25 at the 502 East Event Center in Carmel. That will be followed by the Clay Township GOP chili supper on Oct. 29. Democrats have said they will not have any gatherings due to health concerns.


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Fishers Arts Council holds first-ever Juried Exhibit of local artists

Noblesville to present ‘Nightmare on Main Street’



Fishers man killed in Noblesville accident

At approximately 3:19 p.m. on Monday, police officers from the Noblesville Police Department (NPD) responded to the area of Hague Road and Fox Chase Drive to a report of a head-on crash involving two vehicles.

Based on witness statements and other evidence at the scene, a 2008 Honda Accord was traveling southbound on Hague Road, just north of Fox Chase Drive. Witnesses stated that prior to the crash,

they observed the Honda cross over into the northbound lane of Hague Road colliding head-on with a 2003 Chevrolet Trailblazer traveling northbound.

The driver of the Chevrolet was identified as John C. Bredenkamp, 76, Noblesville. Bredenkamp was transported by ground ambulance to IU Health Methodist Hospital, Indianapolis, in critical condition. There were no passengers in the vehicle.

The driver of the Honda was identified as Julian

T. Duke, 35, Fishers. Duke suffered life-threatening injuries and was transported by ground ambulance to Riverview Health Hospital, Noblesville, where he was pronounced dead.

Investigators from the NPD Accident Reconstruction Unit were summoned to the scene to collect evidence and gather information. As a result of the investigation, traffic on Hague Road was closed or limited between 196st Street and Fox Chase Drive until approximately 5:30 p.m. Monday.

Westfield woman drowns during scuba training at campground

A 61-year-old Westfield woman drowned Monday afternoon at a campground, Indiana conservation officers said.

Donna Kishbaugh was conducting scuba training at Hidden Paradise Campground in northwestern Decatur County when she

disappeared in the water shortly before 2:15 p.m. Monday, according to a news release from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources. The campground is about 25 miles southeast of Indianapolis.

Divers from the Department of Natural Resources

and the Indiana State Police found Kishbaugh in 18 feet of water shortly before 3 p.m. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

Authorities continued to investigate and said additional information will be provided when it becomes available.





The purpose of the meeting is to publicly discuss and afford all interested persons an opportunity to comment and ask questions on the proposed design of the project.



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
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

Volleyball sectional preview

Sectional 8 will be competitive again

Thursday is the day local volleyball fans have been waiting for, as sectionals begin at the three Hamilton County sites in which teams are participating.

Hamilton Southeastern will host the always competitive Class 4A Sectional 8. First-round matches take place on Thursday, with Fishers playing Noblesville at 5:30 p.m. The second match of the night follows, and it will have Westfield taking on Carmel.

FISHERS-NOBLESVILLE

As Hoosier Crossroads Conference rivals, the Tigers and the Millers have already played this season. That match was back on Sept. 30, where Fishers won in straight, but tough, sets. The final score was 25-22, 25-23, 30-28.

“It’s always wise to expect a sectional opponent to play you tougher the second time, and Noblesville is never a team one should overlook,” said Tigers coach Steven Peek. “This season, they have power, experience, and height, all of which make them a tough out. I believe we will need to be stronger in serve-receive to beat them this time around.”

“We had a lot of great takeaways from our match with Fishers,” said Millers coach Annie Phillips. She said that match was “one of the first times our girls had shown grit throughout an entire match” and credited her team with “consistently playing at a high level. We learned that keeping up with the speed of the game the way they play is key.”

The Tigers, who come into the match at 17-7, have a senior-dominated offense. Four 12th-graders totaling at least 100 kills this season. Jada Allen leads the way with 266 kills (3.4 per set), followed by Emily Waldrop (196), Mikayla Christiansen (152) and Camryn Haworth (146). Haworth also leads in assists with 704 for the season.

Senior Grace Dunnuck leads the way in blocks with 64, while Christiansen has 60 for the season. Haworth is tops in aces with 31. Junior Samantha Perdue has collected 297 digs, giving her an average of 12.4 per match, while Haworth’s 244 puts her at 10.2 per match.

“I think we are passing and blocking better than we ever right now, and furthermore, we’re more aware of what we must do to play our best,” said Peek. “I’m pleased with our development throughout the season and the seriousness with which the players have been taking their roles. They each realize the jobs they must do for our team to succeed. The players will be ready for the postseason, and their ability to be ready when it’s ‘showtime’ has always been part of what makes Fishers such a special place to play.”

Rose Crist has been a true senior leader for Noblesville, with 337 total kills (3.8 per set) for the Millers and 37 aces,

putting her on top of both categories. Bella Hines has 33 aces. Junior Riley Branch has dished out 667 assists. Meanwhile, junior Ella Peter is a force at the net with 93 season blocks, while sophomore Dina Cox leads in digs with 251, 9.0 per match.

Noblesville is 7-21 for the season, but has played a tough schedule. In fact, MaxPreps ranks the Millers’ schedule as the ninth-toughest in Indiana.

“With our schedule, we are prepared to play with the highest level of competition, and our girls understand what it takes to rise to the level of play,” said Phillips. “Our season has demanded a lot from us, physically and mentally, and the girls understand that aspect of intensity is what is required of them every time they step on the court.”

WESTFIELD-CARMEL

The Shamrocks and the Greyhounds played each other in the regular season, back on Sept. 14. It was a back and forth, five-set match with Westfield prevailing 26-24, 15-25, 25-23, 20-15, 15-8.

“In looking back at the film, we have a lot of great things that we did and we

have some areas we have cleaned up and improved that will help us as we move into the post-season,” said ‘Rocks coach Sandra Burks. “Carmel is a solid squad and we look forward to an exciting post-season matchup.”

Westfield is 20-7 and finished second in the HCC with a 5-2 record. The ‘Rocks played at the Lawrence North Invitational this past Saturday, where they went 3-1. Westfield beat Delta 25-16, 25-20, Mount Vernon 25-21, 25-18 and Southwood 25-12, 25-13, and fell to Shelbyville 25-16, 25-23.

A trio of seniors have all hit over 200 kills for the season: Indiana University commit Kenzie Daffinee leads with 245 (3.2 per set) followed by Grace Stewart with 226 and Katie Sweet with 203. The Shamrocks have two key setters: Senior Sarah Weglarz has handed out 466 assists, while junior Logan Mapes has dished out 393.


Daffinee is a strong server, with 63 aces for the season. On defense, Sweet has dominated the net with 89 blocks, followed by Stewart with 60. Senior El-lary Detamore leads the defense with 375

digs, or 13.9 per set. “As a team we like where we are at heading into the post-season,” said Burks. “We are playing well, balanced, and focused on winning as a unit. From last year to this year, each player has taken ownership of their position, making sure we are contributing our solid piece for us to work best as a complete unit. One of the things that makes us harder to defend is that we have multiple terminators this year and we are excited to tackle the post-season.”

“These young ladies work hard every day, truly love playing together and enjoy taking on great competition. We are excited and looking forward to Sectional 8.”

The Greyhounds are 20-9 and placed second in the Metropolitan Conference with a 6-1 record. Center Grove won the MIC with a 6-0 mark. Carmel finished as runner-up at its own invitational on Saturday, beating Tri-West 25-23, 25-20, Brownstown Central 21-25, 25-23, 15-7 and Floyd Central 25-16, 25-22 before falling to Bloomington South 25-22, 25-18.

The Greyhounds’ offense is led by two big hitters: Junior Macarty McQueen has hit 322 kills for the season (3.9 per set) and freshman Lauren Evans has spiked

In the Read to the Final Four contest, third-grade classes will compete with how many books they can read. The goal is to use the spirit of competition to promote literacy and make students better readers.

"How cool is it to be a third-grader getting your name announced at the Final Four during Final Four festivities?" Kramer said. "I know if I was in the third-grade I would absolutely love that."

Kramer says the main motivation, however, is to use the competitive atmosphere to send a more important message to the youths.

"At the end of the day, it gets third-graders reading, and I can't think of something more important," she said. "Whatever you might be interested in there's something for you, and if you win some prizes and some notoriety along the way, I think most third-graders would like that."
