# Synergize raises \$3,700 for breast cancer foundation

# Tax abatement resolution for INCOG BioPharma before Fishers City Council

Members of the Fishers City Council will vote on an economic development package for INCOG BioPharma. The firm plans to construct a 50,000 square-foot manufacturing facility in

Fishers by investing \$60 million.

Along with incentives from the State of Indiana, the city is offering a 13-year personal property and no-year real property tax abatement, if the council approves at its Monday night meeting.

INCOG says it will hire about 150

new full-time employees by 2024, and a total of 260 full-time workers by 2029 at an average annual salary of \$83,200, according to the city council action form.

The announcement was made Thursday morning about INCOG BioPharma’s Fishers plans.

## Indiana teens signing up to work the polls on Election Day

Teenagers who aren’t old enough to vote in the upcoming election are still encouraged to help out at the polls.

“We’re really hoping that when you get kids involved at an early age, then that’s going to be something they will continue through life,” Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams said.

The Secretary of State’s Office runs the Hoosier Hall Pass Student Poll Worker Program aimed at helping young adults learn about democracy in action, as it happens on Election Day.

Williams says after paperwork and required approvals, teens aged 16 and 17 can work as a clerk or judge at a polling place.

“I hope they learn the civics of an election day and all the things that go on,” Williams said.

Williams told News 8 a little more than 100 teens have applied to work in Hamilton County on Election Day. Back in 2016, only about 30 teenagers applied. This time around, it’s the most they’ve ever had.

“Oh! I mean, it’s a great thing,” she said.

Half an hour away, at the Marion County Election Board in downtown Indianapolis, more than 4,000 people have signed up to work the polls.

He doesn’t have exact numbers, but Russell Hollis, a deputy director with the Marion County Clerk’s Office, said far more 16- and 17-year-olds have signed up this year than in 2016 and previous election cycles.

“It says our Generation Z and our Millennials – that they are excited, that they are engaged in the political process and in our government that represents them,” said Hollis.

Hollis and Williams said the teenagers' tech-savvy minds would be a help on Election Day.

"Particularly our teenagers," Hollis said. "A lot of them will work the electronic poll books, which is an iPad. The iPad has a list of every registered voter in the county. That's how we

check-in voters. Typically by scanning the back of their driver's license or Indiana ID, so that's what a lot of our younger election workers will do. They are very familiar with that technology, as they use it every day."

# Rainwater reacts to Governor’s latest COVID-19 update

Libertarian candidate for governor Donald Rainwater issued the following statement in reaction to Wednesday’s COVID update presentation by Gov. Holcomb:

"While I clearly believe that COVID-19 is a serious health issue, especially for those in high risk demographics, I find it insulting for a Governor, who can't even wear a mask appropriately while on television, to tell Hoosiers that people who don't wear masks in small gatherings are causing others

to get sick.

"If the Indiana State Health Commissioner, Dr. Box, can practice the highest level of risk mitigation and still test positive, this indicates that the precautionary measures are not 100 percent effective. The fact that Dr. Box received both a negative test result and a positive test result clearly indicates that testing is unreliable and inaccurate.

A private family service will be held. Randall & Roberts Funeral Home has been entrusted with Betty’s care.

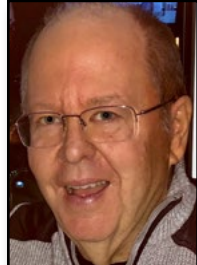

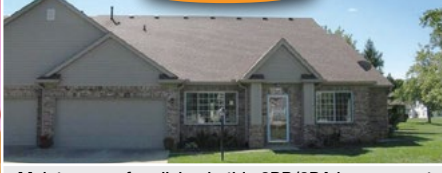

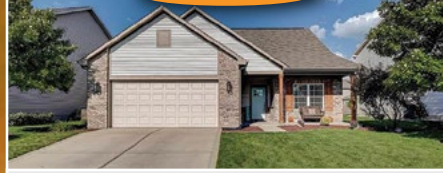

# Westfield finishes unbeaten HCC season

The Westfield football team was already the Hoosier Crossroads Conference champion, but the Shamrocks wanted a little more than that.

On Friday, Westfield became an undefeated HCC champion. The Class 6A No. 2 Shamrocks sailed past Franklin Central 35-0 at Riverview Health Stadium to complete their perfect conference season at 7-0.

Westfield won the HCC back in 2013, but had to share the title with Fishers. This year, the ‘Rocks stand alone. Coach Jake Gilbert said he was “just thrilled for our senior and our whole team” in winning the conference.

“Our JV and freshmen are playing for an undefeated season tomorrow,” said Gilbert. “We’re just blessed.”

Westfield was ready to go from the beginning. Mason Piening took the opening kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown. That was the first of three scores for the Shamrocks in the first quarter. Maximus Webster ran into the end zone from 11 yards midway through the period, then connected with Piening for a 70-yard touchdown late in the quarter.

“I was just so happy with how sharp our guys were at the start of the game,” said Gilbert. “I was really proud that our guys were ready to play. We got off to a good start and that carried us through. Great maturity by our seniors.”

Westfield added two more touchdowns in the second quarter, both on one-yard runs. Jack Pfeiffer scored at the 10:29 mark of the period, then Micah Hauser punched into the end zone with 3:46 left. Sean Sullivan made all five extra-point kicks.

The Shamrocks totaled 364 yards of offense, including 211 yards through the air. Webster went 7-for-9 for 126 yards. Piening had four receptions. Hauser led the ground game with 63 yards rushing.

David Frey had seven tackles on defense, with Magwire Graybill making six stops. Seth Poriah had two tackles for a loss.

“To get a shutout in our conference is an amazing feat in and of itself,” said Gilbert. “I thought our D-line played hard.”

Westfield finished the regular season 8-1 and is off until Oct. 30, when it plays at Noblesville in the semi-finals of Sectional 4.
