We are now just under a week before Election Day. Voters will be choosing a president, governor, members of Congress and many local offices. In Indiana, there are school board elections.

voters residing in Fall Creek, Delaware and Wayne townships are eligible to vote in the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board election. The city of Fishers takes up large parts of Fall Creek

and Delaware townships. I won't comment on the state of the various campaigns. There have been some good, solid discussions and some not so good. But this election will have a major impact on the school age children attending public schools in those three townships.

I have evolved a bit on how I personally evaluate candidates for my local school board. For years, I looked at the positions taken by each of the candidates. That is still a factor, but it has been trumped by another



Brooks' strong background in both the public and private sectors includes experience as a proven difference-maker in areas such as harassment and discrimination, public safety, homeland security, counter-terrorism and economic development. In the 115th Congress, she served as the Chairwoman of the House Committee on Ethics, where she worked with her colleagues to restore confidence in Congress. She also previously served Hamilton County Repubon the Select Committee on the Events Surrounding the 2012 Terrorist Attack in Benghazi. In the 113th Congress, she was a mem-

tee on Education and the Workforce and the House mittee where she served as Chairman of the Subcommittee on Emergency Preparedness, Response, and Communications.


