Through her membership on the Energy and Commerce Committee, she has worked on mental health, substance abuse, biodefense, public safety, telecommunications issues and more. She also serves on the House Select Committee

# HSE School Board election is here

We are now just under a week before Election Day. Voters will be choosing a president, governor, members of Congress and many local offices. In Indiana, there are school board elections.

Here in the Fishers area, all registered voters residing in Fall Creek, Delaware and Wayne townships are eligible to vote in the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board election. The city of Fishers takes up large parts of Fall Creek and Delaware townships.

I won't comment on the state of the various campaigns. There have been some good, solid discussions and some not so good. But this election will have a major impact on the school age children attending public schools in those three townships.

I have evolved a bit on how I personally evaluate candidates for my local school board. For years, I looked at the positions taken by each of the candidates. That is still a factor, but it has been trumped by another

# Arcadia gets \$10K grant for downtown pocket park



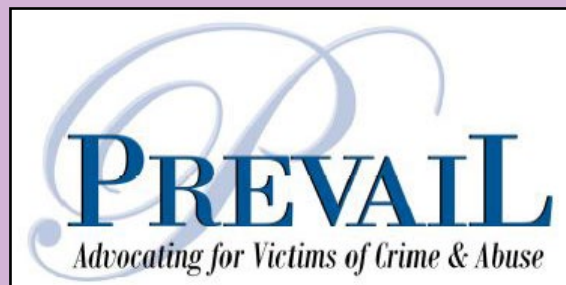

on the Modernization of Congress, where she is focused on restoring confidence in Congress and making it easier for Americans to participate in the business of the People's House.

Brooks' strong background in both the public and private sectors includes experience as a proven difference-maker in areas such as harassment and discrimination, public safety, homeland security, counter-terrorism and economic development. In the 115th Congress, she served as the Chairwoman of the House Committee on Ethics, where she worked with her colleagues to restore confidence in Congress. She also previously served on the Select Committee on the Events Surrounding the 2012 Terrorist Attack in Benghazi. In the 113th Congress, she was a mem-

ber of the House Committee on Education and the Workforce and the House Homeland Security Committee where she served as Chairman of the Subcommittee on Emergency Preparedness, Response, and Communications.

In June 2019, Brooks announced her retirement from the U.S. House of Representatives at the end of the 116th Congress, her fourth term in Congress. Never desiring to be a lifelong politician, she will now focus on her family, which includes aging parents, young adult children whom she would like to visit more often, and her husband David for this next chapter in her life.

The Foundation has previously awarded Great Idea! Grants to teachers, departments or schools to foster innovation and inspire creativity in teaching and learning. CEF Executive Director Jennifer Penix said, “Our mission is to support Carmel Clay students in academic achievement and lifelong learning and these grants are an integral part of their experience. When a teacher is excited about a new idea, the students are able to see how new ideas spark amazing outcomes. We plan to return to this model of grant awards in 2021, but a primary goal for this year is helping our schools stabilize and providing resources related to equity and inclusion that may not otherwise be available right now.”

Along with school grants, CEF has partnered with the Carmel City Coun-

cil to award a \$10,000 grant to Carmel Clay Schools Student Services focused on body safety and bullying prevention by utilizing the Monique Burr Foundation Child Safety Matters and Teen Safety Matters program.

City Councilmember Sue Finkam said, "Over the past few years, the Carmel City Council has actively partnered with CEF by providing school safety grants. I'm pleased that once again the Council is providing support for safety initiatives to help give students, parents and educators greater peace of mind."

Stephanie Whiteside, Carmel Clay Schools Mental Health Coordinator will work with each school's mental health professionals (counselors and social workers) to develop a common language from Kindergarten through 12th grade and consistent expectations and sup-

ports that align with current Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion initiatives. Additionally, School Resource Officers (SROs) will receive training for additional support and collaboration. CEF says it will continue its support of these important initiatives by working with Whiteside to find meaningful ways to engage parents in conversations about bullying and body safety.

We are grateful for the Carmel Education Foundation and the Carmel City Council for their continued support of both our school staff and the students and families we serve.”

I explained this as part of my hour-long **video discussion with Cameron Geesaman** recorded in early September. All voters need to evaluate candidates on their ability to make good decisions as situations change.

For example, I spent time with all current members of the HSE Board and never thought to ask any of them how they would handle a pandemic. No one could foresee that. The ability of each board member to evaluate the situation before them and make good decisions is key for me.

If you do not think your vote counts, allow me to provide just one fact for you. In 2016, Mike Bottorff defeated Howard Stevenson by 41

votes, about one-tenth of 1 percent (0.01 percent) of all votes cast in the Fall Creek Township at-large election. All votes counted in that race. Mr. Bottorff resigned from the board in May 2019 and board members chose Clint Wilson to fill out the remainder of the term.

A couple of reminders: If you vote a straight party ticket, keep going ... you will find the at-large Hamilton County Council election, then the school board candidates will be before you. Also, this is an at-large school board election, so all voters may choose one candidate for each of the three townships.

Please allow me to once again compliment and thank Izzy and Casey Alexander, Fishers High School stu-

dents who offered to record podcast interviews with all 11 candidates for school board. As of early Monday afternoon, Oct. 26, I have set a podcasting record. Combining the number of listens for all candidates, the count exceeded 2,700. That means at least 2,700 people listened to most or all of a candidate podcast.

I see that people in Hamilton County, Indiana, and many parts of the nation are voting early, enduring long lines and long wait times to cast their ballots. It is clear that Americans love democracy.

Remember, our local school board election is of great importance to school-age children in all three townships and the health of our school system is key to the health of our community as a whole. Vote in the school board election!

## Carmel's Malpeddi, McNamar win doubles title

The Carmel doubles team of senior Jones McNamar and junior Srisanth Malpeddi won the IHSAA doubles tournament, which finished up Monday at Park Tudor.

The Greyhounds duo beat the Delta team of senior Brandon Jackson and junior Walker Boyle 6-0, 6-1. Malpeddi and McNamar finished their season with a 28-1 record, with their lone loss to Homestead in the regular season.

“It feels great,” said Malpeddi. He said that after the team took its loss to Homestead, “we were kind of down,” but Malpeddi and McNamar got back it and didn’t lose again for the remainder of the season.

“It’s great,” said McNamar, who said winning the doubles tournament was a “goal all season” for him and Malpeddi.

McNamar won the doubles tournament last year, partnering with now-graduate Uday Lomada. He thus became the first player to win back-to-back state doubles titles with different partners since North Central’s Joe Stimming won twice, in 1990 and 1991.

“We haven’t really played together before, so we were struggling at the beginning,” said McNamar of this season’s partnership. “But as the season went on, we just started to click really well and we started playing a lot better, as good as we were capable of.”

This is the eighth time that Carmel has won a doubles state title, and marked the fifth year in a row that the Greyhounds won both the team state title and either a singles or doubles championship.

## Seniors, sophomores to guide Millers

The future appears to be now for the Noblesville girls basketball team.

The Millers have a solid mix of seniors and underclassmen on their roster for the 2020-21 season. That includes six sophomores, one of whom is Noblesville’s top returning scorer from the previous year.

The Millers were 10-13 last season. After a rough start, Noblesville began to turn things around in the middle part of the season. Beginning with their second game at the Southport tournament, the Millers won six of their next eight games, including the final three of their regular season. Noblesville fell to Hamilton Southeastern in the sectional.

“I am excited for the season,” said Millers coach Donna Buckley. “We have a good group of kids. We are going to continue to work on getting better on both ends of the floor.”

The Noblesville player everyone will be watching is sophomore Ashlynn Shade. The 5-9 guard was a star for the Millers right out of the gate, and finished the season with 20.5 points per game. Shade did it all, also averaging 6.7 rebounds, 4.2 steals and 2.3 assists per contest.

Also back are two good seniors. Mallory Miller, a 5-6 guard, helped out with 9.7 points per game last season, in addition to 2.6 steals, 2.6 rebounds and 1.7 assists. Emily Wood, a 5-10 forward, contributed 4.7 points and 2.9 rebounds per game. Three more seniors are also back for Noblesville, all of whom have varsity experience: Emery Denison, Jayla Jones and Makenna Mundy.

The sophomore class also features four additional players who got plenty of varsity time last year. Dani Mendez, a 5-9 forward, established herself as a solid rebounder during her freshman season. Other returnees that got varsity playing time as freshmen are 5-4 guard Brooklyn Ely, 5-2 guard Kaitlyn Shoemaker and 6-3 forward Brooklyn Smitherman.

Carly Motz, a 5-8 forward, played all junior varsity last season; she will swing between varsity and JV this year. Two freshmen are also on the varsity list: Reagan Wilson, a 5-6 guard, will start her career at varsity, while 5-8 forward Ava Shoemaker will switch between JV and varsity.

“I think we have a lot of potential,” said Buckley. “We must
