## HSE school board set to approve new class start times

An advisory group has been working for months on how to rearrange class start times in Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools, with the school board set to give the plan final approval on Wednesday, Nov. 11.

Based on a recommendation presented to the board, grades K-4 would start most school days at 7:40 a.m., high school at 8:20 a.m. and grades 5-8 at 9 a.m.

The committee had three additional recommendations for the board:

- First, study the possibility of walking zones. The City of Fishers would need to be involved in this.
- Second, take a look at a three-tier bus transportation system.
- Thirdly, study a possible "feeder system" allowing student groups to remain together as they move from one school building to another.

## Solar panels expected to save millions for Noblesville Schools

Noblesville Schools cut the ribbon last Wednesday on its completed solar initiative, which is expected to generate nearly \$8 million in energy savings over the next 30 years.

The solar panel fields, located near White River Elementary, Promise Road Elementary, Noblesville West Middle School and the district's Transportation Center, will provide almost all of the energy used by those facilities, with a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions equivalent to approximately five million miles of vehicle traffic avoided.

The new initiative also

## Noblesville Council approves zoning change for former Marsh property

Last Tuesday, the Noblesville Common Council unanimously approved a zoning change for the former Marsh supermarket property located on River Road just north of State Road 32.

Noblesville officials announced the city will issue \$8 million in bonds to be repaid with captured property taxes over 25 years from a newly created tax increment financing (TIF) district.

The project is described as a mostly one- and two-bedroom luxury apartment complex that will include swimming pool, exercise room, bike storage, fitness classes, massage room and outdoor grills.

Council approval now opens the door for construction to begin before the end of 2020.

A multi-story office building to be located at the north end of the property is also in the plans.

once again eligible to win this prestigious award.

The Gold Medal Award is recognized as the highest honor for a park and recreation system. More importantly, it demonstrates CCPR's sustained level of excellence in serving the residents of Carmel and Clay Township with high quality parks, facilities, and programs.

"We are incredibly proud of our team for this outstanding level of achievement," CCPR Director Michael Klitzing said. "To win this award consecutively is an honor and a reflection of the innovation and dedication of every person at CCPR."

During the 55-year history of the award, only 204 agencies have won the Gold Medal, and less than 1 percent of all eligible agencies have won the award since 1966. Only 56 park systems have won the Gold Medal more than once and just 11 agencies have won the Gold Medal in the first year they regained eligibility after winning.

"This recognition would not be possible without residents who value parks and recreation and the role it plays in our community's quality of life, elected officials who have consistently supported CCPR and provided us the financial resources to create a world-class park system, Park Board members who have helped establish the vision for our parks, and outstanding employees at all levels of our organization who deliver each and every day the highest quality service to our constituents," Klitzing said.

A banner presentation will take place in the near future to celebrate CCPR's accomplishment. Social distancing guidelines will be followed but the public, media and area dignitaries will be invited to attend.

money, reduce environmental impacts and create student learning opportunities is a win for everyone in the community.”

With two million square feet under roof, 550 acres and more than 10,000 students to serve, energy is one of the district’s largest costs

after teachers and support staff. Almost \$1.5 million per year are spent on energy expenses for lighting, heating and air, technology tools and more.

# Millers beat Golden Eagles to repeat as Class 3A champions

**FISHERS** - The magic number for the Noblesville girls soccer team last Saturday was 80.

Millers senior Jenna Chatterton explained why: “Before this game this morning, we had a white board out with the whole team. Right there, circled in the middle is ‘80-plus minutes,’ because we knew it couldn’t just be half a game or even one half, another half. It had to be the whole game.”

That game just happened to be the Class 3A state championship game, which took place at Reynolds Tigers Stadium at Fishers High School. Noblesville took on Guerin Catholic and indeed, never let up the intensity for the entire 80 minutes of the game.

As a result, the Millers defended their state championship, beating the Golden Eagles 3-0. Noblesville scored one goal in the first half, then added the other two goals in the second half on its way to back-to-back state titles.

“It’s awesome to come back here with these girls for a second time and win

again,” said Chatterton.

“I’m just happy we made it through the season, because I thought this season would be cut short with all that’s happening,” said Millers coach Mike Brady. “This is great for the girls. For all they’ve lost out on at school and everything else, for them to have this opportunity to be together, and then just to win is icing on the cake. I love this group. You see how talented they are, but they’re even better individuals.”

Noblesville scored its first goal in the 24th minute, when sophomore Carlie Sack tapped the ball into the net from about five feet away. It was Sack’s first-ever varsity goal.

“It was just cool to score,” said Sack.

The 1-0 lead would stand at halftime and for the first few minutes of the second half. In the 47th minute, Makenna Maloy took a corner kick that wound up in front of Ava Bramblett. She easily kicked it in from about six feet to put Noblesville up 2-0.

The Millers made it 3-0 with 17:11 left in the game, when Chatterton, a University of Tennessee commit,

drilled in a kick from 15 feet. Meanwhile, Noblesville’s defense was doing its job, with goalkeeper Sara Kile leading the way with several key saves.

“I told them they needed to play 80 minutes to win a state title, and this was their best 80 minutes of the season,” said Brady. “It was just exciting for me as a coach to watch it all click and come together, because that’s a very good Guerin team. I’ve watched them all

week. That’s a real tough team.”

The Golden Eagles battled the entire game, with UCLA commit Quincy McMahon leading the offense. McMahon had several shots for Guerin Catholic, with Emersen Jennings and Katie Koger making shots as well.

Guerin Catholic finished its season 16-2-2. The third-ranked Golden Eagles’ only two losses were to the teams rated above

them: No. 1 Noblesville and No. 2 Carmel.

“No regrets,” said Guerin Catholic coach Sean Yau. “They played awesome. Noblesville’s a great team. I know that our girls put everything they could possibly get on the field. They performed as best they could. We just couldn’t get the result tonight.”

The Millers finished their season 17-0-1. Noblesville received another honor after the game, when

senior Emma Potter won the Mental Attitude Award. Potter, who has committed to play lacrosse at Central Michigan University, is the first Millers girls soccer player to receive the award.

“I’m super grateful,” said Potter. “I know a lot of people have won this before and I feel like it’s an honor just to be able to say that I am a winner and to say that people around me think of me in this way. It’s really great.”

# Big fourth quarter plays send Tigers past HSE

**FISHERS** - Just like it did several weeks ago, big plays became a factor in a Fishers-Hamilton Southeastern football game.

Both teams made their share of those big plays when they met last Friday at Reynolds Tigers Stadium in the semi-finals of Class 6A Sectional 4. Fishers made two of them in the fourth quarter: A long touchdown pass and an interception in the end zone. That was enough to give the Tigers a 34-29 win over the Royals and advance to next week’s championship game.

“You need a spark. You need a big win for a program,” said Fishers coach Curt Funk, who picked up his first post-season victory as the Tigers coach.

“We talked to the kids all week about moments, and life’s about them and sports are about them,” said Funk. “And they made their moment tonight.”

Fishers trailed 29-20 going into the fourth quarter. The Tigers cut into that lead midway through the period; after Carson Dunn made a big run to get Fishers into scoring position, Lucas Prewitt punched the ball in from the one-yard line. Southeastern blocked the extra-point kick, but the Tigers were now within 29-26.

Minutes later, Fishers would get the ball back. The Tigers made their way down to the 42, where Prewitt threw a pass to Luke Valerio, who weaved his way into an open space and ran into the end zone. That put Fishers in front, and it added to its lead when Prewitt threw a two-point conversion pass to Shaun Kim.

The Tigers were now up by five points with 1:27 to go. The Royals began a furious drive, getting down to the Fishers 7. But with less than 10 seconds to go, the Tigers’ Shawn Dunnuck intercepted a pass in the end zone, sealing the victory.

“I knew somebody had to make a big play,” said Dunnuck. “They were driving it down the field that whole drive. And it was my man and I did my job and did what I could. All thanks to my teammates. They played their hearts out. They motivated the whole team and we kept it going the whole game.”

“For years they’re going to talk about the Seth Dunnuck interception,” said Funk. “What a way to end an outstanding game, and HSE, they played their tails off. They had a great season and Coach (Michael) Kelly’s done a great job there in his first year.”

Fishers set the tone of the game early. Carson

Dunn blasted off on a 78-yard run into the end zone early in the first quarter to get the Tigers on the board first. Justin Sharkey’s extra-point kick gave Fishers a 7-7 lead.

Southeastern was in control for the remainder of the first half. John McCall found Dylan Conner for a 38-yard touchdown pass, and Alex Geroulis tied it up with his extra-point kick.

The score was now 7-7, and would remain so through the end of the quarter.

McCall stepped up again for the Royals in the second quarter. He ran in two touchdowns, the first from nine yards and the second from one yard, the latter with 13 seconds left in the half. Geroulis kicked both points afterwards, and HSE led 21-7 at halftime.

“I thought our kids

played really well,” said Kelly. “They had a phenomenal game plan and played really hard. I thought our guys showed a lot of heart, showed a lot of poise. At the end of the night, Fishers was the better team than what we were.”

The Tigers mounted a comeback in the third quarter, with Dunn once again making big plays. He zoomed into the end zone on a 69-yard touchdown run early in the period, then caught a 76-yard scoring pass from Prewitt midway through the quarter.

“Carson Dunn did an outstanding job,” said Funk. “We challenged him. We told him, ‘You’re going to have to come out here and you’re going to have to bring it all night long,’ and he did. He just did an awesome job. Real proud of him.”

The Royals blocked the extra point attempt after the second touchdown to preserve a 21-20 lead. Then with less than a minute in the period, McCall scrambled into the end zone from 18 yards. He followed that up with a two-point pass to Will Gerig to put Southeastern ahead 29-20. That lead

would hold until Fishers began its fourth-quarter comeback.

Dunn finished the game with 193 yards rushing on 20 carries, giving him the vast majority of the Tigers’ rushing yards. Prewitt completed 14 of 19 pass attempts for 220 yards, with Silas Martin making five catches. Dunnuck totaled 13 tackles, with Collin Malone making seven stops.

McCall was 13-of-21 as the HSE quarterback, totaling 185 yards. Conner made five receptions for 103 yards, while Jace Alexander had four catches. Blaine Wertz led the rushing with 100 yards, followed by McCall with 96. Cole Earlewine led the Royals tackles with six stops.


Southeastern finished its season 6-3, and tied for second in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference standings.

“We grew a significant amount,” said Kelly. “I appreciate what our seniors did for the program, just setting the tone, setting the expectation. I thought they did some great things for us.”

Fishers improved to 3-7 after the win and will travel to Westfield Friday to play for the Sectional 4 title.
