An open letter from Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen

Dear Editor:

I am writing this letter to express my disappointment in a long-standing Noblesville business for misrepresenting facts before the public regarding the long-planned east-west corridor.

On topics of such importance for our community, our citizens deserve candor, context, and facts. For nearly my entire life, the City of Noblesville has been having a conversation about how we can better move traffic through our city. This project is difficult and does not have an easy solution. If there was one, it would have been accomplished decades ago.

That's why I have asked my Administration to put an emphasis on proactive, in-person conversations around the future of an east-west corridor in Noblesville. This is especially important with stakeholders like homeowners and businesses directly affected.

IDI Composites International, a business located in the heart of our City, is one of these stakeholders that I personally sought out immediately after taking office and have had many positive meetings with over the course of the year. IDI is a valued member of the Noblesville community with a track record of successful business operations and concern for the local com-

To my surprise, IDI abruptly left the negotiating table recently after months of positive conversations. In a matter of weeks, IDI has chosen to lob a negative, fact-distorting campaign to misinform the public. While IDI wants you to believe that we are attempting to destroy their business, the City is in fact proposing to relocate roughly 15 percent of their property, all parking lot. This plan would mitigate the impact upon a designated historic area during the construction of the eastwest corridor.

I am disappointed that extensive efforts to work with, accommodate and explore solutions has been characterized by IDI as the City refusing to listen. To say that city representatives "ignor[ed] the entire discussion raised by the audience at the November 12, 2020 Community Advisory Committee meeting" and "had no genuine intent to

consider legitimate issues raised or alternatives" is erroneous and frankly disrespectful toward the many hard-working individuals involved in the planning efforts of this

FACT: The Mayor's Office and the project design team have met one-on-one with IDI representatives on at least eight occasions to discuss the project, gather their input and adjust project plans to minimize the impact on their operations. For example, our plans have been modified to minimize the property acquisition affecting IDI and to better accommodate truck traffic into and out of their campus.

I am disappointed that decades of study, analysis and evaluation of alternatives has been characterized as rushing the process.

FACT: The city has been analyzing a new east-west Corridor for more than 30

I would encourage residents to visit cityofnoblesville.com/signatureprojects and review the materials that show the extensive analysis and due diligence that has been performed to date. In-depth analysis, design work, and consideration of alternative alignments have been performed, in coordination with our team of environmental, historic preservation, and infrastructure design professionals, for many years.

FACT: The B1 alignment was approved following the extensive environmental process that is required by the state dor will bring residents and visitors near



and federal governments.

Upon learning of the creation of the historic district, the project team explored multiple angles and strategies to see whether the initially envisioned alignment could be sustained. After thoroughly pursuing those efforts, our professional advisors have concluded that the likelihood of getting approval of the

initially envisioned alignment, which is essentially what IDI is recommending, is so low that it is a waste of taxpayer resources to pursue it further. Attempting to revisit questions already asked and answered only serves to increase our risk, increase the cost of the project for taxpayers, and further delay a project that has been sorely

needed in our community for decades. that intentionally goes through a neighborhood that is listed on the National Register of Historic Places could cause our City to lose out on millions of dollars for this project and damage important relationships with state and federal agencies that would affect future road, trail, and infrastructure

FACT: IDI's suggested route would bisect and divide The Plum Prairie Historic District, which would displace families in a historically minority neighborhood that has cultural significance for our community. This is evidence enough to find their proposed route a harmful and irresponsible choice for our city.

IDI's "Bypass Coalition" title itself goes along with their general theme of misinformation and confusion. This City has made it clear that this road project will not be designed to be a bypass, but rather an alternative boulevard to help east-west traffic flow through our city. The corri-

businesses, restaurants, and other parts of town, therein boosting our local economy and enhancing public safety. It is irresponsible that IDI would suggest that a portion of their parking lot is more important than the local businesses, workers, residents, healthcare workers, first responders, schools, and students alike who need this

I am disappointed that a valued community employer and business has walked away from the table of constructive dialogue and negotiation.

FACT: The project alignment, which has been approved by the state, impacts only the south portion of IDI's parking lot, representing around 15 percent of their total property.

The City has a strong track record of working with IDI to facilitate their growth FACT: Moving forward with a route and operations in Noblesville, including granting nearly \$300,000 in property tax abatements during the previous decade, which is still providing a monetary benefit to the company today. Additionally, we have made multiple offers to find and improve alternative parking solutions that could provide a net increase in space and parking capacity. To the extent that IDI contemplates building expansions that would take up portions of their parking lot, we would be glad to work with them on redevelopment and property acquisition strategies in the area to help achieve those plans and improve their campus. We appreciate that IDI wishes to maintain or achieve a "desired visual aesthetic," and we believe that our project, which will provide better boulevard access and develop a convergence of three modern walking and biking trails near their business, will enhance the overall value and aesthetic of their property.

'Rocks open season with back-to-back victories

WESTFIELD - In just two games, the Westfield boys basketball team has established an identity that revolves around balance and defense.

The Shamrocks opened their season last Friday with a 47-38 Hoosier Crossroads Conference victory at Zionsville. Westfield played its first home game last Saturday and won big, cruising past Kokomo 65-30.

The Shamrocks and the Eagles were tied at 7-7 after the first quarter, but Westfield pulled away in the second period, holding Zionsville to just five points. The 'Rocks scored 16 in that quarter, giving them a 23-12 lead at halftime.

Westfield stayed in front in the second half, playing good defense throughout. The Eagles cut the Shamrocks' lead to three in the fourth quarter, but Westfield made its free throws down the stretch to seal the victory.

Braden Smith scored 14 points to lead the Shamrocks scoring, and also handed out six assists. Nic Depasquale added 13 points and Cam Haffner led the Westfield rebounding with six.

By winning over Kokomo, it was the second consecutive season where the 'Rocks began 2-0.

"Our guys have played really hard the last couple nights here on a tough opening weekend," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpter. "We're finally glad to be playing basketball, and certainly feel fortunate for every game that we get to play. I thought our guys played hard. They did a good job on the defensive end, or really both ends both nights.'

The Wildkats only led once, when Shayne Spear opened the game with a 3-pointer. After that it was all Shamrocks. Haffner tied the game with his own triple, then Smith drained a 3 to give Westfield the lead. Those baskets started an 11-0 run for the 'Rocks, which also day night."



Noblesville's Ashlynn Shade placed on Naismith Underclassmen Watch List

Before she even got into high school, many people in the Indiana basketball world were saying that Ashlynn Shade was going to be a very good player.

Shade is now a quarter of the way through her sophomore season at Noblesville, and she has certainly proved how good she is. After a stellar freshman year where she averaged 20.5 points per game, Shade is going strong as a sophomore, with 21.6 points per game so far this sea-

Now it appears that Shade's success has become known beyond Indiana. The 5-foot-8 guard has been placed on the 2020-2021 Jersey Mike's Naismith High School Trophy Underclassmen Girls Watch List. The list contains 25 underclass girls from across the country, and Shade is one of the five sophomores to be recognized. She is also the only player from Indiana on the list.

"I think it's really cool because I've working hard my whole life to get those honors and everything, and I think it's cool that it's finally happening," said Shade. "I've just been working hard my whole life to get those goals and achieve everything. And then I've just had so much help along the way. Every team I've played on, every coach I've had, everyone's just helped me get here."

played Lawrence North on Nov. 7, 2019. In Noblesville's 23 games last season, Shade reached double figures in all but one contest, and totaled at least 20 points in 12 of them. She hit her season-high of 34 points twice, in Noblesville victories against Anderson and Franklin Central.

So far this season, Shade has been consistently outstanding in all five of the Millers' games. Her scoring has ranged from 19 to 24 points, the latter total she achieved twice

Shade is far from one-dimensional. She already revealed that last year, with 6.7 rebounds per game (including four with at least 10) and solid numbers in steals (4.2 per game) and assists (2.3 per game). But Shade has improved them even more this year, averaging 6.2 rebounds, 6.0 steals and 5.0 assists per game.

"Ashlynn is definitely one of the best players in the country," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. "She is a phenomenal basketball player. The growth that she's had from her freshman to sophomore year has been awesome to watch. She's just an all-around kid. She's going to guard you. She's going to be able to score. She can play point, she can play in the post. Her talent is absolutely unbelievable.

One of the best things about her is, she's just such a great kid and a great teammate. She's very humble, great student-athlete. She's just evkind of kid. It's unbelievable what she's capable of doing on and off the floor and we're really excited to have her here."

If Shade felt any pressure handling high-school level competition, she has responded to it very well. In fact, she said having pressure is fun "because it just gives me extra motivation to work harder."

"And I still have a lot of time to achieve a lot of my goals, so I think that's awesome that I'm still young and able to still try to achieve everything," said Shade.

Of course, Shade is always mindful of her teammates. She's enjoying the chances to get to play with her fellow Millers, saying she loves her team "so much."

"It's just awesome," said Shade. "I love hanging out with them, I love coming to practice every day and seeing them. And even at school. They're like my best friends. I just love them so much."

That chemistry has given Noblesville a 5-1 record so far this season. That includes wins over big programs like Lawrence North and Hamilton Southeastern, the last two teams to have won a Class 4A state championship.

"I think we're doing awesome," said Shade. "We're playing well as a team. We're being awesome communicators. We're picking each other up mentally and everything. We hold each other accountable. I still say we
