



Beaver Materials withdraws request for gravel pit rezone

On Dec. 7, Beaver Materials withdrew a request for a change in zoning to allow a gravel pit just south of Potter's Bridge in Noblesville.

Beaver's controversial pro-

posal recently received no recommendation from the Noblesville Plan Commission. The request for a zoning change was then scheduled to be heard by the Noblesville Common Council on Dec. 8.

Beaver's proposal was met with opposition by a group of local residents known as "Don't Leave It to Beaver," in addition to the Hoosier Environmental Council and Indiana American Water.

The City of Noblesville is-

sued a social media statement that indicated Beaver Materials retains the opportunity to refile the petition for a zoning change.

HSE support staff to be paid at least through Jan. 15

With HSE school buildings not in use due to all-virtual classes, the school board voted to pay the support staff, such as bus drivers and food service workers.

The board voted last Wednesday to continue paying those workers at least through Jan. 15. The board is expected to decide on Jan. 13 whether to continue virtual learning or return some students to the classrooms.

The vote to continue paying the school district's support staff was 5-2, with Brad Boyer and Amanda Shera voting no. Boyer expressed concern for paying these employees into 2021 with the board facing budget cuts of \$5 million in the next school year.

Carmel, GOAT reach agreement

Business can reopen, but must comply with new conditions

The City of Carmel announced on Dec. 8 the enforcement of a zoning variance that would force a local tavern, known as the GOAT, to close at 2 p.m.

According to city officials, the previous owners ran a breakfast and lunch café for which the variance was issued in 2007. The variance runs with the land allowing subsequent owners the same variance.

The action came after numerous neighbor complaints and frequent police calls related to loud music, public urination and vandalism.

Then, last Thursday, after negotiations with GOAT owners, the city announced it had reached an agreement that will allow the venue to temporarily operate past 2 p.m. under certain conditions until the use variance is decided on Feb. 25.

A statement issued by the City of Carmel said, "The owners of the GOAT have agreed that their strict compliance with the requirements included in the agreement is required to remain open. If there is a failure to comply with the requirements, the venue will have 24 hours to make changes necessary. If those changes are not accomplished in that time period, then DOCS can require that the GOAT cease operations immediately."

The following is the list of conditions in the agreement:

1. New hours of operation

a. Sunday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m.

b. Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 12 a.m. (midnight)

c. All food and beverage service will end one hour prior to closing, which would be 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and 11 p.m. on Friday and Saturday.

2. Noise Levels and Capacity

a. Noise levels will be at or below 50 decibels.

b. If an ordinance is passed by the City requiring new lower levels, operator will comply with those new levels.

c. No live music.

d. Only 40 persons or less per toilet in compliance with standards in the State of Indiana Building Code. If more restrooms are added, then the capacity can increase accordingly. The occupancy includes the indoor area and the three-season patio area.

e. The Sandlot outdoor area, including the fire pit, will be closed unless use of that area is approved as part of the use variance.

Donsbach appears to still be winner in HSE school board election recount

The recount in the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) school board at-large election in Delaware Township has been completed and Sarah Donsbach appears to still be the winner.

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams says the recount resulted in three additional votes for incumbent Amanda Shera, two more votes for Donsbach and five fewer votes for Tony Bagato, who finished third in the balloting. In the original certified count, Donsbach was shown as the winner in Delaware Township with 20 more votes than Shera.

Attorneys representing the candidates will be working on an agreement to be submitted to the Recount Commission, then the document with the recounted results goes to Superior Court Judge Jonathon Brown. The court will then approve the final recount report.

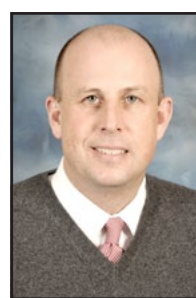
Chris Baldwin named interim Westfield schools superintendent

Carmel using wastewater testing to help forecast COVID spikes

The City of Carmel continues to test its wastewater to determine the prevalence of COVID-19 infections within the community. These studies can show an increase of the virus in the community up to 10 days ahead of a possible spike in positive cases where medical care is required.

Wastewater samples are being collected at the Car-

mel Wastewater Treatment Plant and analyzed for the presence of SARS-CoV-2, the coronavirus that is causing the infections.

Mayor Jim Brainard said the City is taking this extra step to assist local hospitals as they respond to a growing number of patients. The additional evidence of positive tests will allow hospital leaders to make more informed decisions on matters

such as hospital staffing, scheduling elective surgeries, allocation of pharmaceuticals and other matters. In addition, the data helps the State coordinate patient placement and employers to make better decisions about business gatherings and whether employees should work at home.

"Testing the wastewater coming into our sewage plant allows us to provide

vital information to hospitals and businesses with advance warning that they may experience a spike in COVID-19 cases. Even a few days' notice can help our community prepare for an increasing number of cases," Brainard said. "We all need to do what we can to help our vital healthcare workers and this is one way that Carmel can provide useful information, which

will allow our local hospital administrators to make decisions based on scientific data."

To test for COVID, copies of viral RNA (DNA) are extracted from the wastewater and quantified so that researchers may trend the numbers and determine if there are spikes or decreases in the wastewater concentrations. Monitoring RNA in wastewater can re-

veal viral occurrence or emergence up to two weeks ahead of medical testing. Likewise, it can correlate to the number of infected individuals in the community, whether they are symptomatic or asymptomatic. Therefore, it can measure the scope of an outbreak independent of patient testing and hospital reporting.

HSE school board discusses substitute teacher availability

When Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools made the decision to have all-virtual classes as of Nov. 19, the reason for that board vote centered on the lack of substitute teachers. Administrators told the board there were simply not enough adults to handle classrooms when teachers were ill or on quarantine due to exposure to one or more individuals testing positive for COVID-19.

The virtual classes will continue at least through Jan. 15. New board members will be sworn-in at the Jan. 13 meeting and a decision is expected on whether to remain all-virtual after Jan. 15.

That decision will be heavily influenced by how many substitute teachers are available. School officials were using

every available person to cover classrooms needing a sub, including principals, assistant principals, counselors and central office administrators. Many teachers offered to give up their preparation periods to oversee classrooms without the regular teacher available.

But even with all that, the district was coming up short on providing enough substitutes. Superintendent Allen Bourff told the board his staff has been processing applicants as quickly as possible. Background checks are required, with the fee and amount of time needed to complete the check dependent on how many states must be checked in the process.

Some substitute teachers are retirees and many are hesitant to cover classrooms during the pandemic. Dr. Bourff told the board 54 percent of available substitute

teachers have not been in a classroom during the pandemic. However, 46 percent of the subs have substitute taught at least once during the pandemic, many of them subbing more than once.

Dr. Bourff encouraged people in the local HSE community to apply for a substitute teaching position, saying that would be a big help in bringing students at the lower grade levels back to in-person learning.

Board President Michelle Fullhart asked Dr. Bourff to comment on local social media posts asserting that the Hamilton Southeastern Education Association, the local teachers union, is responsible for the district going to all-virtual classes. The association has input into district decisions per state law, but Dr. Bourff made clear the teachers’ union never forced the school corporation into any decision.

HSE Schools begins tough discussions about budget

Certain members of the staff around Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools will begin meeting on Dec. 16 as a budget study task force, with the goal of finding \$5 million in spending cuts during the 2021-2022 school year. The state funds local schools based on enrollment, and local student enrollment is down this school year.

HSE Schools Chief Financial Officer Cecile Nunn told the school board last Wednesday night that districts around the state are seeing a drop in enrollment, largely due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The board unanimously put its seal of approval on the purpose and guiding principles for the task force. That includes reviewing and considering all programs, exploring innovations in delivering programs and using attrition if a reduction-in-force is necessary.

The task force is scheduled to update the board monthly and submit its final recommendations to the superintendent in February, with the board receiving the final task force report for a vote March 24.

In another budget-related action, the board voted to freeze the automatic, incremental pay raises built into the system and allow a 1 percent increase in the pay scale for administrators and support staff. This is effective Jan. 1, 2021.

Local governments awarded \$1.65M for road projects

Indiana Governor Eric J. Holcomb and Indiana Department of Transportation Commissioner Joe McGuinness announced 241 Indiana cities, towns and counties received a combined \$101 million in state matching funds for local road projects through Community Crossings, a component of the Governor’s Next Level Roads program.

Locally, Carmel, Noblesville, and Hamilton County received funding. Carmel topped the list with \$1 million received, followed by Hamilton County receiving \$475,603.65 and Noblesville receiving \$181,290.

“As we navigate through the challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic, we’re as committed as ever to improving and building our state’s infrastructure,” Holcomb said. “I’m incred-

ibly pleased that we’re able to fund all of the high-priority local road projects submitted in this round. Taking care of our local roads is key to making sure our communities remain attractive places to grow businesses and create careers.”

The Community Crossings Initiative has provided more than \$830 million in state matching funds for construction projects. In response to revenue uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, INDOT moved this call for projects, originally scheduled for July, to September. The \$101 million award is funded by the balance available in the state’s local road and bridge matching grant fund at the end of the 2020 fiscal year as well as revenue collected so far in the 2021 fiscal year.

“This is a tremendous win for our local partners,”

McGuinness said. “Our continued partnership with Hoosier communities will deliver more high priority local road projects in the coming year, many of which have been in planning for months or even years and wouldn’t be able to move forward now without the state’s funding commitment.”

To qualify for funding, local governments must provide local matching funds – 50 percent for larger communities or 25 percent for smaller communities – from a funding source approved for road and bridge construction. They must also submit an INDOT-approved asset management plan for maintaining existing roads and bridges. State law requires annually that 50 percent of the available matching funds be awarded to communities within counties with a population

of 50,000 or fewer. State lawmakers identified long-term funding for Community Crossings as part of House Enrolled Act 1002, passed by the legislature and signed into law by Gov. Holcomb in April 2017.

3. Security

- a. Operator will **control the entrance, and exits** of the premises to ensure all employees and patrons are using only public streets, sidewalks, paths and the Monon Greenway and not accessing through private residences.
- b. **If necessary**, operator will employ **private security** to ensure compliance with this and other requirements and to prevent endangerment of neighboring properties.
- c. There will be **only one entrance** into the building and it will be on the east side of the restaurant. Operator will make any improvements necessary to prevent entrance from Sandlot outdoor area or Monon Greenway directly.
- d. Operator will employ **full-time employee “Bouncer”** to be at the main entrance to confirm legal age of all who enter, prevent patrons from taking beverages outside the restaurant building, to ensure that all persons, except employees and staff, have left the building at closing and to prevent loitering in the immediate area after closing.
- e. Operator will direct all **ride sharing** activities to the drop off/pick up point near Midtown Garage.

4. Cleanliness

- a. Operator will install a **water hose** to be used on a regular basis to clean outside of premises and surrounding area.
 - b. Operator will be responsible for **collection of trash in a three-block area** following daily closing of the premises.

When it was time to give up the open road, Daniel entered another trade – drywall hanging and finishing. He worked for White Drywall Company for over 25 years. During that time, "Dr. Drywall" developed a reputation for doing things the right way and paying attention to detail. Just like his time on the road, this too would become a family adventure of sorts, only this time with his nephew, Don Massey. Daniel always thought of Don as "the son he never had." He took Don under his wing, showed him the tricks of the trade, and was about as proud as anyone could be at the craftsman his nephew became.

Family was truly important to Daniel. He loved every moment he got to spend with his kids and with his grandchildren. He especially loved when family time coincided with going out to eat. During the past several months, going to a restaurant with his family was something he missed very much.

The City has been analyzing samples of the incoming wastewater (influent) at the treatment plant for SARS-CoV-2 since the beginning of May when viral concentrations were really high. In June, viral concentrations in the wastewater dropped rapidly and the virus was undetectable in many of the samples. Because of that, the City researched and found two labs that were able to detect the virus at lower concentrations. Samples were sent to each lab twice a week for approximately two months. The data reported by both labs was statistically similar and showed that viral concentrations were relatively "moderate" and fairly consistent throughout August and September.


In October, the City continued to analyze samples using one of the two aforementioned labs at a schedule

of twice per week. Starting mid-October, viral concentrations in the wastewater started to spike rapidly. From Oct. 26 to Nov. 17, viral concentrations were almost doubling each week. Since Nov. 19, the viral concentrations have decreased slightly each week until now. The viral presence remains high, but the concentrations seem to be trending downward.

The viral concentrations that the City has trended since August have correlated very closely with Hamilton County's COVID-19 case loads. Likewise, the spikes in infections that have been reported over the month of November can be confirmed with the SARS-CoV-2 RNA concentrations in the wastewater. Therefore, the viral RNA concentrations in the wastewater can be used to confirm the prevalence of COVID-19 infections within the community.

Tigers pull away from Millers, are 2-0 in HCC

FISHERS - As the night went along at the Tiger Den, the Fishers girls basketball team's defense got stronger.

The Tigers won a pivotal Hoosier Crossroads Conference game with Noblesville last Friday, beating the Millers 53-40. Fishers was involved in a tough battle with Noblesville during the first quarter, but used its defense to pull away and improve its HCC record to 2-0.

"I got to credit our team defense," said Tigers coach Lauren Votaw. In the past four games, Fishers has kept its opponents under 45 points.

"We've talked about keeping people under 45, so holding a team like that to 40 is good for us," said Votaw.

The Tigers led for most of the game, jumping out to a 5-0 lead after Katie Burton made a 3-pointer and a putback. Noblesville's Ashlynn Shade kept her team close, scoring the Millers' first eight points to keep them within 9-8.

Hailey Smith scored on a layin to make it 11-8, Fishers, but Noblesville scored the first quarter's last four points to lead 12-11. Olivia Smith opened the second period with her own layin to get the Tigers back on top 12-13, and the Millers' Reagan Wilson nailed a triple to push Noblesville ahead 15-13.

Wilson's layin got the Millers up 20-19, but Fishers went on a 7-0 run to lead 26-20 and never trailed again. I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault – it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about. But when I was introduced to Prevail of Central Indiana, I was shocked by the number of individuals who are affected by domestic violence. In 2018 alone, Prevail helped more than 4,000 clients in Hamilton County. (Nearly 80 percent of clients are women and children.) Domestic violence and abuse are hard topics to discuss, so you don't often hear about them.
