No ceremony this year for newly elected local officials

For the first time in local history, there will be no public swearing-in ceremony this year for newly elected public officials. Due to health concerns over the COVID-19 virus, county officials decided against the usual practice.

Normally there is a formal Courthouse ceremony for all officials winning office in the November election. The activities often draw around 200 family members and friends.

This year, new or re-elected officials will be sworn individually at a location of their choosing or they may go to the county clerk's office to take their oath. The terms of office for those newly elected begins Jan. 1.

Taking office for new terms locally are: judges Paul Felix, William Hughes, Richard Campbell and David Najjar, County Auditor Robin Mills, County Treasurer Susan Byer, County Surveyor Kenton Ward, County Commissioners Steven Dillinger and Mark Heirbrandt, and County Councilors Brad Beaver, Sue Maki and Steven Nation.

All are Republicans. In addition, there are 14 nonpartisan school board members countywide who will be sworn in their school communities.

Sheridan High School to join Rural Early College Network

Sheridan High School is one of five high schools in Indiana named in the final cohort of schools in the Rural Early College Network (RECEN) administered by the University of Indianapolis Center of Excellence in Leadership of Learning (CELL).

The Rural Early College Network helps students earn college credit while they complete their high school education. Sheridan High School will receive \$120,000 over three years as it works with the University of Indianapolis Center for Excellence in Leadership of Learning (CELL) and a mentor high school.

CELL established the Rural Early College Network through a \$7.9 million grant from the federal Education Innovation and Research program administered by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Elementary and Secondary Education. RECEN helps rural Indiana schools more quickly implement the Early College

high school model. Early College targets underserved students and allows them to earn both high school diplomas and up to two years of credits toward bachelor's or associate degrees through rigorous dual credit classes supported by wrap-around services.

"We are excited to welcome these high schools to the Rural Early College Network (RECEN) project," CELL Executive Director Carey Dahncke said. "Funding and support provided to these schools will help to develop Early College programming for underserved students, allowing them to earn a high school diploma with up to two years of college credits. Our team is excited to work with the educators at these five schools to support innovative opportunities for Hoosier students."

Recipient schools may use the funds for teacher credentialing for dual credit instruction, professional development, travel to RECEN meetings and conferences, and other items that each school specifi-

cally needs to support the students and staff. Schools also receive professional development on work-based learning and career readiness activities for students.

Verizon to "pause" rollout of 5G tower installations in Fishers neighborhoods

The City of Fishers has been told by Verizon the firm plans to "pause" the rollout of 5G towers into Fishers neighborhoods.

In a message sent to subdivisions with pending or tabled 5G permits, the city says "it is our understanding that Verizon will not apply for any new residential permits for a few months."

Verizon has told city officials the company plans to concentrate on a fiber optic

buildout. The company also says it plans to come back to the city for more 5G towers in mid-2021.

The message to neighborhoods provided the following information:

- All tabled or pending applications and permits are now considered withdrawn. If your neighborhood was scheduled at an upcoming Board of Works meeting, these agenda items have now been removed.
- Tabled or pending applications and permits will likely be submitted again at a later date. At that time, the City intends to restart the permit process from the begin-

ning, meaning you will have another opportunity to review placements and discuss locations with Verizon Wireless and City of Fishers.

- This does not mean 5G implementation has stopped in the city. Several 5G towers, located in public right of way outside of neighborhoods, will undergo permitting and construction into 2021. Additionally, approved residential permits may be constructed within neighborhoods in 2021.
- Verizon Wireless has shared that it intends to re-launch its implementation of 5G in Fishers neighborhoods mid-2021.

Carmel receives \$1 million INDOT Community Crossings grant for major road resurfacing projects

The Indiana Department of Transportation has awarded \$1 million to the City of Carmel as part of its \$101 million in funds for local road projects across the state. More than 240 cities, towns and counties throughout the state received the matching funds through the Community Crossings program.

Carmel's grant will fund seven major road resurfacing projects, including:

- 126th Street from Keystone Parkway to Hazel Dell Parkway
- Spring Mill Road from 96th Street to Illinois Street
- 141st Street from Ditch Road to Towne Road
- Lakeshore Drive from 96th Street to

106th Street

- Hazel Dell Parkway from 116th Street to 126th Street
- 96th Street from Michigan Road to U.S. 31
- Emerson Road from Guilford Road to 4th Avenue

For this application, the City Department of Engineering worked with the Street Department to identify larger roadway segments that were projected to undergo resurfacing this year to maximize the potential award amount. This \$1 million grant will supplement the \$4.5 million earmarked in the 2021 bud-

get for additional resurfacing projects in Carmel.

This is the first round of funds awarded through the program, since it resumed after a brief pause due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The program was paused because of uncertainties related to state revenue as a result of the pandemic.

"This is a tremendous win for our local partners," INDOT Commissioner Joe McGuinness said in a news release. "Our continued partnership with Hoosier communities will deliver more high priority local

road projects in the coming year, many of which have been in planning for months or even years and wouldn't be able to move forward now without the state's funding commitment."

In order to be eligible for funding, local governments must provide matching funds, including 50 percent for larger communities and 25 percent for smaller communities. The funding must come from a source approved for road and bridge construction.

"We are always pleased when we can bring more of our taxpayers' dollars back into the community," Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard said. "Resurfacing these roadways using state funds will allow us to use our city tax dollars for other roadway improvements."



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Synergize ignites hope, ends 2020 stronger than ever

Synergize finished its first year in Carmel exactly the same way it began: Changing the world with a group of friends.
At the final 4:30 Meetup at the new Feinstein Club at the Carmichael Hotel, the group raised funds for Marlin Jackson’s Fight for Life Foundation. Despite capping attendance for safety, members donated over \$1,500 to support underserved youth in the community.
The Fight for Life Foundation was founded by former Indianapolis Colts player Marlin Jackson in 2007. Inspired by Jackson’s own upbringing, the non-profit teaches social-emotional learning in schools and through athletic programs.
The program helps underserved youth learn to set goals, make good decisions, and manage their emotions. These skills, Jackson explained, aren’t always taught to children with absent parents.
“How good would your decision-making be if you were missing these key crucial relationships?” asked Jackson, who spoke at the event. “If you didn’t have that role model ... we fill that gap.”
To boost Synergize’s impact, Vivante Restaurant also donated 10 percent of its revenue from Tuesday night to the Fight for Life Foundation. The French restaurant, lo-

cated in Hotel Carmichael, opened its doors in August.
“We love supporting local nonprofits and Carmel businesses,” said Heather Hunter, Synergize’s Marketing and Communications Coordinator. “Thanks to Vivante, we get to do both at once.”
As Synergize wraps up December, the group is looking into the future. Since start-

ing with a handful of members in January, the group has raised more than \$33,000 for Indiana nonprofits in 2020. The goal for 2021? \$60,000.
“The impact we’ve been able to have on the Carmel and Indianapolis communities wouldn’t be possible without you amazing, altruistic people,” Hunter told attendees. “All of this is because of our members.”

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



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Early morning accident on SR 37 takes the life of an Indianapolis man

A fatal accident, a head-on collision, snarled traffic on State Road 37 near 135th Street in Fishers during the Monday morning rush hour. The identity of the driver who died, an Indianapolis man, 29, has not yet been released by authorities.

Police were called to

the scene at 3:30 a.m. Monday, finding a collision involving a Dodge Charger and Toyota Scion. Officers discovered a man trapped in the Toyota with critical injuries. He was transported to a local hospital where police say he later died.

Preliminary information from authorities indicates the Toyota Scion was traveling southbound in the northbound lanes of State

Road 37 when it collided head on with the Dodge Charger. The northbound lanes of State Road 37 were closed for approximately four hours.

The driver of the Dodge Charger, Takita D Lockridge, 33, Noblesville, was not seriously injured in the crash.

Police say the investigation of this accident is continuing.

Hospital leaders address dire state of pandemic, vaccine rollout

On Monday, members of the Indianapolis Coalition for Patient Safety (ICPS), a free-standing nonprofit comprised of leaders from major Central Indiana health systems, held a virtual briefing regarding the dire state of the pandemic in Indiana.

Hospital leaders representing Ascension St. Vincent, Community Health Network, Eskenazi Health, Franciscan Health Indianapolis, Indiana University Health, Richard L. Roudebush VA Medical Center and Suburban Health Organization provided an update on the growing number of hospitalizations and shrinking capacity in the intensive care units of hospitals in Central Indiana and across the state.

Indiana is averaging more than 6,000 COVID-19 patients per day, with approximately 3.5 percent of new cases requiring hospitalization. While this percentage seems small, it has added up quickly, leading all local hospitals to struggle with inpatient, ICU and ventilator capacity. ICPS expressed special concern about the shortage of ICU beds, as this capacity is needed not only for severely ill COVID-19 patients, but also for other patients needing acute care for heart attacks, car accidents and

other possible emergency situations.

"I want to say thank you to Hoosiers who are doing their part to protect themselves and others from catching and spreading COVID-19," said Dr. Michele Saysana, chair of the ICPS and chief quality and safety officer for IU Health. "While Friday's FDA authorization for the Pfizer vaccine represents a light at the end of the tunnel, until we have widespread vaccination, we must continue to stay vigilant in our efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Frontline healthcare workers and other groups at higher risk of getting COVID-19 will be among the first to receive a vaccine. And while this is promising news, we are far from mass vaccination that will allow us to return to 'normal.' We must continue to follow the prevention guidelines that we know work, and wear masks in public, wash our hands frequently and socially distance to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our communities."

In addition to approaching capacity, Indiana hospitals are experiencing staffing exhaustion and shortages. For more than nine months, ICU nurses have been coping with the stresses of caring for COVID-19 patients, who require a great deal of

hands-on care. Due to the spread of the virus in our communities, hospital staff members are getting sick, putting a greater strain on those who can work. While Central Indiana hospitals are bringing in traveling nurses whenever possible, these nurses are becoming more expensive and harder to find, as demand greatly exceeds supply.

The approaching winter weather and holidays threaten to make the current situation worse. Like other aerosol-transmitted viruses, COVID-19 lasts longer in the drier winter air. The weather also forces people indoors, in spaces with less ventilation, making it much easier for the virus to spread.

"Local hospitals are fast approaching crisis. We ask that Hoosiers remain cautious during the coming winter months and the approaching holidays by following statewide and local restrictions," ICPS members said in a joint statement. "Please continue to practice preventive measures that slow the spread of COVID-19: wear a mask when inside and outside where you can't socially distance, avoid gathering with anyone outside your household, wash your hands frequently and keep a distance of at least six feet from others when indoors."

Firewood cutting permits available at Tippecanoe River State Park

The public is invited to cut up and remove certain downed trees at Tippecanoe River State Park.

Trees eligible for firewood have fallen as a result of natural causes or have been dropped by property staff. They are along roadsides or in public areas such as campsites and picnic areas.

Permit sales and cutting both begin on Jan. 4 and

end on Feb. 26, 2021.

The cost of one pickup-truck load is \$10. All proceeds will be used for resource management and restoration efforts, including replacement of trees in campgrounds and other public areas.

A firewood permit must be obtained at the park's office, which is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Permits are not avail-

able on observed state holidays.

Wood may be cut and removed from 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. daily. For more information, call (574) 946-3213.

Firewood cut at Tippecanoe River State Park is for personal use only and cannot be sold.

Tippecanoe River State Park (on.IN.gov/tippecanoeiversp) is located at 4200 N. U.S. 35, Winamac.

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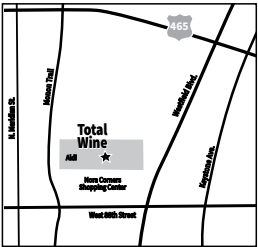


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TODAY'S BIBLE READING

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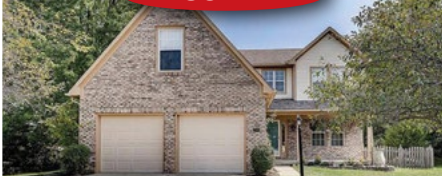

Royals win dual meet at The Mill

NOBLESVILLE - The two teams that wrestled a dual meet at The Mill on Tuesday have been dealing with injuries and absences, but are doing the best they can.

Noblesville hosted Hamilton Southeastern for an all-county matchup, which the Royals won 51-12. Southeastern won eight of the 11 contested matches, and performed well despite having three starters out of the lineup. The Millers had to give up three weight classes, but still gave it a battle.

"I thought we wrestled well," said HSE coach Nick Brobst. "We had three starters out of the lineup with injuries today. With that, sometimes you don't know what you're going to get. I think we had seven freshmen in the lineup or something like that. And I thought they stepped up big time."

One of those freshmen provided excitement during the 160-pound match. DeShawn Ternoir trailed in the first period, but turned it around to get a third-period pin. He was the first of the Royals wrestlers to get a fall; Max Broom finished the meet with a third-period pin of his own at 195 pounds.

Southeastern won three additional matches by major decision, by Nick Egorov at 126, Riley Fredricksen at 132 and Trevon Ternoir at 152. Decision winners were Devin Dudley, who started the meet with a 6-4 victory at 220 pounds; Adam Gerstner later won at 138 and Jacob Schneider took the 182-pound bout.

"We had some big wins from some young guys, even some guys that were out a weight class," said Brobst. "Adam Gerstner comes to mind, bumping up from JV 132 to varsity 138, getting a big win there. We had some big wins from a couple of other freshmen. DeShawn Ternoir got a big win at 160, a comeback victory when he was down by five points to start the match. Very pleased overall with the team effort."

Tyler Jenkins, Mat Benson and Blake Alvarado received forfeits at 106, 113 and 120 respectively.

Ben Decker was the Millers' first winner, getting a decision victory at 285. Carter Richardson then got the Noblesville team going with a comeback win at 145 pounds. Richardson trailed until getting near-fall points in the final seconds of the third period to tie the match, then got a takedown in overtime to win.

Joey Kitko gave the Millers their final win of the night with a second-period pin at 170 pounds.

"The kids that are out there, they're out there and they're giving their maximum effort, and that's all you can ask," said Noblesville coach Michael Weimer, noting the uncertain times that everyone is in.

"Every coach that I've talked to, every tournament we've been at, it's a different team, everybody's having struggles and problems, and just trying to fill a team is more of a victory in itself," said Weimer.

Southeastern is next schedule to compete at the Kyle Osborn Memorial Invitational Saturday at McCutcheon. The Millers will wrestle at The Mill again next Tuesday when they host Westfield for their Senior Night meet.

Monster Energy Supercross 2021 complete schedule revealed

Feld Entertainment, Inc., today announced the complete schedule for the upcoming 2021 Monster Energy AMA Supercross, an FIM World Championship, season. The three rounds originally scheduled for Glendale, Ariz. were removed from the schedule and the series will now split those races between Orlando, Fla., and Salt Lake City.

State Farm Stadium in Glendale is a tremendously partner and the Arizona fans have strongly supported Supercross since 1999 but current attendance restrictions and local health mandates have created a difficult environment in which to plan this far in advance. The series hopes to return to Glendale in 2022.

After the trio of races in Indianapolis, the series will venture to Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Fla. for two races on Saturday, Feb. 13 and Saturday, Feb. 20, followed by the annual visit to the Daytona International Speedway in Daytona Beach, Fla. on Saturday, March 6.

The Arlington, Texas dates remain the same – Saturday, March 13, Tuesday, March 16 and Saturday, March 20 at AT&T Stadium.

The three previously unannounced events will now take place in Atlanta, Ga. at the Atlanta Motor Speedway on Saturday, April 10, Tuesday, April 13 and Saturday, April 17. The final two races of the season will take place at Rice-Eccles
