



# Ready for winter weather? Hamilton County is all set

*Highway Department, Commissioners,  
County Council review snow fighting fleet*

"Preparing for the worst and hoping for the best" is the Hamilton County Highway Department's annual mantra.

"The County Highway Department will use approximately 6,000 tons of salt per winter to treat nearly 1,200 miles of roadway and bridges in the unincorporated areas of the county," said Highway Director Brad Davis. "All trucks also maintain a capability to dispense liquid de-icing chemicals to assist with combating snow and ice in much colder temperatures when salt is less effective."

At approximately \$93 per ton, the County does all it can to minimize the amount of salt required. Hamilton County also uses salt brine as part of an anti-icing program to help keep snow and ice from bonding to the pavement, help prevent frost on bridges, and allow for a much easier post storm cleanup.

"The Highway Department should also be commended for the phenomenal job it does in inspecting and maintaining its snow-fighting fleet," said County Commissioner Mark

Heirbrandt. "That fleet includes 14 snow trucks, two V-plows, pickup trucks, brine making equipment, and liquid storage tank pumps."

The Highway Department is also prepared to maintain a 24-hour oper-

ation if necessary. County Councilman Steve Schwartz says additional CDL and non-CDL certified drivers are hired annually to supplement the normal highway staff.

"They may be called upon to drive the large

snow trucks when split shifting is required or to take out one of the pickup trucks equipped with snowplows," Schwartz said. "When things get real tight, Commissioner Heirbrandt and I have been known to lend a hand as well."

# Hamilton Heights goes hybrid for grades 5-12

Last Thursday, Hamilton Heights Superintendent Dr. Derek Arrowood announced the district will implement a hybrid schedule for students in grades 5 through 12.

In an email sent to parents and students, Arrowood said:

"After much review, research, and consideration, Hamilton Heights School Corporation will implement a new hybrid (a model of in-person and E-Learning) scheduling format for students in grades 5 through 12 beginning Monday, January 4, 2021 through March 12, 2021 (the 3rd nine-week grading period). Principals Jarrod Mason (HHHS) and Bret Bailey (HHMS) will be sending out additional information and specifics about the hybrid schedule tomorrow.

"Elementary school will remain as in-person daily, because we believe that is the best instructional model for these students at this time.

"We also believe this move, which was the result of a collaborative effort between our Hamilton Heights

Classroom Teachers Association, administrators, and parent input, will offer us the best option to establish a quality teaching and learning experience for our middle and high school students and staff.

"This new hybrid schedule, similar to what many area middle and high schools have had in place since the beginning of this school year, will provide a safe option for families who want in-person instruction as well as an option for families who want to continue with remote learning.

"This is not a perfect solution and it cannot replace the pre-COVID-19 student-centered classroom, but it is the right move for the times we are facing with safety first and foremost. Thank you for your patience, flexibility, and support as we continue to rise to the challenges before us."

# Sheridan High School to join Rural Early College Network

Sheridan High School is one of five high schools in Indiana named in the final group of schools in the Rural Early College Network (REC�) administered by the University of Indianapolis Center of Excellence in Leadership

of Learning (CELL).

The Rural Early College Network helps students earn college credit while they complete their high school education. Sheridan High School will receive \$120,000 over three years as it works with CELL and a mentor high school.

REC� helps rural Indiana schools quickly implement the Early College high school model.

Recipient schools may use the funds for teacher credentialing for dual credit instruction, professional development, travel to REC� meetings and conferences,

and other items that each school specifically needs to support the students and staff. Schools also receive professional development on work-based learning and career readiness activities for students.

# Noblesville announces second round of Small Business Resilience Grant funding

*Small businesses could get up to \$10,000 per grant*

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced on Dec. 15 a second round of the Noblesville Small Business Resilience Grant program. Up to \$10,000 per grant will again be provided to small businesses that have been significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The grant is focused on helping small businesses with unmet immediate needs such as maintaining payroll, paying rent and utilities, and covering other expenses, including personal protective equipment (PPE) to remain operational and serve customers and clients. Businesses are eligible for up to \$10,000 per grant

based on the demonstrated need.

If a business received funding in the first round of funding in early 2020, they are eligible for up to \$5,000 in this second phase of grant funding. New businesses within their first year of operation are also eligi-

ble for up to \$5,000 in grant funding.

"When we announced this program in the spring at the beginning of the pandemic, we were convinced that short-term assistance was needed to help our business community navigate the various challenges that came from shutdown orders and other public health risks and safety measures," Jensen said.

The deadline to submit applications is 5 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 8. The Noblesville Small Business Resilience Grant application and eligibility requirements are available at [cityofnoblesville.org/LoveNoblesville](http://cityofnoblesville.org/LoveNoblesville).

# Carmel receives \$1 million INDOT Community Crossings grant for major road resurfacing projects

The Indiana Department of Transportation has awarded \$1 million to the City of Carmel as part of its \$101 million in funds for local road projects across the state. More than 240 cities, towns and counties throughout the state received the matching funds through the Community

Crossings program.

Carmel's grant will fund seven major road resurfacing projects, including:

- 126th Street from Keystone Parkway to Hazel Dell Parkway
- Spring Mill Road from 96th Street to Illinois Street
- 141st Street from Ditch Road to Towne Road

- Lakeshore Drive from 96th Street to 106th Street
- Hazel Dell Parkway from 116th Street to 126th Street
- 96th Street from Michigan Road to U.S. 31
- Emerson Road from Guilford Road to 4th Avenue

This \$1 million grant will supplement the \$4.5 million

earmarked in the 2021 budget for additional resurfacing projects in Carmel.

In order to be eligible for funding, local governments must provide matching funds, including 50 percent for larger communities and 25 percent for smaller communities. The funding must come from a source approved for road and

bridge construction.

"We are always pleased when we can bring more of our taxpayers' dollars back into the community," Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard said. "Resurfacing these roadways using state funds will allow us to use our city tax dollars for other roadway improvements."

## Verizon to “pause” rollout of 5G tower installations in Fishers neighborhoods

The City of Fishers has been told by Verizon the firm plans to "pause" the rollout of 5G towers into Fishers neighborhoods.

In a message sent to subdivisions with pending or tabled 5G permits, the city says "it is our understanding that Verizon will not apply for any new residential permits for a few months."

Verizon has told city officials the company plans to concentrate on a fiber optic buildout. The company also says it plans to come back to the city for more 5G towers in mid-2021.

The message to neighborhoods provided the following information:

- All tabled or pending applications and permits are now considered withdrawn. If

your neighborhood was scheduled at an upcoming Board of Works meeting, these agenda items have now been removed.

- Tabled or pending applications and permits will likely be submitted again at a later date. At that time, the City intends to restart the permit process from the beginning, meaning you will have another opportunity to review placements and discuss locations with Verizon Wireless and City of Fishers.
- This does not mean 5G implementation has stopped in the city. Several 5G towers, located in public right of way outside of neighborhoods, will undergo permitting and construction into 2021. Additionally, approved residential permits may be constructed within neighborhoods in 2021.
- Verizon Wireless has shared that it intends to re-launch its implementation of 5G in Fishers neighborhoods mid-2021.

## Husband and wife found shot on Noblesville's west side

At 1:28 p.m. last Thursday, Noblesville police officers responded to 15905 Plains Road to a report of a shooting inside the residence.

Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and located two victims, male and female, upstairs and both suffering from apparent gunshot wounds. Officers and firefighters provided immediate care to the victims and both were transported by ground ambulance to area hospitals.

The female victim, Kristin A. Tomalia, 37, Noblesville, suffered at least one gunshot wound and was transported by ground ambulance to Ascension St. Vincent (Indianapolis) with life-threatening injuries. She later succumbed to her wounds shortly after

arriving at the hospital.

The male victim, Rene C. Tomalia, 43, Noblesville, suffered at least one gunshot wound and was transported by ground ambulance to Eskenazi Health (Indianapolis) with life-threatening injuries. He also later succumbed to his wounds shortly after arriving at the hospital.

The victims were determined to be a married couple.

Investigators petitioned for and were later granted a search warrant in order to process the scene and collect evidence. Based on witness statements and alleged evidence at the scene, investigators believe that there is no cause for public concern regarding any additional suspect(s) in this case.

This remains an ongoing investigation.

# Royals run away with Mudsock game

**FISHERS** - Even during a basketball season with fan restrictions, quarantines and interrupted schedules, some things aren't changing.

A good example of this is the Mudsock boys basketball game, which took place last Friday when Hamilton Southeastern visited Fishers. While some things were different, such as a drastically reduced crowd at the Tiger Den due to those restrictions, the emotion of the game was still the same.

The Royals rode that emotion into a big win. Despite being down for a good portion of the first half, Southeastern turned things around by the second quarter and went on to a 65-51 victory over the Tigers.

"That was the biggest thing that we keep harping on with our guys: The way that we were resilient, kept fighting back and never give up," said Royals coach Brian Satterfield. "The one thing that we love about our kids, they get out there and they compete every day."

Fishers hadn't played a game since Dec. 1, but showed no signs of rust in the first quarter. The Tigers skipped off to an 11-2 lead; HSE's Vinny Buccilla scored the first basket of the game before Fishers ran off 11 straight points. Lucas Prewitt hit a 3-pointers, Jeffrey Simmons and Bryce Williams both made three-point plays, then Simmons scored again on a layin.

Simmons then nailed two more triples in the latter part of the quarter, helping the Tigers to a 21-11 lead. Buccilla made a pair of free throws and Alex Totton scored the last basket of the period to get HSE within 21-15, then Loudon Sundling opened the second with a layin.

Williams made a rare four-point play, making the free throw while being fouled in the act of hitting a 3-pointer, early in the second quarter. Simmons made two foul shots a minute later, and Fishers led 29-19.

That's when the Royals made their first big run, a 13-0 stretch to take a 32-31 lead with under three minutes remaining in the half. Isaac Bowman drained a pair of 3s, and Buccilla added five points. Southeastern then hung on to the lead until halftime, which saw the Royals ahead 38-36. Wil-

"They were moving the basketball and hitting the open look. I think after that, especially in that second quarter, we started winning those 50/50 balls, were getting the rebounds."

Fishers' Drew Turner opened the second half with a putback to tie the game at 38-38. But Southeastern embarked on another run, this one a 15-3 run that took up most of the third quarter. Buccilla had six points during that stretch, and Sam Jacobs threw in a 3.

A basket by John McCall finished the period and gave the Royals a 55-44 lead heading into the fourth. McCall scored the first point of that quarter on a free throw, and from that point forward, HSE kept its lead between 12 and 16 points. Jacobs added six more points and Dalton Retzner made a dunk.

Buccilla led the Royals with 18 points, while Totton, Jacobs and McCall each scored 11. Buccilla handed out eight assists and collected six rebounds, with Totton pulling five rebounds and making four steals. Jacobs blocked two shots.

Simmons scored 20 points for the Tigers, followed by Williams with 14. Simmons led the rebounding with eight, Char-

lie Smith collected six and Lucas Prewitt had five. Simmons made six steals and Prewitt had two blocks.

"For the first time all year, we got a team that could play with us that, we punched them in the mouth first, got a big lead, but with good teams, there's always going to be another run," said Tigers coach Garrett Winegar. "They're going to come back. And we didn't respond to that well. I thought the emotion of the HSE game, of the Mudsock game, got the better of a lot of our guys."

Southeastern improved to 3-2 and will host Brebeuf Jesuit on Tuesday. Fishers is 2-1 and also plays on Tuesday, traveling to Lawrence North.

# Shamrocks run past Millers, 53-45

**NOBLESVILLE** - If the Indiana girls basketball world isn't paying attention to Westfield yet, then perhaps they'd better start.

The Shamrocks are on a roll, getting their third consecutive win last Saturday at The Mill in Noblesville. Westfield shrugged off an early deficit to take control in the third quarter and go on to a 53-45 Hoosier Crossroads Conference win over the Millers.

"Any time you can go on the road and win in our conference, it's a great win, but I feel like today we were a solid squad across the board," said Shamrocks coach Ginny Smith.

Noblesville started the game well, leading 11-2 as the first quarter ticked to its later stages. Reagan Wilson scored five points in that run, including a 3-pointer, and Mallory Miller also hit a 3.

Westfield answered with its first big run, which started at the 2:34 mark of the period when Olivia Robey hit a free throw. The 8-0 run stretched into the second quarter, with Gigi Eldredge scoring five points. The senior ended the first period with a basket, then added a layin to begin the second. Eldredge's later free throw brought the 'Rocks to within 11-10.

Westfield took its first lead midway through the second when Jadeyn Hammes drained a triple and put the Shamrocks up 13-12. Free throws from Ashlynn Shade and Miller got Noblesville back ahead, and the Millers were up 16-14 at halftime.

The Noblesville lead increased to 17-14 after Dani Mendez hit a free throw. Then Westfield's Alysia Crockett took over. The 6-foot-3 junior with multiple Division I college offers showed her versatility early in the third quarter, making back-to-back layins before nailing a 3-pointer. It was seven straight points for Crockett, and it put the Shamrocks up 21-17.

Westfield held the lead for most of the remainder of the game, except late in the third quarter when the Millers tied it at 27-27 when Miller made a free throw. Hammes responded with a three-point play to get the 'Rocks ahead 30-27, and they never trailed again. Chesney Tebbe also had six points in the third, including a put-back to end the quarter and give Westfield a 32-29 lead.

"We didn't necessarily have a great offensive half the first half," said Smith. "We shot 22 percent in the first half and we talked about it at halftime, we got to get it into the paint, got to get some high-low looks. Let's get some high-percentage shots. Let's build some confidence."

The Shamrocks did just that in the third quarter, and continued that into the fourth period by scoring 21 points. Jessica Castor helped Westfield stay in front at the end by scoring seven points, including making 5 of 6 free throws. Olivia Robey did her part to ice the game by going 4-of-4 from the line.

"Our kids just came together," said Smith. "It all came down to being able to execute a game plan and handle their defensive pressure and I felt like we did that."

Crockett led all scorers with 15 points, while Hammes added 10 points. Crockett and Tebbe both collected eight rebounds, while Robey pulled seven. Tebbe and Robey both handed out four assists, while Crockett blocked three shots.

Shade and Miller both scored 11 points for the Millers, and Shade reached double-double status by pulling 11 rebounds. Miller made six steals and Wilson had five rebounds. Noblesville struggled from the floor, making 17 percent from field goal range.

"Overall, I didn't really think we played poorly, I just though we didn't execute in terms of the shooting," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. "Seventeen percent's not going to win games."

Westfield is 1-1 in conference play and 6-3 overall. The Shamrocks will play two home games next week, hosting Brownsburg Tuesday in a makeup HCC game, then welcoming Yorktown on Wednesday.
