The Noblesville Common Council recognized Public Safety Director Chad Knecht as the 2020 Stake in the Ground honoree at its meeting on Dec. 22. During the past year, Knecht oversaw the Noblesville police and fire departments, and managed traditional public safety issues, mental health care and community partnerships.

"Between COVID-19, national rioting and other challenges we have faced, I think all of us in this room and all of us in this community can be very thankful we are safe here in Noblesville and Chad Knecht has done a phenomenal job keeping us that way," Councilman Mark Boice said.

Knecht began working for Noblesville this year in the newly created position to better assist the city's growth and rapidly evolving national trends in the public safety challenges.

"I'm honored, but I've had the easier job as I've tried to shepherd the efforts," Knecht said. "The men and women in uniform who are out daily serving, protecting and facing the dangers in our community. This truly is a team effort – and a team award. I'm very proud of them and the work they've done and continue to do."

HSE school board recount shows Sarah Donsbach won by 19 votes

The recount for the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board is complete and Sarah Donsbach remains the winner, by 19 votes, following the additional ballot count. Here are the totals following the tally overseen by the Recount Commission:

- Sarah Donsbach: 14,752 votes
- Amanda SHERA: 14,733 votes
- Tony Bagato: 12,931 votes

Hamilton County Superior Court Judge Jonathon Brown issued the order on Dec. 20 finalizing the commission's work. The Recount Commission consisted of three members: Amy Summerfield,

Joe Weingarten and Jerry Liston.

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams says the recount resulted in three additional votes for incumbent Amanda SHERA, two more votes for Donsbach and five fewer votes for Tony Bagato. In the original certified count, Donsbach was shown as the winner in Delaware Township with 20 more votes than SHERA.

This will mean the HSE board will have three new members sworn-in at the first meeting in 2021, scheduled for Jan. 13. Those new members will be Donsbach, Sarah Parkes-Reese and Suzanne Thomas.

Westfield mayor, city councilman disagree over state of Grand Junction

Mayor Cook says "Patton owes our community an apology"

Editor's note: On Dec. 16, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook released the following statement regarding City Councilor Troy Patton's comments during a City Council debate about the Grand Junction Plaza project.

For more than a decade, I've served this great city. During this time, no elected councilor has talked as unintelligently and disrespectfully about our city staff.

Troy Patton, who has largely never been involved in anything of benefit to this community, posted on social media and reiterated in a public meeting as we discussed the Grand Junction Plaza project, "We have a group that clearly can not (sic) build anything under budget or run their own house, let alone spend your hard-earned dollars to your benefit." He also described the project, in no uncertain terms, as a disaster and that "...we've soiled our pants and now everybody has to smell it."

Patton's comments are unbecoming and unprofessional coming from an elected official

– and flat out false. More importantly, these attacks on our staff, whose sole goal is to serve Westfield residents, are hurtful. It is unfortunate our citizens are being represented in such a manner.

The Grand Junction Plaza is a transformative project deserving of debate and scrutiny. Many citizens volunteered countless hours to envision this project. When construction pricing bids were returned, I, along with many others, were disappointed to know – if built to exact specifications – it would be considered over budget. However, a team including construction experts, my staff and me made decisions to continue with the resources allocated.

We will deliver Grand Junction Plaza. The changes will not take away from the functionality, quality and spirit of this project. It will be remarkable and do exactly what it was supposed to do – be a place to bring people together, attract economic development AND build a sense of pride.

In a recent letter, he once again saddled-up his high horse to look down his nose at anyone who disagrees with him. He is either preparing for a career in Washington, where spending gone wild is a daily attribute, or he is clearly just not fit for a job that uses public funds.

Carmel touts lowest unemployment rate since March

Despite the continuing economic challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Carmel's unemployment rate has decreased for the fifth consecutive month – coming in at 3.6 percent for the month of November, down from 4 percent in October.

The new number was released on Dec. 21 by the State of Indiana's Department of Workforce Development. Indiana's overall November unemployment rate is 4.9 percent and the U.S. rate is 6.4 percent.

"This is good news for our local economy and it shows that we are doing a good job of weathering this pandemic storm as a com-

munity," said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard. "I encourage all of our residents to continue to support our local businesses through the rest of the holiday season and even more so as we move into the new year."

Business in Carmel continued to expand with the news that a New York-based firm, Simplifeye, was moving its corporate headquarters to Main Street in Carmel, a local private investment firm announced plans to join them in the same building at Main & Monon, Braunaubility broke ground on its new research building on Carmel Drive

and the Hotel Carmichael opened its doors.

"In our economic development strategy, we have made a point to not focus on just one aspect of the economy, but to eagerly work to attract diversity in corporate and other jobs so that we are better situated to survive economic downturns, like we have in the past," Brainard said.

Fishers Health Dept. issues strict COVID public health order

The number of positive cases for the novel coronavirus in Fishers has skyrocketed, resulting in a strict public health order issued on Dec. 22 by the city Health Department. Indoor dining will not be allowed and food establishments will be required to close from 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. the next day. The order began Christmas Day and continues until 5 a.m. on Jan. 8, 2021.

For the first 14 days in December, the Fishers Health Department reports 1,363 new positive COVID-19 cases, 40 percent higher than the previous 14-day period. City health officials say positive cases in Fishers are expected to continue on an upward trend through the month of January.

Below is the full news release issued by the City of Fishers.

The Fishers Health Department issued Public Health Order 08-2020 [last Tuesday] ordering all restaurants, bars, taverns, nightclubs, retail food establishments, and other establishments providing in-person food and/or drink service to be closed to indoor dining and drink service and cleared of customers between the hours of 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. During these times, carry-out dining is permissible. The Order will go into effect on Dec. 25 at 10 p.m. and will remain in effect until 5 a.m. Jan. 8, 2021.

As of Dec. 14, 2020, new positive cases for the first 14 days of December (1,363 new cases) are approximately

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Carmel named fourth-safest place to raise children

The City of Carmel has been named the fourth-safest place to raise a child in America by Safewise.com, based on an analysis of numbers and statistics from the FBI and other sources that tell the story of how communities rank in matters of safety, graduation rates, sex offender stats, violent crimes and property crimes.

Carmel scored the highest of any city in Indiana. Fishers came in eighth place. All of the cities on the Safewise list have violent crime rates more than three times lower than the national average, according to the report.

Memory Ventures moved its headquarters from Los Angeles to Fishers in 2014. The firm specializes in transforming old media into digital form.

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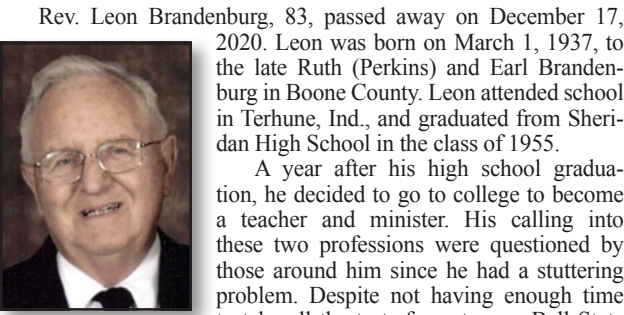

Rev. Leon Brandenburg
March 1, 1937 – December 17, 2020



Rev. Leon Brandenburg, 83, passed away on December 17, 2020. Leon was born on March 1, 1937, to the late Ruth (Perkins) and Earl Brandenburg in Boone County. Leon attended school in Terhune, Ind., and graduated from Sheridan High School in the class of 1955.

A year after his high school graduation, he decided to go to college to become a teacher and minister. His calling into these two professions were questioned by those around him since he had a stuttering problem. Despite not having enough time to take all the tests for entrance, Ball State Teacher's College admitted him into their college and he felt God's presence as he successfully completed his education and graduated with a master's in education. Leon was an educator at a few different schools, but the majority of his career was spent at Western Boone High School where he taught for 37 years. He was fortunate to have had most of the students who came through Western Boone since he taught government, which was a required class for graduation. Leon enjoyed reading about and studying history. This interest led him to volunteer at the Sheridan Historical Society after retiring.

An ordained Methodist minister, Leon served many different congregations in Indiana. The congregations closest to Sheridan were located in Boxley and Jolietville. After serving in the Methodist church, Leon also helped Jesse Griffith by serving as assistant minister at the Sheridan Church of God before retiring and ultimately worshipping at the Sheridan Methodist Church. Along with being active in the church, Leon drove for Meals on Wheels and shared his faith with the people he met.

At their five-year class reunion, Leon was reacquainted with Anna Faye Walker, who became his wife on June 10, 1961. One day, Anna Faye saw a picture of an American Eskimo dog. When she showed it to Leon, he bought her a puppy. They bred and raised American Eskimo puppies together, with Leon continuing to raise them until his death.

Leon and Anna Faye were parted by her death in 2003.

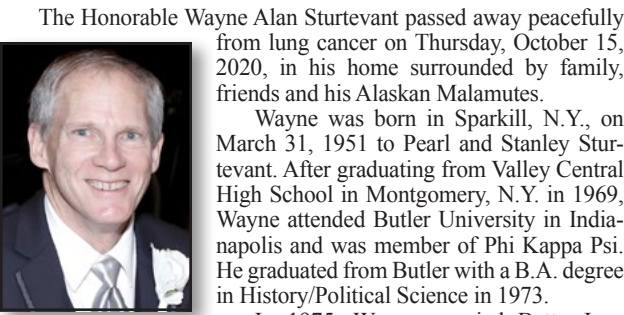
Leon was raised on a farm in Marion Township, and raising livestock was a hobby that he continued to enjoy for all of his life. He primarily raised cattle and hogs, although the farm did have chickens and goats at times. Leon was an avid sports fan. For years, he had a season pass to the Colts games, ran the chains and the game clock at high school sports events, and enjoyed watching games on television. Leon attended his grandchildren's sporting events, as well.

The thing Leon was most proud of was his family – especially his grandchildren who called him "Poppy." Poppy's grandchildren were fortunate to have a grandfather who taught them the values of faith, family and hard work. Leon leaves behind his wife, Pamela (Reddick), whom he married on May 7, 2006; his four children, John Brandenburg (Melanie), Sheridan, Nancy (Ron) Powers, Sheridan, David (Lori) Brandenburg, Plainfield, and LeAnn (Jason) Hopper, Avon. The Honorable Wayne Alan Sturtevant passed away peacefully from lung cancer on Thursday, October 15, 2020, in his home surrounded by family, friends and his Alaskan Malamutes.

He continued coaching girls basketball throughout his life which kept him connected to the community and allowed him to touch the hearts and lives of countless people where he never missed an opportunity to give encouragement.

Wayne was an explorer. He loved discovering new parts of his community on daily walks, hiking adventures through National and State parks including the Appalachian Trail, biking with his family and friends, white water kayaking, and many memorable canoe trips. He also enjoyed connecting the past with the present, never missing the opportunity to visit museums, battlefields or historical markers.
