

Parks, Commissioners explain photo fees

The Hamilton County Parks Department (HCPD) announced on Monday that photography permits will now be required for professional portrait and commercial photography conducted at county-owned parks.

The announcement was made on social media, which drew more than 1,600 comments, most of which were critical of HCPD's decision to charge taxpayers to take photographs.

County officials on Tuesday said the decision was made by the Hamilton County Parks Board.

"I found about it just like everyone else," County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said. "It wasn't a decision made by the commissioners or the county council."

The Hamilton County Parks Board, which oversees county park operations, is an independent board with no elected officials.

Heirbrandt said his understanding of the board's action was to limit poten-

tial liability concerns and to help reduce conflict between competing photographers, as well as photographers and park guests.

Parks officials indicated the permits are only required for professional and commercial photography and videography.

Descriptions of those required to obtain a permit are:

- **Portrait photography:** Individual portrait photographers hired for personal wedding, family, children or senior photographs.
- **Commercial photography:** A business, photography studio, production company, or advertising/publicity firm hired by a client to create a product for profit, or to photograph a product that will be sold for profit.
- **Commercial videography:** Filming of commercials for sales of products, advertising, video, television, and other filming (except for news media, park publicity or for an education requirement).

HCPD issues statement on photography fees

Hamilton County Parks and Recreation is appreciative of the input provided regarding its policy requiring the registration of PROFESSIONAL photographers and videographers conducting commercial operations in Hamilton County Parks and would like to further clarify the intent of the policy that has been reviewed and approved by the department's park board.

Due to the park department regularly receiving communications from park users expressing concerns related to uninformed professional photographers or videographers interfering with park guests' enjoyment of a county park, this policy was put in place to provide:

- **The contact information of registrants** that will allow effective and efficient communication of current and updated rules and regulations governing professional photography and videography on county park property, in order to allow the full enjoyment of park grounds and facilities by ALL park visitors.
- **Safety, privacy and enforcement:** At times, certain areas of county parks are closed due to flooding or other public safety concerns. Communication of these conditions and subsequent precautions and restrictions can be immediately sent to registrants. Additionally, on occasion, special events or functions require temporary limiting of access to a park or area within a park. This information too, can be shared promptly with registered photographers and videographers, to avoid needless travel to a county park for a photo or video shoot, only to learn that the location intended for the shoot is inaccessible.
- **Protection of sensitive nature or wildlife areas:** In designated loca-

tions and during a specific timeframe, accessibility to certain park areas may be restricted to the public, including photographers and videographers to ensure the protection of wildlife and nature-related activities.

- **Opportunities:** With the contact information provided by registrants, it will be possible to reach out to professional photographers, videographers and studios and make them aware of image capture opportunities occurring within the county park system. Programs, events and activities that offer photo opportunities will be regularly shared with registrants.
- **Fees:** The nominal annual fees collected through the registration process are intended to cover the administrative costs associated with the permitting program, as well as related park operational costs. Professional photographers and videographers understand that far greater location fees are regularly incurred as a function of their successful commercial operations.

NOTE: Permitting is only required of professional photographers and videographers engaging in commercial operations. Amateur and casual photography in county parks does not require a permit.

Hamilton County Parks welcomes the proper and responsible use of its park grounds by professional photographers and videographers, and continues to encourage both professional and amateurs to capture and share the amazing subject matter found within our outstanding county parks.

The Fishers Health Department (FHD) on Tuesday released its **COVID-19 Vaccine Interest Form** in anticipation of receiving the Moderna vaccine in January. Public Health Director Monica Heltz requests residents to complete the interest form as quickly as possible.

The purpose of the interest form is to provide information to the Fishers Health Department to assist in the preparations of COVID-19 vaccination distribution. COVID-19 vaccinations are not anticipated to be available to the general public until mid-

2021 but certain individuals may qualify to receive the vaccine sooner based on certain criteria. This survey is based on the most current criteria being utilized at the state and national levels for vaccine allocation and may change as new guidance is released to FHD.

Eight new state troopers report for duty at the Indianapolis Post

A total of 36 probationary troopers graduated from the 80th Indiana State Police Academy on Dec. 19, 2020. Eight of those probationary troopers are assigned to the Indiana State Police Post in Indianapolis.

Probationary troopers now begin their next phase of instruction, a three-month field training period riding with veteran troopers. Field training aims to give a practical application to the training received throughout the formal academy. Upon completing field training, the troopers will be assigned a state police patrol vehicle and begin solo patrol.

These officers have already completed over 1,200 hours of structured training in law enforcement techniques and hands-on and scenario-based training at the Indiana State Police Recruit Academy. Their curriculum included criminal law instruction, emergency vehicle operations, psychology, traffic law, crash investigation, self-defense, first responder and other general enforcement-related training.

Human trafficking more widespread in Indiana than available data indicates, new report says

A new report from the Office of the Attorney General and Indiana Coalition to End Sexual Assault and Human Trafficking shows that, while human trafficking remains a pervasive problem in Indiana, the state has improved its strategies to reduce human trafficking and assist trafficking survivors. Human trafficking is the use or threat of force, fraud or coercion to compel an individual to engage in commercial sex, marriage, labor or services. In 2019, 157 Indiana human trafficking cases were reported to the National Human Trafficking Hotline – a 19 percent increase from 2018. Of the 157 cases reported in 2019 in Indiana, 40 of those involved minors, according to the report. However, those numbers only reflect reports to the National Human Trafficking Hotline. Because Indiana does not have a cen-

tralized reporting mechanism, there is no data that comprehensively illustrates the scope of human trafficking in the state. Reports from service providers indicate that the scope of human trafficking in Indiana is far greater than data from the national hotline indicates. Ascent 121, an Indiana agency that specializes in working with survivors of sex trafficking, provided services for 117 minors in Indiana in 2019. "It is reasonable to suspect that human trafficking in Indiana is a much more widespread problem than available data demonstrates," Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill said. "While our partners in combatting this scourge have made noticeable progress in serving trafficking victims and holding traffickers accountable, there is clearly

more we can do." Hill also commends the Indiana General Assembly for passing legislation that supports trafficking survivors and addresses trafficking in other ways. Since the 2016 report about human trafficking in Indiana was released, the General Assembly has passed five key pieces of anti-trafficking legislation. Hill also applauds the law enforcement officials who have had success in holding traffickers accountable for their crimes. In October 2019, for example, Krisean Porter was convicted of human trafficking, promoting prostitution, and sexual misconduct with a minor in Marion County. According to Marion County Prosecutor Ryan Mears, Porter "physically and emotionally abused a vulnerable child for his personal gain."

"The 2020 Indiana State Report on Human Trafficking shows good progress made by hundreds of partners across the state in addressing human trafficking. The priority now is to continue the momentum," said Tracey Horth Krueger, Chief Executive Officer of the Indiana Coalition to End Sexual Assault and Human Trafficking. "We must ensure that survivors have access to services while we increase our knowledge about the root causes of trafficking so we can end it." The full report summarizes national and state laws regarding human trafficking, efforts Indiana is taking to combat human trafficking, warning signs that someone is engaged in human trafficking, legal remedies available to human trafficking victims, successful criminal prosecutions around Indiana, and additional actions the state can take to reduce human trafficking.

James Donald Day, 92, Westfield, passed away peacefully at his home on Tuesday, December 29, 2020. Don was the faithful husband to his bride Mary Lou for 68 years and one day.

Born on Wednesday, November 14, 1928, Don, as he was affectionately called, grew up in the small country burg of Horton, Ind., just north of his final resting place. He was the son of James Silas Day and Bernice Marie (Teter) Day, and the eldest brother to Robert "Bob" Day, William "Bill" Day and Dennis "Denny" Day. Don grew up humbly in a house filled with hard work, ambition, and love. A life-long resident of Hamilton County, Don graduated from Westfield High School in 1946 and was a member of the football team and multiple extracurricular activities.

In 1950, Don was drafted into the Army and faithfully served his country as a soldier in the Korean War. The bonds he made with his fellow infantrymen were lifelong and everlasting, and for many years they stayed in close contact and were nothing short of extended family. When he was honorably discharged in December of 1952, Don, fresh off the boat and "so thin his family didn't hardly recognize him" was married shortly thereafter to the love of his life and fellow Westfield alum, Mary Lou Wheeler, on Sunday, December 28, 1952, on a cold, yet sunny day.

In 1956 he graduated from Butler University, after completing most of his classes at night, while working during the day and helping Mary Lou's father Paul farm in Westfield. In the fall of 1957, Don and Mary Lou welcomed their first child, Kevin, and little sister Becky joined them in the winter of 1961. Don went on to work at various places, including Curtis, now Curtis Dyna-Fog, in Westfield for many years, but ultimately scratching his entrepreneurial itch by helping found Distribution Management Associates, also known as "DMA." While the company is still actively running in downtown Indianapolis, Don retired as Vice President and the impact the company has had on thousands of households is quiet, yet impressive, much like Don himself.

While his professional life was active and demanding, it was outside the walls of work in which his servant's heart was most inspiring. Don held various positions on committees at Christ United Methodist Church in Westfield, Westfield Masonic Lodge as past Master, the Scottish Rite Valley of Indianapolis, Murat Temple, the National Council of Physical Distribution Management, the Indianapolis Motor Transportation Club, Indianapolis Athletic Club, Indiana Farm Bureau, Westfield Lions Club (where he could be frequently found frying fish at the annual Fish Fry), American Legion Post #318, and was a Past Associate Guardian of Bethel #68 International Order of Job's Daughters. In 2009, he accepted admittance to the Westfield Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame. A few years later he participated in the Indy Honor Flight and took the trip to Washington, D.C., for the day alongside his fellow veterans.

While those positions, boards, and acts of service and leadership were all significant in his many years on this earth, they paled in comparison to the love, affection and generosity he bestowed upon his family. Forever "Papaw" in the eyes of his grandchildren and great-grandchildren, Don was always there for a bit of advice, support and guidance whenever it was needed, a good hug, and maybe even an extra bid at an auction, if you both agreed that it (whatever it was) needed to be bought. He enjoyed his trips to Florida with Mary Lou and his family, playing cards with his friends, classical music, a nice glass of Merlot alongside a filet, Mary Lou's homemade chicken and noodles with an extra dash of cayenne pepper, antique tractors and his favorite sports teams. He loved humbly and quietly, yet with a ferocity that was unmatched. He will forever be missed.

Don is survived by his bride of 68 years, Mary Lou (Wheeler) Day; brother, Dennis Day; son, Kevin (Ann) Day; daughter, Becky Weiss (David); grandchildren, Nathan Day (Renee), Chris Weiss (Sarah), Kristen Yutzky (Ryan) and Cameron Day; and great-grandchildren, Madeline Weiss, Henry Day and Lyle Yutzky.

Don was preceded in death by his parents, James Silas Day and Bernice (Teter) Day; and brothers, Robert "Bob" Day and William "Bill" Day.
