County to open vaccination site Monday

Citizens age 80 years and older encouraged to register for appointments

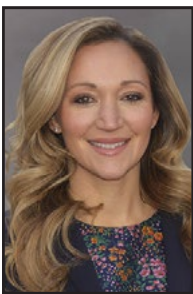
The Hamilton County Health Department will begin vaccinating people older than 80 years of age starting Monday, Jan. 11. Those who fall into this age group can register for an appointment at ourshot.in.gov or by calling 211.

"We are really concentrating on saving lives and reducing hospitalizations," Dr. Lindsay Weaver, Chief Medical Officer for the State Department of Health, said during a news conference Wednesday. "We know that in Indiana age is the biggest contributor to severe disease and death from COVID-19. This age group alone accounts for 52 percent of the state's virus-related deaths."

The Hamilton County Health Department is expected to receive 800 doses of the vaccine next week. It will administer the shots at the Annex Building at the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"We hope to administer at least 160 vaccines a day," said Christian Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the Hamilton County Health Department. "But that will depend entirely on if we get the vaccine we've been promised and how many people make appointments."

Caregivers with a loved one who is 80 or older can register on their behalf. Individuals ages 60 to 69,

with transportation. Vaccines are free, but if you have insurance you should provide that information upon registration. All recipients must prove they live or work in Indiana.

Once those older than 80 years of age are vaccinated, the State Department of Health will open vaccination registration to folks between the ages of 70 and 79, followed closely behind by people ages 60 to 69.

More than 20,000 people register in first 90 minutes for COVID-19 vaccine

Thousands of Hoosiers age 80 or older registered for free COVID-19 vaccines on Friday, according to Indiana State Department of Health officials.

ISDH says 33,500 Hoosiers registered for the vaccines before 11:30 a.m. Friday. More than 20,000 people scheduled their appointments in the first 90 minutes after registration opened.

Hoosiers who would like to register for the vaccine can do so online or by calling 211 or, for additional help, by contacting one of Indiana's [Area Agencies on Aging](#).

Caregivers or family members of eligible seniors can also make a vaccination appointment on their behalf.

ISDH is asking Hoosiers to be patient as they may encounter wait times due to a high volume of scheduling.

Carmel's reimagined Carey Grove Park receives full refresh, reopens to public

[Carey Grove Park](#), located at 14001 N. Carey Road, Carmel, is now open for the public to enjoy. As part of Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation's (CCPR) [Reimagining Parks initiative](#) and the Clay Township Impact Program, the neighborhood park received a complete refresh in order to meet the needs of the growing local community.

The park features all new playground equipment, year-round bathrooms, a basketball court, permanent outdoor exercise equipment, an expanded parking lot, resurfaced trails, and picnic shelters.

The reimagined playground brings a whole new level of exploration and play to Carey Grove Park. The playground is divided into two sections. One section is designed for kids ages two to five and another designed for ages five to 12. Kids will enjoy climbing, sliding, swinging and exploring musical features on this completely modernized playground.

Before making updates, CCPR held a community input meeting to gather feedback and answer the public's questions in November 2019. While Carey Grove is the smallest park receiving updates as part of the Reimagining Parks initiative, CCPR Assistant Director Kurtis Baumgartner said it's the park that received the most feedback.

"Carey Grove Park is located in the middle of several neighborhoods, so it receives a lot of traffic from surrounding families, and they're invested in the park's future," Baumgartner said. "I'm really excited about what this park now has to offer our community. What we're aiming to do with all of these Reimagining Parks projects is

create spaces people want to continually visit to make memories that will last a lifetime."

As a requirement for stormwater management, the park's design required additional drainage accommodations so not to impact neighboring residences. The open area in the middle of the park meets those requirements while also offer-

ing some unique topography that can serve as a sledding hill for small children in the winter months. The low area is designed to remain dry most of the time, except during heavy storm events, and can serve as an open recreation area for various informal recreational pursuits such as soccer, playing catch, or flying kites. The

lowest portions will be planted with native prairie grasses to help absorb the stormwater and provide additional habitat.

Restrooms are currently closed and will tentatively open in the next two weeks.

None of them have piercings (that I know of). They don’t use their hair as a contemporary version of mood rings (we conducted all interviews on Zoom so I could be sure). Manning did drop off our call briefly to “walk through security at the airport” after attending a coronavirus briefing with Vice President Mike Pence. Having found no match for

the phrase on UrbanDictionary.com I am left to assume he actually did walk through security. See? Boring.
But while none of them placated my leading questions by admitting to seeing themselves as representing their generation, they clearly felt a weight of responsibility to meet the demands of this moment, and an urgency to act that comes from the constant reality that political dynamics outside their control can bring their time in office to an unceremonious end every two years.

It was that dual-current of responsibility and urgency that pulsed through our conversations. They spoke of seeking office because the stakes are too high to binge more Netflix. They spoke of finding consensus on criminal justice reform and how we can better define the role of government in society. After all, as Johnson reminded me, Millennials spent hours working on group projects in school, so we know a thing or two about working together (un-

less you were like me and ended up having to do the whole thing yourself).
And they all agreed – breaking news: Republicans and Democrats agreed! – that there’s no time like the present to prove we are up to the task.
That’s why not a single one of them planned to heed the bad advice Payne heard from a current member to sit back and wait his turn. “No, I wouldn’t listen to that,” Manning immediately interjected. He would know. The guy had five of his bills signed into law in his first session.

These Millennials, and the ones I didn’t take the time to meet with, earned their seats. And despite their age, they aren’t the fish out of water that Will Smith was in Bel Air. All four served in local office before grabbing a cubicle in the Statehouse. Better yet, they aren’t so jaded by life’s experiences that they remain eager to maintain Indiana’s stellar reputation for fiscal integrity all while improving our

state in areas in which it needs improved.
“I’m just young and inexperienced enough to think I can make a difference,” Payne would half-jokingly tell voters on the campaign trail.
It all leaves me with the nagging feeling that maybe I was wrong to be upset. I guess for the veterans of the legislature, the only thing to fear from this group of 30-somethings is that they plan to, you know, legislate. Well, then there’s Johnson being a Democrat. But that’s a grievance for another time.

State Police warn of new phone scam

The Indiana State Police Fort Wayne Post received a complaint Thursday from a local citizen reporting a phone scam. ISP receives numerous reports of phone scams each year, but this particular scam has not yet been seen. The scammer called asking this citizen for the phone number of the local Indiana State Police Department. The scammer explained that he was the victim of ID theft and needed the phone number so that he could alert the police. The good citizen, wanting to help, obliged and gave the scammer the phone number for the Indiana State Police Fort Wayne Post, (260) 432-8661. A short time after that call, this same citizen received another phone call,

with the Caller ID showing "Indiana State Police" with the "(260) 432-8661" phone number. The scammer identified himself as an Indiana State Police officer, and commenced to tell the citizen that he was the victim of an ID theft out of Texas. The scammer then asked the citizen to go to a Target store and obtain a prepaid credit card; money that would then be used to assist the scammer to clear up this alleged identity theft. Fortunately, this citizen did not fall victim to this scam, rather he became suspicious and immediately reported the incident to law enforcement. The Indiana State Police would remind all Hoosiers that these types of phone scammers are pervasive, convincing and technically

savvy, as was definitely the case here. Scammers will often play on your emotions and fears in order to get to your money. The easiest way to protect yourself from being scammed over the phone is either to ignore unsolicited calls from unknown callers, or just hang up when something doesn't seem right. You should NEVER provide any information over the phone to an unknown caller regarding your personal identity, Social Security number, bank account(s) or credit card number(s). If in doubt, or if you feel you may have fallen victim to a phone scammer, just hang up and immediately report the incident to your local law enforcement agency.

The Royals had a good first half, leading 20-14 after the first quarter and 39-27 at halftime. Vinny Buccilla hit two 3-pointers on his way to 13 points in the half, while Dalton Retzner scored 10. Alex Totton also drained two 3s.

The Bears made a big comeback in the third quarter, outscoring Southeastern 26-16 and cutting the Royals' advantage to 55-53. Greg Jenkins had 10 points during that period. CARMEL - University's reward for getting a big win Thursday was having to play one of its big rivals on Friday.

The Trailblazers, fresh off a victory over Class 2A No. 7 Covenant Christian, hosted Tindley at the U Center Friday night. The Tigers, who are knocking on the door of the 1A Top 10, jumped out to a big first-quarter lead over University, and never looked back, beating the 'Blazers 63-36.

"I think there was no doubt we looked a little gassed," said University coach Brandon Lafferman. "But to win a sectional, you're going to have to be able to play Friday-Saturday night against two good teams and we told our guys that."

The Trailblazers scored the first basket of the game, a layin by Mitchell Martin. Tindley took over after that, with Jayden Pinkston making back-to-back 3-pointers to put the Tigers in front, and they would stay there for the duration of the game.

Tindley led 8-2 before Larry Pierce ended the run with a basket. But the Tigers promptly went on a 13-0 run that stretched into the second quarter, taking a 21-4 lead within the first minute of the period. Tindley went on to lead 31-11 at halftime, scoring the final five points of the first half, then adding 10 more to start the second half, going up 41-11 midway through the third.

"I think Tindley gets a lot of credit," said Lafferman. "They played harder.

They made shots early. Part of our game plan was to not really allow dribble-drive penetration and that led to a lot of open 3s for them and they knocked them down."

The Tigers allowed University only five points in the third quarter, and held their biggest lead of 31 points twice during that period, including a 47-16 advantage at the end of three. The 'Blazers played hard to the end, however, scoring 20 points in the fourth. Camden Brown had seven points in that quarter, starting things off with a 3-pointer. Sabien Cain also hit a 3, and Pierce added four points.

Pierce was the leading scorer with 12 points, while Brown had nine and Martin scored seven.

University is 7-4 and is off until next Friday, when it travels to Muncie Burris for a Pioneer Conference game.
