The Indiana Association of County Commissioners (IACC) has selected Hamilton County Director of Administration Dan Stevens as its "2020 Outstanding Supportive County Administrator of the Year."

Stevens has been a servant in many capacities with Hamilton County, including Hamilton County Sheriff for eight years and Director of Administration for the Hamilton County Board of Commissioners for the past 14 years.

Stevens administers large scale capital projects on behalf of the county, such as the expansion of the Hamilton County Jail, the recently completed county solar project, and the site master planning of the corrections complex as well as the county administrative offices.

"It is difficult to put into words how valuable Dan's work and dedication has been to the citizens of Hamilton County," said Commissioner Steve Dillinger, a long-time friend of Stevens. "His service has been instrumental in guiding and managing the growth and success of the county and his attention to detail has gained the respect of all."

City of Carmel files complaint against Duke Energy over utility relocations

The City of Carmel has filed a complaint against Duke Energy with the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) over a dispute regarding utility pole relocations within two city road projects – the reconstruction of Guilford Road south of Main Street and the Multi-Use project on 126th Street between Keystone Parkway and Hazel Dell Parkway.

In both cases, the City is seeking to prevent Duke, after decades of practice, from claiming now that they do not have to move out of the right-of-way for a sidewalk or bike path in violation of the statute that requires them to. The City of Carmel is asking the IURC to order Duke to comply with city ordinances and agreements regarding the relocation of utility infrastructure and to pay the costs associated with the relocation.

In 2017, the City adopted an ordinance requiring utility companies to bury utility

Noblesville partners with Patch Development for business park along SR 37

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced his support on Jan. 12 for a new project that would create a master planned business and innovation park on 75 acres along State Road 37, north of 146th Street. Patch Development is proposing the Washington Business Park on currently undeveloped farm land.

"Washington Business Park will attract innovative and dynamic companies that create world class products and services that will add high-paying advanced employment opportunities to the community and will provide a home for world class companies to easily relocate to Noblesville," said Pat Chittenden, Owner of Patch Development.

The development plans provide the city flexibility with seven to 11 lots

– ranging from two-acre to 22-acre sites. The buildings anticipated sizes range from 10,000 square feet to 250,000 square feet depending on the needs of the future tenants.

"We also anticipate more than 500 new jobs will come from building this business park," Jensen said.

If approved, the city will pursue a \$6.7 million bond, which will be developer backed and purchased. The new area will become a TIF district, where the proceeds

will be split 65 percent with the developer and 35 percent with the city. Proceeds will be applied to utilities, stormwater and infrastructure improvements like the extension of North Pointe Boulevard and 153rd Street.

"Site selection and business location is a very competitive process," said Noblesville Economic Development Director Andrew Murray. "Ultimately, it is about attracting the right jobs to Noblesville."

Murray said the project has zero risk to taxpayers.

Noblesville Common Council approves East Bank agreement

The Noblesville Common Council has approved an economic development agreement with East River Partners LLC for a proposed development along the east side of White River near 6th and Conner streets. The project will be known as East Bank.

Originally announced in November of last year, the project will bring a \$49 million mixed-use development to a 3.4-acre piece of real estate along the east side of the White River.

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced his support in November for the project that would add

residential living, commercial space, and a privately-owned parking garage to the downtown area along the White River.

Carmel-based developer J.C. Hart will partner with Fishers-based Republic Development to bring a four-story structure with a ground floor dedicated to 5,000 square feet of retail space. The residential portion will consist of approximately 219 high-end rental apartments.

Funding for the project will come, in part, through Noblesville providing a developer purchased TIF bond that is expected not to exceed \$9.9 million.

"We are going to size the bond based on reasonable TIF projections and assume no growth, but if growth occurs, the agreement calls for the city and developer will share the excess TIF dollars in a 70/30 annual split to allow the developer to recoup a portion or all of project costs," said Noblesville Economic Director Andrew Murray, who said the project is expected to have \$1.2 million in impact fees. Noblesville has agreed to cover 15 percent of that cost.

Construction on the project is expected to begin this coming summer and is planned to take two years to complete.

Fishers approves \$3.2M contract for part of the Nickel Plate Trail

The contract for the next phase of the Nickel Plate Trail has been awarded to Meyer Najem. The Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety voted in favor of the \$3.2 million public-private partnership on Jan. 12.

Mayor Scott Fadness says the agreement calls for any cost savings to be split, with 80 percent going to the city and 20 percent to Meyer Najem. This agreement includes a pedestrian bridge, according to the mayor.

The board also voted to

acquire vehicle license plate readers for the Fishers Police Department. Chief Ed Gebhart told the board 95 percent of the cost for this technology will be underwritten through grants.

Gebhart also said there are specific regulations on how this information is used. It will not be recording every vehicle at a given location and all data will be wiped clean after 30 days.

Finally, the board voted

to allow the Department of Public Works to purchase a radio-controlled mower for just under \$50,000. The department told the board this mower will save the city roughly 600 hours a year, with a return on investment in about a year.

Four local lawmakers take next step on bill to establish new county court

The House Courts and Criminal Code Committee voted unanimously on Jan. 12 to allow Hamilton County to create a new superior court, according to State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel).

Schaibley, the author of the bill, said Hamilton County's population has grown exponentially over the past decade, leading to a backlog of cases in the court system. According to the latest census data, the

area is the fourth most-populous county in the state and is projected to be Indiana's second-largest county by 2050.

State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero), a co-author on the bill, said the addition of another court would help alleviate some burden on the local court system.

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers), who is also a co-author on Schaibley's bill, said the vote comes after the Interim Study Committee on the Courts and

Judiciary recommended the creation of a new court in Hamilton County.

State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel), a bill co-author, said if approved by the General Assembly, the judge for this court would stand for election in 2022 and take the bench on Jan. 1, 2023.

House Bill 1042 now moves to the House Ways and Means Committee for further consideration. Visit iga.in.gov for more information.

Sheriff adds detective to Internet Crimes Against Children task force

Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush has announced a new partnership with the Hamilton County Metro Child Exploitation Task Force. This is the first time the Sheriff's Office has had a detective assigned to this multi-agency unit. This specialized unit is affiliated the federal Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) program in partnership with the Fishers Police Department.

One of Quakenbush's top priorities is the safety and protection of children in

local communities. "The exploitation and victimization of children is one of the most disturbing crimes in our county," Quakenbush said. "It is imperative that we stay progressive and proactive in our approach to reduce human trafficking and internet related crimes against the children. With this partnership, we can continue to fulfill our goal of Keeping Hamilton County Safe."

The Department of Justice, specifically

the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquent Prevention, created the ICAC programs in 1998. Since the inception, 61 units have been established across the country. This national network is comprised of more than 4,500 federal, state and local law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies. They will provide forensic and investigative technical assistance to law enforcement and prosecutors as well as educational information

to parents, educators and others concerned with child victimization.



Health officials urge people who are unable to get COVID vaccine appointment to check other counties

Health officials in some areas are encouraging people who can to check nearby counties for vaccine appointments. As the state allows more groups to get vaccinated, some counties are running into scheduling issues. Christian Walker, Hamilton County emergency preparedness coordinator, said last Thursday he understands the frustration but is hopeful the scheduling issues will only be temporary.

"We're not holding anything back at any of the hospitals, we're dispensing what we get and are creating the appointments accordingly," Walker said. Several people have contacted the Reporter with scheduling concerns. They expressed frustration with the inability to schedule an appointment in Hamilton County, and 90-minute wait times when calling state's 211 helpline. Walker hopes only those who really need it will seek other counties for appointments and reminds people it's an option that

should only be used as a last resort. "If I send everybody down to Marion County, there's people in Marion County that are now not able to get vaccinated," Walker said. Last Wednesday during Indiana's weekly coronavirus update, state leaders said on they are working to help clear up some of the scheduling issues. One way is by eventually allowing people in the same household to sign up for their vaccination together. Right now, only one person can do it at a time.

lines when installing new infrastructure or relocating existing facilities. The ordinance also prohibited new above-ground utility poles, except in cases where the City grants an exception, such as where the cost to do such work would be too high or otherwise too complicated.

Along Guilford Road, the City requested Duke bury utility lines and infrastructure and erect no new poles. Duke refused to comply and instead asked the city to modify its road project so the utility infrastructure could remain in place. After some consideration, the City agreed to a mix of both underground and above ground utilities – but there is still work to be done.

On the 126th Street project, the City agreed to allow above-ground infrastruc-

ture, but there is a dispute over who pays for the relocation costs.

In order for both projects to proceed, the City agreed to pay 50 percent of the costs up front, which came to \$560,641 for the Guilford Road Project and \$30,211

for the 126th Street Trail Project.

The complaint asks the IURC to order Duke to complete the relocation of its facilities located within Carmel's public right-of-way that interfere with the Guilford Road Project and the 126th

Hamilton Heights hosts IHSGW State Finals

ARCADIA - The best girls wrestlers in the state traveled up to Hamilton Heights last Friday, as the school hosted the Indiana High School Girls Wrestling state finals.

The 112 wrestlers, divided among 14 weight classes, included seven from Hamilton County. Carmel and the host Huskies both had three wrestlers competing for their respective schools, while Noblesville freshman Kyra Tomlinson made history by being the first Millers girls wrestler to compete at state in the event's five-year history.

This is the third time that Heights has hosted the girls state finals.

"I think it's going great," said Huskies coach Gary Myers. "The girls are getting better every year. They're getting after it, they're training hard. The coaches are finally helping them. And to have this back at Heights is really an honor for us."

Of the three county schools, Carmel finished the highest by taking 10th. The Greyhounds scored 30 points, with two wrestlers placing in the top four.

Senior Haley Mattingly finished in third place at 120 pounds. Mattingly won her first match with a second-period pin over Rochester's Jady Geller, but lost to Delta's Anna Krejsa in the semi-finals by an 11-4 decision. Mattingly rebounded to win the third-place bout, in a 16-4 major decision over Frankfort's Emma Pillion.

Freshman Tay Coatie took fourth place at 126 pounds. Coatie advanced to the semi-finals with a pin of La Porte's Taylor Higley in the first period of her first match. In the semi-finals, Coatie lost an overtime decision to Penn's Heidi Selis, then lost to Jay County's Lita

Chowning in the third-place match with a second-period fall.

Senior Roni Ledzema placed eighth at 98 pounds. Ledzema dropped her first match by fall to Crown Point's Alexie Westfall, lost to Cowan's Cricket Morey in a 15-0 technical fall, then fell to Frankfort's Eryka Pillion by an 11-0 major decision.

"We tell all of our seniors, when you're gone, there's a footprint of what you've left inside of the program," said Carmel coach Ed Pendski. "And as our girls program is starting to grow and build some traction, what those two have done is going to be seen in girls wrestling in Carmel for a very long time."

Heights finished with nine points, placing it 50th as a team. All three Huskies wrestlers that competed are juniors, starting with 132-pounder Jayla Logan. She finished sixth in that division.

Logan dropped her first match to Lowell's Nadine Summers by a second-period fall, but rebounded to beat Terre Haute South's Paisley Sanquetti in a 10-6 decision. In the fifth-place match, Logan was pinned by Columbia City's Lauren Platt in the second period.

Semera Henson finished seventh for Heights at 113 pounds. Henson fell to West Lafayette's Rose Kaplan in the first round by a 14-2 major decision, then lost to Twin Lakes' Ella McNulty by fall in the semi-finals. But Henson went out with a victory, getting a first-period pin over North Miami's Aubrey Burns in the seventh-place match.

Reagan Ward placed eighth at 250 pounds. Ward lost to Fort Wayne Wayne's Felicity Stockman by pin in the first round, and to Attica's Rachel Smith by pin in the semi-finals. Ward injury

Basketball doubleheader . . . Westfield scores sweep of Southeastern

Last Friday night will go down as one of the best nights for Westfield basketball in a while.

The Shamrocks girls and boys teams played a Hoosier Crossroads Conference doubleheader at Hamilton Southeastern, and returned home with a sweep. The Westfield girls held off the Royals 38-37; it was the first win for the 'Rocks over Southeastern in exactly five years.

Westfield's boys then got out to a fast start and eventually won their game 77-68. It was the Shamrocks' first victory over Southeastern in three years, and the first time in decades that Westfield won on the Royals' court.

GAME OF SWINGS

Westfield girls coach Ginny Smith accurately called the girls' contest a "game of swings." The first quarter belonged to HSE, which went up 14-10 by the end of the period. The Royals' Ryan Viele had a hot quarter, hitting three 3-pointers.

It was the Shamrocks' turn in the second period, as they outscored Southeastern 15-5 to lead 25-19 at the halftime break. Olivia Robey had seven points for Westfield, while Alyssa Crockett added five points.

Crockett scored seven in the first quarter as well.

The Royals took the lead back in the second half, moving ahead 32-30 by the end of the third quarter. Riley Makalusky scored six points and Viele hit another 3.

"HSE's just so good," said Smith. "They don't make many mistakes. They really execute well offensively."

Southeastern was still in front late in the fourth, but a basket by Crockett got Westfield ahead by one. The 'Rocks were able to hang on from there.

"We were really patient offensively," said Smith. "It was probably about a minute-long possession, and we ended up getting a bucket which put us up one. It was a huge bucket for us, a little bit of a shift that occurred."

Crockett scored 19 points, collected eight rebounds and had two blocked shots. Robey added 12 points and made four steals. Gigi Eldredge pulled six rebounds.

"We knew it would come down to at least a possession or two," said Smith. "We feel fortunate. Anytime you can win on the road, it's good. But when you can beat HSE, it's an accomplishment."

Viele finished the game with 14 points, including four 3-pointers. Makalusky and Makayla Hinshaw both had nine points. Olivia Brown dished out five assists and made four steals; Hinshaw, Brown and Lauren Stewart all collected three rebounds.

Westfield is now 5-1 in HCC play and 15-4 overall. The Shamrocks finish up conference play Thursday with a game at Fishers.

The Royals are 1-2 in the conference and 9-4 overall. Southeastern plays at Franklin Central Wednesday in another HCC contest.

OTHER GIRLS GAMES

Before meeting last Friday, both Westfield and Southeastern played a game last Tuesday.

The Shamrocks sailed past Avon 66-48 in an HCC game at The Rock. Westfield led the Ori-

oles 20-17 in a high-scoring first quarter, then pulled away in the middle periods. The 'Rocks outscored Avon 17-7 in the second quarter to take a 37-24 halftime lead, then ran through the third period to go up 53-30 by the end of the quarter.

Crockett scored 18 points for Westfield, with Jessica Castor and Robey both adding 10 points. Eldredge scored eight points and also collected 12 rebounds. Ellie Kelleher and Hailley Remaks both contributed six points, Emmrey Collinsworth and Mikayla Rudolph each scored three and Alli McEvoy had two points. Isaac Bowman then threw in a triple to get HSE within 54-51. But Kai Butterworth answered that with his own 3-pointer, and

"What about some big free throws from our two seniors down the stretch," said Sumpter.
