However, safety precautions will be necessary for a while to keep unvaccinated people safe.

Healthcare workers said people may need to wait a

bit longer for that hug after their shots.

“Immunity really happens two weeks after that second dose, full immunity,” Melissa McMasters

said. “So in the meantime, we still need to do everything we have been doing. Still social distancing, wearing your masks, washing your hands. It’s just time

to be extra patient.”

McMasters is the Nurse Administrator for the Immunization and Infectious Disease Program at the Marion County Public Health Department. She has been fighting the virus on the frontlines throughout the pandemic and is now helping seniors in Indiana get vaccinated.

According to the CDC, the various COVID-19 vaccines have not been proven

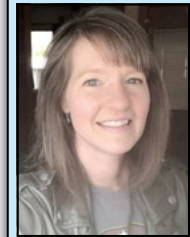
OneZone, a Chamber of Commerce serving southern Hamilton County, has announced Pinheads Entertainment Center as the Small Business of the Year Award Winner.

to reduce transmission of the virus. Health experts in Indianapolis said transmission seems unlikely, since the vaccine should highly reduce the chances of people getting the COVID-19 virus. Still, they suggest that people keep the safety of others in mind.

“It is important even if you have received the vaccine, to note that there are several around you that haven’t,” McMasters said.

The CDC hasn’t made it clear what percentage of the population needs to be vaccinated to achieve herd immunity. However, health-

care workers say every day as people get vaccinated, the solution to our social distanced dilemma inches closer.

“It is the light at the end of the tunnel for all of us to get back to normal, and to get rid of this pandemic,” McMasters said.

Indiana restaurant, bar industry fear changes to U.S. minimum wage

President Joe Biden has proposed the federal minimum wage be raised from \$7.25 per hour to \$15 per hour.

That increased pay comes with a catch: Cutting tip wages.

Meanwhile, Indiana Democrats have come up with a similar proposal to increase Indiana’s minimum wage from \$7.25 per hour to \$10 per hour in 2022, and then by \$1 each year until it reaches \$15 an hour. That proposal faces slim prospects in the Republican supermajority of the Indiana General Assembly.

Rob Strong, owner of downtown Indianapolis Stadium Tavern, said that for most bar and restaurant owners, the toughest part of the coronavirus pandemic was cutting staff and shortening their hours, something he fears could happen again if the minimum wage increases and the tip wages go away.

“A lot of places don’t have that labor included in everything,” Strong said. “You know, \$15 an hour is a lot for a restaurant or a small business to cover.”

Patrick Tamm, president and chief executive officer of the Indiana Restaurant and Lodging Association, said if the tip wage goes away, business owners would have no choice but to raise food and drink prices.

Michael Hicks, director of the Center for Business and Economic Research at Ball State University, said two of every 100 workers in the United States earn minimum wage. Usually, one of them is a teenager working a part-time job, and the other is almost exclusively someone on a waitstaff.

“If a 16-year-old on weekends and evenings is making \$10 an hour in the midst of a recession, this is not going to affect to many people outside the restaurant industry,” Hicks said.

Indiana’s minimum wage has been the same as the current federal rate, \$7.25, since 2009.

Three neighboring states – Illinois (\$11), Michigan (\$9.65) and Ohio (\$8.80) – have higher minimum wages, according to [paycor.com](#).

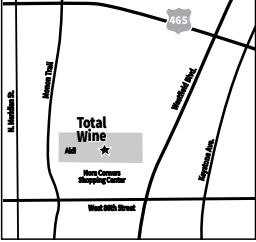
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Timing right to bring back *Alabama Story*

“History is a guide to navigation in perilous times. History is who we are and why we are the way we are.” – David McCullough, historian

Many Americans faced perilous times in 2020. Not only did a pandemic alter our way of life, but issues of racial injustice were pushed to the forefront. In 2020, many people had their eyes opened to the evils of prejudice and injustice in our country.

That’s why The Actors Theatre of Indiana felt the time was right to bring back their show *Alabama Story* in order to expose people to the unsung heroes of history.

In 1959, an Indiana native, who became state librarian of Alabama, found her life and livelihood at risk when a controversial children’s book crossed her desk. The innocent tale of a white rabbit marrying a black rabbit angered politicians in the Civil Rights era. Some wanted the book burned, but State Librarian Emily Reed, a forgotten hero of free speech, decided to fight for what is right. This fact-inspired, highly the-

atrical new American play had its Indiana premiere in 2019 and was launched as a Streaming-On-Demand presentation on Monday, Jan. 18, Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

Those who saw the show in 2019 agree that it’s relevant to today’s times.

In her review on [Plays With John and Wendy.com](#), Wendy Carlson writes that, “This show is important to give you context as to this country’s history and what our future could be again should we glorify the past instead of learning from it.”

On the theatre blog [A Seat on The Aisle](#), reviewer Ken Klingemeier called ATI’s production, “an important story, showing the attitudes, the conflicting ideas and ideals.” He urged people to share this show with young people. “It might just cause some interesting conversation,” he writes.

Sam Acre, a Realtor/broker for F.C. Tucker and Broadway investor who saw the 2019 production, said he plans to watch the show again with his son.

“This immensely touching, true story is full of hu-


mor and humanity,” he said. “Actors Theatre of Indiana has brought cutting edge theatre to our city.”

Frank Basile, a long-time patron of the arts, said he was giving a speech last year at the grand opening of the building housing the Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library. At the event, he told the crowd, “I have long enjoyed the works of Kurt Vonnegut and the principles he advocated, along with his satire and sense of humor. Among other things, I liked his stand against literary censorship and in favor of social justice. In connection with literary censorship, coincidentally, the current production by Actors Theatre of Indiana is the play *Alabama Story*, which very effectively addresses this issue with an incident from 1959 in Montgomery, Alabama. The casting and acting are superb, and the story is compelling. I strongly recommend that each of you in the audience attend this play.”

The DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife is seeking public comment on proposed wildlife rule changes.

Those changes include updates to rules regarding legal equipment for turkey hunting, muzzleloaders for deer hunting, and beaver trapping season starting and ending times. For a complete list of proposed amendments with additional information about each proposal, see wildlife.IN.gov/2362.htm.

There are three ways to comment on the proposed changes. A virtual public hearing will be held at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 9 using WebEx.

Description of Work:

Fishers: The project involves complete reconstruction of the site, including replacement of existing parking lots and addition of new parking areas, new concrete walks, plantings, irrigation and site lighting. The asphalt shingle roof will be replaced with a new standing seam metal roof. New fascia trim is included as well as resurfacing of EIFS and plaster surfaces, and cleaning of all masonry surfaces. The existing south entrance of the building will be remodeled on the footprint of the existing foundations. A small addition and significant renovation of the north entrance will include a new drop-off canopy and creation of a two-story entry volume. This work will include removing a portion of the existing roof, reworking the structural frame of the building, and tying the new structure system into the existing. Additional renovation new the main entrance will include renovation of lower level meeting rooms, the first floor teen area, and finishes in miscellaneous spaces. There is also work to create a fire barrier through a portion of the Library. Replacement of existing elevators and the addition of new elevators is also included in the project. The building will be occupied throughout construction and multiple phases will be required.

Noblesville: The project involves complete reconstruction of the site, including replacement of existing parking lots, reorientation of the main vehicular traffic entrance, as well as the addition of new concrete walks, plantings, irrigation and site lighting. The existing metal roof will be recoated and the exterior wall and soffit finishes cleaned, repaired, or modified based on age and condition. The main entrance will be renovated to add a new drop-off canopy and replace the current one-story entrance with a two story entrance. This work will include removing a portion of the existing roof, reworking the structural frame of the building, and deep foundation work. Additional renovation near the main entrance will include reconfiguring the meeting rooms and bookstore as well as new finishes in the group restrooms and offices. The existing elevators will also be refurbished as part of the project. The building will be occupied throughout construction and multiple phases will be required.

Shamrocks beat Tigers, clinch share of HCC championship

FISHERS - With a share of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship in sight, the Westfield girls basketball team sprinted to the finish line.

The Shamrocks used a solid defensive effort to beat Fishers 54-33 Thursday night at the Tiger Den. With the victory, Westfield finished conference play at 6-1, giving the 'Rocks at least a share of the title. This is the second time that Westfield has won an HCC championship, the first time was in 2016.

"I'm so proud of the kids, I'm so proud of their effort," said Shamrocks coach Ginny Smith. "I just couldn't be more pleased with the direction of this team. From a culture perspective, everything is really in a great place. They care about each other and they're putting each other above themselves, and that's just what you would hope to see as a coach. And I couldn't be prouder."

Westfield scored the first nine points of the game, starting with a basket by Chesney Tebbe. Olivia Robey took over after that, pouring in the next seven points. The 'Rocks didn't allow Fishers to get on the scoreboard until Hailey Smith made a free throw with 1:20 left in the first quarter.

Westfield led 11-3 after the first quarter. A jump shot by Katie Burton got the Tigers within 13-5, but the Shamrocks answered that with a 7-0 run. Hailey Remaks made a 3-pointer, then Gigi Eldredge scored back-to-back baskets. The momentum carried Westfield to a 26-9 lead at halftime.

"There's no question, Fishers is a fantastic basketball team," said Ginny Smith. "We probably caught them coming out of quarantine, so maybe for us the timing was right. But defensively, we were locked in. We did some really great things and I think we played well together as a team. It was a really great team effort."

The Tigers, ranked No. 4 in Class 4A, had not played a game since Jan. 2. Fishers coach Lauren Votaw said the layoff did affect her team, although she didn't want to use that as an excuse.

"This was our first game in a few weeks," said Votaw. "We tell our kids every day that everything that happens to me today is an opportunity to learn and grow. And so that's what today is."

Votaw also credited Westfield with playing well.

"They came out and were ready to play," said Votaw. "They knew they were playing for a conference title tonight. Their kids were locked in and focused from the beginning. They handled our 1-3-1 really well. So, I got to give credit to them there. They had a nice balanced attack. I think (Alyssa) Crockett only had 10. They were ready to play."

Westfield stayed comfortably ahead in the second half, using timely baskets to stop the Tigers anytime they began to get some momentum. The Shamrocks had four 3-pointers in the third quarter: Two from Crockett and one each by Jessica Castor and Robey.

"We didn't shoot it great, but we were able to still 'inside out,' it's kind of our

thing," said Ginny Smith. "And I think we were able to get some buckets early on the inside, which opened up some stuff for us on the outside."

Fishers made its biggest run late in the third, scoring six consecutive points. Burton had four of those points on a putback and a jumper, then Hailey Smith made a layin. But Crockett followed that up with her second 3 of the period, and Westfield was up 46-22 after three.

Eldredge went 4-of-4 from the free-throw line in the fourth quarter to help keep the Shamrocks' lead above 20 points. The Tigers got some good minutes out of Karina Scott in the fourth quarter, with four points.

"I thought as the game wore on, we came back into our own," said Votaw. "I thought our bench energy at the end was really good. I thought our floor energy at the end was really good. I saw some positive things. We had some kids diving on loose balls and things like that."

Robey led the Shamrocks with 14 points, followed by Eldredge with 12 points and Crockett with 10 points. Eldredge and Crockett both had outstanding defensive games, with Eldredge collecting nine rebounds and blocking three shots, and Crockett pulling six rebounds and getting four blocks.

Burton scored 14 points for Fishers and pulled eight rebounds. Hailey Smith scored seven points and collected seven rebounds.

Westfield is 16-4 overall and completed its regular season with its Thursday game. (The Shamrocks' game with Greensburg next week has been canceled.) Westfield will now await the draw for Sectional 8, which will be revealed on Sunday night.

"We will wait for our sectional draw and just be prepared to go play in a sectional," said Ginny Smith.

Fishers, meanwhile, is 2-1 in conference play and 13-3 overall. The Tigers will be busy for the next week making up HCC contests, starting with a Saturday trip to Avon. Fishers then plays at Brownsburg on Tuesday and at Hamilton Southeastern on Thursday, then will finish the season at home next Friday against Franklin Central.

These upgrades, which are part of Phase 1 of the three-year Fieldhouse of the Future project, are important elements that make the NBA’s best arena an even better experience for fans.

In addition to much of the infrastructure needed for subsequent phases of the project, Phase 1 renovations include:

- **Center-Hung Scoreboard:** Welcoming fans back to the Fieldhouse is the new LED center-hung scoreboard, equipped with more than 3,350 square feet of video area, two LED rings, and underbelly screens. A partnership with experience design company ANC, the scoreboard is part of a digital enhancement to Bankers Life Fieldhouse that also includes more than 600 square feet of 1.5mm fine-pitch LED in the DataBank Courtside and PointsBet Hardwood Clubs.
- **New Retractable Seating System and New Seats in the Lower Bowl:** The new retractable seating system at the north end of the lower bowl allows for construction of additional suites and loge terraces on the Key Bank level, while the green

seats in the lower bowl, original to the building’s opening in 1999, have been replaced with new dark gray seats.

- **Fever Locker Room:** A new locker room for the Indiana Fever is among the best in the WNBA and includes amenities like a film room, larger weight room and hydro-therapy tubs.
 - **Salesforce Court:** The Salesforce court, which was 21 years old, boasts a brand new playing surface and was raised to street level, to not only create necessary operational space on the event level but make access to the court for community and youth events easier.
 - **New Kitchen:** This larger kitchen on the event level includes expanded capacity, dedicated dock and storage areas, and state-of-the-art equipment.
 - **New PointsBet Hardwood Club and '67 Club and Updated DataBank Courtside Club:** Offering unique experiences within the overall game experience, the clubs are a mix of traditional and modern and incorporate design elements reflective of Indiana’s rich basketball tradition.
 - **New and Updated Key Bank Level Suites:** Ten new Key Bank Level suites and two new loge terraces have been added while all the suites on the Key Bank level have been modernized and updated.
 - **Renovated Visitor Locker Rooms:** The visitor locker rooms, also used for teams and groups using the Fieldhouse for other events throughout the year, has been updated with all new fixtures, paint, and carpeting.
- “For many fans, this is going to look like a whole new Fieldhouse,” said Mel Raines, Executive Vice President for Corporate Communications, Community Engagement, and Facility Operations. “But it’s the same great Fieldhouse that’s beloved in the NBA, and it’s still the best place to watch a basketball game in the country and the world.”
