# Fishers unveils plan to keep Gray Eagle golf course, new residential development

It was August of 2018 when the announcement was made that the Gray Eagle Golf Course in Fishers would close. It did not close as was scheduled, but the future of the course has been uncertain.  
Fishers city officials announced last Tuesday the Gray Eagle Golf Course will remain open with an age-targeted 55-years-of-age-and-older multi-family development south of the Gray Eagle Clubhouse. The plan includes upgrades to the Clubhouse and improvements to the Golf Course, while also preserving the current greenspace.  
The city says these improvements will not impact Gray Eagle Homeowners Association dues.  
The agreement was reached by the city of Fishers, the Gray Eagle Homeowners Association, and JC Hart.  
“We’ve been in discussions for over two years to ensure the long-term sustainability of this area, including preservation

of the golf club, and I believe this is a viable solution to achieve that goal,” said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness in a city news release.  
A land rezoning will be required and an economic development component will

be a part of this planned development. The city said in the release only that the economic development part of the plan “is anticipated to be presented to the City Council in the near future.”

# Carmel schools embarking on facility upgrades

Carmel Clay Schools will embark next month on the first of a three-year series of multi-million-dollar improvements to school facilities. It will be accomplished without a property tax increase, according to Assistant Superintendent Roger McMichael.  
Bids will be accepted on Feb. 9 for an estimated \$20 million series of improvements at Carmel High School that include new chillers and boilers, roof restoration, planetarium upgrades and parking lot expansion.  
This phase of the overall project will also include work at the soccer and baseball fields with some new bleachers, parking, lighting and a press box.  
Later this year another \$25 million project will be bid that includes renovating and expanding the Performing Arts Department and remodeling the Dale Graham Auditorium.  
School officials say with many more students involved in performing arts, the current facilities are crowded and outdated.  
In 2022, the school system will undertake the \$43 million construction of a new 50-meter natatorium to be largely devoted to competition swimming. The current swimming facility will then be primarily for recreational swimming. (Carmel swim teams have set national records, winning 51 state championships including 34 consecutive girls swim titles.)  
In 2023, the last in the series of renovations called ‘general facility improvements’ estimated to cost just under

# Juvenile faces charges in last week's Fishers shooting

An Indianapolis juvenile faces a long list of charges following a shooting on Jan. 18 near 104th Street and Olivo Road.

Fishers Police say the 15-year-old is alleged to have been involved in the shooting that resulted in non-life-threatening injuries to the victim. Authorities say this was not a random act.

Shortly before 4 p.m. on Jan. 18, Fishers police responded to a report of a person shot. Officers found the

victim and rendered first aid until paramedics from the Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Services arrived. The victim suffered a non-life-threatening leg injury and was transported to an area hospital.

Prior to being transported, the victim provided detailed information regarding the suspect. Officers established a perimeter and deployed both K9 and drone units to assist in the search for the suspect and evidence related to the incident. After an extensive search, police determined the suspect was no longer

in the immediate area.

Detectives located the suspect the next day and took him into custody without incident. The suspect is currently being held at the Hamilton County Juvenile Detention Center.

This case remains an active investigation. Anyone with information regarding this case should contact Detective LaShawn Tyler at (317) 595-3313.

The suspect faces a long list of felony charges, including robbery, strangulation, criminal confinement, motor vehicle theft and firearms violations.

# Local politics in a non-election year

The year 2021 is a year without elections. Some may say "thank goodness." Others may ask what are the politicians to do in such a year?

Well, there will be politics, just not election politics. This is the year that political parties hold reorganization of their party leadership, also known as central committees.

In Hamilton County, Republican Chairwoman Laura Campbell and Democrat Chairman Joe Weingarten will be up for election this year. The reorganization meetings will be held on March 6 with all of the county's 221 precinct committeemen and their vice committeemen of each party eligible to vote.

The gatherings will also choose vice chairmen, secretaries and treasurers of their respective parties for the next four years. In past years these conclaves have

produced some stormy competition.

Four years ago, Pete Peterson of Fishers was first elected GOP chief, but his election was ruled invalid by the GOP State Committee because a number of committeemen had been appointed too late to be considered legitimate.

His opponent, Mrs. Campbell, was found to be the properly elected chairman.

Weingarten was elected unopposed by Democrats as a new chairman replacing Keith Clock. Weingarten promised to rebuild the party structure, which had not succeeded in electing a local Democrat in years.

It seems likely Mrs. Campbell will seek re-election this year. It is possible, but not certain, that a contest may develop for the chairmanship. A Fishers faction of the GOP is the

most likely to field a candidate if any emerges.

Weingarten says he will probably not seek re-election. Democrats may well have a contest en route to choosing a new party chief. Weingarten says names have been mentioned, but he does not wish to reveal them.

Party chairmen lead local election campaigns and raise funds for their candidates' campaigns. They may have considerable, if not always visible, influence in local and state government. A Republican governor, for example, may rely on a county chairman for advice when considering an appointment of a resident of the chairman's county.

A county chairman can sometimes be helpful to a candidate in a primary election by advising party workers of his or her preference. In this county, however, both parties have avoided anything that could be considered endorsing of candidates by party leadership.

# Fishers GOP councilors vote down proposal aimed at appointment diversity

Republican members of the Fishers City Council on Tuesday voted down a proposal by Democrat Jocelyn Vare aimed at increasing diversity when the council makes appointments to boards and commissions. When Vare's proposal came to a vote, only Vare and fellow Democrat Sam DeLong voted in favor, with the seven GOP councilors voting no.

In a statement, Vare describes the language on the city website encouraging local citizens to apply for seats appointed by the council.

"In practice, however, an extremely unrepresentative group of people have the opportunity to participate on boards and commissions, while other groups within the community are routinely excluded," Vare said. "The 95 available seats on boards and commissions include very few people of color, women, members of the LGBTQ community, and persons with disabilities."

Vare cites data provided by the city showing 80 percent of appointees to city boards and commissions are white males. Five recommendations Vare says

would remedy the situation were voted down in the 7-2 party line vote.

No Republican member of the council commented during the public meeting as to why they opposed Vare's proposal.

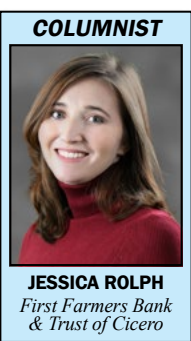

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# Safety precautions, patience key after receiving COVID-19 vaccine

As more people get their COVID-19 vaccine, they're wondering when they can safely get back to normal life. Doctors say it takes about two weeks after the second dose of the COVID-19 vaccine for optimal protection to kick in. However, safety precautions will be necessary for a while to keep unvaccinated people safe.

Healthcare workers said people may need to wait a bit longer for that hug after their shots.

"Immunity really happens two weeks after that second dose, full immunity," Melissa McMasters said. "So in the meantime,

we still need to do everything we have been doing. Still social distancing, wearing your masks, washing your hands. It's just time to be extra patient."

McMasters is the Nurse Administrator for the Immunization and Infectious Disease Program at the Marion County Public Health Department. She has been fighting the virus on

the frontlines throughout the pandemic and is now helping seniors in Indiana get vaccinated.

According to the CDC, the various COVID-19 vaccines have not been proven to reduce transmission of the virus. Health experts in Indianapolis said transmission seems unlikely, since the vaccine should highly reduce the chances of peo-

ple getting the COVID-19 virus. Still, they suggest that people keep the safety of others in mind.

"It is important even if you have received the vaccine, to note that there are several around you that haven't," McMasters said.

The CDC hasn't made it clear what percentage of the population needs to be vaccinated to achieve herd immunity. However, healthcare workers say every day as people get vaccinated, the solution to our social distanced dilemma inches closer.

"It is the light at the end of the tunnel for all of us to get back to normal, and to get rid of this pandemic," McMasters said.

# One-of-a-kind historic covered bridge funded

Hamilton County is likely the only place in America where the number of covered wooden bridges is increasing. On Monday, Jan. 25, county commissioners accepted \$2.77 million in federal highway funds to largely pay for the restoration of the nation's last known post truss combination bridge.

Known as the Bell Ford Bridge, it stood for

135 years over the East Fork of White River in Jackson County. When it virtually collapsed about 10 years ago, Jackson County officials said they could not afford to restore it.

Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt worked with Jackson County Commissioners to take the bridge with the understanding it would be reconstructed over Fall Creek at Geist Park.

The bridge was disassembled and brought here. It has been in storage for several years awaiting funding under a federal alternative transportation program which grants 80 percent of such costs for trails and bridges.

Actual reconstruction will start late next year, according to County Highway Director Brad Davis, whose department will be the lead agency on the project. The bridge will be a link in the county trail system for pedestrians and bikers, but will not carry motor vehicles.

Hamilton County once had at least six covered bridges. After the loss of Eller Bridge in 1957, Poters Bridge was the only wooden span until Conner Prairie salvaged a covered bridge and placed it on its property several years ago.

Now, the third such historic bridge will be located here. The scenic bridges were numerous throughout the nation in the 19th century, but began disappearing with the advent of steel and concrete bridges in the early 20th century.

\$18 million will include making certain facilities ADA compliant, installing new field lights at the football stadium, along with a new concession and restroom building at the stadium.

All told, the school corporation will spend slightly over \$106 million. Financing will be entirely within

existing revenue sources using a combination of general obligation bonds and lease rental contracts, McMichael said.

No voter referendum will be required since existing bonds will be maturing, and their debt retirement rates can be used to retire the newly planned bonds.

# Shamrocks beat Tigers, clinch share of HCC championship

**FISHERS** - With a share of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship in sight, the Westfield girls basketball team sprinted to the finish line.

The Shamrocks used a solid defensive effort to beat Fishers 54-33 last Thursday night at the Tiger Den. With the victory, Westfield finished conference play at 6-1, giving the 'Rocks at least a share of the title. This is the second time that Westfield has won an HCC championship, the first time was in 2016.

"I'm so proud of the kids, I'm so proud of their effort," said Shamrocks coach Ginny Smith. "I just couldn't be more pleased with the direction of this team. From a culture perspective, everything is really in a great place. They care about each other and they're putting each other above themselves, and that's just what you would hope to see as a coach. And I couldn't be prouder."

Westfield scored the first nine points of the game, starting with a basket by Chesney Tebbe. Olivia Robey took over after that, pouring in the next seven points. The 'Rocks didn't allow Fishers to get on the scoreboard until Hailey Smith made a free throw with 1:20 left in the first quarter.

Westfield led 11-3 after the first quarter. A jump shot by Katie Burton got the Tigers within 13-5, but the Shamrocks answered that with a 7-0 run. Hailey Remaks made a 3-pointer, then Gigi Eldredge scored back-to-back baskets. The momentum carried Westfield to a 26-9 lead at halftime.

"There's no question, Fishers is a fantastic basketball team," said Ginny Smith. "We probably caught them coming out of quarantine, so maybe for us the timing was right. But defensively, we were locked in. We did some really great things and I think we played well together as a team. It was a really great team effort."

The Tigers had not played a game since Jan. 2. Fishers coach Lauren Votaw said the layoff did affect her team, although she didn't want to use that as an excuse.

"This was our first game in a few weeks," said Votaw. "We tell our kids every day that everything that happens to me today is an opportunity to learn and grow. And so

that's what today is."

Votaw also credited Westfield with playing well.

"They came out and were ready to play," said Votaw. "They knew they were playing for a conference title tonight. Their kids were locked in and focused from the beginning. They handled our 1-3-1 really well. So, I got to give credit to them there. They had a nice balanced attack. I think (Alyssa) Crockett only had 10. They were ready to play."

Westfield stayed comfortably ahead in the second half, using timely baskets to stop the Tigers anytime they began to get some momentum. The Shamrocks had four 3-pointers in the third quarter: Two from Crockett and one each by Jessica Castor and Robey.

"We didn't shoot it great, but we were able to still 'inside out,' it's kind of our thing," said Ginny Smith. "And I think we were able to get some buckets early on the inside, which opened up some stuff for us on the outside."

Fishers made its biggest run late in the third, scoring six consecutive points. Burton had four of those points on a putback and a jumper, then Hailey Smith made a layin. But Crockett followed that up with her second 3 of the period, and Westfield was up 46-22 after three.

Eldredge went 4-of-4 from the free-throw line in the fourth quarter to help keep the Shamrocks' lead above 20 points. The Tigers got some good minutes out of Karina Scott in the fourth quarter, with four points.

"I thought as the game wore on, we came back into our own," said Votaw. "I thought our bench energy at the end was really good. I thought our floor energy at the end was really good. I saw some positive things. We had some kids diving on loose balls and things like that."

Robey led the Shamrocks with 14 points, followed by Eldredge with 12 points and Crockett with 10 points. Eldredge and Crockett both had outstanding defensive games, with Eldredge collecting nine rebounds and blocking three shots, and Crockett pulling six rebounds and getting four blocks.

Burton scored 14 points for Fishers and pulled eight rebounds. Hailey Smith scored seven points and collected seven rebounds.

Westfield is 16-4 overall and completed its regular season with its last Thursday game. (The Shamrocks' game with Greensburg that was originally scheduled for this week has been canceled.) Westfield will now prepare for a Sectional 8 re-match with Fishers, which takes place at Zionsville on Tuesday, Feb. 2.

Fishers got back on track last Saturday with a Hoosier Crossroads Conference win at Avon, by the score of 75-38.

The Tigers cruised through the first quarter to take a 20-3 lead. Fishers outscored the Orioles in each period, leading 37-16 at half-time and 55-27 after three quarters.

Burton led the Tigers' scoring with 25 points. Hailey Smith added 14 points and Olivia Smith contributed 13 points. Other scorers were Audra Emmerson with seven points, Joirdyn Smith with six, Katie Howard with five, Haley Gausepohl with three and Scott with two.

Both Hailey Smith and Olivia Smith collected eight rebounds., followed by Emmerson and Emily Gausepohl with five each. Haley Gausepohl and Kaiya Walker each had three rebounds. Burton had five steals and Hailey Smith had four steals.

Audra Emmerson dished out three assists, with Joirdyn Smith handing out three assists as well.

Fishers is 3-1 in conference play with three more HCC games to go. The Tigers are 14-3 overall and play Tuesday at Brownsburg and Thursday at Hamilton Southeastern on Thursday, then will finish the season at home Friday against Franklin Central.

## IHSAA announces girls basketball sectional pairings

The IHSAA revealed the sectional pairings for this year's girls basketball state tournament last Sunday night.

The Hamilton County story begins with the Class 4A schools, which will play in Sectional 8 at Zionsville. The Indiana Basketball Coaches Association released its weekly one-class poll minutes before the pairings were revealed, and all six schools that will play in Sectional 8 are ranked in the top 20, easily making that sectional the most loaded in the state.

Play begins on Tuesday, Feb. 2. The first game will see No. 17-ranked Hamilton Southeastern take on No. 10 Noblesville in the first of two opening-round games. The second game of the night will see No. 8 Fishers play No. 18 Westfield.

Host Zionsville, ranked No. 12, got one of the byes into the semi-finals and will take on the Southeastern-Noblesville winner in the first game Friday, Feb. 5. Carmel, ranked No. 15, also got a bye and will play the Fishers-Westfield winner in the second game. Semi-final winners will meet for the championship on Saturday, Feb. 6.

Hamilton Heights will travel to New Castle for Class 3A Sectional 24, a seven-team sectional. The Huskies will take on Winchester in a first-round game on Wednesday, Feb. 3.

The New Castle sectional opens on Feb. 2 with Jay County playing Delta. On Feb. 3, the Huskies-Golden Falcons game will be followed by the host Trojans taking on Muncie Burris. Yorktown got the bye and will play the Jay County-Delta winner on Feb. 5 in the first semi-final, with the Feb. 3 winners playing the second semi-final.

Sheridan will face the winner of the Feb. 2 first-round game between Seeger and Fountain Central. That will be the second game of the night, following the opener between Rossville and Lafayette Central Catholic. The winner of that game will play Clinton Prairie in Feb. 5's first semi-final game.

University will travel to Cascade, in southern Hendricks County, for Class 2A Sectional 43, a five-team sectional. The Trailblazers will play Western Boone in the first semi-final game on Feb. 5.

The sectional opens up on Feb. 2 with Park Tudor taking on Cascade in the site's lone first-round game. The winner will play Covenant Christian on Feb. 5 in the second semi-final.

Heights led 18-15 after the first quarter. MyKayla Moran scored seven points during that period, including a 3-pointer. Moran was one of four Huskies players to make a 3 in that quarter.

Central Catholic came back to lead 32-28 at halftime. Jillian Osswald helped keep Heights close by scoring six points in the second quarter. The Knights extended their lead to 46-36 after three periods; the Huskies tried to make a comeback in the fourth, led by Camryn Runner's 11 points, but LCC hung on for the win.

Runner scored 17 points to lead the Huskies, including two 3s. Osswald and Moran both scored 12 points.

"Caught a streaky shooting LCC team on the wrong night," said Heights coach Keegan Cherry. "It was a great experience in preparing for tournament. It's really pretty simple, if teams are going to man us, they can't take away all options. We have to have some poise and toughness to take advantage of how they are guarding us. We got quick on several trips. Didn't execute and didn't get the type of look we wanted. And when you're in a hole and trying to make a comeback, that's when you really need to be tough and get what you want. Your margin for error is really thin. Tonight was also a great example of the tougher team always sets the rules. You can't get caught up in officiating. The only counter is to be tougher. And that's mental and physical."

"It was just one of those nights."

Prior to the conference championship game, the Huskies rolled past New Castle 73-31 in their Senior Night game last Tuesday where they honored Osswald, the lone senior on the team.. Heights outscored the Trojans in each of the four quarters; the Huskies led 14-8 after the first period, then dominated in the second quarter, pouring in 28 points for a 42-14 halftime lead. Heights then led 58-18 after three quarters.

"Great evening celebrating our only senior, Jillian Osswald," said Cherry. "Sometimes on special occasion evenings like Senior Night, it can be hard for a team to maintain focus. We gave up a couple of 3s early, but once we got settled in, I was pleased with how our girls played, both mentally and physically. We talk often about playing to a standard regardless of the score. And we did that for the majority of the minutes tonight."

Appropriately, Osswald led the way for the Huskies, scoring 29 points, including four 3-pointers. Runner added 24 points, also hitting four 3s. Moran scored nine points.

"I am really proud of Jillian Osswald," said Cherry. "She's everything we want our program to be about. We will definitely miss her contributions next season." But for now, Cherry said the team's goal is to continue playing basketball for several more weeks.

Heights is still unbeaten for the season at 15-0. The Huskies will travel to Lafayette Central Catholic on Friday to play the 2A No. 6 Knights in the Hoosier Conference championship game.

Heights finished second in the conference and is now 15-1 overall. The Huskies travel to Lafayette Jefferson on Thursday for their regular-season finale.

Noblesville scores two big wins

Blackhawks go 2-1 for the week

Noblesville took a trip to Harrison last Tuesday and came home with a big win and a new record.

The Millers overwhelmed the Raiders 90-53. It was the first time that Noblesville had topped the 90-point mark since Dec. 22, 2015, when the Millers put up 95 points against Beech Grove.

Shade scored 27 points for Noblesville on Saturday. Shade threw in three 3-pointers and also had eight rebounds and seven assists. Wilson nailed five 3s on her way to

Emma Went helped out in the period with seven points in the third quarter. 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



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
