## Fishers vaccination site up and running at former Marsh building

The Fishers Health Department vowed to do whatever it takes to get as many people vaccinated at its new vaccination site.

The city celebrated renovating the former Marsh Supermarkets building on 116th Street near Brooks School Road with a ribbon cutting on Monday. The opening means city officials are a step closer to achieving their goals.

"The sooner we can get people vaccinated the faster we can stop the spread of the virus," said Monica Heltz, public health director of the Fishers Health Department.

On the first day, the vaccination site was

expected to vaccinate 340 people. Officials hope to have enough doses to vaccinate 1,000 people a day. The city previously said the site can give up to 1,600 shots a day. Appointments are required, and applicants for the vaccinations must have no COVID-19 symptoms. Right now, only people 70 and older can get vaccinated in Indiana.

Heltz

Heltz said she hopes opening the site will encourage others to work with their health departments to use community re-vaccine dose at the site. He said the large

"I think the message is 'Be ready. Do whatever needs to happen in the community to make sure your community is well-positioned and ready to respond when the vaccine comes'," Heltz said.

This morning, Westfield High School received a threat and immediately went into its lockdown safety protocols. Westfield Police Department secured the building and no students or staff were injured. There was no shooting or any act of violence at the school. No weapons or instruments of destruction were found during the on-site investigation. The Westfield Police Department gave Westfield High School the all-clear and WHS resumed normal activities with increased police presence. In the process of the investigation, which remains ongoing, the police spoke with several individuals with knowledge of the situation."

## Carmel residents must wait to learn fate of The GOAT tavern

Neighbors who live near The GOAT tavern in Carmel will have to wait longer to find out what comes next for the bar.

The city's Board of Zoning Appeals was set to discuss a possible variance in a meeting Monday night. That part of the agenda was tabled until the Feb. 22 meeting.

The tavern first opened in July; since then, the city has received several complaints. In December, Carmel officials ordered the tavern to limit its operating hours based on the existing variance between 7 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Two days later, Carmel allowed The GOAT to stay open past 2 p.m. if it agreed to a long list of conditions.

#### Drainage improvements coming to Home Place area

The Hamilton County Surveyor's Office and the City of Carmel will launch a drainage improvement project in the Home Place area in a shared partnership project to help address a history of chronic poor drainage, roadway and roadside ditch flooding and standing water.

The project will take place along the Clara Knotts Regulated Drainage an area bordered by New

and 102nd Street to the south.

Work is expected to begin in February with an anticipated completion date of May 1, weather and utilities permitting. New storm water pipes will be installed along several roadways including portions of Broadway Avenue, Park Avenue, and 102nd and 103rd streets. All of the work will take place in areas where utility easements exist.

Intermittent, short-term Jersey Street to the west, roadway closures are ex-College Avenue to the east, pected in order to install the pipes crossing the roads.

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



## Good start sends Royals to victory

FISHERS - Before Hamilton Southeastern took to the floor Tuesday night to host Connersville, the Royals coaches talked about the importance of getting off to a good start.

The Southeastern players did just that. The Royals dominated the first half against the Spartans and cruised their way to a 51-35 victory, making HSE 2-0 to begin its current six-game homestand.

"The last couple games, we haven't gotten off to great starts and sort of dug ourselves in holes," said Royals coach Brian Satterfield. "It's not fun always trying to play from behind, and one thing we wanted to try and do was come out here and try to get off to a better start."

Southeastern couldn't have asked for a better start on Tuesday. The Royals led 15-2 after the first quarter and ran that advantage to 26-2 midway through the second period. Sam Jacobs scored the game's first five points, then Stutz made two free throws for a 7-0 lead.

Connersville got on the board with a basket, but the Royals continued to roll, scoring the next 19 points. Vinny Buccilla made two free throws, then both he and John McCall made three-point plays to finish out the first quarter. In the second quarter, Alex Totton got hot, making two 3-pointers on his way to eight points.

The Spartans made an 8-0 run during the second half of the period, but Buccilla finished the quarter with a triple, giving the Royals a 29-10 halftime advantage.

"I thought the energy that we had early on was good, especially at the defensive end," said Satterfield. "We were able to get our hands on a lot of things and get some deflections and let a little bit of our defense create some offense for us."

Southeastern had another fine defensive effort in the third quarter, holding Connersville to nine points and leading 41-19 by the end of the period. Jacobs had four points and Buccilla completed another three-point play with 49.3 seconds to go in the quarter.

The Spartans made a 9-0 run that took up the first three minutes of the fourth period, getting with 41-28. But the Royals answered that with their own 8-0 stretch. McCall started the run with a free throw. then Totton made his third 3-pointer of the game. Two free throws from Jacobs and a layin by Loudon Sundling put Southeastern back ahead 49-28, and the Royals were on their way to victory.

Satterfield said Connersville coach Kerry Brown "does a great job with them," and knew the Spartans weren't going to stop fighting.


