# Deputies diffuse tense situation with armed individual under severe stress

In January, Deputy Eddie Hansen and Sergeant Kevin Crask were dispatched to check the welfare of a Hamilton County citizen. Upon arrival, Deputy Hansen contacted the distressed individual, who was also armed with a rifle and struggling with suicidal ideation.

Deputy Hansen gave successful verbal instructions to deescalate the situation. Dep. Hansen negotiated for several minutes to gain compliance and eliminate the use of a weapon.

Subsequently, the incident ended peacefully because of the courageous actions of Dep. Hansen and Sgt. Crask. Despite the tense and uncertain nature of this call, no injuries occurred.

"Dep. Hansen displayed some of the most amazing communication skills and compassion I have seen in this profession," Sgt. Crask said. "Dep. Hansen routinely goes above and beyond to help people, and this was yet another display

# Hamilton County gets \$10M in Emergency Rental Assistance

# Heights earns recognition for Husky Fan Shop

Hamilton County officials announced that they have been awarded a \$10 million dollar Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) grant from the U.S. Department of Treasury for COVID-19 assistance. Specifically, the funding will assist renter households unable to pay rent and/or utilities due to loss of income from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The County Commissioners selected the Hamilton County Trustee Association (HCTA) and Danielle Carey Tolan, Hamilton County Trustee Association President and Westfield Washington Township Trustee, to oversee and distribute the grant; however, the commissioners and trustees needed county council approval before moving forward.

During the most recent county council meeting, Commissioner Christine Altman and Westfield Township Trustee Danielle

"The concern becomes the complexity of federal grant compliance, the reporting side, and how intricate and detailed that needs to be," said County Council President Amy Massillamany.

"If you are confident in your abilities, then we ultimately

Carey Tolan presented the details of the grant.

Councilman Brad Beaver expressed his concern to Tolan: "You realize the gravity of what you are doing here? You screw this up, we don't get any more federal money. That is a big weight on your shoulders."

Beaver cautioned Tolan by saying, "We get lots of federal money. If you interrupt the pipeline, we will be unhappy."

Tolan responded to Beaver's concerns by stating she already has an implementation

The Emergency Rental Assistance Program is included in the most recent stimulus package from the U.S. Department of Treasury. Seven Indiana counties, including Hamilton County, were allocated funds in terms of grant dollars for COVID-19 relief assistance for rent and utilities. Specifically, Hamilton County received \$10,120,511.40. These funds will be administered through Dec. 31, 2021 or until all funds have been distributed. trust the decision."

"We are very proud and excited to have been awarded this grant," Altman said. "Not only are renters who lost income due to COVID hurting, but our many landlords are struggling as a result. This grant will assist with lost income and provide the ability to keep renters housed in 2021."

"One of the main functions of the Township is to provide financial assistance to our residents facing emergency situations," Tolan said. "We are extremely grateful for this funding and providing much-needed COVID-19 relief to our residents in need. The grant does allow us to assist renters with past due rent/utility bills beginning in April 2020."

# Families protest to school board, call for HSE superintendent to quit

Families in the Hamilton Southeastern Schools district said last Wednesday they will not back down until Superintendent Allen Bourff steps down.

Thousands have signed petitions disagreeing with the way Bourff suggested teachers discuss the Black Lives Matter Movement in the classroom.

Last Wednesday, nearly 20 people stood holding signs to send a message to the school board members meeting inside. The group says they were blocked from entering and speaking.

Aaron Ferris said he was in communication with the superintendent's assistant who told him there would be limited capacity at the meeting due to COVID-19 and he would need to sign up early. Ferris did and was told he would get in, but that changed when he filled out the public comment section

of his request.

"She stated that the reason that I wanted to speak, my bullet point that I wanted to speak (about) was not on the agenda for the night, so I wouldn't be able to go," Ferris said.

He said he reached back out to see if he could still attend the meeting since he made the original cut and possibly speak on a different subject, but that request was also denied.

Later in the meeting, a parent who tried to bring up the letter was silenced by a board member. Before she was cut off, she said, "While I know Dr. Bourff's letter to the teachers Monday wasn't on the agenda today, our students' well-being should be on the agenda every meeting."

Parents said even though the superintendent issued an apology, they're still not OK

with the original email he sent faculty.

"This right here in 2021, this is our Rosa Parks. This is our Malcom X. This is our movement," Aaron Ferris said.

A spokesperson for the school board told News 8 that no one was blocked from speaking at or entering the meeting, but added the board has limited attendance due to COVID-19; that reserving a seat is first-come, first-served; and people are only allowed to address the board about issues on the agenda and the superintendent's letter was not one of those agenda items.

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# HSE food pantry in high demand while students continue to face food insecurity during pandemic

More students from Hamilton Southeastern High School are using its food pantry as the pandemic continues.

It's currently a small storage closet called Rory's Closet, named after HSE's mascot.

Front office manager Della Johnson told News 8 she's hopes to relocate the food pantry to a larger space within the school and still asks for donations.

Johnson said Rory's Closet was created after a student asked her for food about seven years ago. She said it took her about a week to help the student and later mustered the courage to notify the school principal.

The principal soon after allowed there to be a non-perishable food pantry.

Rory's Closet also has school supplies and toiletries. Johnson said it's often used during breakfast hours and that Pop-Tarts are what students often ask for. She said that macaroni and cheese microwavable cups are also in high demand.

The front office manager mentioned that families have also stopped in as part of their grocery shopping and the pantry has helped students who've lost their home to a fire.

Between five and six students use the food pantry daily while school is operating at 50 percent capacity, but Johnson expects more students when everyone returns.

"It amazed me because of the perception of Fishers, Indiana and that everybody is well off, but I'm a witness to tell you that, no, the need does not have a color or has a class," Johnson said. "The need is real."

There's also a second pantry on the other side of Hamilton Southeastern High School for clothes, shoes and household items. Johnson really hopes to combine both pantries in the near future.

find alternative parking while the garage is closed.)

There was lots of discussion about the right decision. While many items we discuss are shuttled to committee meetings to be vetted, I brought this matter to the full Council to have an open conversation. The discussion will move to the Finance Committee, on which I serve, to be vetted before being brought back to the Council for a decision.

These are the kind of decisions we often have to make: Forecasting long-term needs vs. immediate demands.

## Emergency rental relief

Another item of interest: Hamilton County was awarded \$10 million in emergency rental relief assistance from the federal government to be directed to people struggling to stay in their rental homes. As we have seen during the pandemic, renters make up a large portion of the service and entertainment industries that have been economically decimated. Kudos to the Hamilton County Auditor Robin Mills and the Hamilton County Commissioners for securing these desperately needed funds, as we were only one of a handful of communities across the state to secure this grant.

I want to thank the Hamilton County Reporter for providing me the opportunity to share monthly columns with you about what is happening in county government, particularly focused on recapping the Hamilton County Council meetings from which I participate as the District 4 representative.

This is my first elected position, and to be truthful, was never part of any career aspirations. My goal in running for office was to serve and apply business philosophies to government. Mission statements, departmental goals, business plans, return on investment and KPI's are all common focuses in business. I and other newcomers to the Council believe government should reflect more of that bottom-line mentality.

The County Council is essentially the fiduciary body that approves budgets and appropriations for Hamilton County and consists of seven members. While we have ultimate decision-making power regarding fiscal affairs for the county, our counterparts are the three-member Hamilton County Commissioners that provide day-to-day direction of the county. This checks-and-balance function is true in all of Indiana's 92 counties.

The Council meets on the first Wednesday of the month and is livestreamed. There were three important takeaways from February's Hamilton County Council meeting.

## County parking garage

We are the midst of planning for a parking garage near the square in downtown Noblesville. Last year, the Council approved moving forward with a four-story parking garage to serve county employees and visitors. The parking garage represents more than just a structure; it is a three-way commitment that provides a safe place for our county workers to park, allows for a developer to build a residential development and supports Noblesville's vision of its downtown. Hopefully this can help support Noblesville's downtown businesses, especially the restaurants that have been devastated by the pandemic shutdowns.

During our February meeting, we discussed adding a fifth floor to the garage while still in the planning stages. While the original design called for four floors – is there demand for a fifth floor? Will people be working in offices post-COVID? On the one hand, four floors are sufficient for our current county employees and demand; on the other hand – what will our growth be in the future?

The cost of adding a fifth floor now, while in planning, is significantly less than building a four-story garage only to add another level several years down the road (not to mention the inconvenience to the staff who will need to

Trace Bulger was a 2015 graduate of Guerin Catholic High School. Bulger died in 2019 from a degenerative neurological disease.

Here's an idea of what is in a kindness bag (not all are the same):

- **Adult bags:** Facemask, blanket, gift card (\$10 to 25), journal, pens, socks, gloves, tape, dish towel, kitchen utensils, packaged treats (crackers, cookies, jerky, chocolate, mints, gum, etc.), lotion, toiletries, facial tissue pack, coffee/drink tumbler, hand warmers packet, small holiday/seasonal item, etc.
- **Youth bags:** Gift card (\$10 to 25), blanket, socks, hat, gloves, toothbrush, puzzle or cards/game, video DVD, notepad, pens, packaged treats (crackers, cookies, jerky, chocolate, mints, gum, etc.), water bottle/drink tumbler, small holiday/seasonal item, etc.

Hamilton County Sheriff's Deputies delivered bags to eight individuals – four boys, two girls, one adult female, and one adult male.

The foundation also provided stuffed animals with blankets. A Sheriff's Department employee delivered a stuffed animal with blanket to a five-year-old boy who recently lost a sibling.

# Will Charlie White try again? Both local parties could have leadership contests

Some might ask, why would anyone want to be the chairman of a political party in Hamilton County?

It's a rather thankless job, it offers no salary, and people can get mad at you if they don't get what they want.

But, fortunately some want the job. Fortunate because good leadership is needed in our political parties to keep our system of government working, and this year the parties will choose their leadership for the next four years.

As reported here earlier this month, the Democrats have a contest for county chairman shaping up between Kevin Patterson, Carmel, and Dayna Colbert, Fishers.

Republicans may also be looking at a contest, although possible candidates other than incumbent Laura Campbell are not saying anything yet.

Campbell, who indicates she is proud of her organization's success in the past election, will seek a new term when party reorganization is held March 6.

A couple of names of potential opponents have been reported by Abdul Shabazz in his periodic newsletter *The Cheat Sheet* earlier in the winter.

He says he's heard "on very good authority" that former chairman Charlie White might make a comeback bid in the reorganization. Also mentioned as a possible candidate is Troy Woodruff, a former state legislator now living in Fishers.

Shabazz, an attorney and Indianapolis radio personality, knows his Indiana politics and predicts "a very interesting year in Hamilton County" politics.

But, anyone serious about seeking party leadership positions will need to make plans known soon because running in a reorganization caucus involves contacting as many as possible of the 220 precinct committeemen to seek support.

So, it is possible that both parties may have contests, something that has rarely happened locally. Republicans will meet 'in person' while Democrats will make their selection by mail for the first time.

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# County Commissioners provide relief for Health Department

More than a dozen health care providers have been hired and started work on Feb. 8 at the vaccine clinic on the 4-H Fairgrounds. Up until now, employees of the Hamilton County Health Department, with support from local fire departments, have been manning the clinic themselves.

“The way that the health department is working right now is unsustainable,” County Commissioner Christine Altman said. “We need to give them the support they need to do the other vital work they’re tasked

with, but don’t currently have time to do – things like food inspections, health education, HIV testing, immunizations, and vital records.”

The county is in a position to bring on more contract help as vaccine supply increases. All expenses are expected to be fully reimbursed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) as part of President Biden’s “American Rescue Plan.”

The clinic has moved from the Annex Building to the Exhibition Hall. The new facility offers six times the space and will allow

the Health Department to administer four times the vaccines it started with once more become available.

In addition to canceling all events originally scheduled for the Exhibition Hall, the building had to be retrofitted to meet the Health Department’s needs. The county’s Building and Grounds Department installed refrigeration for the vaccine as well as a generator to ensure no vaccine is lost due to power outages. The county’s information technology department ran 600 feet of network cables to ensure necessary internet

access and provided dozens of computers.

“The Health Department gets an awful lot of credit for vaccine distribution because we’re on the frontlines of the pandemic,” said Jason LeMaster, interim administrator for the Health Department. “But some of the real heroes are the ones behind the scenes. Dozens of county agencies have gone out of their way to ensure the residents of Hamilton County get the first-rate service they’ve come to expect. We’re lucky to have the partnerships we possess.”

# New data show COVID cases down in Fishers, but city remains at Level 4

According to the Fishers Health Department, COVID cases are down in the latest numbers. However, even with that, Fishers remains in the red, Level 4, or highest category of transmission.

The Fishers Health Department has vaccinated

ed 3,232 individuals. Last week, the department was vaccinating people for their second dose. In Hamilton County, 12 percent of the population has received their first dose and 5.5 percent have completed their vaccine.

The Technology Drive testing site in Fishers closed for testing on Monday, Feb. 15 due to decreased

demand. School-based exposures (resident and nonresident) can be tested at the drive-thru Fishers Health Department Testing Site at the City Services Building located at 3 Municipal Drive.

Eligible individuals, regardless of underlying medical conditions, can make an appointment to get the vaccine at [coronavirus.in.gov/](#)

[vaccine](#). New appointments continue to open up, so check back frequently.

If you need assistance with scheduling, please call 2-1-1. Family members may schedule on behalf of eligible individuals. There is no charge for the vaccine. All persons receiving the vaccine will need valid ID or other proof of meeting eligibility criteria.

# Fishers has provided 3,000 COVID vaccinations, could do up to 2,000 a day with enough doses

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness and the Board of Works and Safety acknowledged the lease for the mass vaccination site in Fishers last Tuesday, which is allowed under emergency law provisions tied to the COVID pandemic.

Fadness says the site, located in a former Marsh grocery store on 116th Street just east of Brooks School Road, has already administered 3,000 doses of the Moderna vaccine.

“With this new facility, we should be able to scale up 1,600 to 2,000 people a day,” Fadness said.

The lease on this build-

ing is for six months, with the city holding an option to lease the space an additional six months. If the city wishes to lease beyond that time, City Attorney Greisl says city officials would need to have further conversations with the landlord.

Board of Works member Jason Meyer says the cost of the lease, at \$5 per square foot, is very reasonable.

Greisl told the board the majority of the costs for the mass vaccination site will be reimbursable by the state and/or federal government.

# Health officials planning for school staff vaccinations

Officials from both the Fishers and the Hamilton County health departments are discussing options for school employees to be vaccinated, even though they don’t know when that will happen.

For both departments, keeping school going without interruption is a top priority. However, the way each is planning vaccinations for school staff is a little different.

Hamilton County is considering a phased approach. Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Christian Walker said based on current sup-

ply, he can’t justify opening sites to teachers only.

“Carmel Clay Schools would go through two weeks of vaccine just to do their school district,” Walker said.

Meanwhile in Fishers, Public Health Director Monica Heltz said mass vaccination sites would work better for Hamilton Southeastern schools’ schedule.

“Most of the kids are virtual on Fridays; that would allow us a day where we could potentially get a large number of school staff vaccinated and it would also allow them an additional two days for recovery,” Heltz said.

'Blazers stun the field at Southmont

Unranked University beats two ranked teams on its way to the title

The University girls entered the Class 2A Southmont regional last Saturday as the only unraked team in the field. The Trailblazers left as regional champions after defeating No. 5 Triton Central 54-50 in the morning game and No. 9 South Putnam 51-43 in the championship game.

The championship is University's fourth regional title in 16 years of IHSAA competition and the first in Class 2A. The Trailblazers last won a regional in 2019 in Class 1A. University advances with a 12-3 record to play No. 1 and defending state champion Linton-Stockton (25-1) in the Jasper semi-state this Saturday.

Defense was the key for the Trailblazers as they held South Putnam to their lowest point total of the season and 24 points under their 67 points per game average. In the morning game, University held Triton Central to 12 points less than their average.

"We have worked extremely hard on defense," said University coach Justin Blanding. "The keys all day were to key in on shooters and rebound on the defensive end. Kelsey DuBois, Payton Seay and Jordan Patterson were great on the boards. Our defensive coach John Fair has spent countless hours and coach Alex Carson has been working hard on film and personnel for multiple teams. We were prepared. I can't thank my staff enough for their hard work and effort."

"The kids were locked in all day and we had some great offensive and defensive practices. Offensive and post coach Jessica DuBois was huge all year along with guards coach Abby Abel. We just made sure we had stuff that worked and we were comfortable doing. I'm proud of my team, staff and school," Blanding continued.

The coach was also grateful for having the season, in which the Trailblazers had three quarantine layoffs.

"Our heads of school Alicia LaMagdaline and Dave Vesper and our athletic directors John and Rhonda Walls - I cannot thank them enough for their effort in order for us to be able to play basketball this year."

The University defense was evident in the first half as they held South Putnam scoreless for nearly ten minutes, scoring 19 consecutive points to turn a 11-5 deficit in to a 24-11 advantage. The Trailblazers held a double-digit lead until the last four minutes and never let the Eagles get closer than six points down the stretch.

DuBois led University in the championship game with 18 points and 15 rebounds. The sophomore was 4 for 4 at the line in the fourth quarter. Seay had 17 points and 12 rebounds, including 10 of the Trailblazers' first 12 points.

South Putnam led 11-5 midway through the first quarter, before University mounted their charge. Seay split a pair of foul shots, made a rebound basket and scored at the buzzer to pull University within 11-10 after the first quarter.

Seay drove for a basket 30 seconds in to the second quarter to give University their first lead at 12-11. It was a lead the Trailblazers would never relinquish. DuBois scored two straight baskets before Patterson added a bucket. A DuBois rebound basket gave University a 20-11 lead and forced South Putnam's second timeout of the quarter. The timeout did not slow down the Trailblazers momentum. Kamryn Washington scored off a pass from Seay, then Washington found Sierra Hinds for a basket and a 24-11 lead. South Putnam made a late rally to cut the halftime advantage to 26-18.

University's defense showed up again in the third quarter, holding South Putnam to just a single point in the first 4:30 of the second half, building a 34-19 lead. Patterson and Seay had the

first two baskets before DuBois had two offensive rebound baskets. University closed the quarter with a reverse layup from DuBois, a Seay free throw and baskets by Seay and DuBois to take a 41-27 lead to the final quarter.

South Putnam stormed back in the fourth quarter, scoring the first eight points of the quarter to pull within 41-35 with 4:52 remaining. Seay answered with a driving basket to stem the Eagle momentum before University junior Abby Hannon made the defensive play of the game, blocking a shot in the lane and turning possession back to University. DuBois made a pair of foul shots and Hinds found Washington for a five-footer on the left baseline and the lead was back to 10 at 47-37.

The Eagles converted a pair of University turnovers in to baskets to cut the lead to 47-41 with 2:07 left. But the Trailblazers clamped down on defense and DuBois and Washington made both ends of one-and-one free throw attempts to close out the game and extend University's season for another week.

South Putnam finishes the season with a 15-2 record, Macie Bumgardner had 15 points for the Eagles.

University won the morning game 54-50 over No. 5 Triton Central in a thrilling contest.

Seay put University on top 52-50 with 32 seconds remaining when she drove the right baseline and finished through contact. After Triton Central missed a shot, DuBois was fouled with 17 seconds remaining and calmly made both ends of the one-and-one to put the Trailblazers up 54-50. The Tigers controlled a few long rebounds before Seay grabbed her fourth rebound of the game and ran out the clock.

Triton Central had no answer for Seay attacking the basket. The sophomore had a game high 20 points with most of her points coming at the rim, often brushing off contact to finish. DuBois fought off first half foul trouble to finish with 12 points including making all six of her second half free throw attempts.

University got off to a quick start, jumping to a 6-2 lead on a basket by Seay and two foul shots each from Seay and Washington. Triton Central stayed in the game with three offensive rebound baskets and three three-pointers. Patterson had a late rebound basket for the Trailblazers to tie the score at 15 after the

first period.

The Tigers took the lead early in the second quarter and held a one possession advantage for most of the period until going up 29-24 with a minute remaining. Washington had a big basket for University with 33 seconds left to pull the Blazers within 29-26 at the break.

University ran a set play for Seay on the block to open the half and she converted. Washington had another big bucket from the left baseline to keep University close before the Tigers took their largest lead of the game at 36-30 with 6:41 left in the third.

The Trailblazers come back started with DuBois making two foul shots before Seay stole the ball and drove for a layin. After a Tigers score, Sierra Hinds hit a three pointer from the corner off a nifty feed from Washington to pull University within 38-37. University went on top when the Tigers defense collapsed on DuBois in the lane and the sophomore found Seay all alone for a layin. Hinds hit another three-pointer to give University a 42-40 lead before Triton Central scored to even the game at the end of the third period.

The Tigers took a 44-42 lead early in the fourth quarter off an errant Trailblazer

pass. Hinds made a steal and Patterson scored to knot the score back up. Triton Central senior Taylor Heath converted an and-one with 5:52 remaining to put the Tigers up 47-44.

University's defense cranked up the intensity from there, holding Triton Central to just three points for the remainder of the game. Seay scored before the Tigers Bailey Stamper split a pair of foul shots for a 48-46 lead. DuBois tied the contest with 3:58 remaining at 48-48. University finally took the lead when DuBois scored off a Seay assist with 2:19 remaining for a 50-48 before Stamper scored with 1:44 remaining to knot the game at 50.

After the Trailblazers had an empty possession with three missed shots, Hinds made the defensive play of the game, forcing Triton Central in to an over and back call with 53 seconds remaining to give the ball back to University. After a timeout, the Trailblazers were patient on offense until they had Seay isolated in the right corner and she beat her defender to the hoop for what turned out to be the winning points.

Triton Central bowed out with a 20-4 record. Stamper had a game high 21 while Heath had 13.

Millers edged out by Homestead in OT

**MARION** - Noblesville's remarkable season came to an end last Saturday, as the fifth-ranked Millers fell in the semi-finals of the Class 4A Marion regional to Homestead, 62-57 in a tight overtime game.

It was a tough battle, as neither team led by more than seven points the entire way. The Spartans led for the entire fourth quarter before a last-second layin by Kaitlyn Shoemaker forced overtime. But Homestead quickly took control in the extra period, getting a lead in the first minute and not relinquishing it.

"I thought we played really hard. It was just one of those things, like a little thing here or there, it could have been a different outcome," said Millers coach Donna Buckley.

The first quarter be-

longed to hot-shooting sophomore guards. Noblesville's Ashlynn Shade scored 10 points, including two 3-pointers, while Homestead's Alison Stephens also drained two 3s on her way to eight points. Shade's floater put the Millers up 12-11 at the end of the period.

The Spartans were up 17-16 with 5:31 left in the second quarter, but Noblesville went on an 8-0 run to go up 24-17. Shade and Mallory Miller both hit triples and Emily Wood's jumper gave the Millers their largest lead of the game.

Homestead then went on its own 8-0 run that stretched into the third quarter. Stephens nailed another 3 just before halftime, brining the Spartans within 24-20. Stephens then opened the second half with yet another 3, then Maggie Keinsley jumper moved Homestead

in front 25-24.

Noblesville pushed back with a 6-0 run to lead 30-25. Shade made a layin, then Brooklyn Smitherman stepped up with back-to-back baskets. Later in the quarter, Reagan Wilson's 3 gave the Millers a 35-32 lead.

But Homestead blasted back with a 10-0 stretch that bridged the third and fourth quarters. Stephens drained her sixth 3-pinter of the game to tie it up, then Molly Stock's triple put the Spartans up 38-35 at the end of the third. Back-to-back jumpers by Amber Austin gave Homestead a 42-35 lead.

The Spartans stayed a basket or two in front during the fourth, but Noblesville stayed close. Shade helped out with six points, then Shoemaker added her own six points, including the two

2015-16. Noblesville also won its first sectional championship since 2015.

"I'm so proud of our kids," said Buckley, who described her players as "kids you want representing your school and your community, and that's this group. They're really, really good kids."

"That's what makes me the saddest about it all is I just love coaching them," said Buckley, who also said the appreciated the support from the community during the season. "I love coming to work every day, knowing that I get to end my day with them. You couldn't ask for a better group."

# Carmel sets records in winning 35th straight state championship

At an unusual state meet, the Carmel girls swim team was its usual dominant self.

The Greyhounds had a phenomenal day at the annual IHSAA state meet, which took place last Saturday at the IU Natatorium in downtown Indianapolis. Carmel won the state championship, extending its national record win streak to 35 in a row.

The meet took place without any spectators due to COVID-19 restrictions. Fans could watch on a live-stream, and those that did saw a record-setting performance from the 'Hounds. Carmel scored a state-record 479 points, easily besting its own mark of 445 from the 2015 state meet.

Carmel won six events at the meet, including all three relays. The Greyhounds began with the medley relay, which Berit Berglund, Margaret Love, Hayley Reed and Colleen Duffy finished in 1:40.38. Next up was Margaret Lueking, who took first in the 200 freestyle, repeating as

Fishers picked up two state medals in three separate events. Kate Mouser was fourth and Lydia Reade seventh in the 200 free, JoJo Ramey placed fourth and Kate Mouser fifth in the 500 free, while Reade was third and Grace Lux seventh in the breaststroke.

Ramey, Lux, Mouser and Kalli Agapios finished seventh in the medley relay, while Ramey also took fourth in the 500 free. The Tigers finished the meet with a fourth-place finish by Ramey, Mouser, Avery Stein and Charlie Ramey in the 400 free relay.

"Don't believe me?"

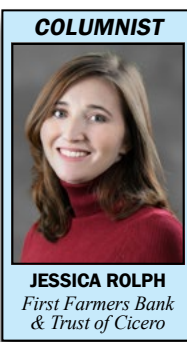
