



# Reps. Huston, Goodrich, Jeter vote to strip county control on wind and solar projects

Thirty-one counties issue resolutions against House Bill 1381

House Bill 1381, which essentially eliminates local control on the siting of wind and commercial solar projects, was passed by the Indiana House of Representatives last Wednesday.

The locally controversial bill sets statewide default standards for the installation of wind and solar farms, and strips local government of the ability to make decisions as to where or if renewable energy projects are able to be developed in their counties.

"If this bill passes the senate, unelected officials will be able to make decisions on land use for every county in the state," said Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. "No accountability to the voters and no ability for land use controls."

Indiana has a policy of Home Rule that grants local elected officials the power needed for the effective operation of government as to local affairs.

Currently, if a company wants to build wind turbines in unincorporated Hamilton County, they must get permission from county commissioners first. Under H.B. 1381, if the county denies a permit for a project the applicant can appeal to the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC).

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers), who voted in favor of the bill, said, "Providing more

opportunities for wind and solar will help Indiana diversify our state's energy sources. Right now, our state isn't a competitor in this growing market, and we don't want to continue losing out on the added jobs, people and investment these projects could bring. This legislation still has a long way to go, and we'll continue to work with our Senate colleagues moving forward."

The Indiana Association of County Commissioners recently released a statement that said, "We believe that planned development, permitting standards, and permitting processes should be determined locally by locally elected County Commissioners."

The Association of Indiana Counties also opposes the bill: "HB 1381 removes a county's ability to develop long term, compatible land uses crafted through

local public meetings. Wind and solar companies will be able to randomly put in projects that meet state standards but may conflict with future economic development projects, planned residential development or even road expansions. These projects can reduce the value of a neighbor's property so the decision about where these projects are located should be made at the community level, not by legislators who represent

districts that will not be affected by the bill."

"It is disturbing to continue to see bills like this against Home Rule," Heirbrandt said. "Local land use decisions should be made locally and not at the Statehouse."

State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville), who also voted in favor of the bill, said, "This legislation has the potential to have

a positive statewide economic impact, especially in rural communities, as it could bring more opportunities for renewable energy investment in Indiana's future to strengthen our power supply and put more Hoosiers to work. This bill now heads to our colleagues in the Senate, where it will be further examined to see how we can better serve consumers and businesses across the state."

Prior to HB 1381 passing the House, Hamilton County Commissioners issued a resolution that stated, "The Board of Commissioners believes that decisions regarding wind and solar development are best made by the citizens living in the community, rather than by the wind and solar industry or State officials who live outside the community."

## County to mark one-year anniversary of COVID-19

Hamilton County, along with the cities of Carmel, Fishers, Noblesville, and Westfield, will pay its respects to those who have lost their lives this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic at a vigil on Saturday, March 13.

Dubbed a "Night of Reflection," city and county officials will meet on the steps of the Historic Courthouse in downtown Nobles-

Instead, organizers are asking residents to place candles in their windows at 7 p.m. that evening to show their support. Free battery-operated candles will be available for residents to pick up the week of the event.

## Cumberland Cottages project passes Fishers City Council

The HAND project to construct 11 cottages at 141st Street and Cumberland Road will move forward after the Fishers City Council voted 5-4 approving a rezone of the property.

Voting yes for the rezone were David George, Cecilia Coble, Brad DeReamer, Samantha DeLong, and Jocelyn Vare. The no votes were

from Selina Stoller, Pete Peterson, John Weingardt and Todd Zimmerman.

The Advisory Plan Commission voted an unfavorable recommendation 8-1, with Howard Stevenson being the only commission member supporting the proposal.

There was a great deal of discussion about car ports rather than garages for the 11 cottage units. HAND Executive Director Andrea Davis

said an upgrade to garages is possible, once more details of the design are available now that the rezone has been approved.

The city planning staff recommended approval of the housing project.

The rezone approval is just one step in the process. Davis said she plans to continue discussions with neighbors and council members as the project moves to the next stages.

## Carmel Police Department unveils new online Traffic Stop Dashboard

The Carmel Police Department (CPD) has announced the release of the Traffic Stop Dashboard. This web-based portal gives citizens the opportunity to view statistics on traffic stops made by Carmel police officers, as well as the

number of warnings and citations written.

Additionally, the dashboard enables the user to filter the traffic stop information using any combination of several categories, such as: Type of Stop, Driver Race, Driver Ethnicity, Driver Gender, Driver Age

Range, and Violation Type.

The Traffic Stop Dashboard was created in collaboration with KSM Consulting, who worked with a community focus group to determine the desired content. This dashboard will be

## Noblesville Schools proposes rebalancing elementary school boundaries for 2021-22

Noblesville Schools announced last Tuesday a proposed rebalancing of elementary school boundaries for the 2021-2022 school year.

Approximately 200 elementary students (4 percent of the district's elementary population) would be impacted by the new boundaries and have already been notified directly of the proposed moves.

The new boundaries would see students from Hazel Dell Elementary, North Elementary, and

Stony Creek Elementary moving to Hinkle Creek Elementary, Noble Crossing Elementary, and Promise Road Elementary. White River Elementary would have students moving both in and out. No boundary changes are being proposed at any other schools in the district.

Current fourth graders impacted by the moves

will be allowed to stay at their home school for their last year of elementary next year, if they choose.

A committee made up of district staff and parent representatives developed the rebalancing proposal after carefully studying the issue for several months. The plan works to minimize the number of impacted students while

# Next phase of Range Line Road boulevard design will soon be underway in Carmel

The City of Carmel plans to begin the next phase of transforming Range Line Road from a five-lane roadway – between City Center Drive and Elm Street – into a tree-lined boulevard.

This Midtown portion of Range Line Road will provide a continued boulevard treatment featuring elements found further south, such as pedestrian-friendly crosswalks, bike lanes and landscaped medians. It will also have a new roundabout at Walnut Street (6th Street SE), which will eventually continue west, creating an east-west connection from Range Line Road to Monon Boulevard and eventually to 3rd Avenue SW.

Roadwork on Range Line Road should begin soon, weather permitting, and is expected to be substantially complete in time for the CarmelFest parade on July 4. This work will result in partial closures of Range Line Road, while maintaining northbound and southbound traffic until the full closure, anticipated to begin after April 5.

The project will also include restoring the gateway arch that marks the southern entrance to the Carmel Arts & Design District. That arch was removed a few years ago to make way for the Elm Street roundabout.

that motorists should be aware of:

- A one-day, full closure of Range Line Road will occur on or after Feb. 23 north of Elm Street for the concrete pouring of columns for the archway.

- A short closure of Range Line Road will last a few days in March to hoist the actual arch into place; exact dates to be determined.

- Full closure of Range Line Road will begin on or after April 5 and last about 60 days so construction crews can build the new roundabout at Walnut Street.

All businesses and restaurants will remain open during the construction and special signage will be used to direct customers to those locations. The City of Carmel urges all local residents and visitors to support small businesses at all times, but especially during road construction season.

For motorists traveling through the area, alternative routes include Main Street, Keystone Parkway, City Center Drive, and 3rd Avenue SW, as well as Elm Street.

# Aspire expanding Noblesville clinic

Aspire Indiana Health has begun an expansion of its Noblesville health center that will result in nearly doubling its size, allowing for growth of its integrated primary and behavioral health model of care.

The construction project will take approximately 14 months and includes a new wing that will bring the total space of the facility to 27,000 square feet from its current 14,000. It also includes renovation of the existing space and the addition of an in-house pharmacy at the clinic, located at

17840 Cumberland Road.

The total cost of the expansion is \$6.9 million, including construction, furniture and equipment. Wurster Construction is the general contractor, with project management by Colliers and architectural planning by Artekena.

"Aspire is showing its commitment to Noblesville and Hamilton County with this major investment in community health," said Tim Crockett, Aspire Chief Financial Officer. "We are here for the long haul to serve Hoosiers from every walk of life with com-

passionate healthcare that treats the whole person, not just their symptoms."

A groundbreaking ceremony is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. on March 3 with Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen and dignitaries from the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce.

As of last Thursday, a total of 31 Indiana counties have issued resolutions against the bill.

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers), who voted in favor of the bill, said "Rural communities could have the opportunity to experience economic growth as a result of this bill, as these projects could generate new jobs and tax revenue. This legislation still has a long way to go, and I look forward to working with those on all sides of the issue to find a solution that benefits communities and energy consumers throughout Indiana."

None of the three local state legislatures who supported the bill commented on removing local government from final de-

HB 1381 passed the House of Representatives with a 58-38-4 vote. Lo-


cal representatives voting against the bill were Tony Cook, Donna Schaibley, and Jerry Torr.

The bill will now go to the Indiana Senate



where it will be heard by Senators representing Hamilton County, which includes Scott Baldwin, J. D. Ford, Jim Buck and Fady Qaddoura.



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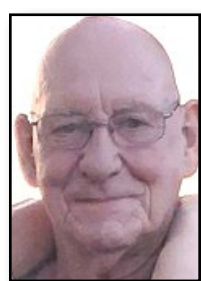
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## William E. "Bill" Forkner

Interment will be at Lewis Creek Baptist Cemetery in Shelby County.

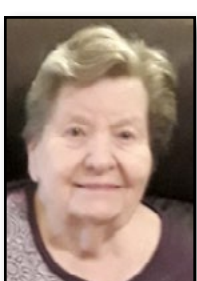

Preceding Timmy in death were his grandparents, Jerry Kinkead and Fayda Isaacs; and his aunt, Anna Kinkead.

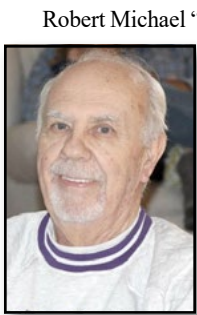

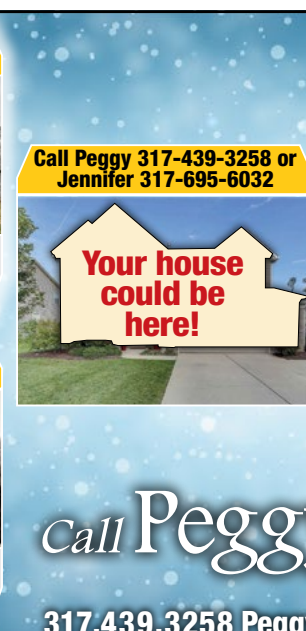

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# Legislators should remember who they are representing

Newspaper publishers around the state are understandably upset with some state legislators who want to allow removal of public notices from newspapers and require only that notices appear on governmental websites. The controversial bill in the legislature failed, but it will likely come again in some form.

Our own Hamilton County legislators Tony Cook, Donna Schaibley, Chuck Goodrich, and Chris

Jeter voted for this bill. Why you might ask? Probably because many local government leaders and school officials are lobbying for it. These folks say they can save the money it costs to run legal advertising.

If one looks at a city budget or a school budget, it is obvious that money spent on legal notices is infinitesimal compared to many other expenditures.

Saving that small amount is not a good enough reason to stop publication of

advance notice of the public's business.

Our legislators should be trying to assist the public they serve, promoting transparency and easier access to public services and information.

Many of our state legislators are trying to do a good job of representing us, but with some others we must ask what in the world are they thinking about? Not only in the matter of public notices, but in other matters such as last week's attempt to curtail home rule by opening the door to wind farms with statewide legislation.

Then there were news reports revealing proposed legislation that would benefit the author of the legislation in his business dealings.

Yet there is no attempt to stop the scandalous 'Pay to Play' racket in which some government officials are given contributions in expectation of awarding contracts for goods or services to the donor.

All this activity should tell us that the average taxpaying citizens need a powerful lobbyist to counter the special interests and help legislators remember who they were elected to represent.

appropriately balancing class sizes and socioeconomic backgrounds as evenly as possible across schools.

“We know that this kind of change can be stressful for families who are impacted and we hate that,” said Noblesville Schools Associate Superintendent Dr. David Mundy. “Unfortunately, we can’t control where growth occurs and must address the lack of space in some of our buildings. Our goal is to maximize existing space while minimizing disruptions to families.”

The district commissioned a professional demographic study and leaders have used this data to carefully monitor growth trends and enrollments.

With the cost of new construction for an elementary school estimated at \$30 million, rebalancing as needed to use existing space efficiently saves taxpayers money.

“We last rebalanced in 2016,” Mundy added. “We realize doing it again this year was not ideal given the pressure COVID has placed on our school systems and families, but due to upcoming student projections we must address space in our buildings now.”

Impacted families have been invited to in-person meetings to discuss details of the proposed moves.

“I want to thank the parents and staff who served on our study committee as their input was a key part of this process,” Mundy said. “I look forward to meeting more parents and answering any questions at our upcoming public meetings.”

State wrestling

Carmel's Major finishes as 160-pound runner-up

Carmel senior Robert Major made some history for the Greyhounds last Saturday night at the IHSAA state wrestling finals.

He also competed in a state championship match that will be talked about by wrestling fans for years to come.

Major battled it out with Evansville Mater Dei junior Broderick Baumann under the lights for the 160-pound state title during Saturday's finals at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Major made a comeback in the third period before Baumann took control in the final seconds and took the championship in a 15-11 decision.

"It was exciting, that's for sure," said Carmel coach Ed Pendoski.

Both wrestlers came into the match undefeated. Baumann got the upper hand in the first period, using two take-downs to lead 4-1. Baumann increased that lead to 6-1 by starting the second period in the bottom position and gaining control in a reversal.

At this point, Pendoski gave Major this bit of advice: "Smile, Bobby."

"And he gave us the grin and it was on," said Pendoski. "He just kept wrestling."

Major struck back in the middle of the period, getting his own reversal to get back on top, then scoring a couple of near-fall points to get within 6-5. But Baumann made another reversal, and that gave him an 8-5 lead at the end of the second period.

"The way that Robert competes and the way that Baumann competes, we were very certain this match wasn't going to be 1-1 and go into overtime,"

said Pendoski. "There were going to be points scored."

And there were indeed many more points scored during a raucous third period, the last 60 seconds of which were a frenzy of reversals and near-falls. This time Major started in the bottom position, and he slowly but surely worked his way into a reversal with a minute to go, cutting Baumann's lead to 8-7.

Ten seconds later, Baumann made a turn and took back control, leading 10-7 after yet another reversal. But his hold was tenuous, and it looked as if Major would be able to make an escape. Instead, Major was able to re-establish control by grabbing Baumann's leg, and managed to get one of Baumann's shoulders on the mat for a couple seconds.

With the reversal and the back points, Major briefly held an 11-10 lead. Both wrestlers got back up to their feet, but Major still had control. However, with 16 seconds left, Baumann was able to take Major down, earning reversal points, then got one of Major's shoulders on the mat for five seconds, giving him the maximum three near-fall points. Baumann stayed in control for the remaining few seconds of the match.

"Anytime you wrestle in a match like that in the middle of Bankers Life and you make good choices, you wrestle hard and you keep competing, you have to be happy," said Pendoski.

Major finished the season with a 40-1 record. He got to the championship match by winning two tough decision bouts, beating Plainfield junior Landon Boe 3-0 in the quar-

ter finals and Columbus East junior Kade Law 3-1 in the semi-finals.

Major became the first Carmel wrestler to compete in a state-championship match since 2008, when Chris Mascaro was the finalist at 160 pounds. Major's effort earned 20 team points for Carmel, which tied it for 22nd at the state meet.

**TWO WESTFIELD WRESTLERS PLACE SEVENTH**

Two junior wrestlers from Westfield both earned seventh-place finishes at the state meet on Saturday.

At 120 pounds, Braxton Vest began the day by falling to Sullivan sophomore Lane Gilbert in a 9-6 quarter-final decision. Vest lost by fall to East Noble junior Aidan Sprague in the wrestleback match, but rebounded to beat Brownsburg junior Aiden Haines in the seventh-place match by a 2-1 decision. Vest finished his season 35-4.

Mihail Platonov, wrestling at 285 pounds, also lost in the quarter-finals, as he was pinned by the eventual champion, Fort Wayne Carroll senior Reeve Muncie. Platonov was edged out by Franklin Central senior Antone Alexander in the wrestlebacks by a 3-2 decision, but finished the day by pinning Jeffersonville senior Matthew Munoz in the seventh-place match. Platonov ended his junior season with a 33-7 record.

Westfield tied for 32nd as a team with 12 points. Evansville Mater Dei won the team championship by scoring 112 points, just ahead of runner-up Chesterton's 107 points.

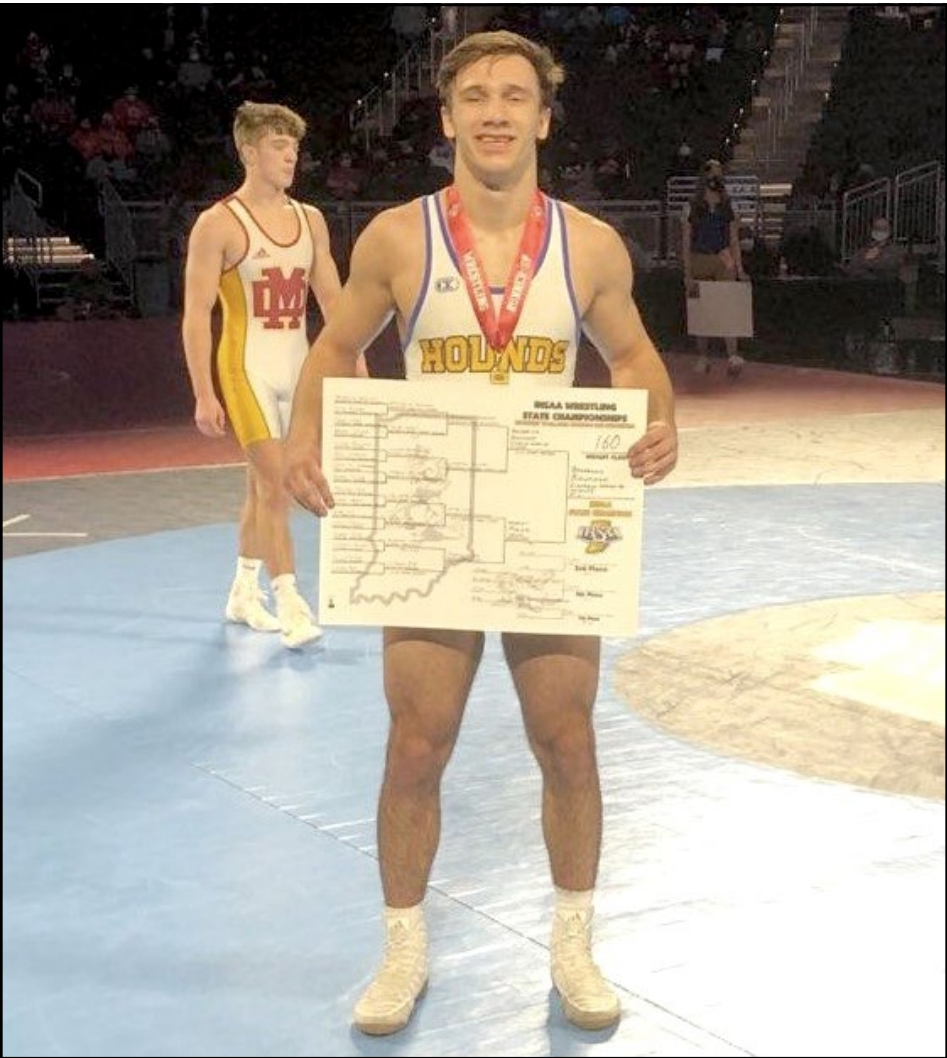

Boys swimming sectionals

Carmel, Fishers win team championships

**NOBLESVILLE** - Even during unusual circumstances, the Carmel boys swim team was its usual excellent self last Saturday at the Noblesville sectional finals.

The Greyhounds won the team championship – its 14th consecutive and 34th overall – with a score of 543 points and qualified 22 of its 27 swims to Friday's IHSAA state preliminaries at the IU Natatorium, with callbacks to state likely for the other swims. Carmel is the six-time defending state champion and put itself in good position to extend its streak to seven.

The meet was conducted without any spectators and with COVID-19 protocols in place. It was an adjustment, but everyone made the best of the circumstances, as all the teams at the sectional were as enthusiastic as ever.

"I thought we swam pretty well today, given all the challenges that this meet presents in terms of warm-up and warm-down and the COVID procedures," said Greyhounds coach Chris Plumb. "We're in a good spot. Hopefully we get everybody called up. We have a really strong team moving on to next week."

Carmel won 10 of the 12 events. That included a new sectional record for senior Augustus Rothrock in the individual medley. The University of Tennessee commit swam the event in 1 minute, 48.24 seconds, beating out now-graduated Greyhound Wyatt Davis' record by just over a third of a second.

It was the first of three wins for Rothrock. He also triumphed in the 100 butterfly and was part of the winning 200 freestyle relay team, with Ryan Malicki, Andrew Robertson and Kayden Lancaster.

"Gus has been working hard and I feel good about him heading into next week," said Plumb. "He's been a great senior leader and I think he's peaking at the right time."

Senior Griffin Hadley is also headed to Tennessee, and is also a three-time winner. Hadley paced the 200 and 100 freestyles, then joined Ethan Johns, Sean Sullivan and Gregg Enoch to take the 400 free relay.

The Greyhounds began the meet with a win in the medley relay, which consisted of Carter Lancaster, Ryan Malicki, Christopher Holmes and William Kok. Carter Lancaster would later triumph in the backstroke, with Malicki following that up by claiming the breaststroke.

Kayden Lancaster also picked up an individual victory, winning the 500 free. Carmel finished 1-2-3 in all but two events, the 50 free and the diving. Tipton's Ayden Stanley won the 50 free, with the Greyhounds going 2-3-4 behind him.

The host Millers placed second as a team with 353 points. Noblesville had two relays finish as runners-up, starting with the medley relay squad of Jeremiah Ledwith, Aidan Biddle, Luke Whitlock and Cameron Cavan. At the end of the meet, Whitlock, Justin DuBois, Cavan and Biddle

took second in the 400 free relay.

The Millers also had two divers place in the top four, thus advancing to Tuesday's regional at Fishers. Parker Mutter placed third, while Evan Stingley was fourth.

Westfield scored 285 points to finish third as a team. The Shamrocks' best finish was second in the 200 free relay, achieved by the foursome of Noah Brauer, Aiden Yonkus, Bennett Morse and Nathaniel Hand.

Guerin Catholic scored 128 points to place eighth in the team standings. Quinn Sweeney placed fifth for the Golden Eagles in the IM, while Dane Leonard was fifth in diving.

**FISHERS WINS CLOSE MEET**

At the Hamilton Southeastern sectional, Fishers edged out the Royals 511-492 to claim its third sectional title and first since 2018.

The Tigers won four events, and were helped by 1-2-3 finishes in two of them. Sebastian Otero led the way in the diving event, and he will join teammates William Jansen and Jack Roby at Tuesday regional.

Kyle Ponsler led a 1-2-3 sweep in the 500 free, winning the event in 4:27.02. Jackson Carlile placed second in 4:28.30, both swimmers were well under the state cut time. Ponsler won the IM and joined Jackson Carlile, Conor Carlile and Tyler Schwertfeger for a victory in the 400 free relay.

Fishers had eight swims qualify for state. In addition to the above-mentioned swims,

Kumler finished sixth in the IM with a time of 2:03.66, then later placed eighth in the breaststroke, clocking in at 1:03.78.

Huskies get second straight win over Millers

Hamilton Heights boys basketball coach Chad Ballenger became the head coach of the Huskies in 2007, but he is aware of Heights history.

“The history of the Noblesville-Heights series is just dominated by Noblesville,” said Ballenger. That’s why he was a happy coach last Saturday night, as his Huskies beat the Millers 76-67 at The Mill. It’s the second straight win for Heights over Noblesville. The last time the Huskies had two straight wins over the Millers? Go back a quarter-century to Dec. 18, 1993 and Dec. 17, 1994.

“We were so locked in,” said Ballenger. “Just a great team win.”

It doesn’t hurt that Heights has Gus Etchison. The senior star scored the first six points of the game for the Huskies, giving them a 6-0 lead. Noblesville got on the board with two free throws from E.J. Smith and a three-point play by Noah Harris, cutting that Heights lead to 6-5.

But the Huskies continued to roll, leading 19-13 by the end of the first quarter. Etchison scored 15 points, including a rare four-point play, where he got fouled while making a 3 and hit the subsequent foul shot. Etchison had two 3s in that quarter, with Lucas Letsinger also making a three.

Heights cruised through the second quarter, taking a 37-20 lead by halftime. The Huskies drained four 3s during that period, with four different players stepping up from long range: Linville, Tillman Etchison, Isaac Wilson and Gus Etchison, who finished the half with 20 points.

“I thought their team played really well,” said Millers coach John Peckinpough. “I need to do a better job getting my guys more focused and ready to play. We just got to work on our maturity level and learn how to focus in on a quick prep to get ready to play.”

Heights’ lead swelled to 46-21 midway through the third quarter, but that’s when Noblesville began to make its move. Harris was the main catalyst of an 11-0 Millers run during the period, scoring eight points.

Aaron Fine scored a lay-in off a Noblesville rebound to end the third, getting the Millers within 48-34. Smith then opened the fourth with a triple, and Noblesville had cut the lead to 11.

The Millers got as close as 61-54 with 3:41 left, getting within seven when Fine converted an and-1. But the Huskies went on a 6-0 run to get their lead back to 67-54. Gus Etchison and Linville both hit two free throws, and Wilson helped out with a layin. Noblesville continued to fight during the last two minutes of the game, but Heights was able to hang on.

“We had great ball movement,” said Ballenger. “Noah Linville had four assists. We played good defense. And then I think we got tired, but we stayed poised, even though they made their run, we were still able to overcome it and hit free throws and hold on.”

Gus Etchison finished the game with 38 points, including three 3-pointers. Wilson added 11 points and Letsinger scored 10. Luke Carroll had nine rebounds and two blocked shots, Ballenger said he “was just a beast on the boards.”

Harris led the Millers with 20 points, while Smith scored 14 and Fine added 13. Josh Durham and Luke Almodovar each collected four rebounds. Smith dished out five assists and Harris had two blocks.

“I thought our guys battle in the second half, showed some toughness,” said Peckinpough. “Just dug ourselves in too big a hole. It’s tough to get out of that when you play a team with a kid like Gus on it.”

The Huskies are 13-4 and play at Norwell on Tuesday before finishing the regular season Wednesday by hosting Harrison. Noblesville is 10-10 and also goes on the road Tuesday, playing at Mississinewa to finish its regular season.

**FRIDAY GAMES**

Hamilton Heights needed overtime to win the Hoosier Conference third-place game, but the Huskies prevailed, 57-54, over West Lafayette last Friday at the Heights gym.

The contest was tied at 54-54 after regulation. The Huskies got the overtime tipoff, then held on to the ball for the entire extra period. With two seconds left, Gus Etchison threw in a 3-pointer that proved to be the winning basket, and the only points in the overtime.

The Red Devils led 16-11 after the first quarter and 35-22 at halftime. Heights came storming back in the second half, cutting West Lafayette’s lead to 45-42 by the end of the third period. Etchison had 12 points in the third quarter, then added nine more in the fourth.

Etchison finished the game with 28 points, five rebounds and four steals. Linville was next with 11 points, while Carroll had five rebounds and two blocked shots.

Meanwhile, Noblesville won its Hoosier Crossroads Conference finale last Friday, beating Avon 58-46 at the Orioles’ gym.

The Millers had a solid first half, leading 15-10 after one quarter and 31-20 at halftime. Noblesville extended its lead to 42-28 after three periods, then added 16 points in the fourth to keep its lead above double digits.

Almodovar had a tremendous game, scoring 22 points and pulling eight rebounds. Smith added 14 points; both he and Almodovar made three 3-pointers. Harris scored 10 points and collected six rebounds, while David Lloyd had nine rebounds to go with eight points. Durham pulled five rebounds.

The Millers finished HCC play with a 2-5 record.

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# Carmel completes unbeaten MIC campaign

CARMEL - For the second time in three years, the Carmel boys basketball team is perfect in the MIC.

The Greyhounds completed the sweep of the Metropolitan Conference last Friday at the Eric Clark Activity Center. Carmel beat Warren Central 56-47, pulling away from the Warriors with a late run. As a result, the 'Hounds finished conference play 7-0.

A rebound basket from Gabriel McNary pushed Warren ahead 21-19, but Wil Leary threw in a 3 to give Carmel a 22-21 advantage. McNary struck again at the buzzer, however, with a put-back to give the Warriors a 23-22 lead at the break.

The Greyhounds scored the first five points of the second half, with Charlie Williams scoring on a hook shot and Suder making a 3. Warren answered with five points of its own to lead 28-27; Malik Stanley's lay-in put the Warriors in front once again.

Carmel then took off on a 7-0 run to hold a 34-28 lead, and the Greyhounds would stay in front until the

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
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
