East-west highways will continue to be a major focus of the Hamilton County amenities. The HHSC Board of Highway Department during this construction season.

Highway Director Brad Davis says the 146th Street corridor across the county should be completed this year when the section from Towne Road to the Boone County line is finished.

In the northern part of the county, work will continue on 236th Street, with the section from Deming Road to DeVaney Road scheduled for this year. Eventually the road will be rebuilt from Cicero to Sheridan.

Work also continues on 276th Street between State Road 19 and U.S. 31 to provide a better east-west corridor.

By the spring of next year, a new interchange, now underway, at State Road 37 and 146th Street should be completed. It is part of the county's plan to make SR 37 a freeway without grade level intersections from Noblesville to Interstate 69.

The next interchange will be underway next year at 131st Street and SR 37.

Bridge improvements this year include a new deck for Carrigan Road over Morse Reservoir, now underway, and resurfacing

### County gets \$1M to support local affordable housing

# **Women chosen to chair local political parties**

For the first time in history, women now head both political parties in Hamilton County. The quadrennial reorganization of Republican and Democratic parties produced the historic 'first' last Saturday when the precinct organizations of the parties conducted their vote for party chairs and other officers.

Laura Campbell has been head of the GOP for the past four years, and was re-elected in a party caucus held at the 502 East Event Center in Carmel.

Mrs. Campbell, who won in a contest over Paul Hevesy, is also a Carmel City Council member and wife of Superior Court Judge Richard Campbell.

With 249 committeemen and vice committeemen voting, Campbell won with 156 votes to 93 for Hevesy, a Fishers resident and newcomer to local politics.

# Carmel ends fiscal year 2020 with \$70 million in city's general fund

For the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2020, the City of Carmel had more than \$70 million in its fund balances – \$56.8 million of which were unencumbered funds, or unspent budget dollars – a sign of fiscal strength.

The General Fund balance closed the year with \$11.1 million, an increase of \$200,000 over the was less than 2020 by \$2.5 million. Unprior year. The Rainy Day Fund balance

# Cindy Gossard responds publicly to Mayor Cook's lawsuit

Editor's Note: Westfield Mayor Andy Cook has filed a lawsuit against Clerk Treasurer Cindy Gossard. Cook alleges Gossard failed to provide information on a city-wide audit recently requested by Cook, thus "actively interfering" with the mayor's operation of the city.

The lawsuit was filed mid-January in Hamilton County Superior Court 2.

Gossard has now chosen to publicly address the lawsuit brought against her by Cook in the pages of the Hamilton County Reporter. The following is Gossard's statement released to the Reporter in its entirety.

Unfortunately, statements have been made about me and my office that I have failed to provide information to the Mayor's review team, which was the alleged basis for the Mayor's lawsuit.


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



# Carmel's defense rules as it beats Westfield for seventh consecutive sectional title

CARMEL - Carmel's defense went to another level last Saturday, and that gave the Greyhounds another sectional championship.

Second-ranked Carmel dominated the Class 4A Sectional 8 final at its own Eric Clark Activity Center, overwhelming Westfield 53-27. It's the 31st overall sectional title for the Greyhounds as well as their seventh in a row - a streak not seen since the days of the Shepherds in the 1960s and

"This group is special," said senior Brian Waddell. "You always watched Carmel teams when we were little, coming here and winning sectional championships. When I was younger watching older guys do it and to be able to be a part of it now is something special."

The Greyhounds' performance was all the more remarkable because it came against a high-flying Shamrocks team that averaged 66 points per game this season, and had scored 81 points the night before in a semi-final win over Noblesville. 

The Noblesville wrestling team showed everyone that it's tough and talented when it won the sectional championship at the end of January at Elwood.

The Millers are also pretty smart, too. That's something the public might not be aware of, but it will be now. Noblesville finished in a tie for first place in the inaugural Indiana High School Wrestling Coaches Association Academic Challenge, which was announced earlier last week.

The Academic Challenge takes all 32 sectional championship teams and adds together the cumulative grade-point average of all 14 student-athletes that participated in the sectional. The IHSWCA then averages together all of the wrestlers' GPAs on a 4.0 scale. The Millers and Columbus East both had GPAs of 3.40, and are thus co-champions.

"It's awesome," said Noblesville coach Michael Weimer. He called the challenge victory "a great accomplishment" for the Millers program.

"I preach being a student-athlete," said Weimer. "You have to have your grades first before you can compete. Our team, they live by that."
