At the Tuesday, Feb. 23, meeting of the Hamilton Heights' Superintendent Advisory Group (SAG), attendees were treated to a glimpse into what Heights' campus could look like in the future.

Kristin McCarty, Hamilton Heights School Corporation (HHSC) Business Manager, and Dori Hochstetler, HHSC Project Vision Director, shared an en-

gaging presentation on the Master Plan that contained a lot of exciting and interesting information at this stage of its development.

While still in the early phases, and under construction, the concepts included in

The HHSC Board of School Trustees committed to keeping a flat tax rate in 2014 and that commitment remains as an integral part of developing and finalizing the plan.

## Major highway work outlined for this year

East-west highways will continue to be a major focus of the Hamilton County Highway Department during this construction season.

Highway Director Brad Davis says the 146th Street corridor across the county should be completed this year when the section from Towne Road to the Boone County line is finished.

In the northern part of the county, work will continue on 236th Street, with the section from Deming Road to DeVaney Road scheduled for this year. Eventually the road will be rebuilt from Cicero to Sheridan.

Work also continues on 276th Street between State Road 19 and U.S. 31 to provide a better east-west corridor.

By the spring of next year, a new interchange, now underway, at State Road 37 and 146th Street should be completed. It is part of the county's plan to make SR 37 a freeway without grade level intersections from Noblesville to Interstate 69.

The next interchange will be underway next year at 131st Street and SR 37.

Bridge improvements this year include a new deck for Carrigan Road over Morse Reservoir, now underway, and resurfacing

## County gets \$1M to support local affordable housing

## Women chosen to chair local political parties

For the first time in history, women now head both political parties in Hamilton County. The quadrennial reorganization of Republican and Democratic parties produced the historic 'first' last Saturday when the precinct organizations of the parties conducted their vote for party chairs and other officers.

Laura Campbell has been head of the GOP for the past four years, and was re-elected in a party caucus held at the 502 East Event Center in Carmel.

Mrs. Campbell, who won in a contest over Paul Hevesy, is also a Carmel City Council member and wife of Superior Court Judge Richard Campbell.

With 249 committeemen and vice committeemen voting, Campbell won with 156 votes to 93 for Hevesy, a Fishers resident and newcomer to local politics.

Winning for vice chairman was Will Riley, for secretary was Suzanne Heinzmann,

and Raju Chinthala for treasurer. The three were unopposed.

Dayna Colbert won the county Democratic chairmanship over Kevin Patterson, Carmel, by a vote of 116 to 41. Ms. Colbert is a program manager for a market research firm and a Fishers political activist. She succeeds Joe Weingarten, who retired as party chairman after four years.

## Fishers Plan Commission makes history, Stevenson will serve as president

The Fishers Plan Commission has had the same president for about 30 years, Warren "Butch" Harling. But Harling died last week. So, the question was, who would replace Warren Harling with the Plan Commission gavel?

Commission members made more history with that selection: Local attorney Howard Stevenson was voted unanimously as the commission's new president, the first African American to hold that post.

"I want to thank my colleagues on the board for the confidence they have in me," Stevenson wrote in a Twitter message following the meeting. "I also want to thank my predecessor, the late, great Warren Harling. There's no way I can fill Warren's shoes, but I'll walk the path he paved to make our great city even better."

The commission members had a moment of silence in memory of their long-time president, Warren Harling.

Stevenson was appointed to fill out a term on the Hamilton Southeastern School Board, but narrowly lost the election to Mike Bottorff in 2016. Bottorff

resigned his school board seat before his term ended.

Stevenson was voted to remain on the Fishers Board of Zoning Appeals.

Fishers City Councilman Pete Peterson was elected Plan Commission Vice President.

The commission voted a favorable recommendation on two projects last Wednesday night.

## Carmel ends fiscal year 2020 with \$70 million in city's general fund

For the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2020, the City of Carmel had more than \$70 million in its fund balances — \$56.8 million of which were unencumbered funds, or unspent budget dollars — a sign of fiscal strength.

The General Fund balance closed the year with \$11.1 million, an increase of \$200,000 over the prior year. The Rainy Day Fund balance remained unchanged at \$11.2 million.

"We work very hard to manage the

city's finances prudently," Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard said. "We approach the budget process much like the private sector in that we perform budget forecasting 20 years out to ensure that we can accomplish our goals and keep our tax rate among the lowest in the state."

As indicated in the City Council approved budgets, 2021 was less than 2020 by \$2.5 million. Unspent budget dollars, due to city departments' reduced expenditures, produced savings that remain in the General Fund.



# Westfield Clerk Treasurer goes on record

## Cindy Gossard responds publicly to Mayor Cook's lawsuit

*Editor's Note: Westfield Mayor Andy Cook has filed a lawsuit against Clerk Treasurer Cindy Gossard. Cook alleges Gossard failed to provide information on a city-wide audit recently requested by Cook, thus "actively interfering" with the mayor's operation of the city.*

*The lawsuit was filed mid-January in Hamilton County Superior Court 2.*

*Gossard has now chosen to publicly address the lawsuit brought against her by Cook in the pages of the Hamilton County Reporter. The following is Gossard's statement released to the Reporter in its entirety.*

Unfortunately, statements have been made about me and my office that I have failed to provide information to the Mayor's review team, which was the alleged basis for the Mayor's lawsuit.

As Clerk Treasurer, I have consistently provided information to the citizens of Westfield, City officials

and members of Council. I believe in the transparency of government and cooperated with the Mayor's review team, by providing requested information by the end of October 2020.

Since the case was pending, I wanted to refrain from making any public comment; however, I feel that it's important to inform the citizens of Westfield, as your elected Clerk Treasurer, how this case came about and my concerns about the Mayor's review.

At the beginning of 2020, I requested an investigative audit of Grand Park by the Indiana State Board of Accounts during our state and federal annual audits. Prior to that time, the City Council had raised concerns about the operations and the business dealings of parties related to the Mayor at Grand Park.

Based on the findings of the Indiana State Board of Accounts and concerns raised by the City Council, the City Council passed a resolution in August 2020 to conduct an independent

audit of Grand Park. However, before the City Council was able to move forward with its independent audit, the Mayor appointed the law firm of Taft, Stettinius & Hollister LLP (Taft) to conduct a review of the city records and to purportedly address the City Council's concerns over Grand Park.

Taft entered into engagements with BKD and Baker Tilly to assist in the review, which could possibly shield this information under the protection of the attorney-client privilege between the Mayor and Taft. If this were to happen it would be contrary to my understanding of the City Council's intention to conduct a public, independent audit of Grand Park.

In September 2020, Taft requested that I provide administrator access to the City's financial accounts within two days to the review team. In the

approximate 13 years that Mayor Cook has been an official of the City of Westfield, I cannot recall any other such requests, neither from the Mayor or any third party. Administra-

tor access would allow the user to intentionally or unintentionally delete, change or manipulate data. I found this request concerning as the City Council just announced its desire to conduct an independent audit of Grand Park and now the Mayor was seeking administrative access to the City's financial systems.

I provided Taft, BKD and Baker Tilly with requested records and "view only" access to our NAV system, which contains the City's financial records. I also invited the review team to come to my office to obtain any additional information.

Even though Taft had informed me that administrator access was not

necessary for their review, after I declined to provide administrative access to the Mayor and/or Taft, the Mayor sued me. The contents of this are public record, but a portion of the Mayor's request was to provide the Mayor and his staff unlimited access to all financial information of the City, under the allegation that I was not cooperating with the Mayor's review team.

After I received the Mayor's Complaint, I still did not agree to provide "unlimited access," which would require me to provide administrator access, but I again agreed for the review team to come to my office and get any additional information purportedly needed for the review. This agreement was filed with the Court and then used to suggest that the Mayor's lawsuit was necessary to compel my cooperation with the review team. In my opinion, these allegations detract attention from the Mayor's request for administrator access to the

City's financial and payroll systems after the City Council requested a financial audit of Grand Park.

As Clerk Treasurer, my duty is to maintain and safeguard the integrity of our City's financial accounts, and as such, I do not believe that providing unfettered access to Taft, BKD, Baker Tilly and/or the Mayor, under these circumstances, is in the City's best interest. I am hopeful that the City Council will continue its efforts to conduct a true independent audit of Grand Park, that will be transparent, and available to the citizens of the City of Westfield for review. I will continue to safeguard the financial records of the City, as is my lawful duty, and fulfill my responsibilities as Clerk Treasurer. # Carmel's Rich Furniture building to be restored to original design

Turner Woodard, the former majority owner of the Stutz Business and Arts Center, is now preparing for his next redevelopment project in the heart of downtown Carmel.

In February, Turner, an Indianapolis resident, purchased the former Rich Furniture building in Carmel, 1030 S. Range Line Road, and says he plans to bring the building back to how it was originally designed as a boutique office and retail space.

"I've always loved the building since the very first time I walked into it to buy furniture for my Indianapolis office decades ago. It might be the massive atrium, the glass elevator, or the floor to ceiling windows, but the building has always had a unique character and a wow factor," Woodard said. "During our due diligence, we learned the property was originally designed as a multi-tenant building when it was built in the 70s, and that is our future plan – to create a new office option for Carmel businesses."

Woodard said he's excited to add the Arts and Business Center concept he created at the Stutz to the suburbs.

"I've been an Indianapolis guy my entire life," he said. "However, recently I've been spending more time north of 96th Street and it's been amazing

seeing the growth and quality of life in Carmel."

Woodard and his team have begun work already on turning the former furniture store into Carmel's newest and unique office property.

Woodard plans to move his real estate investment offices from the Stutz into the Rich building this summer. He will also create an Art and Auto gallery on the first floor of the building that will face the Gazebo at Carmel's Civic Square.

"I'm excited to join the Carmel community, and I hope my new Art and Auto gallery will become a great asset for the city," Woodard said. "The

gallery will feature some of my art, art of local artists, and six to seven of my very special cars. We will also be bringing up the old bar from the Canterbury Hotel."

"We're very excited to have a visionary like Turner Woodard invest in our community," Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard said. "This is again a testament to the investments we've made in infrastructure and quality of life that then results in investments from the private sector by creative individuals like Turner."

Woodard will have between 20,000 and 25,000 square feet of unique office and retail space available for lease. Turner believes the Rich building will become a special environment where businesses of all

kinds can thrive.

ALO Property Group Vice President Brian Bondus, a Carmel resident, represented Turner during the purchase.

"It's been a joy working with Turner and exposing him to the growth that's taken place in Carmel during the last few years," Bondus said. "I remember the first day we went out for a tour and Turner was shocked seeing everything happening, specifically the activity around the Monon Trail. I'm also excited for Carmel having a new office option in the downtown area."

Improvements at the building are scheduled to be completed later this summer and Woodard plans to begin welcoming new tenants shortly after.

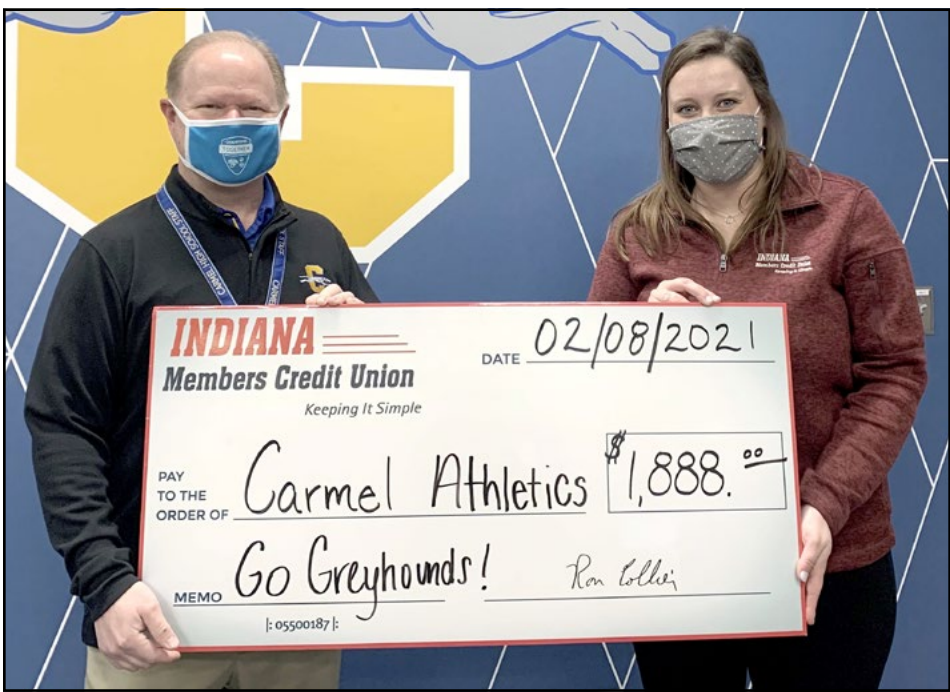

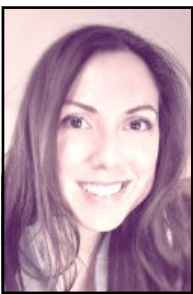

of bridges at 116th Street over White River and 266th Street over Cicero Creek. Most noticeable will be new resurfacing of nearly 40 miles of county roads and chip sealing of another 50 miles, Davis says. One roundabout is planned for construction this year at 191st Street and Grassy Branch Road near Westfield. Last week, the highway department received word that the Department of Natural Resources has granted the county \$1 million for building a section of the Steven Nation Trail. That grant will allow construction of the foot trail from Cicero to Koteewi Park at Strawtown.

# Carrigan Road bridge closure raises concerns, poses challenges for firefighters

The closure of Carrigan Road bridge over Morse Reservoir is raising concerns among some residents and new challenges for the Noblesville Fire Department.

Hamilton County officials say the Carrigan Road bridge will be closed to replace the bridge deck and clean the beams. The closure started March 1 and is scheduled to run through May 29.

The \$1.3 million project is now making it harder for residents to get where they need to go.

On top of that, the No-

blesville Fire Department says the project made their jobs a little harder.

“With that bridge closed down, it really affected our response time to this section of town, and so we wanted to make sure that we are still operating under the same guidelines that we normally did,” said Noblesville Fire Department Assistant Chief Adam Biddle.

The fire department built a temporary structure on the west side of the bridge, where they’ll keep a fire engine to

Biddle said, “Harbour Town Apartments, they became a really good partner in this, and then also the adjacent parking lot where we were able to build the structure.”

There’s also a heater and a generator that will help prevent the water inside the engine from freezing. They say

firefighters will also be living at Harbour Town Apartments near their equipment, and according to Biddle, it’ll be quite the challenge.

“The firefighters that are tasked with responding out of here – this certainly took them outside their comfort zone, the fire station that they’re used to being in,” Biddle said.

County officials say that during the closure, local traffic should use the signed detour route of Little Chicago Road, State Road 38, and Hague Road. Property owners will continue to have access to their properties through the construction area.

City Releases Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) Information

The City of Noblesville is a Combined Sewer Community, which means that some of the sewers in the older part of the City transport both storm and sanitary wastewater to the treatment plant. During rain events, the capacity of the lines transporting this liquid to the treatment plant may be exceeded. Overflow points exist to allow the system to relieve the excess flow to a receiving stream. This discharge into a receiving stream is a combination of the storm and sanitary flow. The Utility has placed signs at each of the eight (8) outfall structures where the combined waste flow is discharged to a receiving stream. It is important that when you see water coming out of these structures, you stay out of the water. There is a risk of becoming sick if you come into contact with this water.

The probability of the combined sewer system having an overflow from one of our eight (8) outfall structures is high during a 0.25 inch rainfall within a 15 minute period. It is advisable that you do not wade in the streams during these times. Carmel's defense rules as it beats Westfield for seventh consecutive sectional title

CARMEL - Carmel's defense went to another level last Saturday, and that gave the Greyhounds another sectional championship.

Second-ranked Carmel dominated the Class 4A Sectional 8 final at its own Eric Clark Activity Center, overwhelming Westfield 53-27. It's the 31st overall sectional title for the Greyhounds as well as their seventh in a row – a streak not seen since the days of the Shepherds in the 1960s and 1970s.

"This group is special," said senior Brian Waddell. "You always watched Carmel teams when we were little, coming here and winning sectional championships. When I was younger watching older guys do it and to be able to be a part of it now is something special."

The Greyhounds' performance was all the more remarkable because it came against a high-flying Shamrocks team that averaged 66 points per game this season, and had scored 81 points the night before in a semi-final win over Noblesville. But Carmel's defense ruled from the first minute of the game to the last, never allowing Westfield more than seven points during a quarter.

"We have good team defense," said Greyhounds coach Ryan Osborn. "But our team wouldn't be as good as it is if the kids weren't totally bought into it. Over time, they've seen the development, they've seen the growth. They've soaked it all in and embraced it, and now they convince themselves that it's important. So, you get their best effort every night."

The 'Hounds led from

the start, with Brian Waddell hitting a 3-pointer to start the game. A layin by Charlie Williams made the score 5-0 before the Shamrocks' Braden Smith got his team on the board by making a floater.

Josh Whack drained a triple for Carmel, which Smith answered with his own triple. The Greyhounds then finished the quarter on an 8-2 run, with Peter Suder's jumper finishing the period and giving Carmel a 16-7 lead.

Smith opened the second quarter with a 3, but that was answered by a basket from Williams and two free throws by Waddell. Those points gave Carmel a 20-10 lead. Westfield cut that to 20-14 after a foul shot by Smith and a 3 from Cam Haffner – that four-point run was the longest for the 'Rocks in the game.

The Greyhounds responded with an 11-0 run that stretched into the third quarter. Williams made a

hook shot, Connor Gioia was good on a layin and Wil Leary finished the half with a 3-pointer to give Carmel a 27-14 lead.

Williams started the third quarter strong, making back-to-back layins to gave the Greyhounds a 31-14 lead. Smith ended the run with his own layin, but another basket by Williams put Carmel ahead 33-16.

"It's definitely one of the better games I've had this season, but I just got to give it to my teammates," said Williams. "They got me going."

Waddell provided some excitement with back-to-back baskets, the second of which was a slam dunk. The Greyhounds finished the third quarter on a 7-0 run, which consisted of a Williams putback, a three-point play by Gioia and two free throws by Suder.

Carmel led 44-21 after three periods, and kept its lead above 20 points for the entire fourth quarter. Williams scored five points

during that period, including a dunk. Whack added four points from the Greyhounds by going 4-for-4 from the free-throw line.

Williams had a dominant game, scoring 19 points on 9-of-10 field-goal shooting, and also collecting five rebounds. Waddell added 13 points. Suder pulled seven rebounds and handed out five assists, while Whack dished out four assists.

Smith scored 18 points and pulled five rebounds for Westfield, which finished its season 18-5. The Shamrocks graduate four seniors: Benji Welch, Luke Naas, Matthe Penley and Luke Van Dyke.

Carmel is now 22-2 and advances to Saturday's Logansport regional. The Greyhounds will take on No. 1-ranked and unbeaten Homestead in the first semi-final, which tips off at 10 a.m. The Spartans won the Columbia City sectional Saturday with a 75-56 victory over New Haven, making them 25-0 for the season.

Greyhounds, Shamrocks victorious in semi-finals

CARMEL - For the second consecutive year, the Carmel and Westfield boys basketball teams battled it out for the Class 4A Sectional 8 championship.

The No. 2-ranked Greyhounds won the first of last Friday's semi-final games at the Eric Clark Activity Center, beating Hamilton Southeastern 46-33. In the second semi-final, the Shamrocks held off a late push by Noblesville to win a wild 81-74 contest.

**DEFENSE AND DUNKS**

The Greyhounds put together another solid defensive performance on Friday. Carmel began to pull away late in the first quarter after battling the Royals for most of that first period, then used a second-quarter run to build a lead that it maintained in the second half.

The 'Hounds also threw in some fireworks as well, making five dunks. The first one was by Charlie Williams, and his dunk gave Carmel a 7-4 lead. Not to be outdone, Southeastern's Dalton Retzner threw down his own dunk, then Vinny Buccilla made a floater to put the Royals up 8-7.

That was to be HSE's only

lead of the game, as the Greyhounds went on a 7-0 run that stretched into the second quarter. Peter Suder and Connor Gioia made layins to finish the first quarter, then Suder scored to open the second. Brian Waddell put down a dunk to finish the run.

"I think defensively we did a good job," said Carmel coach Ryan Osborn. "The kids carried out a good game plan. They locked in. They made shots difficult, limited some offensive rebounds."

Retzner stopped that run with two free throws, but Carmel ended the half with a 9-2 stretch to take a 24-12 lead into halftime. Josh Whack scored five points, making two free throws and a 3-pointer.

"Trying to play from behind against them is always tough," said Royals coach Brian Satterfield. "I got to give our guys a lot of credit. They came out here and they battled, they played hard. But Carmel's a great team. Coach Osborn does a great job. They're ranked where they are for a reason."

The Greyhounds kept their lead at 10 points or above for most of the second half. There were two times the Royals got within nine, starting with

the third quarter when Alex Totton hit a jump shot to get Southeastern within 25-16. Carmel responded with a 9-1 run; Waddell scored seven of those points with a triple, another dunk and a layin.

That pattern repeated itself in the fourth quarter. Jason Stutz nailed a 3 to cut the Greyhounds' lead to 40-31 with four minutes left. But Carmel clinched the game with a 6-0 run: Suder and Whack both made two foul shots, sandwiched in between Waddell's third dunk of the night. With that, the Greyhounds improved to 21-2 and were back in the sectional final.

"Just an opportunity to play in the championship game, you got to celebrate that," said Osborn. "I'm proud of the kids for sticking with what we do."

Waddell scored 13 points to lead Carmel, with Suder scoring 11 and collecting eight rebounds. Williams, who had two dunks in the game, also blocked three shots.

Buccilla scored eight points to lead the Royals, who finished their season at 12-11. Retzner added seven points and pulled four rebounds, while Sam Jacobs handed

out four assists. Buccilla and Retzner are seniors, along with Stutz, Totton, Isaac Bowman, Mohammed Awad and John McCall.

For the seniors, Satterfield said, "I commend them for what they did in terms of the leadership of helping everybody stay connected and doing everything that we wanted to do."

"It's a group that has led things the right way and hopefully that gets passed along to the leaders that are going to take over next year," said Satterfield.

**SMITH AND SMITH STEP UP**

The first half of the second semi-final was dominated by Smith, while the second half was also dominated by Smith.

Westfield's Braden Smith put on a show in the first half, scoring 27 points. After Noblesville started the game by going up 5-0 on a Noah Harris layin and an E.J. Smith 3-pointer (more about him in a minute), Braden Smith quickly got the Shamrocks on top to stay. He made three free throws after fouled while shooting a 3-pointer, then threw in a triple.

Cam Haffner then hit a 3, and Braden Smith's layin fin-

ished an 11-0 run, getting the 'Rocks up 11-5. After Harris scored a layin, Westfield blasted off on a 19-2 run that lasted well into the second quarter.

Braden Smith scored five more points in the first quarter, which ended with the Shamrocks leading 18-9. That lead swelled up to 30-9 at one point; Smith added eight more points, while Matthew Penley hit a floater and Haffner made a putback. The Millers began to chip away at that lead by halftime, but Westfield still led 38-19 at the break. Smith's 3-pointer gave him 27 points at halftime.

"I'm sitting there and I'm glad that I'm his coach and I'm not coaching against him, that's what it's like," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpt-

er. "He's a special kid and a special player."

Noblesville pushed back in the third quarter, outscoring the Shamrocks 26-16 in the period. The Millers made six 3s during the quarter, and went on an 8-0 run early. Harris threw down a dunk, then David Lloyd and Luke Almodovar drained 3s.

Another Almodovar 3 got Noblesville within 48-40, but Braden Smith answered that with six straight points, a three-point play and a 3-point basket. E.J. Smith answered for the Millers with two free throws, and Almodovar struck again with his third triple of the period, which ended with Westfield up 54-45.

E.J. Smith opened the fourth quarter with a layin, then later made two free throws to

# Golden Eagles edge out Brebeuf for Sectional 27 title

Guerin Catholic won its first sectional championship in six years last Saturday, triumphing at Class 3A Sectional 27 by beating Circle City Conference rival Brebeuf Jesuit 44-36 at the Lebanon's Rosenstihl Gymnasium.

It was a close game throughout. The No. 6-ranked Golden Eagles led 10-6 after the first quarter before the Braves cut GC's lead to 20-19 by halftime. Guerin Catholic had another solid defensive quarter in the third period, enabling it to lead 30-25 after three.

"There was some very physical play tonight," said Golden Eagles coach Bobby Allen. "Both teams were prepared for what was going on each possession."

Allen said his team was focused on Brebeuf's two top players, Evan Altman and Billy Smith, with the Golden Eagles committed to forcing them "to take difficult shots and we succeeded in doing that tonight. Luckily, we had enough energy to get some buckets at the other end."

Guerin Catholic held its largest lead, 39-30, in the fourth quarter. The Braves

cut that lead to four before senior captain Joseph Bobilya made two free throws, then got a steal with 40 seconds to go.

"That iced the game for us," said Allen.

Bobilya finished the game with 15 points, including three 3-pointers. Kaleb Edwards added 14 points and blocked three

shots, Allen said the senior also played "incredible defense" on Smith all night. Will Grissom collected seven rebounds and Matthew Gillis pulled six rebounds.

"Matthew Etchison came in off the bench and hit a huge 3-pointer, and took a charge in the fourth quarter," said Allen.

Saturday's sectional title was the fifth in the Golden Eagles' program history. Guerin Catholic is now 19-3 and will play at the Greencastle regional Saturday, taking on the host Tiger Cubs in the second semi-final. Greencastle won the Frankfort sectional by beating the host Hot Dogs 58-31.

In last Friday's semi-finals, Guerin Catholic pulled away from host Lebanon in the fourth quarter to win 49-30.

The semi-final game was close, although the Golden Eagles outscored the Tigers in each of the four quarters. Guerin Catholic led 10-7 after the first period and 20-15 at half-

time. The Golden Eagles held a 32-25 advantage after three quarters, then clamped down on defense in the fourth, outscoring Lebanon 17-5 in the closing period.

Edwards led the way for GC, scoring 13 points and collecting nine rebounds. Gillis added 11 points and pulled five rebounds.

# 'Hawks get first sectional win in six years, fall to Taylor in semis

Sheridan got its first sectional win in six years last Tuesday, beating Eastbrook 53-49 in the opening game of Class 2A Sectional 39 at Blackford.

The Blackhawks got off to a good start, leading 14-8 after the first quarter. Silas DeVaney scored nine points in that period, including a 3-for-3 performance from the free-throw line. The Panthers cut that lead to 23-20 by halftime; Kyle Eden had five points to help keep Sheridan in front.

The 'Hawks led 32-26 after three quarters. Both teams turned on the offense in the fourth, scoring over 20 points each. Sheridan held on by making free throws; Ethan Moistner was 6-of-8 during that period, while Eden

scored six points, including a 4-of-6 effort from the line.

DeVaney led the Blackhawks with 18 points, followed by Eden with 13 and Moistner with 11. Corbin Murray collected six rebounds, followed by Weibel with five. Moistner had five steals and Eden handed out four assists.

Sheridan saw its season come to an end last Friday, as the Blackhawks lost a tough semi-final game to Taylor 52-50 at Class 2A Sectional 39 at Blackford.

Sheridan trailed 14-8 after the first quarter, but the Blackhawks the Titans in the second period, as each team scored 16 points. Moistner scored 17 points in the first half, including five 3-pointers, helping to keep Sheridan

within 30-24 at halftime.

The 'Hawks cut into Taylor's lead in the third quarter, getting within 44-41 by the end of the period. Murray added nine points, while Eden scored six. Sheridan battled to the final buzzer, but the Titans were able to hold on.

Moistner finished the game with 18 points, while Eden scored 13 points and handed out seven assists. Murray totaled 10 points. DeVaney led the rebounds with seven.

The Blackhawks finished their season with a 12-11 record, their first winning campaign since the 2012-13 season. Sheridan graduates seniors Murray, Eden and Keenan Warren.

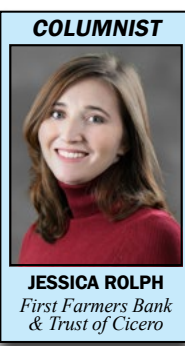
# Tell me a story

It turned warm early that year. Flowers made March appearances, dazzling in the spring sunshine, filling the air with the sweet scents of growing things. It rained, of course. It rained constantly. But somehow, every day, there was at least a few hours of sun. The rabbits would hop carefully out of their burrows, sniff the air, and take experimental nibbles of the grass, still dry and crunchy from winter's grasp. Mostly, they just soaked up the sun, enjoyed the warmth, and, always watchful, kept an eye on the humans in the houses below.

The warren, a rambling collection of burrows and tunnels, had been scraped out years ago by the rabbits' ancestors. The floor

had been made smooth by generations of strong feet and warm bodies, the inside full of comfortable nests of long crumbled leaves, hoarded pieces of cloth, and tangles of rabbit fur, plucked out to pack around the newborn kittens. During the long months of winter, the warren was full of rabbits, the temperature maintained to a hospitable level by the press of bodies in the tight space. Now, in the early spring warmth, the tunnels were largely empty, the colony spread out in the tall grass outside of the town's limits.

There was much to see in the afternoon sunlight. The warren was located on a slight rise that you might call a hill if you were feeling generous. Rabbits, being most comfortable when close to the ground, don't often like to sit up and make targets of themselves. The hill provided a nice vantage point, however, and these rabbits had grown accustomed to the view. The people in the houses nearby could look out their windows or across their lawns and see half a dozen rabbits, sitting on their haunches with no apparent concern for safety. On this day, some of the small humans were busy in the yard of a blue house, only 500 feet or so from the warren's hill, and the rabbits were intrigued.

You may not know this, but rabbits are almost as curious as cats, although they are inherently more careful due to their status as prey. If a rabbit is satisfied that there is little risk of danger in a situation, they are likely to do

a little exploring, especially if there's a garden involved. These rabbits had explored a great many gardens in the homes nearby and were the primary reason for the tiny fences that had sprung up in those same gardens. For now, the gardens lay empty, and their curiosity led them to less practical pursuits.

The children from the blue house were playing in a sandbox. It had been covered for the winter, and now, finally freed to play outside in warm weather, the little girls were making castles in the damp sand. The rabbits, with nothing else to occupy their attention, watched as the children filled a bucket, poured some water into it from a nearby cup, and then suddenly and with great gusto slammed it upside down on to the ground. Many of these attempts resulted in half formed towers, the top quickly crumbling away.

The rabbits were not impressed with the castles, of course. Natural diggers, they'd enlarged their burrows, dug new tunnels, and could scrape out a small shelter in an hour. What caught their attention was the way the sand crumbled. The warren was comfortable, but difficult to expand. The dirt around it was hard and difficult to dig. Soon, the little girls heard their mother calling from inside the house and hurried inside. Two of the largest rabbits hopped casually towards the yard, fascinated by the slow, easy crumble of castles in the sand.

# Royals, ‘Rocks win first-round games

CARMEL - Basketball fans found some familiar and welcome sights at Carmel’s Eric Clark Activity Center last Tuesday night as play began in the Class 4A Sectional 8 tournament.

There was a nice-sized crowd. Student sections were back. And the games were exciting, too. The first contest saw Hamilton Southeastern tough out a 44-40 victory over rival Fishers. In the second game, Westfield put on a blistering long-range shooting performance to beat Zionsville 61-47.

## WORKING FOR IT

Southeastern led for most of the opening game, but the Tigers made their district-mates work for it. The two teams traded the lead four times during the first quarter, which began with baskets by the Royals’ Dalton Retzner and Vinny Buccilla for a 4-0 advantage.

“We talked about two things,” said Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield. “One was getting off to a great start and I thought we did that, just being locked in. At the defensive end, I thought we did a pretty good job of that for the most part tonight.”

Jeffrey Simmons got Fishers on the board with a 3-pointer, then Myles Stringer’s rebound basket put the Tigers in front 5-4. The back-and-forth continued for the entire quarter: Southeastern scored four straight points, including a 3 by Isaac Bowman, and Fishers answered that with four consecutive points; Bryce Williams’ layin put the Tigers ahead 9-8.

Matt Brewer’s two free throws gave the Tigers an 11-9 lead with 54.6 seconds left in the period. But the Royals would begin a 7-0 run that stretched into the second quarter. The first period finished with a basket by Loudon Sundling to tie the game, then John McCall’s free throw finished the quarter. Southeastern led 12-11 and would never trail again.

Sam Jacobs started the second quarter by scoring four consecutive points. Later, the Royals’ Dalton Retzner made a layin to give HSE its biggest lead of the game at 21-14, then a Jacobs basket put Southeastern ahead 23-16.

The first half finished with two free throws by Charlie Smith, getting the Tigers within 24-20 at the break. The two teams traded baskets for the first part of the quarter, with a McCall floater giving the Royals a 30-24 lead. Simmons and Smith made layins to cut the lead to 30-28, which Retzner answered with two free throws. A Williams basket was the last score of the period, which finished with Southeastern up 32-30.

Williams scored again to open the fourth quarter, and the score was now tied at 32-32. Buccilla got the Royals back in front with a floater, and the Royals would stay in the lead until the final buzzer. Fishers got within 36-35 during the middle part of the period, but a 6-0 run put the Royals up 42-35, matching their largest lead of the game.

McCall made two baskets and Buccilla hit a layin.

“We’ve got guys that have been in there and put in all the time and the effort,” said Satterfield. “It’s a special group and the season’s been a little up and down with a lot of things that have gone on. We were able to find a way tonight.”

The Tigers made one last push, getting to within 42-40 with 7.5 seconds remaining. But Fishers had to foul, and Alex Totton clinched the game by making two free throws.

Retzner finished the game with 13 points, while Buccilla and McCall both scored 10. Retzner and McCall both collected five rebounds. The Royals, now 12-10 for the season, assisted 14 of their 15 baskets, with Buccilla dishing out five and McCall handing out four.

Williams led the Tigers with 12 points, followed by Simmons with 11 and Smith with 10. Smith also had six rebounds and five steals, while Simmons pulled five rebounds.

Fishers finished its regular season 14-6. The Tigers were relatively young, with two returning starters and a handful of players with varsity experience, and had to learn a new system without the benefit of summer practices. First-year coach Garrett Winegar said he thought “this group was really resilient in what we were able to do.

“We ended the regular season 14-6 and had a really nice run there, winning 10 of our last 12 games after being quarantined twice,” said Winegar. “I’m proud of those guys for how they worked and how we defended. I think we defended well most of the season. Just got to find a way to score a little more.”

## THIRTEEN 3-POINTERS

After an early series of basket-trading, Westfield pulled away from Zionsville thanks to an incredible shooting performance that resulted in 13 3-pointers for the Shamrocks.

The Eagles led 5-4 in the first quarter before Westfield finished the period on a 13-2

run. Cam Haffner made the Shamrocks’ first two triples, and just like that Westfield led 10-5. Braden Smith added five points, including his own 3, and Luke Van Dyke made a layin to give the ‘Rocks a 17-7 lead after one.

Westfield continued to roll in the second period, pouring in another 17 points to take a 34-19 lead. Smith threw in two more 3s during the early part of the quarter. Zionsville got within 28-19 midway through, but the Shamrocks finished the half with back-to-back 3s from Nic Depasquale and Benji Welch.

The Eagles came out on a rampage to begin the third quarter, going on a quick 7-0 run that led Westfield to call a timeout. When play resumed, Haffner threw in his third 3-pointer of the game. The junior was hot in the period, making two more 3s.

“I thought that was a key moment in the game was, how were we going to respond to that,” said ‘Rocks coach Shane Sumpter. “And we sure did.”

Smith scored the final points of the quarter by making two free throws, giving the Shamrocks a 48-33 lead. Those foul shots were the start of a 13-0 run by Westfield that stretched well into

the fourth quarter. Smith scored 10 of those points, including two triples. The other three were scored by Haffner, who nailed his sixth 3-pointer of the game.

When the dust settled, the ‘Rocks led 59-33 with 4:47 left in the game. Zionsville went on a 14-0 run, draining four straight 3s, but Westfield had too big a lead to make up. Alex Romack gave the Shamrocks the last word, hitting a layin with 19.4 seconds to go.

“Really proud of our effort today, and our defensive effort was really good with Zionsville,” said Sumpter. The coach complimented the Eagles as “a good team,” noting their two star sophomores: Logan Imes led Zionsville with 14 points and Nicholas Richart added six points.

“I got a lot of respect for them,” said Sumpter.

Smith finished the game with 23 points, including five 3-pointers. Haffner’s six 3s equaled 18 points, while Depasquale added 10 points. Haffner led the rebounds with seven. Smith dished out eight assists, with Welch handing out four.

Westfield improved to 17-4 after the victory, while Zionsville finished its season 14-8.

# Westfield's Alyssa Crockett commits to Michigan

Westfield junior Alyssa Crockett has announced last Friday that she will continue her basketball career at the University of Michigan.
