The Indiana Department of Health has revised Hamilton County's weekly 2-metric score from Yellow to Blue.

The Indiana Department of Health added 213 newly-reported COVID-19 positive cases to the county's dashboard on Saturday, March 6.

Upon further review, the state found that some of the test results dated back as far as January. However, color status is based on the date the test is reported, not the date the test was taken. The state has adjusted Hamilton County's level to Blue to reflect this change.

Being that last week was the second week that Hamilton County has been under Blue status, its advisory level has now been lowered to Blue as well.

That means events and social gatherings may take place at up to 100 percent capacity so long as participants social distance and wear masks. This includes K-12 extracurricular and co-curricular activities, community recreational sports, and college and professional sports. Social gatherings should be no more than 250 people.

## Russell's seat on Arcadia town council to be filled by appointment

With the death of Arcadia Town Council member Mitch Russell on Feb. 23, there is a vacancy on the town council.

Republican County Chairwoman Laura Campbell said last Tuesday that under state law she will be responsible to fill the vacancy.

Persons interested in being considered for the position should contact Mrs. Campbell at GOP headquarters, (317) 849-9600, before March 15.

State law provides that the party to which the deceased belonged will fill the vacancy for the remainder of Russell's term which runs through Dec. 31, 2023.

Since there is only one precinct in the vacated district, the law gives the county chairman the right to fill the vacancy. Russell, a Republican, was elected to the three-member council in 2019.

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

As COVID-19 case numbers con-

tinue to trend in the right direction in our schools and in the community, WWS administrators, in collaboration with the Hamilton County Health Department, have begun planning



for increased in-person learning for students in grades 7-12. With full support from the health department, we have selected Monday, April 26, to update the 7-12 hybrid plan to four days a week (Monday through Thursday) with Friday remaining a district-wide virtual learning day.

We believe this is the safest return date for staff and students and is the best way to minimize the impact of potential spread after Spring Break while providing flexibility to make adjustments in the event of any COVID-related issues.

NOTE: K-6 will remain in-person Monday through Thursday, with Friday as a virtual learning day.

Our success in safely increasing in-person learning is completely contingent on our ability to continue to keep cases low, monitoring conditions after Spring Break, and the continued guidance from the Hamilton County Health Department. It is more important than ever that we stay home when sick, properly mask, and report symptoms in the lead up to this transition.

As the health and safety of students and staff is always a top priority, masking will continue to be required and buildings will continue to practice vigilant hygiene procedures to help reduce the spread of germs. Fridays will continue to be district-wide virtual learning days to facilitate coordination with quarantined students, afford teachers time for professional development and allow teachers to have proper planning time.

If you do not wish for your student(s) to be in-person four days a week, you still have the option to switch to the 100 percent virtual platform. The middle and high school will reach out to families with additional information.

I would like to thank you for your continued support and flexibility during this unique school year. I want to thank the teachers, staff and administrators for their selfless work ethic and unwavering dedication to the education of our students. Without them, this school year and school district would not be what it is today. We are all looking forward to finishing the school year on a strong, positive note and I thank you all, in advance, for doing your part to make that happen.

### CrossRoads Church seeking applications for home repairs

CrossRoads Church at Westfield is bringing 200 to 300 high school students to Westfield this summer for a week to provide free home repair for those in need. This pro-

gram is being offered in partnership with Group Mission Trips, a youth mission organization based in Ft. Collins, Colo., and has a long history.



CrossRoads is seeking applications from any who need home repairs. Applications are due by April

Building or repairing wheelchair ramps, constructing decks, doing mobile home skirting, or painting the exterior of homes are the home repair services being offered for free this summer. This program is geared primarily toward older adults, veterans, and any low-income families who live in the

community and own their own homes. "The qualification is very simple," said Eric Lohe, who is the lead pastor of Cross-Roads Church at Westfield. "If you are in need of housing repair so you can live in your house, we want to help. We are not checking your bank statements or any of that. Once you submit an application, we have people from our congregation and the community who will go assess the needed repairs and determine if we have the skills and people power to meet the need."

To help people stay in their homes is the reason for doing the home repairs," Lohe told the Reporter. "This summer from June 21-25 we are going to have up to 300 high school kids, church kids, and their adult leaders come into the Westfield community, to live at Westfield Middle School, and go out in smaller groups of six people to serve. They will go to 35 to 45 home sites where each of those small groups will spend a week doing repairs for those people in need."

The current focus toward this goal is the free home repair program coming to Westfield, Noblesville and northern Hamilton County this summer.

"Since folks in our church are in Westfield, Noblesville, Cicero, and Sheridan, we decided for this round of doing this camp we were going to focus in those four communities," Lohe said. "This effort is one of four church initiatives called, 'For Our Neighbor.' We are trying to meet, know, enjoy, and serve the needs of our local neighbors."

"In addition to seeking work group sites, we are also seeking businesses or service organizations to be a part of this," Lohe said. "If a Rotary Club asks, 'What can we do?' I'd say, 'The kids come back really hungry in the afternoons. Could you cook up some hot dogs and have them available when the kids come back from camp?' Or a business could take out popsicles to a group or to a couple work sites during the week to say, 'Thank you. We're glad you are here and thanks for what you are doing.' It is not just about us as a church trying to do something for our neighbor, it's also about helping people be the best neighbors we can be."

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
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### Council minutes with Ken Alexander

I want to thank everyone who reached out to me after my first column ran in the Hamilton County Reporter last month. I'm excited to share a regular recap of what is going on with the

This month's meeting was relatively brief, so I've included some information from our joint Council/ Commissioner meeting and highlighted a few exciting developments.

We recently learned Hamilton County has become the only S&P rated "AAA" local income tax county in the State of Indiana. AAA is the highest rating possible, which is a tremendous reflection of our overall financial health. While we continue to recover from the effects of the pandemic, have numerous projects planned and underway, and provide assistance to our residents and businesses also recovering from the pandemic, to improve our credit rating is impressive. Taking it one step further, we are doing all of this while also improving services and building assets for our citizens, which is our number one priority.

For example, Governor Holcomb announced last week that Hamilton County has been awarded another grant from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) in the amount of \$1,047,670 through the Next Level Trails Grant Program for trail expansions. It will be used to build the Steven Nation Community Pathway Phase 1 (Kathryn Street in Cicero to Koteewi Park). The trail will eventually follow 234th Street from Cicero to White River Campground at Koteewi Park and connect with the pedestrian bridge over the river. 

Summary of Ordinance 09-02-21 Ordinance No. 09-02-21, adopted by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville on February 23, 2021, repealed and replaced Chapter 90 of the Noblesville Code of City Ordinance (the "Code").

Section 90.00 adopted certain state laws and regulations. Section 90.01 set out definitions to be used throughout the Chapter. Section 90.02 set out the duties and responsibilities of animal owners such as allowing access to adequate food, water and space, adequate shelter, keeping all vaccinations current, protection from abuse, cruelty, neglect, torment, overload, overwork or mistreatment, providing adequate veterinary care, and maintaining

in compliance with all laws and regulations.

Section 90.03 requires animal bites to be reported promptly to the local health

Section 90.04 sets out owner responsibilities for animal attacks/bites. It is a violation of the Chapter for an animal to chase or approach in an aggressive manner or attach a person or other domestic animal which results in injury. Defenses to the violation include if the animal is confined without means of escape, there is posted at the entrance to beware the animal and the person attached entered the enclosure as well as if the attack occurs during the commission or escape from a criminal act on the property or keeper of the animal. An animal may deemed vicious if they cause a serious injury or death and the animal may be forfeited or destroyed.

Section 90.05 sets out vaccination and tag requirements. Dogs and cats must be vaccinated against rabies and vaccinations must be kept current.

Section 90.06 set out standards against animal cruelty, neglect and abandonm A person who kills, abuses, maims, tortures or disfigures an animal or who administers poison to any animal or exposes the animal to poison commits animal cruelty. A person who overloads, overworks, torments or intentionally deprives an animal of necessary food, water or shelter commits animal cruelty. A person who engages an animal in fighting commits animal cruelty. A person who confines an animal without shelter, food, water, space or veterinary care commits animal cruelty. A person who abandons an animal commits animal cruelty. An animal found to be the victim of animal cruelty, neglect or abandonment may be impounded. A person found to commit animal cruelty faces a fine up to \$2,500 per occurrence and their animal seized by law enforcement and relinquished to the Humane Society or ordered to counseling or to pay restitution.

Section 90.07 requires owners to remove their animal feces from public property, public walks, parks, beaches, recreation areas or private property of

Section 90.08 sets out standards when animals are deemed vicious and the extra recautions required for keeping animal both confined in an enclosure and when t is not in an enclosure.

Section 90.09 sets out prohibitions of keeping wild or exotic animals within city limits without the proper permits. Section 90.10 sets out requirements for stabling of horses and ponies within th

city limits, minimum of one acre.

Section 90.11 sets out requirements for keeping an animal restrained; not allowing animals to roam free off owners' property. Prohibits tethering of dogs between the hours of 11:00 pm and 6:00 am unless an owner is present while tethering is occurring. Choke chain/collar prohibited during tethering and tether cannot become caught/entangled on objects inhibiting dog's free movement.

Outlines specific requirements for guard/watch dogs including signage. 90.12 requires all dogs and cats have permanent identification at all times via tag or microchip. Requires animals without permanent identification to be

microchipped if impounded and transported to the Humane Society. 90.13 sets out the requirements for feral cat colonies, including care, feeding, housing, medical treatment, and spay/neuter requirements, ear tipping requirements. Allows impounding of feral cats in violation of requirements.

90.14 prohibits individuals from placing out poisonous bait, certain individual

90.15 requires individuals to report vehicle/animal collisions to notify animal wher or local enforcement agency the animal's location and condition.

90.16 prohibits animals from being kept in vehicles when the conditions in the vehicle would cause a health hazard.

90.17 sets out requirements for training of animals 90.18 set out requirements for animals in heat.

90.19 sets out requirements for spay/neuter of dogs and cats, exceptions for health reasons, or has a breeder's permit. Outlines specific requirements for on-commercial breeding, how to obtain permit and length of time permit is valid

90.20 outlines reasons for animals to be designated as public nuisance animals 90.21 reserved

90.22 prohibits puppies and kittens from being sold at less than eight weeks of

90.23 prohibits individuals from offering animals as prizes or incentives to ente any business establishments, except those selling animals as primary business 90.24 prohibits animals (fowl) being given away as novelties or those who hav been altered by means of dyes.

90.25 sets out the standards for commercial animal establishments including medical care, food/water, sanitation, shall not engage in acts of neglect/cruelty Defines commercial animal establishments

90.26 prohibits certain animals in the city limits unless property is zoned agricultural.
90.27 prohibits certain animal events/contests, requirements for approval of

90.28 outlines the destruction of animals, including manner, and those who are approved to conduct such activities: licensed veterinarian, certified euthanasia technician, law enforcement, fire personnel, animal owner, those engaged in mmediate self-protection.

90.29 sets out the requirements for disposing of dead animals, notification of proper authorities when finding a dead animal, timeline for disposing of bodies/parts (24 hours) for commercial establishments, prohibits offensiveness of keeping dead animals or parts thereof. Dead animals being hauled must be covered or blocked from public view. Exceptions of skinning, dissecting, etc. include legal hunting or fishing.

90.30 prohibits noisy dogs, and manners in which the issue may be addressed.

90.31 prohibits the feeding of birds in the public areas of the city without

approval of park employees.

90.32 prohibits interfering with those city official designated to handle animal complaints, including removing or attempting to remove animals from city wehicles, impoundment areas, animal control shelter, or attempting to prevent an animal control officer from conducting their lawful duties.

90.33 sets out prohibitions of interfering or enticing with another person's animal, including tempting an animal to leave its own property for the purposes of keeping animal or taking to an animal control shelter, or bringing into the city an animal for the purposes of impounding the animal or collecting a fee. 90.34 prohibits animal sacrifice or the sale of animals for ritual sacrifice. Does ot apply to religious slaughter or agricultural purposes

90.35 sets forth the requirements for notification of proper authorities when stray animals are located within the city limits. Noblesville Police Department may demand any found animal and finder much relinquish said animal(s). Stray animals to be held for 7 days.

90.36 sets out the requirements when an animal bites another animal or person, must be reported to Noblesville Police Department and quarantined for 10 days per state law, at location to be determined by Police Department. Animal cannot be destroyed; exceptions, and body detainment.

90.37 provides for violations of the chapter as grounds for impoundment of animals.

90.38 reserved

## 'Incredible' defense leads Golden Eagles to regional championship

The No. 6-ranked Golden Eagles triumphed at the Class 3A Greencastle regional, first beating the host Tiger Cubs 52-41 in the semi-finals. That sent Guerin into the championship, where it defeated Northview 59-43. That game featured an incredible shooting performance by senior Joseph Bobilya, who scored a career-high 40 points and made a school-record 10 3-pointers.

The GC offense scored quite a few points, and the defense did its part in helping the Golden Eagles win their fourth regional championship and first since 2015. Guerin Catholic held both of its opponents to well under their season av-

"Our defense was incredible today," said Golden Eagles coach Bobby Allen.

The defense was ready from the start, as Guerin Catholic jumped out to a 12-2 lead over Greencastle after one quarter. The Tiger Cubs cut into the Golden Eagles' advantage in the second quarter, but GC still led 25-19 at halftime. Guerin held a 32-27 lead after three periods, then pulled away in the fourth with a 20-point quarter.

Matthew Gillis reached double-double status with 20 points and 11 rebounds, while Kaleb Edwards added 14 points. Will Grissom collected five re-

bounds and Bobilya dished out four assists.

### RECORD-SETTING GAME

In the championship game, Guerin Catholic outscored Northview in each of the four quarters. The Golden Eagles went up 11-10 after one period, then jumped out to a 26-17 lead by halftime. Guerin led 43-32 after three quarters.

Bobilya led the way, making 10 of 16 3-point attempts. That sets new records for most field goals attempted and made in a Guerin Catholic game. The old records were seven 3s made and 14 attempted, both set by Christian Munson.

"Everything he threw up was going in," said Allen. "Towards the end of the game, he realized that they were trying to take him out, and he was able to get the ball where it needed to go in the end."

Edwards added 10 points and led the rebounds with eight. He also played tough defense the entire time in both games.

"He had the two toughest assignments and he stepped up and he played incredible defense for 64 minutes today," said Allen.

Jack Cherry and Gillis both collected seven rebounds against Northview, while Grissom handed out six assists.

The Golden Eagles improved to 21-3 after the victory. Guerin Catholic will play in Saturday's Class 3A south semistate, taking on No. 2-ranked Silver Creek at Seymour.

The Junior All-Star team All-Star junior coordinator Beth both were canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This year, because of just one game involving the Juniors, is the first time that just 12 players are being selected to the Junior All-Stars.

Over 24 years of games, from 1996 through 2019, the Indiana Senior girls lead the Indiana Junior girls 39-10 and the Indiana Senior boys lead the Indiana Junior boys 39-10. In five years of games against the Kentucky Juniors, the Indiana Junior girls lead 9-1 and the Indiana Junior boys lead 6-4. Games against the Kentucky Juniors were played in 2012, 2013, 2014, 2018 and 2019.
