Amanda Engle fills vacancy on Arcadia Town Council

Amanda Engle has been appointed to complete the unexpired term of the late Mitch Russell on the Arcadia Town Council. Engle is Russell's daughter and a teacher at Hamilton Heights Schools.

Republican County Chairwoman Laura Campbell made the appointment Monday as prescribed by state law when a vacancy of this type occurs. Because Russell was elected on the Republican ticket, the party chooses his successor.

Russell, a lifelong resident of Arcadia and a career police officer in Hamilton County, died last month at age 67. He had been elected to the council in 2019 to a term that runs through Dec. 31, 2023.

Engle, who takes office immediately, joins Maurice St. Louis and Randal Hill on the three-member council.

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

Investigation by AG Rokita leads to settlement with medical device manufacturer to benefit women

An investigation led by entific Indiana Attorney General ration allegedly Todd Rokita has resulted in misrepresented a \$188.6 million multistate settlement with a medical manufacturing company accused of deceptively marketing its transvaginal surgical mesh devices to patients.

Indiana will receive \$5,982,218 as a result of the settlement, in which 46 other states and the District of Columbia also participated.

"Women across the country have suffered serious health complications caused by surgical mesh devices, and I will continue to hold companies accountable that misrepresent or withhold information about the risks associated with the devices," Rokita said.





On Feb. 18, Black Indiana legislators were speaking in committee when they were heckled by white legislators after pointing out the discriminatory consequences of a bill.

For a month now, the Indiana Black Legislative Caucus (IBLC) has repeatedly called on legislative leadership to implement specific changes to improve equality in the statehouse – with no response. State Senator Shelli Yoder (D-Bloomington) sent a letter to the legislative leadership, offering support for the IBLC recommendations and also has received no commitment from the Speaker of the House or the President of the Senate to address racism in the General Assembly.

"I offered this letter because the behaviors experienced by our Black Colleagues in the House of Representatives should infuriate us all. White people must not only speak up when we hear it or see it, but also do the work to understand our role in systemic racism and carry the responsibility to address it head on," Sen. Yoder said. "This unacceptable harassment must be thoroughly rebuked. But not only by our Black colleagues, and not only by Democrats, but by every member of the General Assembly



representing the people of our state. I am disappointed that so far leadership has not stated the same.

Senator Eddie Melton (D-Gary) joined Yoder in her frustration.

"I appreciate Senator Yoder's commitment to fighting for justice and equity not only in the statehouse, but all of Indiana," Sen. Melton said. "I support her call for action, and hope that legislative leadership will recognize that people of all backgrounds and races see racism as a problem that we must work together to eradicate."

Sen. Yoder said, "The fact that an entire month has passed since our colleagues were heckled and nothing has been done is shameful. I will continue to fight for justice and speak out when I see it here in the people's house."

McKinney: \$65M in federal money isn't a "blank check"

I am responding to two recent articles by Fred Swift, first one on March 18 and the second on March 21, both related to Hamilton County receiving \$65+ million in pandemic "relief" money from the leading and inaccurate.

Defining the difference between WANTS and NEEDS was a cornerstone operating principle of my 24 years on the Hamilton County Council and it earned me the ire of the County Commissioners.

I have conferred with multiple members of both the Hamilton County Council and Auditors Office: the \$65+ million is indeed coming to the bank account of Hamilton County government but its use is highly restricted to replacing "lost revenue because of the pandemic." It is not a blank check to be spent on proposed 146th Street improvements, the cost overruns on SR 37 or other "want" wish lists of government officials.

When I left the County Council at the end of 2020, the "revenue loss" Hamilton County had experienced from the pandemic was zero: the tourism agency was down about \$2 million but quickly recovering into 2021 and County government was not expecting a decline in its property tax and income tax revenues until between 2022 and 2023, if then. Given all the stimulus money and sustained economic activity Hamilton County saw as a whole in 2020, I doubt the losses will occur to the extent originally feared.

enough "lost revenue" to warrant keeping all the money, which is extremely unlikely, it will have to be returned by the end of 2024. Most likely, the County will be able to establish \$8-12 million as "lost revenue.'

Thankfully, the Auditors Office is

independent and the bulwark against pressure from County Commissioners who have no hesitation spending money, especially that which is called "surplus" and "free."

Lastly, the Hamilton County Counfederal government. They are both mis- cil unanimously approved a \$2 million addition to the planned County parking garage which had a previous price tag of \$9.5 million. I have previously stated my position that the County should not bear the cost by itself but instead the City of Noblesville should be responsible for the extra cost. The County does not need the extra space now nor will it need the spaces in the next 20 years for its employees or visitors. The greatest need for parking spaces was tied to the Health Department but it was moved to an auxiliary building on the east side of SR 37 several years ago to alleviate the parking issue, which it did.

> The County has always planned to allow downtown visitors to use the parking structure after 5 p.m. to help downtown restaurants and businesses: perhaps the REAL reason for the sudden request and subsequent approval is the upcoming announcement by the City of Noblesville to eliminate all downtown parking around "the historic courthouse square"? In the hopes of revitalizing the area, the City will widen sidewalks and ban on the street parking. So where will the cars go? Of course, the extra spaces the County plans to build.

Another free gift to a city, courtesy of Unless the County can establish the County Commissioners and a compliant County Council.






