



Hamilton County sees first dealer convicted in drug overdose death

A Hamilton County jury has convicted a Noblesville man, Justin R. Yearly, of Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death.

According to Hamilton County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Andre Miksha, Yearly was the first to be charged and convicted of the relatively new statute that provides police and prosecutors with an additional tool to combat the opioid crisis – charging drug dealers with the death of

the person to whom they sold drugs.

Yearly was arrested in April 2019 in connection with a drug transaction that took place in Noblesville in which he sold drugs to Tyler Humphrey, which resulted in Humphrey's death.

The statute for Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death was created during the

2018 legislative session and signed into law by the Governor Eric Holcomb.

Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death is a Level 1 felony and is therefore the most serious drug offense in the Indiana Code. Most Level 1 felonies carry a

possible sentence of between 20 and 40 years, with the advisory sentence being 30 years.

Prosecutors throughout Indiana have said charging dealers with the new statute sends a clear message that they will be held accountable.

Yearly's sentencing is scheduled in Hamilton County Superior Court 1 on May 6.

Two other cases of Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death are pending in Hamilton County.

Local officials await COVID relief rules

County and municipal government officials are awaiting guidelines on how massive COVID relief grants can be spent. The money, which begins coming to local entities on May 10, is designed to replace revenue lost because of the national pandemic.

Nationwide, about \$1.9 trillion will be granted to government units, companies and individuals who suffered losses in the past year.

Little is yet known about the specific rules of where the funds can be spent. But, apparently one place it cannot be used is to replace any future local tax sources such as property tax and local income tax.

Hamilton County government and cities and towns within the county will be getting a total of well over \$100 million. The local governments did not suffer the extreme financial hardship that some areas and their populations experienced.

County government will be getting \$65.5 million, while the City of Noblesville is scheduled to receive slightly over \$14 million, and Carmel \$20.6 million.

When guidelines are received, county commissioners and city and town administrations may outline departments, recipients or qualifying projects for the funds. The money must then be appropriated by respective councils of the various units.

Sheridan woman, two others arrested in connection with Carmel murder

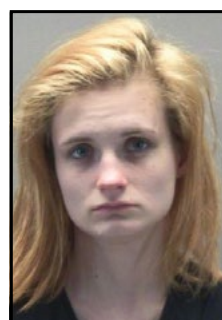

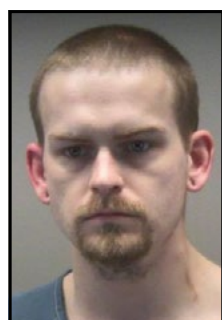

Republican County Chairwoman Laura Campbell made the appointment on March 22 as prescribed by state law when a vacancy of this type occurs. Because Russell was elected on the Republican ticket, the party chooses his successor.

Russell, a lifelong resident of Arcadia and a career police officer in Hamilton County, died last month at age 67. He had been elected to the council in 2019 to a term that runs through Dec. 31, 2023.

Engle, who takes office immediately, joins Doug Grishaw and Rich Versprille on the three-member council.

Carmel firefighters offering COVID vaccine to immobile, at-risk residents

The Carmel Fire Department is working with the Hamilton County Health Department to administer COVID-19 vaccines to people who are unable to leave their homes. Last week, 18 homebound residents were vaccinated in Carmel.

The program is part of the Homebound Hoosier EMS Vaccine Administration Program and provides vaccines to at-risk, hard-to-reach, and immobile residents. Carmel Fire EMS Chief Jon Alverson was involved with planning and implementing this program to be used in Carmel, as well as playing a key role in working with fire departments throughout the state.

"This is one more way for the City of Carmel to help our residents who are most in need of the vaccination, but have been unable to get out to get the shots," Mayor Jim Brainard said. "We are doing all we can to take advantage of science and new ways of administering potentially life-saving vaccines so that we can fight off this deadly pandemic virus."

No longer suffering in silence

Former fire chief shares his story of trauma, healing, helping others

Jeff Muszar has resigned as chief of the Jackson Township Fire Department and is now one of the owners of a company focusing on helping people of all ages deal with cumulative stress and PTSD.

In an exclusive interview with The Reporter, Muszar reveals for the first time the origin of his own struggles with PTSD and the heavy price he has paid by not having the kind of resources he and co-owner Michelle Shepherd are offering.

Muszar served as a police officer in South Carolina and at the Fishers Police Department in the 1980s. He worked in the emergency room for Indiana Heart Hospital and St. Vincent, then in the St. Vincent trauma center. He started his firefighting career with Castleton Fire Department and segued into Lawrence Township Fire Department early in his career. While no longer in charge of Jackson Township Fire, he is still a Fire Lieutenant in Indianapolis.

“I have never talked to anyone about this in my life,” Muszar said as he began his story.

Muszar said he got into the fire service in 1984 was because of a man named David Edwards, who would become one of his best friends.

“I became a paramedic because of him,” Muszar said. “On Feb. 3, 1988, we were fighting a fire four years into my career. He fell through the floor. Three of us didn’t. He burned to death. A horrible death. I experienced that.”

After taking a moment to compose himself, he continued the story he has never told publicly.

“That was the first time in 19 years in the city of Indianapolis that anybody had

been killed,” Muszar said. “It opened up a wound that nobody knew how to deal with. It opened up the introduction to what we now call PTSD that we didn’t know how to understand or deal with. That’s part of my background that started this.”

Every year since 1989, Muszar goes to Edwards’ grave on the date of his passing. He calls it, “A remembrance of how fragile life is.”

In the late 1980s, firemen didn’t get help dealing with trauma because, in Muszar’s words, “We didn’t know what help was. We turned it down or we were told ‘suck it up, buttercup.’ We turned down any critical incident stress or anything they wanted to give us because they weren’t trained. In our business as police and firefighters, ‘if you have not been there, done that, or have a T-shirt, don’t talk to me about it because you have not experienced it.’”

Muszar also went through other traumatic incidents in his career.

“I was shot at, at point-blank range on a fire run,” he told The Reporter. “The

reason I am alive today is because the gun misfired. It was a man who was fleeing from the police and crashed through our fire scene. Through that and a couple other traumatic experiences that have built up over time, I watched my marriage fall apart, I watched my life fall apart, I watched my finances fall apart, my home was in foreclosure.”

According to Muszar, in the last few decades, the fire service has been looking into what effect the compounding of traumatic events has on first responders.

“They took the lead in that and began to develop employee assistance programs and counseling programs that didn’t require a disclosure to administration and allowed us access to that help confidentially,” Muszar said. “Now it is an open discussion through peer support, through the fire department administration and police department administration support – there’s a lot more openness to freely discuss what people go through.”

It is not one always one single event that triggers PTSD. It is a compounding of events over time.

Although he did not have the kinds of resources he and Shepherd are offering when he needed them, Muszar chose to live and survive and rebuild his life alone.

“I began to rebuild my life through asking people for help,” Muszar said. “They were eventually able to provide me some form of help through employee assistance, stress management counselors and people I could confide in who would not disclose my story. So that brought me back. But the sad part was that at that time I was still talking in confidence, afraid to ever tell my story. To this day, this is the

first time I have ever shared my story publicly. Ever.”

He told The Reporter he is doing so in our pages because he wants to help others and hopefully prevent them going through what he did alone.

“I have suffered through PTSD for years,” Muszar said. “It’s a stigma that now we are not ashamed to admit, but years ago we were. We just suffered in silence. There was no help back then that we were willing to go get.”

Even though the culture is changing and talking about the weight of trauma is now more common among first responders, after a lifetime in the culture of “suck it up, buttercup,” Muszar had not planned to tell his story until after he retired.

“This came along and her [Shepherd’s] passion for what she offers and the ability to have preventative mental health and wellness – to actually have a chance to save a life before they go into crisis is the reason that I got involved with this,” Muszar said. “If I can help one firefighter or police officer and save his life – because I was ready to end mine – then I feel like it would be successful.”

Muszar said this is one of the reasons he chose to leave Jackson Fire.

“I felt like it was time for me to move on,” he said. “It’s an opportunity that I didn’t know would become available, but it did. Because this became available, I knew I had one chance and I didn’t want to miss out on it. This opportunity is once-in-a-lifetime to help other people. Perhaps it is cathartic for me as well.”

Major road closures coming in April

Hamilton County motorists will see two major east-west corridors close on April 5.

As part of the State Road 37 project, 146th Street between Herriman Boulevard and the entrance to Jagger’s (approximately 700 feet east of SR 37) will be closed for approximately one week to all thru traffic for road construction. The estimated completion date is Monday, April 12.

County highway officials recommend using the posted detour route of Allisonville Road, 141st

Street, and Cumberland Road.

Also closing on April 5 will be 236th Street between Deming Road and Devaney Road to all thru traffic. The closure is Phase II of the 236th Street East Rehabilitation Project. The estimated project completion date is Tuesday, Aug. 3.

Local traffic on 236th Street will continue to have access to their homes, while thru traffic is asked to use the posted detour route of 256th Street, Anthony Road, and Devaney Road.

HSE junior high moving to four-day in-person classes

Junior high school students in Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools will be on a four-day in-person class schedule beginning Monday, April 12, following a unanimous vote by

the school board supporting the action recommended by Superintendent Allen Bourff. Monday through Thursdays will be in-person, with Fridays set aside as e-learning days.

Bourff cited junior high school family survey results, with 75 percent of

parents submitting responses. A total of 82 percent of the responses favored in-person learning and 70 percent were in favor of the four-day in-person schedule, compared to the hybrid method.

School administrators will watch for any surge in positive COVID cases following spring break. Dr. Bourff cited revised numbers showing 19 positive cases in the schools last week, compared to 70-plus such cases during school weeks in January. School officials say they will close individual buildings if there are COVID outbreaks on or after April 12.



Chandler

The e-Fridays are allowing teachers to take individual time with students needing extra help and help with teacher stress. Hamilton Southeastern Education Association President Janet Chandler told board members how difficult it has been for the teaching staff to handle in-person and virtual students at the same time.

"We cannot do another year like this," Chandler told the board. "Something has to give."

HSE Schools is planning a regular classroom schedule for the 2021-2022 school year, according to Dr. Bourff.

The future of HSE Schools, Noblesville and Wayne Township

The school situation in the area is going to be a bit more complicated in the future, based on a presentation by Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen before the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board on March 16. If the mayor's projections are correct, both the City of Noblesville and HSE Schools will see dramatic growth in Wayne Township during the next five to 10 years.

For as far back as I can remember, the local school district situation was fairly clear. For the most part, Noblesville Schools handled students in the City of Noblesville and HSE Schools took in all of Fishers, unincorporated parts of Fall Creek and Delaware townships, as well as all of the mostly-rural Wayne Township.

Jensen made it clear his city plans to expand eastward into Wayne Township with both residential and commercial development. The mayor told HSE Schools officials he expects Noblesville to double in size in the coming five to 10 years and most of

that growth will be into Wayne Township. That projection would mean HSE Schools would see dramatic growth in the student population. Keep in mind that HSE Schools is already the fourth-largest school system in the state, based on student population, with a count of roughly 21,500. The largest district in Indiana is Fort Wayne (29,404), followed by Indianapolis Public Schools (26,410), and Evansville Vanderburgh Schools (22,601). If Noblesville expands as projected into Wayne Township, HSE Schools would rise on that list.

This would create a much larger school system than HSE is now and would bring burdens as well as opportunities. More buildings would be required for more students, but the tax base would also increase with all the projected growth.

After posting my original story on Mayor Jensen's appearance before the board, plenty of comments followed about HSE giving up any territory annexed by Noblesville into Wayne Township. I have covered the HSE school board for more than nine years, and school officials have said consistently that there is no intention of giving up Wayne Township as part of HSE Schools.

So, with growth comes change. At HSE Schools, that change will likely come with more growth in the next decade, this time in Wayne Township and Noblesville rather than Fishers. The new superintendent of schools yet to be hired by the HSE school board will be facing all that change.

Some people think this change is not a good idea, others say it will be good for all of us. Only time will tell. But I will be watching and reporting on whatever happens.

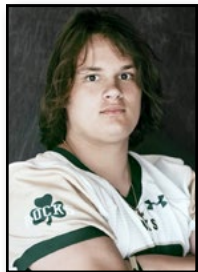

- Business engagement – ensuring equitable opportunities for all residents of the City of Fishers and inclusive work environments
- Religious institution engagement – implementing skills as equity partners

• Programming for resident graduates of Interrupting Racism, giving them implementation skills of the information learned

• Equitable opportunities for residents to hold leadership positions in City of Fishers (committees, etc.)

The consulting firm will report directly to Mayor Scott Fadness. This program is the next step after the city provided Interrupting Racism training to any Fishers resident wishing to take it, free of charge.
