

Final figures on the official 2020 U.S. Census have not been released yet, but are expected in the next couple of months, a year and a half after the nationwide count began. Hamilton County has an estimated population of 338,011, up from the 2010 total of 274,560. With the increase, the county should be entitled to 10 state representatives and five state senators. * * *

Indiana Department of Environmental Management's periodic soil borings continue to downtown Noblesville. The latest was last week in the 800 block of Logan Street. The testing has been ongoing in an attempt to learn whether there is groundwater contamination which had been suspected two years ago. A report should be made public soon. * * *

An official state historical marker will be erected April 20 in Noblesville memorializing Norman Norell, a nationally known fashion designer. Norell was born Norman Levinson in 1900 in a house along South 8th Street near the site where the marker will be located, according to County Historian David Heighway. Operating professionally as Norell, Levinson was a leading designer in New York for half a century. * * *

Monon Greenway tunnel in Carmel to close soon for mural installation

On or after April 19, the Monon Greenway tunnel under City Center Drive/126th Street will be closed. During this time, Monon Greenway traffic will be detoured west to 3rd Avenue Southwest.

The closure is estimated to last five to six weeks, with the Monon Greenway reopening in time for the International Making Cities Livable Conference starting on June 8. This closure will allow CCPR to perform maintenance on the tunnel including power washing, crack repair, hole patching, and painting with anti-graffiti primer.

Following the completion of regular maintenance, students from Carmel High School will paint a mural with a whimsical music theme, playing off the world-class music performed at the Center for the Performing Arts.

Noblesville firefighters respond to two resident fires

On Saturday, the Noblesville Fire Department (NFD) responded to two residence fires. At 10:24 a.m., crews were dispatched to 9561 Belmar Court. The first crews to arrive were met with heavy smoke outside the building. Firefighters were able to quickly enter the home and extinguish the fire. There were no injuries to civilians or firefighters. The second fire was dispatched at 6:37 p.m. Crews responded to 9973 Waterside Drive and were met with smoke and flames in the residence. Using what firefighters called an aggressive interior attack, crews were able to quickly bring this fire under control and limit the fire damage to the kitchen area. Two civilians were transported to Riverview Hospital for possible smoke inhalation. NFD reminds residents to check your smoke detector batteries.

The Council ended relatively early, but my day wasn't over. I received a few calls and texts after the meeting that I needed to handle. We are all aware that politics has become toxic – not because of the things we do or do not do but because of the way we communicate and handle ourselves.

Growing up I can remember participating in debates in nearly every class and I'm not sure they do that anymore. You learned to listen and respect other points of view. The civility in debate was not a goal it was a requirement. You can disagree without being disagreeable. We no longer respect the idea of a different opinion. That has spilled over into our day-to-day lives and is on display every night on cable news.

the way we look at things and being transparent with the debate over the issues. In the first few years of my Council role, the Council made quick action of agenda items in what felt like a race to get the meeting over with quickly. What can a new Councilor offer?

The calls I received after this month's Council were about how refreshing it is to see our Council not have the negativity and bickering that plagues other levels of government. Others mentioned that we seem to have a well-balanced Council with subject matter experts that can offer opinion to help inform the other Councilors. In general, people seem to be happy with the civility that now occupies our Council chambers. Maybe it is examples like this that will get people to want to engage.

Many things are happening in and around you and while your voice may seem to be inconsequential, it is still right to stand up and state your opinion. I have done it on Council and tried to be respectful of others. We have some exciting things that are rolling out on the Council agenda over the next few years. I am excited that these visions are shared by others and we will see them start to become a reality

When I accomplish my goals as a Councilor and it is time to step aside, I will support another person to bring their fresh ideas to the Council. If I cannot get what I want accomplished within that time frame, what makes me think I can get it done in another 4, 8 or 12 years?


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
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
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Millers win all-county game over Tigers

Remembering an Indiana sports legend . . . How Bobby 'Slick' Leonard helped shape Indianapolis

Fans were brought to tears over the loss of an Indiana sports legend Tuesday evening after the news that Bobby "Slick" Leonard had died at age 88.

He was a championship player with the Indiana Hoosiers, a championship coach with the Indiana Pacers, and, for decades, the beloved color commentator for the NBA team.

Leonard's free throws won Indiana University the 1953 NCAA championship over Kansas. But those who know agree, Leonard's influence went far beyond his time at IU and with the Pacers.

Without the Pacers, Indianapolis might not have secured the Colts. Without professional sports, the city may not have become the center of college and amateur athletics, headlined by this year's all-Indiana NCAA men's basketball tournament due the coronavirus pandemic.

Leonard was a legend in his own time. "He was like a father figure," remembered former Pacers player and NBA Hall of Famer George McGinnis. His No. 30 jersey is retired in the rafters of Bankers Life alongside the No. 529 jersey of "Slick" Leonard. His number stands for each victory Leonard had as the Pacers head coach over 12 seasons, winning three championships in the American Basketball Association.

McGinnis said "Slick" was tough but gentle, and organized fun team activities such as picnics and horseback riding during the offseason to bring the players together as a unit, which paid off during the season.

"He touched all of us in so many different ways, we loved him," McGinnis said. "He could be really tough but the next day he'd put his arm around you and tell you how much he loved you and that what he was doing is because he wanted you to be a better player."


It was during those years that Leonard originated his signature "Boom, Baby" call for a successful 3-point shot.

It was Game 7 in the playoffs against the Denver Rockets with Denver up two points. The play call was for McGinnis, but he was covered.

"Billy Keller, launched a three. And Bob said "Boom" as he launched it and then went down said "Baby." And that became 'Boom, baby," remembered documentary filmmaker Ted Green, who put a movie together about Leonard's life in partnership with WFYI in 2015.

"And we win that game on that 3-point shot and 'Slick' said 'Boom, baby,' and that's the first time I ever heard it," Mc-Ginnis agreed.

Still, the Pacers franchise was in trou-



"The ABA was a rough league and a lot of teams folded," Green said. "Imagine if the Pacers had folded. Would we have gotten the NCAA (headquarters) here? Would we become the amateur sports capital?"

"If there's no 'Slick' Leonard, there's no Pacers," said Jeff Rickard, program director and morning host for 93.5/107.5 The Fan. "If there's no Pacers, there's no Colts. If there's no Pacers and Colts, we probably don't have the thriving sports city that attracts the NCAA tournament."

Rickard interviewed Leonard every Wednesday morning on his radio program, telling stories in a way that only he could.

"He'd call us from the hospital one time," Rickard remembered. "You couldn't stop 'Slick.' He'd had a heart attack; he'd had COVID."

But, he didn't want to miss out spending time with this friends, all over the state.

News 8 Sports Director Anthony Calhoun said Leonard's advocacy for basketball both on and off the court will be missed. "The person you saw and you listened to on the radio was the same



Clippers pull away from Pacers, 126-115

Three Pacers topped 20 points on Tuesday night. Malcolm Brogdon led the way with 29 points on 12-of-18 shooting. Caris LeVert tallied 26 points, six rebounds, six assists, three blocks, and two steals, while Domantas Sabonis recorded a double-double with 20 points and 13 boards. But it wasn't enough to overcome a big night from George, who looked right at home back in the building he called home for his first seven NBA seasons. With fellow All-Star Kawhi Leonard sidelined due to a sore right foot, George had a game-high 36 points to go along with seven rebounds, eight assists, and two steals. The seven-time All-Star went 13-for-25 from the field, 4-for-7 from 3-point range, and 6-for-6 from the free

George knocked down two 3-pointers (part of a 15-point opening quarter for the former Pacer) to tie the game, but T.J. McConnell's buzzer-beating trey gave Indiana a 34-31 lead after the opening frame.

McConnell scored Indiana's first six points of the second quarter — including a signature sequence where he converted a layup, intercepted Reggie Jackson's inbounds pass, and scored again - to extend the lead to 40-34.

But Indiana made just one field goal over the next five minutes of game time and the Clippers capitalized with an 18-3 run to surge back in front.

Pacers coach Nate Bjorkgren called a timeout to try to stem the tide, but the Pacers were unable to make any headway over the ensuing stretch. In fact, the Clippers built their lead, pushing the score to

Marcus Morris had 22 points, six boards, and three assists for the Clippers, going 9-for-12 from the field and 3-for-3 from 3-point range. Ivica Zubac added 14 points and seven rebounds, while Batum registered 14 points, five boards, and five blocks off the bench.

The Pacers will now embark on a three-game road trip that zigzags across Wednesday night, moving west to Utah on Friday, and then concluding back east in Atlanta on Sunday.

"Tomorrow night is a must-win for us," Brogdon declared. "Regardless of the back-to-back, regardless of being on the road, we have to win that game."

Chip Ganassi Racing and Team Penske both will field four full-time cars for the first time since 2017.
