# Sheridan High School first in Indiana to offer 'eCPR'

## Ponderings on the porch

**The REPORTER**

Sheridan High School has partnered with Allies of Indiana to offer the first Youth eCPR training in the state. Allies of Indiana is a Peer-Run community-based organization that provides recovery inspiration, hope, support, and education to individuals working toward mental and lifestyle wellness.

This is the first Youth eCPR program to be offered in Indiana through grant funds from the Indiana Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA). Sheridan Schools staff recommended 16 students, grades freshman through junior, to become certified in the Youth

eCPR program. A second round of youth will be trained beginning mid-April.

Emotional CPR (eCPR) is an evidence-based educational program designed to teach people to assist others through an emotional crisis based on the principles found to be shared by a number of support approaches: Trauma-informed care, counseling after disasters, peer support to avoid continuing emotional despair, emotional intelligence, suicide prevention, and cultural attunement. Sheridan Community Schools Superintendent Mary

Roberson said, "We know that mental health awareness is vitally important to the well-being of our students, staff, and community. We are honored to be ground floor of this exciting project and are grateful to Allies of Indiana and the staff and students of Sheridan High School for making it possible to promote mental health well-being through this innovative program."

NaKaisha Tolbert-Banks, Licensed Clinical Social Worker and Adult and Youth eCPR Trainer, along with a great team through Allies of Indiana, has excitedly worked with Carrie Bennett, Sheridan's Project AWARE Mental Health Coordinator, and staff of Sheridan High School to bring Youth eCPR to life and train students of Sheridan to be the first of their peers to be able to utilize these skills to better support, listen to, and benefit others in an emotional crisis.

# What to expect for Fishers, HSE high school graduations

High school graduation ceremonies for Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern high schools will be held at the Indiana Fairgrounds Coliseum on Saturday, June 5, but each high school will have two sessions in order to lower the number of people at each event.

Superintendent Allen Bourff told HSE School Board members Wednesday night Fishers High School will hold graduation ceremonies at 9 a.m. and 11:30 a.m., then HSE will have its events at 2 p.m. and 4:30 p.m.

There will be no orchestra or choir, but recorded music may be used. There will be no handshakes as graduates accept their diplomas. There will be no procession to begin and end each event. Each graduate will receive four tickets to the ceremony.

The speeches will be reduced to a brief address by the principal and remarks from each valedictorian.

Last year's graduation was delayed due to the pandemic and held outside.

In other updates from Dr. Bourff at the HSE board meeting:

- The Fishers Health Department is working with school officials to provide COVID vaccinations to students, now that the age of those eligible for the vaccine has lowered. No details have been worked out on how that may work.
- The first three days of school after spring break have resulted in 34 positive COVID tests at HSE Schools, which exceeds the last full week before spring break at 23 cases. However, Dr. Bourff says that this week's number is lower than had been projected.
- Finally, the consent agenda is normally a list of routine items approved by the board at each regular meeting. Wednesday night, board member Brad Boyer voted no on the consent agenda, a rare event. When asked after the meeting why he voted no, Boyer responded that he had asked questions on some items contained in the consent agenda and did not receive "satisfactory answers" to those questions.
- The consent agenda consists of board minutes from the previous meeting, financial claims and personnel actions. When asked what specifically on that agenda caused him to vote no, Mr. Boyer declined to answer.

# Stand-up comedy class coming to Carmel’s Center for Performing Arts

For those who want to check an item off their bucket list, escape their comfort zone or improve their speaking skills, the Center for the Performing Arts is offering another round of its Intro to Stand-Up Comedy Class.


In four weekly sessions May 3-24, participants learn the history and evolution of stand-up comedy along with the basics of joke writing and performance. Under the guidance of the instructor, each student writes and rehearses their own five-minute routine to perform for friends and family at the graduation show May 29 in the Center’s Studio Theater.

Instructor Dwight Simmons is a nationally known comic who has been featured on Kevin Hart’s *LOL Radio* on Sirius XM and on the syndicated *The Bob & Tom Show*, for which he is also a writer. He is a co-director of the annual Limestone Comedy Festival in Bloomington and the creator and host of the web series *BrewTube Comedy*. In 2018, Simmons’ self-produced album *Sip and Pass* reached No. 1 on the iTunes comedy charts, making it his second release to do so. That same year, he was the Indiana selection for Thrillist’s “Best Undiscovered Comedian from Every State.”

The class is recommended for ages 17 and up and limited to 15 participants. The cost is \$90. The three-hour weekly sessions will begin at the Palladium, 1 Carter Green, with physical distancing and other public health protocols in place. I invite my family and friends to sit on the porch and offer them some sweet tea. I think it tastes sweeter on my back porch. Perhaps it is a reminder of the sweetness of friendship.

If my friends would rather have coffee, I tell them that it is a mild brew but somehow strength is found in the caffeine or the conversation.

Wisdom is shared. Both mine and theirs. I always pray for my guests after they leave. That’s something my mother taught me.

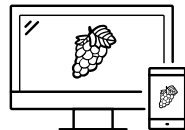

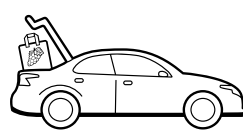

# Booth Tarkington Civic Theatre announces plays for 2021-22 season

The Booth Tarkington Civic Theatre has announced its 2021-22 Season.

Civic's season will begin with *The Color Purple*, which was originally scheduled for this spring. This musical adaptation of Alice Walker's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel spotlights Celie, a downtrodden young woman whose personal awakening over the course of 40 years forms the arc of this epic story. *The Color Purple* will run Oct. 7-23.

## Senate Democrat calls for fully funding traditional K-12 public schools, raising teacher pay

On Thursday, the state tax revenue forecast was released showing an increase in Indiana's revenue projections by \$2.4 billion over the next three years. This provides the General Assembly with an opportunity to fund core budget items that were left out of the existing legislation.

Senator Shelli Yoder (D-Bloomington) gave the following comments in response to the new tax revenue forecast:

"I proposed multiple amendments to our state budget seeking to improve our state's quality of education and to fund crucial public programs. With \$2 billion in new money, there are pragmatic, attainable line items that we can address," said Sen. Yoder. "I hope Senate leadership does their part."

"With this new revenue forecast, we can fully fund traditional K-12 public schools, fully fund public television, raise teacher pay and restore funding for our Arts Commission. After the governor's own **teacher pay commission suggested** that making teacher salaries in Indiana competitive with the rest of the region would require a \$600 million investment, it's exciting to see that we can make that investment in our teachers and our students."

"Indiana ranks dead last in the country in teacher pay raises since 2002 and we pay our teachers lower salaries than Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Kentucky. We have a tremendous opportunity to meet the recommendations of Governor Holcomb's commission, it's long overdue and it's time Republican lawmakers stop kicking the can down the road."

## What Congressional act “enabled” Indiana to become the 19<sup>th</sup> state?

### The REPORTER

*This week in Indiana's history ...*

**1816** – President James Madison signed into law the Enabling Act, passed by Congress. The measure would permit Indiana to become a state "on equal footing with the original states." The next step was the organization of a constitutional convention, which took place in the summer of the same year. Indiana was admitted to the Union on Dec. 11, 1816.

**1884** – The city of Hammond was incorporated in Lake County. It was named for George H. Hammond, who had founded a slaughterhouse in the area and built refrigerated box cars to haul the beef. The town grew rapidly due to its proximity to Lake Michigan. In the 1920s, the city was home to the Hammond Pros, considered one of the first professional football teams.

**1902** – President Theodore Roosevelt sent a note to Secretary of War Elihu Root suggesting that the new Army post in Indianapolis



be named for President Benjamin Harrison. Roosevelt had served under Harrison as Civil Service Commissioner. The fort was active for 85 years and is still the site of the Defense Finance and Accounting Center. The grounds have been developed into a state park.

**1912** – Indianapolis resident Ellen Toomey returned to her home on Bates Street, having survived the sinking of the Titanic. She had been on a visit to Ireland to see her mother and two sisters. She booked passage for the return trip on the Titanic. When the ship struck an iceberg and began to sink, she was placed in a lifeboat with 30 other people. They drifted on the dark sea for seven hours before being rescued by another ship, the Carpathia.

**1939** – Langston Hughes and Arna Bontemps, noted African American poets and authors, were guest speakers at the Indianapolis YWCA on North Pennsylvania Street. Hughes spoke about his experience as a journalist covering the Spanish Civil War. Bontemps discussed his recent book, *Haiti, Mysterious Island*. The event was sponsored by the Progressive Art League of Indiana.

**1970** – Herb Shriner and his wife Ellen were killed in an automobile accident in Florida. Shriner was famous for his homespun humor about growing up in Indiana. His monologues were accompanied by his harmonica. He had his own radio and television programs and was a popular stage entertainer.

# Huskies host annual Big Orange Meet

The Hamilton Heights track and field teams hosted their annual Big Orange Meet on Saturday.

It was a great day for the Huskies girls team, as it finished second to a strong Lebanon squad. The Tigers scored 125.33 points, with Heights totaling 101.5 points.

Ella Ewing cruised to a win in the 100 hurdles (17.15 seconds), while Taylor Standridge was first in the pole vault, with a best effort of 9-9.

Heights coach Todd Jones was happy with how his team performed, especially since the Huskies were missing two athletes who were unable to compete.

“Our girls stepped up, had some great performances,” said Jones. “Winning that 4x4 relay at the end of the meet was a really nice thing to have.”

In the boys meet, Heights finished sixth with 57.5 points. The Huskies collected three runner-up performances, including two from Nate Josza. He placed second in the long jump at 18-11, then joined Alex Knepper, Lukas Knepper and Trey Ehman to finish second in the 4x100 relay (46.01). Bayden Lutz was the pole vault runner-up with a vault of 12 feet.

Heights coach Mike Hippensteel was also pleased with how his young athletes competed – “We had some guys step up,” he said. He noted that the Huskies had lost quite a few athletes from last year.

“We’re just really inexperienced and it will be difficult to compete sometimes,” said Hippensteel. “But real pleased with how our young kids came out and went at it today.”
