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CPD seeing increase in elder fraud

Two recent cases resulted in \$1.4M in losses

Each year, millions of elderly Americans fall victim to some type of fraud, and Carmel police say they are seeing an increase in these crimes in their community.

According to CPD investigators, seniors are often targeted because they tend to be trusting. They also usually have financial savings, own a home, and have good credit – all of which make them attractive to scammers.

Police say scammers work to gain their targets' trust and often communicate with them directly via computer, phone, and the mail.

"Scammers have the ability to use technology to obtain names, dates of birth, addresses and phone numbers of a potential victim's friends or relatives,' said Carmel Officer Mike Morley, an expert on senior fraud. "They will often spoof phone

Two recent investigations conducted by Carmel officers resulted in the victims being scammed for more than \$1.4 million.

Carmel police say common scams directed toward the elderly include:

• Romance scam: Criminals pose as interested romantic partners on social media or dating websites to capitalize on their elderly victims' desire to find companions.

• Tech support scam: Criminals pose as technology support representatives and offer to fix non-existent computer issues. The scammers gain remote access to victims' devices and sensitive information.

Grandparent scam: Criminals pose as a relative – usually a child or grandchild claiming to be in immediate financial need.

• Government imperson-Once scammers gain the trust ation scam: Criminals pose as government employees and

Sheridan High School first in state to offer 'eCPR' program

Sheridan High School has partnered with Allies of Indiana to offer the first Youth eCPR training in the state. Allies of Indiana is a Peer-Run community-based organization that provides recovery inspiration, hope, support, and education to individuals working toward mental and lifestyle wellness.

This is the first Youth eCPR program to be offered in Indiana through grant funds from the Indiana Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA). Sheridan Schools staff recommended 16 students, grades freshman through junior, to become certified in the Youth eCPR program. A second round of youth will be trained beginning mid-April.

Emotional CPR (eCPR) is an evidence-based educational program designed to teach people to assist others through an emotional crisis based on the principles found to be shared by a number of support approaches: Trauma-informed care, counseling after disasters, peer support to avoid continuing emotional despair, emotional intelligence, suicide prevention, and cul-See Fraud...Page A4 tural attunement. The location was approved by the Library Board at its meeting last Wednesday. The seven-acre property south of the Midland Trace Trail sits west of Westfield Boulevard.

"This new building will be a centerpiece in the heart of Westfield's expanding downtown," said Scott Willis, board vice president and building committee chair. "While the current building has served us well through the years, it doesn't allow us room to grow and continue to meet the community's burgeoning needs."

"During her campaign, she put in the hard work of talking to her constituents, and has served admirably on the city council. We wish her the best, and look forward to welcoming our next City Councilor."

DeLong says she is not looking forward to leaving the council.

"It's been a great pleasure working with the council and for the North Central District," DeLong told LarryInFishers. "I am very sad to be leaving."

Being a council member was complicated during her tenure with the COVID pandemic, not allowing her the opportunity to interact personally with constituents. One thing she would like to see in the future is diversity among the city council members.

"I think we need more diversity on the council," DeLong said. "I hope whoever fills my seat can bring that."

"I look forward to collaborating with the new Democratic member of the Fishers City Council to make government more transparent and accessible for residents, create policies that improve diversity, equity and inclusion, and represent Fishers citizen's interests above all," said Jocelyn Vare, the other Democrat on the city council. Plans are moving forward for the development of Geist Waterfront Park, as the Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety awarded a build, operate and transfer (BOT) agreement with local contractor Meyer Najem last Tuesday.

The city says it issued a request for proposals in early March. After negotiations with the firm, Meyer Najem was selected to not only enter into the BOT agreement, but also enter into a contract substantially similar to the Public-Private Agreement for the construction, operation, and transfer Of Phase 1 of Geist Waterfront Park, primarily consisting of earthwork.

A public hearing was held, as required by law, but no one chose to speak.

threaten to arrest or prosecute victims unless they agree to provide funds or other payments.

Sweepstakes/charity/lottery scam: Criminals claim to work for legitimate gain victims' trust. Or they claim their targets have won a foreign lottery or sweepstake, which they can collect for a "fee."

· Home repair scam: Criminals appear in person and charge homeowners in advance for home improvement services that they never provide

Local law enforcement officials say many scams go unreported. Seniors may be less inclined to report fraud because they don't know how, or they may be embarrassed at having been scammed. They might also be concerned that their relatives will lose confidence in their abilities to manage their own financial affairs.

- Where you sent funds, "If you believe you are including wire transfers and prepaid cards (provide financial institution names, account names, and account numbers)
 - Descriptions of your interactions with the scammer and the instructions you were given


Noblesville and Fishers baseball teams split a Hoosier Crossroads Conference series last week.
