



# CPD seeing increase in elder fraud

## Two recent cases resulted in \$1.4M in losses

Each year, millions of elderly Americans fall victim to some type of fraud, and Carmel police say they are seeing an increase in these crimes in their community.

According to CPD investigators, seniors are often targeted because they tend to be trusting. They also usually have financial savings, own a home, and have good credit – all of which make them attractive to scammers.

Police say scammers work to gain their targets’ trust and often communicate with them directly via computer, phone, and the mail.

“Scammers have the ability to use technology to obtain names, dates of birth, addresses and phone numbers of a potential victim’s friends or relatives,” said Carmel Officer Mike Morley, an expert on senior fraud. “They will often spoof phone calls or emails. Spoofing is the act of disguising a phone call or email from an unknown source as being from a friend or relative.

If someone is asking for money or your personal information, don’t assume the caller ID or email address is correct.”

Once scammers gain the trust of their victims, they are likely to keep a scheme going because of the prospect of significant finan-

cial gain.

Two recent investigations conducted by Carmel officers resulted in the victims being scammed for more than \$1.4 million.

Carmel police say common scams directed toward the elderly include:

- **Romance scam:** Criminals pose as interested romantic partners on social media or dating websites to capitalize on their elderly victims’ desire to find companions.

- **Tech support scam:** Criminals pose as technology support representatives and offer to fix non-existent computer issues. The scammers gain remote access to victims’ devices and sensitive information.

- **Grandparent scam:** Criminals pose as a relative – usually a child or grandchild – claiming to be in immediate financial need.

- **Government impersonation scam:** Criminals pose as government employees and

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# Sheridan High School first in state to offer ‘eCPR’ program

Sheridan High School has partnered with Allies of Indiana to offer the first Youth eCPR training in the state. Allies of Indiana is a Peer-Run community-based organization that provides recovery inspiration, hope, support, and education to individuals working toward mental and lifestyle wellness.

This is the first Youth eCPR program to be offered in Indiana through grant funds from the Indiana Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA). Sheridan Schools staff recommended 16 students, grades freshman through junior, to become certified in the Youth eCPR program. A second round of youth will be trained beginning mid-April.

Emotional CPR (eCPR) is an evidence-based educational program designed to teach people to assist others through an emotional crisis based on the principles found to be shared by a number of support approaches: Trauma-informed care, counseling after disasters, peer support to avoid continuing emotional despair, emotional intelligence, suicide prevention, and cultural attunement. # Westfield Washington Public Library settles on its new downtown location

## Community meetings planned in coming weeks

The Westfield Washington Public Library plans to build a new library in downtown Westfield at Westfield Boulevard and Park Street. The location was approved by the Library Board at its meeting last Wednesday. The seven-acre property south of the Midland Trace Trail sits west of Westfield Boulevard.

“This new building will be a centerpiece in the heart of Westfield’s expanding downtown,” said Scott Willis, board vice president and building committee chair. “While the current building has served us well through the years, it doesn’t allow us room to grow and continue to meet the community’s burgeoning needs.”

The current library on Hoover Street was built in 1983 and expanded in both 1994 and 2014. At 32,230 square feet, the current site doesn’t offer enough room for further expansion.

“Our biggest pain points are a lack of parking, insufficient study rooms, and demand for more programming space,” Library Director Sheryl Sollars said. “In fact, a feasibility study we conducted last year indicated it would actually cost us more to stay in our current location and make the upgrades

necessary than to start from scratch.”

The 45,000 square-foot library’s construction and land costs will be covered by a \$16.7 million general obligation bond scheduled to go before the Westfield City Council later this year. The bond will cause a 2-cent tax increase; however, the Westfield Washington School District plans to

The soonest the tax-neutral bonds could be approved would be this fall. A groundbreaking could take place as soon as spring 2022 with completion in the fall of 2023. Although there are no firm design plans, KRM architects has been hired to

decrease its tax rate over the next several years allowing construction on the new library to be net neutral.

help create a vision for the new building. Visit [tinyurl.com/WestfieldLibrarySitePlan](http://tinyurl.com/WestfieldLibrarySitePlan) to review the site plan.

“Residents have told us they’d like to see more parking, drive-thru service, remote-working spaces, and a coffee shop,” Sollars added. “And in this current climate, we’d also like to include some courtyard space for outdoor activities.”

The library will host a series of public meetings in the coming weeks to keep the community informed about the new library’s progress. The first will be held at 7 p.m. on May 26.

# DeLong to resign April 30 from Fishers City Council

Samantha DeLong is one of only two Democrats serving on the Fishers City Council, but her husband’s new job will take her family out of state, meaning DeLong will resign her council seat effective April 30.

As a result, new Hamilton County Democratic Chair Dayna Colbert will convene a caucus of party precinct officials to elect DeLong’s successor on the city council. Colbert tells *LarryInFishers* there are already people interested in running for DeLong’s council seat. Potential candidates have until 3 p.m. on April 22 to file their paperwork.

“Councilor DeLong is someone who wanted to get involved in politics to make her community even better,” Colbert said. “During her campaign, she put in the hard work of talking to her constituents, and has served admirably on the city council. We wish her the best, and look forward to welcoming our next City Councilor.”

DeLong says she is not looking forward to leaving the council.

“It’s been a great pleasure working with the council and for the North Central District,” DeLong told *LarryInFishers*. “I am very sad to be leaving.”

Being a council member was complicated during her tenure with the COVID pandemic, not allowing her the opportunity to interact personally with constituents. One thing she would like to see in the future is diversity among the city council members.

“I think we need more diversity on the council,” DeLong said. “I hope whoever fills my seat can bring that.”

“I look forward to collaborating with the new Democratic member of the Fishers City Council to make government more transparent and accessible for residents, create policies that improve diversity, equity and inclusion, and represent Fishers citizen’s interests above all,” said Jocelyn Vare, the other Democrat on the city council. “I join my colleagues in our shared appreciation of Councilor DeLong’s service to the City of Fishers and her constituents of the North Central district.”

# CarmelFest returns ... with a few new twists

## Annual Independence Day celebration, July 4-5 with parade, fireworks, new music, kid zone at Carter Green

The City of Carmel and the Carmel Rotary Club have announced the return of CarmelFest this July 4-5 with a few new twists.

For the first time in over 10 years, the Fourth of July holiday falls on a Sunday, so the CarmelFest parade will now take place on July 5, the federal observance of the holiday. The event will feature a new layout at two locations: Music will return to the Gazebo, but there will be new features at an expanded adult and kid zone at Carter Green to reduce congestion and make it easier to maintain physical distancing.

For the first time ever, CarmelFest will feature two

nights of fireworks – July 4 shows on the east side and west side of the City and a July 5 show over the skies of downtown Carmel. In 2020, the city launched fireworks at three locations on the same night and received positive feedback, prompting the decision to offer multiple locations again this year.

“Not only will this give fans of fireworks more opportunities to enjoy that tradition, we

who oversees the fireworks. Ongoing growth throughout the city’s central core has created an increasingly congested event footprint the past several years. This, in conjunction with construction projects at two key locations – the gardens south of City Hall and the area north of the Carmel Fire Department –

believe it will promote less congestion during the traditional downtown show,” said City Councilman Jeff Worrell,

prompted organizers to rethink event logistics.

With 2020’s CarmelFest canceled due to the global pandemic, and 2021’s festival including physical distancing considerations, the decision to use Carter Green and areas around the Palladium to stage additional event zones came to fruition. This new configuration will allow for a second stage for music, additional vendor booths, kids’ games and adult beverage booths. At the same time, the traditional CarmelFest music at the Gazebo will be enjoyed by those wanting to picnic and watch the fireworks.

## Meyer Najem selected for Geist Waterfront Park public-private partnership agreement

Plans are moving forward for the development of Geist Waterfront Park, as the Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety awarded a build, operate and transfer (BOT) agreement with local contractor Meyer Najem last Tuesday.

The city says it issued a request for proposals in early March. After negotiations with the firm, Meyer Najem was selected to not only enter into the BOT agreement, but also enter into a contract substantially similar to the Public-Private Agreement for the construction, operation, and transfer Of Phase 1 of Geist Waterfront Park, primarily consisting of earthwork.

A public hearing was held, as required by law, but no one chose to speak.

# Former HSE board president asks for no new superintendent action at this time

Diane Eaton served on Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board for many years, and sat in the president's chair for some time during that tenure.

Eaton addressed the board last Wednesday night, asking that the contract for the new superintendent not be approved. No vote was scheduled Wednesday, but a

public hearing was held and the contract was discussed with attorney David Day.

The former board member argued an interim superintendent should be named and the search for a new leader for HSE Schools delayed because, according to Eaton, the board is not being transparent with the community by holding a public

pool of candidates is smaller due to the COVID pandemic.

Eaton urged the board to continue the search for a new superintendent. She said after the

hearing on the contract when the new superintendent's identity has not been revealed. Eaton added that state law does allow this.

Eaton also expressed concerns the

meeting that her comments represent the views of “hundreds” of families who have contacted her with the same concerns.

The board has announced a special meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 22 to announce the new superintendent and approve her contract. (It appears the new superintendent is a woman based on the contract language and other interactions with school officials.)

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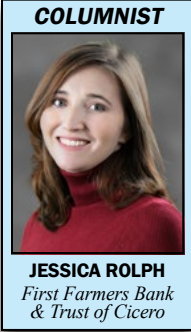

In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by her husband in 2017, Johnnie Wright; sister, Linda Mills; son, Shawn Wright.

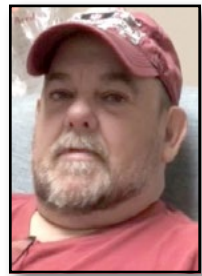

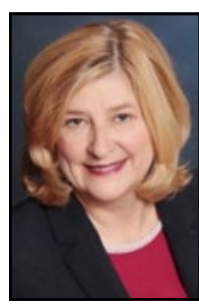

threaten to arrest or prosecute victims unless they agree to provide funds or other payments.

• **Sweepstakes/charity/lottery scam:** Criminals claim to work for legitimate charitable organizations to gain victims' trust. Or they claim their targets have won a foreign lottery or sweep-stake, which they can collect for a "fee."

• **Home repair scam:** Criminals appear in person and charge homeowners in advance for home improvement services that they never provide

Local law enforcement officials say many scams go unreported. Seniors may be less inclined to report fraud because they don't know how, or they may be embarrassed at having been scammed. They might also be concerned that their relatives will lose confidence in their abilities to manage their own financial affairs.

"If you believe you are a target of a scam, or if a criminal gains access to your identity, computer device or bank account, immediately contact your financial institutions to place protections on your accounts, and contact your local law enforcement agency," said Carmel Police Chief Jim Barlow. "Our officers are available 24 hours a day to answer

questions. If you think you might be a victim of a scam, call the Hamilton County Dispatch Center at (317) 773-1282 to have an officer contact you immediately."

Morley says it is important to act quick. The sooner the incident is reported, the better the chances of recovering money. He also encourages people to keep original documentation, emails, faxes, and logs of all communications to aid in a potential investigation.

When reporting a scam to police, it is helpful to include as many of the following details as possible:

- Names of the scammer and/or company
- Dates of contact
- Methods of communication
- Phone numbers, email addresses, mailing addresses, and websites used by the perpetrator and methods of payment
- Where you sent funds, including wire transfers and prepaid cards (provide financial institution names, account names, and account numbers)
- Descriptions of your interactions with the scammer and the instructions you were given

# HSE Board gets proposal to cut more than \$5M in spending

The student count for HSE Schools was down 660 students on Feb. 1, 2021, lowering the total count to 21,339.

The state funds school districts based on the number of students enrolled, so HSE Schools has lost \$3.3 million in financial support with fewer students.

An internal committee has been meeting since December and provided a list of recommendations to the school board last Wednesday.

The total revenue loss is set at roughly \$5 million because HSE lost revenue to lower interest rates and a large reduction in rental fees

due to COVID.

HSE Chief Financial Officer Cecilie Nunn and Human Resource Director Kim Lippe told the board they are “optimistic” no Reduction in Force (RIF) of staff will be necessary. But some staff may need to be moved and transferred to accomplish that goal.

Nunn said the largest chunk of savings comes from adjusting class sizes to levels called for in the most recent operating referendum, kindergarten through grade 6. Those grade levels are currently overstaffed by 33 teaching positions. Resignations and retirements will reduce that number. Plus, the American Rescue Plan recently passed by Congress and signed by

the president will fund programs dealing with pandemic-related learning loss by students. The savings from adjusting class sizes, plus the federal funds, amount to more than \$3.3 million.

Savings of over \$1.3 million will come from freezing incremental pay increases for support staff and school administrators, plus not filling several currently open positions. Several other line items will create savings that total \$5.045 million in the coming school year.

The board is scheduled to vote on the list of cost-saving recommendations at the April 28 session.

# Millers and Tigers split HCC series

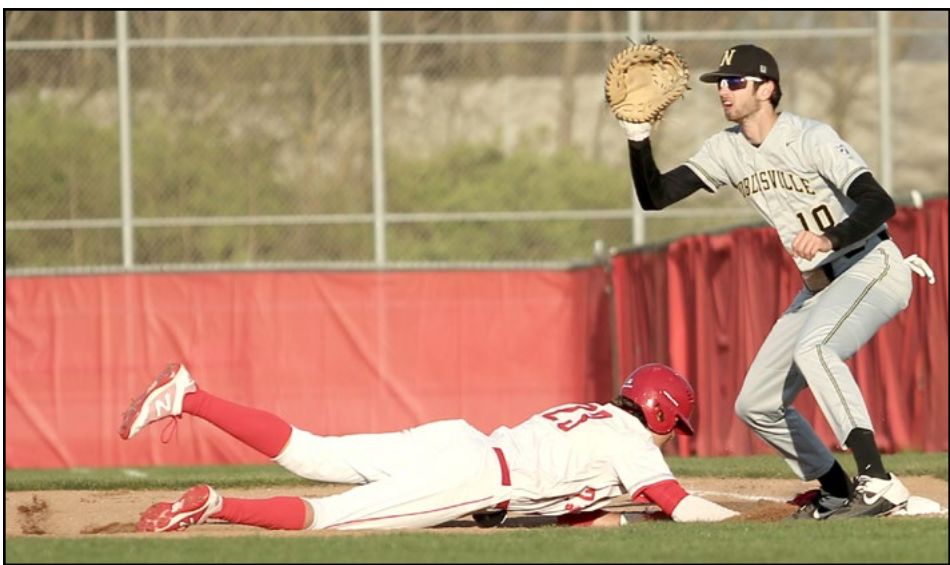
The Noblesville and Fishers baseball teams split a Hoosier Crossroads Conference series last week.
