Help Noblesville grad become LLS Man of the Year

Mike Bragg: "Leukemia & Lymphoma Society saved my life"

More than 126,000 people in the U.S. currently live with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL), a typically slow-moving blood cancer that begins in the bone marrow and then progresses to the blood. CLL is the most common form of leukemia in adults.

Locally, lifelong Noblesville resident and businessman Mike Bragg is bringing attention to the disease and aiding with raising funds to offset treatment costs and assist with research.

Bragg is in the running for Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Man of the Year, a 10-week philanthropic competition for leaders in local communities to raise funds that support LLS programs. Selection is based on funds raised for LLS.

"My fight with leukemia began November 2013," said Bragg.

Bragg is the General Manager for Tom Wood Volkswagen in Noblesville and a 1980 Noblesville High School graduate.

In talking about being diagnosed with CLL, Bragg said. "Many do not experience symptoms for a few years. Over time, the cells grow and spread to other parts of the body, including the lymph nodes, liver, and spleen.'

Bragg's diagnosis came after doctors noticed an elevated white blood cell count.

"I thought I was invincible," he said. "I lived thinking nothing would ever happen to me. Then the doctor told me I had cancer. The diagnosis ripped me apart emotionally.'

Bragg also described the toll chemotherapy took on his body.

"It was horrible for me," he said. "There were times that I just wanted to die; however, through friends, family and faith I was able to fight through it."

After chemotherapy, Bragg remained healthy for about five years.

replaces traditional IV che- against cancer. motherapy. The drug's name is Venetoclax, an oral medication used to treat CLL. Venetoclax is often prescribed with Rituxan which is used to aid the patient's immune system.

"I was very excited not to go through chemotherapy again," Bragg said. "Then I learned the cost of the treatment would be thousands of dollars per pill. I would need several pills a week. My wife and I struggled trying to figure out how we would pay for the medication. We had a son at home and were paying for college for our other children. We were on the verge of selling our home to help offset the cost of the medication. That's when the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (LLS) got medication expense."

Today, largely due to the advancement in treatment, Bragg appears to be leukemia free.

Bragg is now involved with the fundraiser to make sure others have an opabout a new medication that portunity to win the battle

He's raising funds and seeking community donations to help fund the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. All money raised is donated to LLS for use in research and offsetting cost of medication.

"LLS saved my life and I want to give back," he said. "Every dollar helps."

Bragg also is making himself available to mentor others who are diagnosed with CLL.

"Not everyone has a supportive family like I had," he said. "Some don't have friends to support them in the fight against this disease. I just want those people to know I'm here and always willing to support them however I can."

ABC, IBA: Hoosiers want the right to work

Dear Editor:

Over nine years ago, then-Governor Mitch Daniels and the Indiana legislature boldly led Indiana to become the 23rd state to adopt a right-to-work law. Today, more than a third of the states across the es are the backbone to Indiana's thriving country have adopted a right-to-work law.

Indiana's right-to-work law protects every Hoosier's right to affiliate with a union, but it forces no Hoosier to do so. The Associated Builders and Contractors of Indiana and Kentucky and the Indiana Builders Association believe no worker should be required to join a labor union or pay dues to an organization.

Indiana is the nation's premiere business-friendly state, in part because companies and entrepreneurs prefer to create jobs in states that understand the importance of privacy and free choice. This point is proven by Michigan and Kentucky, where, following Indiana's lead, right-to-work laws were adopted so that they could compete to attract business to their states. In fact, Indiana was ranked fifth-best among all states in Chief Exec-

utive Magazine's "Best and Worst States" The states that have the strictest labor and and independent contractors, many famifor Business". In its survey of 513 CEOs, Indiana ranked #1 as the Midwest's Best State for Business.

We know that Hoosier small businesseconomy. Unfortunately, our pro-business laws and regulations are under assault. The Protecting the Right to Organize Act dubbed the PRO Act - was recently introduced in Congress and directly threatens Indiana's right-to-work law. This legislation would negatively impact the Hoosier construction industry at a time of prevalent worker shortages and exacerbate the housing affordability crisis. The PRO Act's proposed codification of a broad joint employer standard and adoption of a rigid test for determining whether a worker is an employee or independent contractor is concerning. The very bedrock of the construction sector and the contracting business model is in danger.

The U.S. labor market is stronger than it has been in decades. Half of the states have unemployment below 6 percent. a home. Without these subcontractors

workforce policies, California and New York, are the states with the highest unemployment rates. The current administration plans to mirror labor laws like those in California, even though Californians are already fighting to repeal their state labor statutes.

Data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that union members accounted for only 8.3 percent of wage and salary workers in Indiana. Nationwide, union members accounted for 10.8 percent of employed wage and salary workers in 2020. One of the many dangerous provisions in the PRO Act has the potential to completely upend business models that allow individuals to work independently. The building industry relies on a network of general contractors, subcontractors, and entrepreneurs that specialize in a range of services. For most builders, there is simply insufficient internal demand to justify hiring individual employees for the countless trade-specific tasks required to complete

ly-owned small businesses would simply cease to be viable operations.

This legislation would also completely end employee privacy laws. Now more than ever, it is obvious that teachers deserve much more compensation than they receive. They deserve better working conditions, and their students deserve better learning conditions.

During the pandemic, so many K-12 teachers have been asked to teach in ways that they didn't have experience with. For example, teaching a class at the same speed that they usually would, with the same amount of students that they usually would, but half of the class is learning virtually, and the other half of the class is socially-distanced and masked-up in the classroom.

I am not against safety precautions such as mandatory masks or social distancing, but so many new things for teachers to be experiencing with their students all at the same time has to be extremely difficult.

Indiana being ranked 39th in a list of per-pupil spending across the United States is not impressive. Studies have shown that student success rises and employment turnover rates for teachers decrease when teachers' wages are raised.

Lastly, increasing teacher compensation will attract more candidates to apply to open teaching positions. During a time when teacher's salaries are so low, very few people choose to pursue the profession. Teachers are people, too!




