

# Help Noblesville grad become LLS Man of the Year

## Mike Bragg: “Leukemia & Lymphoma Society saved my life”

More than 126,000 people in the U.S. currently live with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL), a typically slow-moving blood cancer that begins in the bone marrow and then progresses to the blood. CLL is the most common form of leukemia in adults.

Locally, lifelong Noblesville resident and businessman Mike Bragg is bringing attention to the disease and aiding with raising funds to offset treatment costs and assist with research.

Bragg is in the running for Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Man of the Year, a 10-week philanthropic competition for leaders in local communities to raise funds that support LLS programs. Selection is based on funds raised for LLS.

“My fight with leukemia began November 2013,” said Bragg.

Bragg is the General Manager for Tom Wood Volkswagen in Noblesville and a 1980 Noblesville High

School graduate.

In talking about being diagnosed with CLL, Bragg said. “Many do not experience symptoms for a few years. Over time, the cells grow and spread to other parts of the body, including the lymph nodes, liver, and spleen.”

Bragg’s diagnosis came after doctors noticed an elevated white blood cell count.

“I thought I was invincible,” he said. “I lived thinking nothing would ever happen to me. Then the doctor told me I had cancer. The diagnosis ripped me apart emotionally.”

Bragg also described the toll chemotherapy took on his body.

“It was horrible for me,” he said. “There were times that I just wanted to die; however, through friends, family and faith I was able to fight through it.”

After chemotherapy, Bragg remained healthy for about five years.

In 2019, he began experiencing symptoms. “My white blood cell count increased well above normal,

I lost my appetite and began having pain in my spleen ... I did not want to put my mind and body through chemotherapy again. That’s

when I found out advancements in attacking CLL improved dramatically.”

Bragg’s doctor told him about a new medication that

replaces traditional IV chemotherapy. The drug’s name is Venetoclax, an oral medication used to treat CLL. Venetoclax is often prescribed with Rituxan which is used to aid the patient’s immune system.

“I was very excited not to go through chemotherapy again,” Bragg said. “Then I learned the cost of the treatment would be thousands of dollars per pill. I would need several pills a week. My wife and I struggled trying to figure out how we would pay for the medication. We had a son at home and were paying for college for our other children. We were on the verge of selling our home to help offset the cost of the medication. That’s when the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (LLS) got involved to help with the medication expense.”

Today, largely due to the advancement in treatment, Bragg appears to be leukemia free.

Bragg is now involved with the fundraiser to make sure others have an opportunity to win the battle

against cancer.

He’s raising funds and seeking community donations to help fund the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. All money raised is donated to LLS for use in research and offsetting cost of medication.

“LLS saved my life and I want to give back,” he said. “Every dollar helps.”

Bragg also is making himself available to mentor others who are diagnosed with CLL.

“Not everyone has a supportive family like I had,” he said. “Some don’t have friends to support them in the fight against this disease. I just want those people to know I’m here and always willing to support them however I can.”

# Villas of Fishers District development gets final OK, but with some controversy

Thompson-Thrift developed Fishers District, and it is now seeking approval of a rezoning to allow a new residential development to move forward in that same area. The Fishers City Council gave its approval, but only after complaints from some neighbors in the area were not heard before the vote.

Villas of Fishers Dis-

trict will consist of 250 residential units located on 25.5 acres of land directly south and adjacent to Fishers District.

The vote to approve the rezoning tallied at six yes votes, with no votes from Samantha DeLong and Jocelyn Vare, along with an abstention from councilor David George.

The Fishers Plan Commission had approved the rezone unanimously, but nearby residents complained that a fence had

been added since the Plan Commission public hearing. Councilor Vare asked City Council President Selina Stoller to allow comments from the residents, but Stoller moved on with the council vote.

Residents were able to comment at the end of the meeting following the vote to approve the rezoning, and Mayor Scott Fadness told the residents to contact him and he will work for a solution with the developer.

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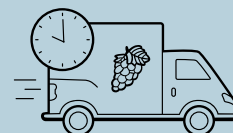
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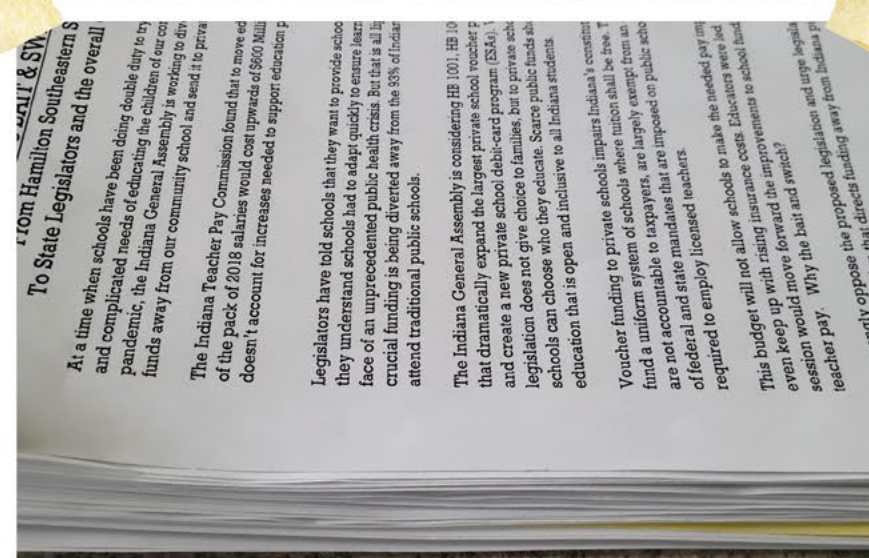

# Saunders: Sen. Baldwin’s support to lessen gun restrictions is “out of touch”

Dear Editor & Fellow Hoosiers,

Indianapolis is still coping and processing its third and most public mass shooting this year, but to add to the heart-break, Senator Scott Baldwin doubled down with an untimely stance touting his support of the failed [House Bill 1369](#) and his authoring of [Senate Resolution 39](#) – supporting legislation that would have lessened gun regulation in Indiana.

One thing that still frustrates me from the General Election campaign last year is that then-candidate Baldwin never really

took the chance to really speak to the issues that were important to the people. In fact, the one opportunity where we both could have participated in a candidate forum together, he consciously chose to hold a fundraiser that evening instead of providing his would-be constituents a chance to question both of us in real time.

Friday, Baldwin decided to let us know what was important to him on the day that the state and the nation learned of the mass shooting at the Indianapolis FedEx Ground Center: His support for looser gun

regulation is more of a priority.

Our community, represented by Senator Baldwin, is approaching the three-year anniversary of the shooting at Noblesville West Middle, and his out-of-touch misstep hours after the tragedy in Indianapolis demonstrates lack of truly responding to the people’s need in the moment. Senator Baldwin is now in a position where he and the other legislators should have serious conversations that actually lead to common sense gun regulations to prevent incidents like what happened in Noblesville in

2018 and what happened in Indianapolis last Thursday night.

Compassionate leadership is what we need right now, not partisan promotion. Hoosiers cherish the Second Amendment, but it should not come before the safety of our community or our lives.

# ABC, IBA: Hoosiers want the right to work

Dear Editor:

Over nine years ago, then-Governor Mitch Daniels and the Indiana legislature boldly led Indiana to become the 23rd state to adopt a right-to-work law. Today, more than a third of the states across the country have adopted a right-to-work law.

Indiana’s right-to-work law protects every Hoosier’s right to affiliate with a union, but it forces no Hoosier to do so. The Associated Builders and Contractors of Indiana and Kentucky and the Indiana Builders Association believe no worker should be required to join a labor union or pay dues to an organization.

Indiana is the nation’s premiere business-friendly state, in part because companies and entrepreneurs prefer to create jobs in states that understand the importance of privacy and free choice. This point is proven by Michigan and Kentucky, where, following Indiana’s lead, right-to-work laws were adopted so that they could compete to attract business to their states. In fact, Indiana was ranked fifth-best among all states in Chief Exec-

utive Magazine’s “Best and Worst States for Business”. In its survey of 513 CEOs, Indiana ranked #1 as the Midwest’s Best State for Business.

We know that Hoosier small businesses are the backbone to Indiana’s thriving economy. Unfortunately, our pro-business laws and regulations are under assault. The Protecting the Right to Organize Act – dubbed the PRO Act – was recently introduced in Congress and directly threatens Indiana’s right-to-work law. This legislation would negatively impact the Hoosier construction industry at a time of prevalent worker shortages and exacerbate the housing affordability crisis. The PRO Act’s proposed codification of a broad joint employer standard and adoption of a rigid test for determining whether a worker is an employee or independent contractor is concerning. The very bedrock of the construction sector and the contracting business model is in danger.

The U.S. labor market is stronger than it has been in decades. Half of the states have unemployment below 6 percent.

The states that have the strictest labor and workforce policies, California and New York, are the states with the highest unemployment rates. The current administration plans to mirror labor laws like those in California, even though Californians are already fighting to repeal their state labor statutes.

Data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that union members accounted for only 8.3 percent of wage and salary workers in Indiana. Nationwide, union members accounted for 10.8 percent of employed wage and salary workers in 2020. One of the many dangerous provisions in the PRO Act has the potential to completely upend business models that allow individuals to work independently. The building industry relies on a network of general contractors, subcontractors, and entrepreneurs that specialize in a range of services. For most builders, there is simply insufficient internal demand to justify hiring individual employees for the countless trade-specific tasks required to complete a home. Without these subcontractors

and independent contractors, many family-owned small businesses would simply cease to be viable operations.

This legislation would also completely end employee privacy laws. Unions would have the ability to force employers to turn over employees’ personal information – including cell phone numbers, emails and home addresses in advance of a union election without the opportunity for employees to provide consent or opt out. The list of anti-business, anti-freedom provisions in the PRO Act is staggeringly long and unequivocally wrong.

On behalf of the 3 million non-unionized Hoosier workers, we oppose any legislation that takes away freedom of employees and small business owners. The Associated Builders and Contractors of Indiana and Kentucky and the Indiana Builders Association will continue to fight for not only the rights of Hoosier builders and contractors throughout Indiana but EVERY worker in the state.

I agree with ISBA Executive Director Terry Spradlin; lawmakers have a chance right now to significantly improve local schools, specifically in terms of teacher compensation. Now more than ever, it is obvious that teachers deserve much more compensation than they receive. They deserve better working conditions, and their students deserve better learning conditions.

During the pandemic, so many K-12 teachers have been asked to teach in ways that they didn’t have experience with. For example, teaching a class at the same speed that they usually would, with the same amount of students that they usually would, but half of the class is learning virtually, and the other half of the class is socially-distanced and masked-up in the classroom.

I am not against safety precautions such as mandatory masks or social distancing, but so many new things for teachers to be experiencing with their students all at the same time has to be extremely difficult.

Indiana being ranked 39th in a list of per-pupil spending across the United States is not impressive. Studies have shown that student success rises and employment turnover rates for teachers decrease when teachers’ wages are raised.

Lastly, increasing teacher compensation will attract more candidates to apply to open teaching positions. During a time when teacher’s salaries are so low, very few people choose to pursue the profession. Teachers are people, too!

# Carmel's Brian Waddell named to Indiana Boys All-Stars team

Carmel's Brian Waddell has been named to the 2021 Indiana Boys All-Star team. Waddell, a 6-foot-7 guard, averaged 15.8 points per game for the Greyhounds, helping them to a Class 4A state championship.

Carmel's Brian Waddell is among the 14 players that have been selected for the 2021 IndyStar Indiana Boys All-Stars, All-Stars game director Mike Broughton announced Monday.

Those chosen to the team will play three games in June -- one exhibition game against the Indiana Junior All-Stars as well as home-and-home contests against the Kentucky All-Stars.

Waddell, a 6-foot-7 guard, was one of the key players for the Greyhounds during their run to the Class 4A state championship, which they won on April 3. Waddell averaged 15.8 points per game during his senior season.

Caleb Furst of Fort Wayne Blackhawk Christian was named winner of the Indiana Mr. Basketball award on Friday. Furst and Waddell will be joined by 12 other players on the 2021 Indiana Boys All-Star team. The remaining players, listed alphabetically, are Shamar Avance of Lawrence North, Brooks Barnhizer of Lafayette Jeff, Jalen Blackmon of Marion, Luke Brown of Blackford, Luke Goode of Homestead, Kooper Jacobi of Silver Creek, Trey Kaufman-Renn of Silver Creek, J.R. Konieczny of South Bend St. Joseph, Blake Sisley of Heritage Hills, Jayden Taylor of Perry Meridian, Pierce Thomas of Brownsburg and Blake Wesley of South Bend Riley.

The coaches for the 2021 All-Stars will be the same staff that was to guide the All-Stars a year ago, as the 2020 All-Star events were canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The head coach will be Ryan Osborn of Carmel. He will be assisted by Mark Detweiler of Delta and Nate Hawkins of Heritage Hills.

The 2021 IndyStar Indiana Miss Basketball, Jayla Smith of Lawrence North, and the rest of Girls All-Star team were announced last month. Fishers' Katie Burton is among the players selected.

The Junior-Senior exhibition game is set for June 9 at Brownsburg High School. The first game against Kentucky will be June 11 at the Owensboro SportsCenter in Owensboro, Ky. The final game against Kentucky will be June 12 at Southport Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. The games in Indianapolis are at Southport because Bankers Life Fieldhouse is unavailable this summer because of another phase of renovations that will be occurring there.

All three dates will be doubleheaders with the IndyStar Indiana Girls All-Stars.

The Indiana Junior All-Stars will play just one game this year -- June 9 against the seniors. There are no Junior All-Star games against Kentucky this year.
