Historic group of Carmel projects total \$335 million

Adding up the costs of the Carmel community's current public building projects, the total is enormously impressive and probably historic.

These local government projects have all been reported previously, but generally one by one from of-



ficials of the various entities undertaking their own building programs, namely Carmel Clay Schools, Clay Township, the City of Carmel and the Carmel Public Library.

These include the first of the school system's \$105 million facilities improvement plan. This year nearly half of that amount will go into high school upgrades (new boilers, roofing, etc.), planetarium improvements, baseball and soccer field renovations and parking expansion. Next year a new \$43 million natatorium has been approved.

The Clay Township administration has a \$65 million Community Impact program underway, which features a new fire department administration building and fire buffs' museum, a Dad's Club fieldhouse, a historical society museum and major improvements in several local parks.

The city recently approved a \$125 million bond issue to finance numerous street improvements and additional roundabouts plus the new water tower feature that will allow huge video displays.

The Carmel Clay Public Library is in the midst of a \$40 million renovation and expansion of the main library and construction of a parking garage.

All told, these building programs have a total cost of about \$335 million. Little to no property tax increase is promised in these massive programs. How do they do it?

It's done by a combination of making use of existing debt retirement rates when current bonds mature, a rapidly increasing tax base, proceeds from existing building funds and, in some cases, refinancing some debt at current lower interest rates.

All the building is certain to bring more change to the public face of the community, as if change was not already almost a daily occurrence in Carmel.

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



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

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AG Rokita, Dr. Box warn of COVID-19 vaccine survey scam

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita and State cine, we encour-Health Commissioner Dr. Kristina Box are warning report with our Hoosiers of a new scam targeting consumers who have received their COVID-19 vaccine.

The Office of the Indiana Attorney General and the Indiana State Department of Health have recently learned that consumers are reportedly receiving unsolicited emails and text messages asking them to complete a survey about the Pfizer, Moderna, or AstraZeneca vaccine. In exchange, consumers are offered a free product, but asked to pay shipping and handling fees. Instead, the scammers bill them and never send the product.

"Hoosiers should keep their guard up, safeguard their personal information, and take steps to avoid becoming victims of a scam," Rokita said. "If you receive an unsolicited message offering money or a reward

related to the COVID-19 vacage you to file a Office's Consumer Protection Division. Our Office relies, in part, on consumer complaints to

conduct investigations into scams and scammers."


Carmel senior Robert Major has been selected as this year's Hamilton County Reporter Wrestler of the Year.

However, the Pacers caught fire once again. Threes from Brogdon and Aaron Holiday, followed by a pair from McConnell, anchored a 16-6 run down the stretch to grab a 34-28 lead after one. The squad

finished the frame 8-of-14 from deep. Two quick buckets from McConnell and Kelan Martin pushed the Blue & Gold's lead to double digits in the second. From there, the squad maintained a comfortable lead for much of the frame. Brissett and Martin fought for rebounds like seasoned veterans. With 6:11 to play, the former Butler star snagged his third offensive board of the frame and tipped in a layup to grab a 53-41 lead.
