Commissioners adopt updated Comprehensive Plan for rural areas of county

The Hamilton County Commissioners adopted the Hamilton County Plan Commission's updated Comprehensive Plan on April 12. The long-range document provides a foundation for all land use, transportation, and environmental policies for the rural townships of Wayne, White River, the northeast corner of Noblesville, and Adams Township.

"Through public input, a real vision emerged for this area," said Corrie Meyer, President and CEO of Innovative Planning, the consultant team that led the Plan Commission through the process. "We're confident the final product is not only strategic and thoughtful; but also provides guidance for landowners and developers regarding what county leaders and residents want to see, and how to grow, build, and invest in the county."

The recommendations of the new Comprehensive Plan focused on:

- (1) Endorsing the agrarian culture and quality of life,
- (2) Balancing current land uses and growth in a sustainable manner,
- (3) Protecting floodplains and natural resources,
- (4) Strategically encouraging economic development in business and agriculture, and
- (5) Managing population growth by increasing clusters of population density.

"They've provided us with a detailed roadmap for the next 10 years," said Mark Heirbrandt, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. "The Plan Commission's due diligence will help county leaders implement what county residents envision and aid in future decision making based on factual data. Plus, it offers the

"Essential workers" to benefit . . . County officials huddle on COVID relief spending

Having more money than you know what to do with is usually not a problem for most folks. But, local government is, in a sense, facing that problem.

With American Rescue Plan funds on the way to Hamilton County, officials must decide where they can spend their \$65.5 million windfall. County commissioners and county council

members met Friday on the matter.

Hamilton County government did not suffer financially to a great extent because of the pandemic. The money is supposed to be spent to compensate local government for losses suffered in the past year.

The first decision by county officials was extra

pay for employees who faced health risks and may have lost out on benefits due to a cautious approach to budget-making last year in the face of the rising health crisis.

Since any bonus pay to "essential" employees must be made by May 27, the

County Health Department sets up new hotline for COVID vaccine cancellations

The Hamilton County Health Department has noticed a sharp increase in the number of people not showing up for their COVID-19 vaccinations.

"We're averaging as many as 50 no-shows a day," said Christian Walker, the health department's Emergency Preparedness Coordinator. "Unfortunately, that puts us in a bad position as we don't want to risk

losing a dose because we opened a vial and don't have an arm to put it in."

As more clinics open, people are finding ways to get their vaccine sooner. Unfortunately, the only way to cancel an appointment is by calling 2-1-1, which can lead to long wait times. As a result,

volunteers for the health department have taken to calling those on the schedule each day to confirm their appointments, but that has proven time consuming.

"We're hoping this hotline will make cancelling an appointment

Learn about redistricting, legislative mapping with League of Women Voters

Learn about legislative mapping and redistricting in a special program presented by the **League of Women Voters of Indiana and All IN 4 Democracy**. People Powered Virtual Day of Action will be presented on Zoom at 7 p.m. on Thursday, April 29. The event is free, but viewers must register in advance.

Participants will receive advocacy toolkits and resources to build engagement in their communities. Panelists from several organizations will discuss re-



districting and why it matters to communities. Julia Vaughn of Common Cause will discuss the efforts of the **Indiana Citizens Redistricting Commission**, which has held virtual presentations all over the state this year to engage citizens in redistricting issues.

To demonstrate how maps could be drawn, Ranjan Rohatgi of the Indiana Citizens Redistricting Commission will conduct a live workshop on drawing maps with **Districtr tool**. Using 2010 census data as practice, people can experiment with ways to draw maps and better understand the process. When the 2020 data is released, they can use that information to draw their own maps.

Redistricting occurs every 10 years following

Khayla Williams: No reason for high cost of hearing aids

Dear Editor:

Let's play a game of word association. What's the first thing you think of when you hear the word dealer? Car dealer? Phone dealer? Drug dealer? What about hearing aid dealers? YES! They exist.

There are people whose JOB is to sell you hearing aids and willingly get you to pay the most expensive price for them. Not only does this show how they only view helping people with hearing losses hear better as a simple transaction, but ALSO their lack of regard for the seriousness of the impact hearing loss can have on a person! This is why you should care about reducing the cost of hearing aids for those who are hard of hearing and deaf.

When getting hearing aids, they present the newer ones as if it is a new iPhone. They tell you all the great things it does and try to persuade you that you absolutely need to get the most expensive hearing aids with the best features. However, not everyone can afford them.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), 70 percent of people who need hearing aids live in low-income countries, and low-income families are more likely to have children who

suffer from hearing loss. In addition, 17 percent of people who need a hearing aid actually have one. This is not surprising considering that the cheapest ones will still cost up to \$1,000 per ear, or \$2,000. It doesn't help that not all insurance covers them and the majority of it has to be paid out of pocket, upfront.

The people who are most affected by hearing loss are the most vulnerable to this exploitation – the elderly and children – yet hearing aid companies and audiologists still choose to make a profit off them. I've had hearing loss all my life and I am just now being able to get hearing aids because my insurance started covering it.

There's literally no reason for hearing aids to be so expensive. It costs more to produce an iPad, yet they are cheaper than the most basic hearing aids. What if your ability to live a functional life was dependent on if you had the most updated, expensive phone? Well, people with hearing loss who can't afford hearing aids have to deal with a similar challenge every day.

This is why we need to work to stop treating it as an industry and more like the life-changing medical technology it is.

Jensen issues statement on 2021 state budget

Editor's note: Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen released the following statement on Thursday after the state budget passed both houses of the state legislature and was signed into law by Governor Eric Holcomb.

"I want to commend our governor along with members of the House and Senate for passing a budget that will fund critical parts of our state and positively impacts our local economy," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "Infrastructure investment has been a priority in Noblesville, and the additional \$900 million infra-

structure fund means we can focus on our local infrastructure projects with the help of our state partners."

Jensen added, "Our K-12 education will get 1.9 billion more dollars with 45 percent of that going directly to teachers' pay. Our schools are key factors for economic development and are major partners with cities on a number of local issues and projects. Overall, this state budget proposal strengthens our education system, funds needed infrastructure projects and ultimately gives local government the ability to move their municipalities forward."

Fast times and exciting races . . .

Carmel hosts first-ever Distance Showcase

CARMEL - With spring sports schedules being adjusted as Indiana slowly climbs out of the COVID-19 pandemic, some schools are putting on some new events.

The Carmel track and field teams are among them, as the Greyhounds hosted the first-ever Carmel Distance Showcase Friday night. The showcase brought elite-level talent schools from all across the state.

Greyhounds boys track coach Ken Browner said the event was modeled after the annual Franklin Central Flashes Showcase, which features its "Miracle Mile" 1600 run as the centerpiece event. But at Carmel, the runners go for a 3200 run, and they produced some outstanding performances.

"I think the kids and the coaches really enjoyed tonight, and it was fun," said Browner.

The highlight was the boys' 3200, with feature three heats. The fast heat turned into a blistering showdown between Angola's Izaiah Steury, the reigning cross country state champion, and Carmel's Kole Mathison. Both runners set a fast pace during the run, then came streaking down the track side by side during the final 100 meters.

In the end, Steury edged out Mathison by 0.05 seconds. But what had everyone buzzing after the race were the times: Steury finished in 8:55.07, Mathison clocked in at 8:55.12. Another runner, Whiteland's Will Jefferson, placed third in 8:56.15. Three runners, all under nine minutes.

Steury called it a "perfect day" to run and made the most of the opportunity.

"We wanted to run fast," said Steury. He said that runners don't have many opportunities to run one single event, so they "had to get out here and do what we were supposed to do. It turned out pretty good."

"It was really cool, really special to race against such great competition here locally in my home track," said Mathison, who broke nine minutes for the first time in the 3200. "It was really just a blessing

to have guys like that that could push me to run a time like that, a PR."

Browner noted that in addition to the three sub-nine minute runners who raced on Friday, there was another elite-level runner, Lucas Guerra of Highland, capable of being in the mix as well.

"Depending on what happens at the state meet and who runs what, it could be a very hot race," said Browner.

In addition to Carmel, runners from Guerin Catholic, Hamilton Southeastern, Noblesville and Westfield were at the showcase. The Millers' Cole Kimmel finished in seventh place to lead his school, with the Shamrocks' Kai Connor taking 11th. Austin Callahan finished 13th for the Golden Eagles and the Royals' Will Maquardt placed 17th.

The girls 3200 race was also fast. Park Tudor's Sophia Kennedy won in 10:25.27, just ahead of runner-up Lily Cridge of Bishop Chatard, who clocked in at 10:26.50.

Carmel's Annie Christie was the top county runner, placing third in a time of 10:33.26.

"I felt pretty good about the race," said Christie. "I think my last 800 could have been a little bit stronger, but other than that I was pretty happy with it."

The Greyhounds' had two runners in the top 10, with Cara Naas placing seventh. Gnister Grant finished 25th for Noblesville and Sophie Porter took 34th for Westfield. Allison Wozniak took 54th for Guerin Catholic.

There was also a 4x800 relay race at the event. The Carmel girls team of Ellie Marsella, Mahalet Zeruesenay, Lily Rose and Abbey Grogan won that race in 9:47.37.
