Westfield Chief of Staff Todd Burtron gains international credential

Todd Burtron, Chief of Staff for the City of Westfield, has received the Credentialed Manager designation from ICMA, the International City/County Management Association. Burtron is one of more than 1,300 local government management professionals currently credentialed through the ICMA Voluntary Credentialing Program and one of five in Indiana.

"Todd's dedication to the City of Westfield is unparalleled," Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said. "His commitment to our more than 200 employees is evident every day and the professionalism he has brought to our operations and community development is one of the reasons our city is among the most desirable in all of Indiana. To receive the ICMA credential, a member must have significant experience as a senior management executive in local government, have earned a degree (preferably in public administration or a related field) and demonstrated a commitment to high standards of integrity and to lifelong learning and professional development.

Burtron began with the Westfield Fire Department in 1996 working his way up to Fire Chief and was ultimately appointed Chief of Staff by Mayor Andy Cook in 2008. Along with the prestigious ICMA accreditation, Burtron holds a Bachelor's Degree in Public Safety, a Master's degree in Management and Leadership and is an alum of the Harvard Kennedy School's Executive Education program holding an Executive Certificate in Public Leadership. Additionally, Burtron helped the city broker its utility sale, implement a fiscal Sustainability Strategy and helped move city employees to a self-funded insurance program.

Help identify where broadband is needed most in Hamilton County

Hamilton County has created a Broadband Task Force, led by the Hamilton County Economic Development Corporation, to explore connectivity issues within the county. It is asking for the public's help in identifying areas where broadband connections are weak or nonexistent.

"The pandemic has shown us just how important it is to have county wide connections to do schoolwork, work from home, or manage a business," said Amy Massillamany, president of the Hamilton County Council and a member of

the Broadband Task Force. "While the majority of our broadband concerns are located in the northern part of the county, this survey will help us identify other pockets where we could use a boost."

The State of Indiana has encouraged counties and regions to use the results to create their own broadband maps with support from Purdue University. Many expect federal and state dollars to be available soon to address the issues.

Residents are encouraged

to fill out the survey at surveymonkey.com/r/HamCo-Broadband. It will be open for three weeks. Hamilton County's school districts will also be sending information home with students about the survey.

Carmel Education Foundation gets \$20K grant

The Carmel Education Foundation (CEF) has been awarded a grant from The Duke Energy Foundation to support the Carmel Clay Schools summer school program for rising second grade students who have had significant disruptions in their learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

This \$20,000 award will provide decodable text resources, which focus on phonic skills to assure students are at the appropriate reading level when they begin school in the fall. Second grade is when students begin to shift from "learning to

read" to "reading to learn," and is a critical time to set the groundwork for future learning. The decodable text resources will be housed in each of the 11 Carmel Clay elementary schools for use beyond the summer school program.

The Duke Energy Foundation asserts that bright futures begin in the classroom and that every child deserves a fair chance at success. Foundation grants are designed to support summer reading loss prevention, an issue that has become even

more prevalent during the pandemic.

"Education at all levels is important, but especially so in the early primary years," said Mark LaBarr, Duke Energy Indiana community relations manager. "We're proud to contribute to these efforts, which will help grow the students into productive workers and community members."

CEF is instrumental in creating partnerships between community partners and Carmel Clay Schools.

"Working with The Duke Energy Foundation to provide essential resources to our students is an opportunity we are grateful to be part of," CEF Executive Director Jennifer Penix said. "Duke Energy has supported CEF through various programs we host to raise funds for teacher grants and student scholarships, and we value their role in furthering our mission to strengthen public education."

Penix will continue to work with the Carmel Clay Schools administrative team to provide information about the summer school program to families.

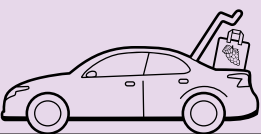

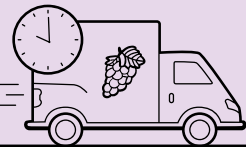

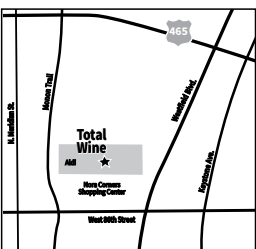

Goodrich's bill encouraging Hoosiers to skill-up heading to Governor Holcomb's desk

A bill to break down barriers for young, low-income workers looking to obtain in-demand job skills could soon become law, according to State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville).

Currently, all money earned in a household is used to determine eligibility for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families benefits. TANF is a program that provides cash assistance and supportive services to assist families with children under age 18, helping them achieve economic self-sufficiency.

If signed into law, [House Enrolled Act 1009](#) would allow a Hoosier who is 24 years old or younger and

resides in a home receiving TANF to earn up to \$15,000 and not impact their family's TANF eligibility. Goodrich said this would incentivize students from low-income families to pursue a college degree or workforce certificate, or participate in a pre-apprenticeship or apprenticeship program.

"Many young Hoosiers choose not to pursue educational opportunities or work-based learning programs because the money they earn could push their families' income eligibility requirements beyond the threshold, jeopardizing

uation."

According to Goodrich, this legislation would also increase the state's Earned Tax Credit to 10 percent, which could put more than \$11 million back into the hands of low-income working families each year.

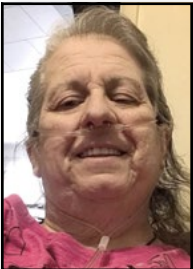
