Facing the worst in the Sandwich Generation ... the "C" word

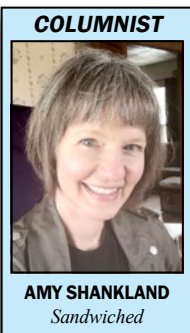

Westfield reporting decrease in major crimes

The City of Westfield on Thursday released the Westfield Police Department 2020 Annual Report. Data reported a decrease in major crimes while seeing an uptick in domestic disturbances.

"Just last week Westfield was named the top suburb in the U.S. and one of the reasons cited was our low crime rate," Mayor Andy Cook said. "The Westfield Police Department Annual Report highlights the people and processes that help us to continue to be a safe community. I am proud of the proactive and professional policing from our officers."

"No one could have predicted the challenges we faced in 2020," Police Chief Joel Rush said. "We did see

an increase in domestic runs that I attribute to the pandemic. Our team rose to the challenges presented by the pandemic and social unrest in the country. Our team adapted and responded to the challenges of 2020. We have a dedicated group of men and women who continue to show they can manage transition and still meet and exceed the demands of one of the fastest growing cities in Indiana."

In 2020, the department transitioned to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS is a criminal reporting system that is designed to capture details on each crime incident. Using this new system, WPD reported a

HSE school board enacts \$5M in budget reductions

The Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board voted unanimously Wednesday night to enact a \$5 million spending reduction plan recommended by administrators.

Chief Financial Offi-

cer Cecile Nunn told the board recent retirements and resignations among the teaching staff, along with funds from the American Recovery Act, translate into no need for a staff reduction-in-force (RIF) in the 2021-2022 school year.

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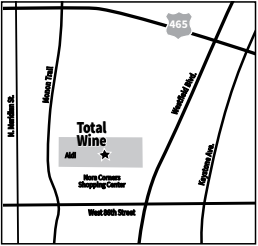
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Noblesville Police Chief John Mann speaks to Lions

United Way awards \$820K in grants to local organizations

United Way of Central Indiana (UWCI) announced Thursday it has awarded unrestricted grants totaling \$1.75 million to human services organizations serving individuals affected by the COVID-19 pandemic in Hamilton, Boone, Hancock, Hendricks and Morgan counties.

Locally, grants amounted to \$820,000.

These grants were made possible by support to UWCI from Lilly Endowment Inc. The grants build on relief efforts in these areas that were funded by a \$3.5 million Lilly Endowment grant announced last year.

With this latest round of unrestricted grants, \$5.25 million in total has been distributed to 90 organizations working in these counties of UWCI's service area.

Workgroups comprising of UWCI community relations staff and county representatives, including staff

of the counties' community foundations, analyzed the needs in each area. Funding recommendations included food, housing, health, and transportation, mental health support for youth, families and seniors, and childcare and child/family safety programs.

Common ground found on sustainability, climate change

I find, like many others, that the start of spring carries with it a fresh energy. This sense of renewal is felt from the flowers blooming to the Little League teams busting out crisp uniforms in anticipation of a new season. On a beautiful day, it's certainly felt by students on college campuses like mine. It's a spirit of optimism and possibility and its exactly what our country needs in Washington.

After a long winter – scratch that – year, our country needs leaders who are ready to do the hard work of building consensus and finding solutions that gets the U.S. back on track. The decisions made by leaders today are the foundation of tomorrow's America. My generation overwhelmingly believes that foundation must include infrastructure investments and low carbon innovation that promote resiliency, efficiency, affordability and energy independence.

Despite rhetoric trying to paint it otherwise clean energy and sustainability is a place of common ground.

A history of misplaced partisan framing has sullied the conversation, but as it stands Republicans and Democrats alike think climate change is a real threat and want to take action. **Seventy-four percent of Americans** support increased government action to boost clean energy development, according to a poll by Citizens for Responsible Energy Solutions. From my time on campaigns to chairing the Butler College Republicans, I know this to be particularly true of young voters.

This is why it's so important for elected officials to move ahead with a bipartisan plan to reinvest in American infrastructure and prep the nation to grow with future opportunities. Thankfully, Congress has already started the process by passing the Energy Act of 2020 last December. It was the nation's first comprehensive energy innovation package in more than a decade. A true bipartisan achievement, the Act will allow for investments in clean energy infrastructure, energy efficiency, renewables, grid modernizations and more.

Senator Mike Braun (R)

also provides a promising example. He's a leading voice on the environment among Republicans, but more importantly he works across the aisle to bring his conservative principles and perspectives into a bipartisan conversation. This approach led to his co-founding the Senate's bipartisan Climate Solutions Caucus and also led to him championing the Growing Climate Solutions Act. Re-introduced this year with support from both Senator Mike Braun and Senator Todd Young, the GCSA supports the free market and will empower more of the agricultural community to adopt carbon capture practices.

After so much uncertainty and hardship over the last year, leaders in Washington must focus their attention on solutions the better Americans quality of life, create jobs and provide a strong foundation for the nation to grow. Smart infrastructure investments can hit all three. Congress should not miss out on this opportunity, nor should it forget the public appetite for an infrastructure that builds a more resilient, productive and low-carbon future.



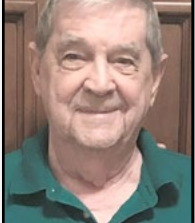

Smith has been a force for the Shamrocks since his freshman season, and continued his improvement into his junior season, averaging 22.0 points, 6.2 assists, 5.4 rebounds and 2.7 steals per game. Smith got much attention in March for his 41-point performance in a sectional semi-final win over Noblesville. He had several Division I offers from schools across the country.

Smith is the latest high-profile Hamilton County basketball player to commit to Purdue. Carmel senior Brian Waddell committed last week, as part of a loaded Boilermakers freshman recruiting class.

Noblesville was led by two new meet records: Rylee Hassan tied the high jump mark of 5 feet, 6 inches, while Hannah Alexander won the discus with a new record of 130 feet, 1 inch.
