



# Construction on new county parking garage will soon be underway in Noblesville

Hamilton County will break ground on a new parking garage at Eighth and Clinton streets in Noblesville at 10 a.m. on Monday, May 10. The new garage will consolidate parking for county employees who currently use several lots around downtown Noblesville.

"Building this parking garage will prevent county employees from having to cross Indiana State Road 32 to get to the government center, which can be dangerous," said Mark Heirbrandt,

president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. "This parking garage will also help us accommodate a burgeoning court system. Hamilton County will soon get another judge which

means more jury members, attorneys, and judges."

Building of the new garage also frees up land on the south side of Conner Street that is currently being used for county parking. The City of Noblesville and J.C. Hart have agreed to purchase the lot from the county for \$4.5 million and plan to develop

a \$47 million mixed-use development with commercial and retail space.

"This is a win-win for everyone involved," Heirbrandt added. "That property sits near the river and is prime for redevelopment. As it is now, that land is not taxable because it is owned by the county. But selling it and putting

it back on the tax rolls will generate tax income for Noblesville."

The five-story garage is expected to cost \$11.5 million. It will have 475 parking spaces. It should be open by February of next year. The public will be able to use the parking garage after 5 p.m. on weekdays and on the weekends.

# Two students en route to prom killed in crash

Two high school students died in a crash last Saturday evening on their way to the Hamilton Heights prom.

The crash happened around 5:15 p.m. on Saturday near 281st Street and Lacy Road.

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Department identified the students who died as Lendon Byram, who was driving, and Kalen Hart, one of the passengers. Two other passengers received non-life-threatening injuries and were treated at St. Vincent's Hospital in Indianapolis.

Hart was a Hamilton Heights High School student. Byram attended Cathedral High School.

Investigators do not believe alcohol or drugs were a factor in the accident.

# HSE school board enacts \$5M in budget reductions

The Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board voted unanimously last Wednesday night to enact a \$5 million spending reduction plan recommended by administrators.

Chief Financial Officer Cecilie Nunn told the board recent retirements and resignations among the teaching staff, along with funds from the American Recovery Act, translate into no need for a staff reduction-in-force (RIF) in the 2021-2022 school year.

Nunn acknowledged that the new state budget just enacted by the legislature will increase funding for public schools in the two-year period beginning July 1, but there are many unknown factors at this time. For example, the state will be funding virtual students at 85 percent, after funding such learners at 100 percent during the pandemic. Also, officials do not know what staffing will be required, because student enrollment numbers are not known for the coming school year, virtual or in-person.

Superintendent Allen Bourff said administrators will come back to the board if there are any updates on how the added state funds may change the spending cuts already enacted.

There is a long list of savings passed by the board, as it was generally laid out at the previous meeting. Savings of \$3.3 million are projected by re-establishing class sizes in grade K-6 consistent with the last referendum, and using federal funds. More than \$401,000 will be saved by freezing incremental pay raises for support staff and administrators. Several open jobs will not be filled, including 16 bus driving positions.

There was some discussion about the elimination of recycle bins and Nunn indicated that was a small line item and could be handled if the board so chooses to keep them.

hard-at-work team, are executing on our Comprehensive Plan created more than 14 years ago. And, it does not appear, in spite of the pandemic, that things are slowing down in Westfield.

We just pulled together our Q1 permits. In the first quarter of 2021, our new home starts are on record pace and we almost doubled our Plan Commission filings from a year ago. These are new projects interested in coming to Westfield. Typically, the first quarter accounts for approximately 20 percent of filings in a given year. If this trend holds for 2021, we could have a banner year – higher than any we have seen in the past. One could say that we are up because we are, hopefully, emerging from a global

# Noblesville Common Council encourages Westfield to move forward with State Road 32

On April 26, at a regularly scheduled Westfield City Council meeting, three members from the Noblesville Common Council spoke in favor of a proposed widening of State Road 32 through downtown Westfield.

Attending the Westfield meeting from Noblesville were council members Darren Peterson, Megan Wiles and Greg O'Connor.

Peterson told Westfield council members, "As members of the Noblesville City Council, we understand the importance and duty of making fiscal decisions for the growth of our growing cities in Hamilton County. We are often faced with decisions that must balance existing restraints, growth, historical significance, financial responsibilities. With 19,000 vehicles driving this two-lane roadway each day, there is

no question State Road 32 through Hamilton County is in dire need of compacity improvement."

In 2018 Westfield, and the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT), announced a major State Road 32 reconstruction through downtown Westfield. The \$15 million project is a 50/50 cost split between the city and the state.

After the initial announcement, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said, "Partnering with the state on this work is a huge win for our city."

The project has recently

been met with resistance. Opponents cite concerns for Westfield's historic district and project costs.

"Currently Noblesville is making significant investments to fix the same capacity problems in our downtown," Peterson said.

Peterson also said INDOT has funded an additional \$35 million project to add travel lanes from East Street in Westfield to River Road in Noblesville.

"Westfield canceling their downtown project

# Help identify where broadband is needed most in Hamilton County

Hamilton County has created a Broadband Task Force, led by the Hamilton County Economic Development Corporation, to explore connectivity issues within the county. It is asking for the public's help in identifying areas where broadband connections are weak or nonexistent.

"The pandemic has shown us just how important it is to have county wide connections to do schoolwork, work from home, or manage a business," said Amy Massillamany, president of the Hamilton County Council and a member of the Broadband Task Force. "While the majority of our broadband concerns are located in the northern part of the county, this survey will help us identify other pockets where we could use a boost."

The State of Indiana has encouraged counties and regions to use the results to create their own broadband maps with support from Purdue University. Many expect federal and state dollars to be available soon to address the issues.

Residents are encouraged to fill out the survey at [surveymonkey.com/r/HamCoBroadband](https://surveymonkey.com/r/HamCoBroadband). It will be open for three weeks. Hamilton County's school districts will also be sending information home with students about the survey.

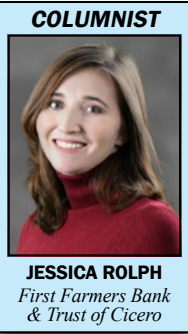
“Hello!” her dad yelled out. “Who’s there?”

116<sup>th</sup> Street to close June 1 for tunnel construction at Nickel Plate Trail

Fishers City Engineering Director Jason Taylor talked about it April 1 in a podcast with me ([tinyurl.com/3va549jr](#)). The closure of 116th Street at the Nickel Plate Trail would start once the school year ends locally. We now have a specific date for the closure – June 1.

The closure of the street in the heart of the downtown Fishers Nickel Plate District

is required to allow the construction of a tunnel for the Nickel Plate Trail at that location. 116th Street will be closed from east of Municipal Drive to west of Maple Street during the construction. The closure is expected to last 60 days. All local business and public parking access will remain open.

The city announced last Friday that 106th Street will be the recommended detour, beginning at Hague Road for eastbound thru traffic

and Lantern Road for the westbound thru traffic.

As of last Friday, there are now lane restrictions in place at that 116th Street location allowing utility relocation construction in anticipation of the June 1 full closure. The outside, westbound lane is closed until Thursday, May 6. Beginning May 6, lane restrictions will be in effect from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily through the June 1 closure.

The tunnel will com-

plete the trail connection through downtown Fishers, joining South Street and North Street, and establishing a full connection from 106th Street to 131st Street. In 2020, paving was completed on the portions of the trail between 131st Street and North Street, and South Street to 106th Street.

The already paved portions of the trail are now open for pedestrian and bicycle access. Motorized vehicles are prohibited.

HSE moves ahead with virtual learning for next school year

Families with students in Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools will have the chance to opt into a virtual learning program for the upcoming school year after the school board voted to approve the recommendation from school administrators in a work session last Tuesday. The vote was 6-1 with Suzanne Thomas voting no, saying she wants more time for

public comment.

The plan calls for HSE teachers to instruct virtually grades K-6, with some type of virtual plan for pre-school. Indiana Online, which has provided summer school virtual learning for HSE Schools, will provide the virtual classes for grades 7-12.

Indiana Online had planned to charge HSE Schools \$2,800 per student, but agreed to lower that fee to \$2,400 per student once state lawmakers went back

to 85 percent funding for virtual students in school year 2021-2022.

Parents can apply for the virtual learning program now through May 14. The school district wants a commitment for the first semester of the coming school year at minimum.

A webinar is scheduled for Wednesday, May 5 to explain the virtual program for grades K-6. Indiana Online will conduct a webinar for grades 7-12 on a date yet to be announced.

Superintendent Allen Bourff is retiring at the end of June and Dr. Yvonne Stokes has been hired to replace him as of July 1. Dr. Bourff told the board, in answer to a question raised by board members, that he had discussed the virtual learning proposal with Dr. Stokes and she is supportive, with one caveat. Stokes is concerned that the 7-12 Indiana Online curriculum might not be as rigorous as HSE’s program.

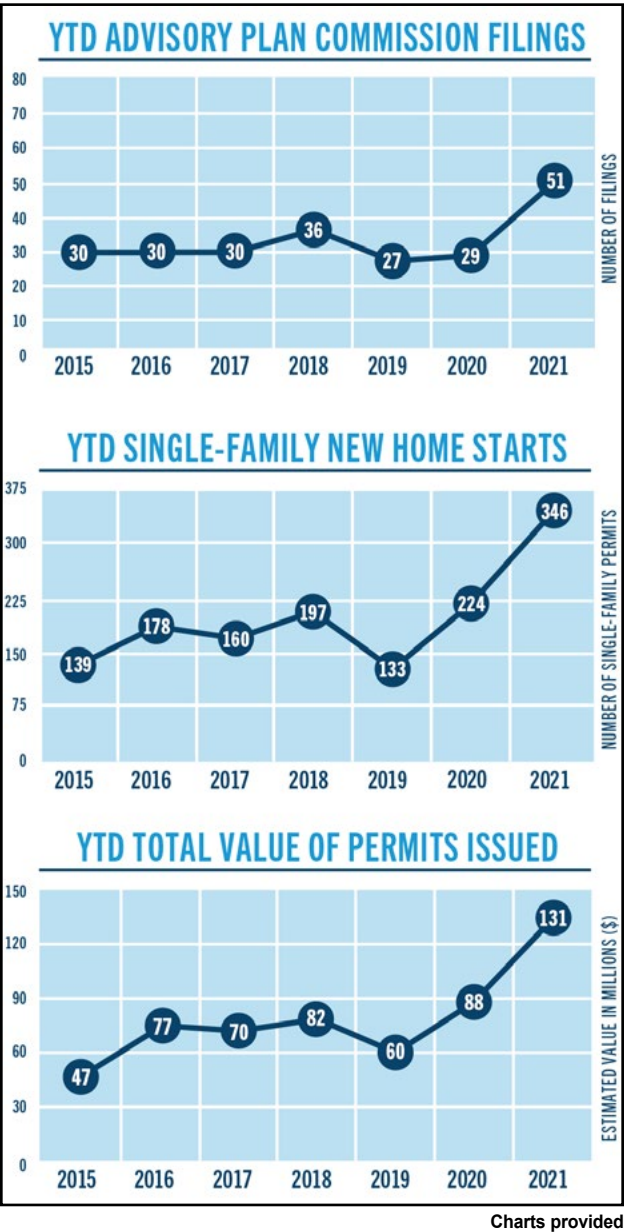
Neumann was selected to fill the opening by a group of Democratic precinct officials in a caucus held on April 25.

# Big fourth inning sends Tigers to Mudsock series win

After the previous two Mudsock baseball games went to extra innings, what would be in the store for the deciding third game?

As it turned out, the game would turn into a dominant performance for Fishers. The Tigers let loose for 10 runs in the fourth inning, and that propelled them to a 15-2, five-inning victory last Saturday at Hamilton Southeastern's Ken Seitz Field. Fishers thus won the series 2-1 and was awarded the Mudsock trophy at the conclusion of the game.

The Tigers started things off with a run in the top of the first inning. Joey Brenzcwski led off with a triple, then Jack Brown hit a sacrifice fly to get him home. The Royals responded with two runs in the bottom of the inning. Hunter Dilts scored the first run, then Landon Riekhof got home on a passed ball.

Fishers then added two runs in both the second and third innings. In the second inning, Gavin Clayton tied the game with a single to score Jack Braun, then Brenzcwski doubled home Clayton to give the Tigers a 3-2 lead. Both of Fishers' third-inning runs were scored by sacrifice fly: JP Preston batted in Matt Bryant and Braun sent home Dom Oliverio.

The Tigers began the fourth inning with back-to-back doubles from Clayton and Carson Dunn. Brenzcwski drew a walk to load the bases, then Jack Brown sent a double into center field to score Clayton, Dunn and Brenzcwski. Jack Brown scored on a passed ball to give Fishers a 9-2 lead.

Braun batted in the next two Tigers runs with a triple, scoring Bryant and Preston. Braun then got home on a passed ball. Dunn finished things off with a three-run home run, also sending Zach Cox and Clayton in to score.

Fishers coach Matthew Cherry said that fourth inning was one of the best offensive innings it has had all season.

"That's the potential I've seen in them all along," said Cherry.

The Royals battled to the end, loading the bases in the bottom of the fourth inning after singles by Noah Wolf and Cole Earlewine, then Hunter Dilts drew a walk.

Fishers' Joey Wilmoth got out of that with a strikeout for the third out. In the fifth inning, HSE's J. Bush drew a walk, then Jason Dettman came in to run for him and got to third. This time, closer Cody Jones got the strikeout to finish the game.

"Southeastern's a great team," said Tigers coach Matthew Cherry. "They compete. They play hard. They're never out of it, they keep fighting back. To be honest, even there at the end, it made me nervous when they get runners on. Even though the lead looked good and looked in control, I've seen them come back before."

Jack Brown totaled four RBIs for the Tigers, while Braun and Dunn both had three. Wilmoth pitched four innings for the win, striking out eight.

EARLIER GAMES

The first two games of the Mudsock baseball series between Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern went to extra innings.

In Game 1 last Thursday at the Royals' Ken Seitz Field, the Tigers and the royals were tied at 2-2 after the regulation seven innings. Fishers would score seven runs in the 10th inning, eventually winning 9-4.

Southeastern got on the board in the third inning when Peyton Riekhof batted in Jason Dettman. Fishers answered right away in the top of the fourth with a solo home run by Preston, but the Royals got the lead back in the bottom of the inning after Hunter Dilts singled home Earlewine.

The Tigers tied the game up again in the fifth inning after Dunn scored on a passed ball. The score would stay at 2-2 until the top of the 10th inning.

The Shamrocks got a run back in the fourth inning when Mahan led off with a home run. The score would stay 3-1 until there was one out in the seventh inning.

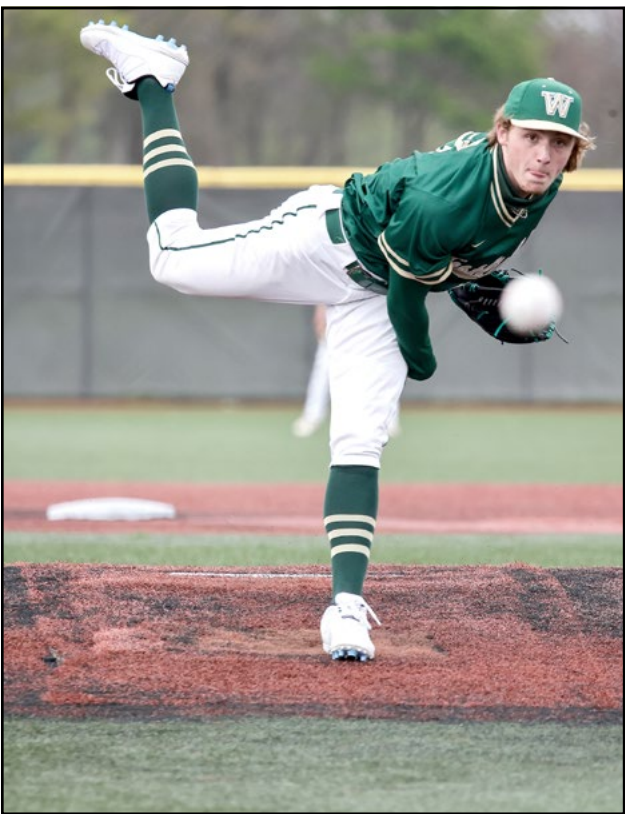

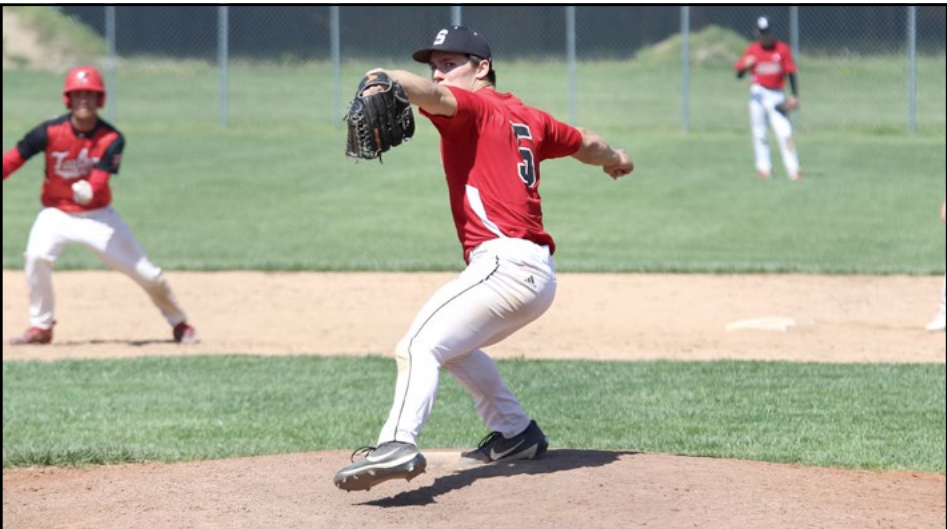
