Cities may follow county lead on hazard duty pay

The Hamilton County Reporter has learned that officials of the county's four cities will consider extra pay for essential municipal employees who worked during the COVID-19 pandemic, thereby risking their own health. This follows county officials' decision to grant extra pay to essential county employees who had to work during the health crisis. Checks of up to \$3,000 will go out on May 21 to several hundred county employees. Cities and towns also received millions of dollars in COVID relief funds from the federal government. Many municipal employees will apparently be paid extra compensation for potentially hazardous duty although amounts may differ from what the county is granting.

COVID didn't stop energy-efficiency improvements at Noblesville Schools

While remote digital learning during the pandemic has challenged parents, teachers and students, it opened the door for energy-efficient improvements on school campuses. With no classrooms to disrupt for multiple months, schools have had a unique opportunity to make updates that students and teachers have been able to benefit from since returning to campus. Duke Energy customers can get rebates on high-efficiency lights and lighting controls, which can reduce energy use by up to 30 percent. Noblesville Schools in Indiana jumped at the opportunity. "We're pleased to have been able to partner with Duke Energy and Facility Solutions Group to upgrade our lighting to LED flat panels in all 10 of our schools, as well as our administration building," said David Mundy, associate superintendent of Noblesville Schools. This project will result in an estimated 4 million kilowatt-hours saved across schools including Hinkle Creek Elementary, Noblesville High School and Noblesville East Middle School.

Hamilton Heights finds ways to cope after couple dies on way to prom

The rural areas of northern Hamilton County make up the kind of place where people know their neighbors. So virtually everyone in the community is stunned at the deaths of students from Hamilton Heights High School in Arcadia and Cathedral High School in Indianapolis. They were on their way to prom at an event center in Kokomo. Junior Lendon Byram of Cathedral and his girlfriend, senior Kalen Hart from Hamilton Heights, died Saturday afternoon in a crash. Investigators believe Byram's car was T-boned by another vehicle near 281st Street and Lacy Road. The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office continued to investigate the crash, but did not believe drugs or alcohol were factors. No criminal charges are expected. Hamilton Heights Superintendent Derek Arrowood told the Reporter's newsgathering partner WISH-TV News 8 on Monday that Hart was active in school activities. She wanted to go to Indiana University to become a teacher. "She was involved in the play. She was involved in the choir. She was a good student,

a really super-hard worker," Arrowood said. "While maybe not everybody knew the students who were involved in the accident, everybody's connected in some way to those students." He said people in the community "care about their families; they care about their neighbors . . . strong faith-based community. It's a great place to live, a wonderful place to raise children." In addition to grief counselors in place since Saturday, Arrowood said faith-based groups were also onsite Monday, and school districts in the neighboring area offered to send additional counselors. "Our heart just grieves for

her family and for her friends and we want to make sure we do our best job to support her family and support her friends here at school, support the on-site school as they deal with tragedy," Arrowood added. "Today at the high school, we've worked really closely with some area therapy-dog providers. So, we've got multiple dogs at the school, therapy dogs, that's been really helpful. That's part of our crisis plan . . . We're sorry of we grieve with you. Our condolences and if there's anything at all we can do to help support you, don't hesitate to ask." On Cathedral High School's website Monday, a

pop-up page showed Byram's photo with the words "Cathedral Mourns the Loss of Lendon Byram." The district also issued this statement: "Lendon Byram had a brilliant, quick mind and was a natural storyteller. He was looking forward to representing Cathedral and the state of Indiana at the National Speech and Debate Tournament this summer. Three weeks ago, he was inducted into Cathedral's National Honor Society. In addition to his family, he leaves behind friends and teachers who loved him very much. Please keep Lendon's family and friends in your prayers, as well as Kalen Hart's family and friends."

City of Carmel encouraging community engagement for Comprehensive Plan update

Fishers Parks moving to Hub & Spoke building

Fishers Parks announced on Tuesday it plans to move its headquarters from the Brooks School Road office to the Hub & Spoke building, located at 8100 E. 106th St. Fishers Parks will hold a grand opening celebration from 2 to 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 22. The new headquarters will also feature a 15,000 square-foot community makerspace called Maker Playground. The Maker Playground will offer hands-on maker programs, STEAM-based programming, day passes, and annual memberships for the public. "We are thrilled to relocate our headquarters to create a space that is open for the community to create, tinker, collaborate," said Fishers Parks director Sarah Sandquist. "We hope this new home along the Nickel Plate Trail will introduce more people

Decisions must be made fairly quickly because the federal guidelines provide that money must be given by May 27 in an effort to get more money into the economy sooner than later.

There is also a \$13-per-hour limit on the pay rate that local government may give in extra wages during the pandemic period.

Many other uses for the money are allowed including reimbursing departments of local government for lost revenue because of the pandemic. Funds can also be granted to non-profit charitable organizations and even small businesses who lost potential revenue.

But, local governments cannot use the money for capital projects. County government was granted \$65.5 million while cities got as much as \$20 million for Carmel, the county's largest city, and \$14 million for Noblesville.

That's not the only benefit to LED updates, which, in facilities like schools, are generally replacing four-foot fluorescent fixtures.

"LED lighting is always improving the quality of light," said Dan Simpson, with Duke Energy's Smart Saver® Business Program. "There's a lot of flexibility when it comes to controlling the light and revising light levels. The products last an extremely long time, so there's a reduction in maintenance costs. And the initial cost of the changeover is pretty attractive as well."

LED updates are easy when it comes to energy upgrades for any type of facility, Simpson said. "It's a pretty painless process."

Simpson supported the project through the **Smart Saver program**, which offers rebates and incentives to business customers pursuing energy-efficient upgrades in lighting, HVAC and commercial food service equipment. Supported by rebates, customers can install high-efficiency lights and lighting controls, which can reduce energy use by up to 30 percent.

It helps Duke Energy on its path to **net-zero carbon emissions** by 2050, and it helps customers on their path toward cost savings.

"I love to tell customers the discount on their bill is going to happen," Simpson said. "It's going to be provided by the energy-efficient devices they install."

The Noblesville Schools project was completed in about a year. The end result: An enhanced environment for teachers and students. The savings created by LED lighting should help offset any natural increases in energy rates, as well, Simpson said.

"The Smart Saver program is a great economic stimulus," he said.

For Noblesville Schools participating in the program, Mundy said, "This is part of our overall energy-savings strategy that allows us to direct more funding to teachers and classrooms while reducing environmental impacts."

to all we offer and expand opportunities for all ages to explore a playground of creativity with the Maker Playground."

Fishers Parks Headquarters

The Fishers Parks Headquarters provides a central collaboration space for the Fishers Parks department, along with spaces for community meetings and programs. The office is open to the public for customer service from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Fishers Maker Playground

The Fishers Parks Maker Playground is a makerspace for all – whether you want to tinker on projects, have a small business idea, or want to learn more about skilled trades. The Maker Playground offers tools and tinkering to create without limits. The Maker Playground features several zones throughout the space including a community workshop, metal shop, 3D printing space, welding, CNC routers, a laser cutter, and more.

Complementing this space are four classrooms for S.T.E.A.M. experiential learning and a large gathering and collaboration space.

- **The Think Tank** – A space dedicated for members to map out the beginning stages of their idea. With a library of materials to read, fidget, and draft, several tables will be available to imagine, collaborate, and create the blueprint of your design.
- **The Wood Shop** – Whether constructing, cutting, or crafting, the wood shop is where members will find any tools needed to create with wood materials, including a table saw, chop saw, CNC router, sander, planer, hand tools, lathe, and more.
- **The Metal Shop** – Located at the back of the Maker Playground is the Metal Shop, where makers can weld, bend, cut, drill, grind, and roll their designs from metal. In this area, you'll find welders, metal lathe, machining center, grinder, bender, roller, metal cutting saw, and more.
- **CNC Row** – Members have access to CNC (computer numerical controlled) routing machines for precision project work. Training and assistance will be available to hone in makers' skillsets.
- **3D Printing** – Members have access to 3D printers to model prototypes, create small projects, and test different materials.
- **The Maker Lab** – Housed along with the Fishers Parks office, guests will find four Maker Lab classrooms to teach, train, and inspire makers to craft their next project.


Membership or day passes are required to access the Fishers Maker Playground. A basic membership starts at \$50 per month for residents, Young Entrepreneur (ages 16-21) memberships start at \$25 per month for residents, and professional memberships starts at \$100 per month for Fishers residents. Annual memberships are available for a 10 percent discount. Members must be 16 years of age or older.

Grand Opening

The grand opening event will welcome members of the community to explore the Fishers Parks and Maker Playground with hands-on demonstrations, entertainment, and more family fun. Attendees will get the chance to experience:

- Maker Lab classrooms take-home projects
- 3D printing with first Makerspace
- Engineering and building projects with Snapology
- Assemble a community mural with High Frequency Arts
- Robotics showcase in Project Alley from the Fishers Robotics Club
- Skateboard at Fishers Parks' mobile skate park
- Watch StudioM craft a modern bench structure outside
- Race through a remote-control car track built by students at Riverside Intermediate
- Music, food trucks, and more

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


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Nine Hoosier student vocalists in Songbook Academy national finals

Rep. Victoria Spartz: I will seek another term in Congress

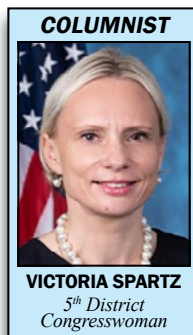

The 2021 Indiana State Fair will have carnival rides, 4-H competitions, the always interesting fair food and free entertainment.

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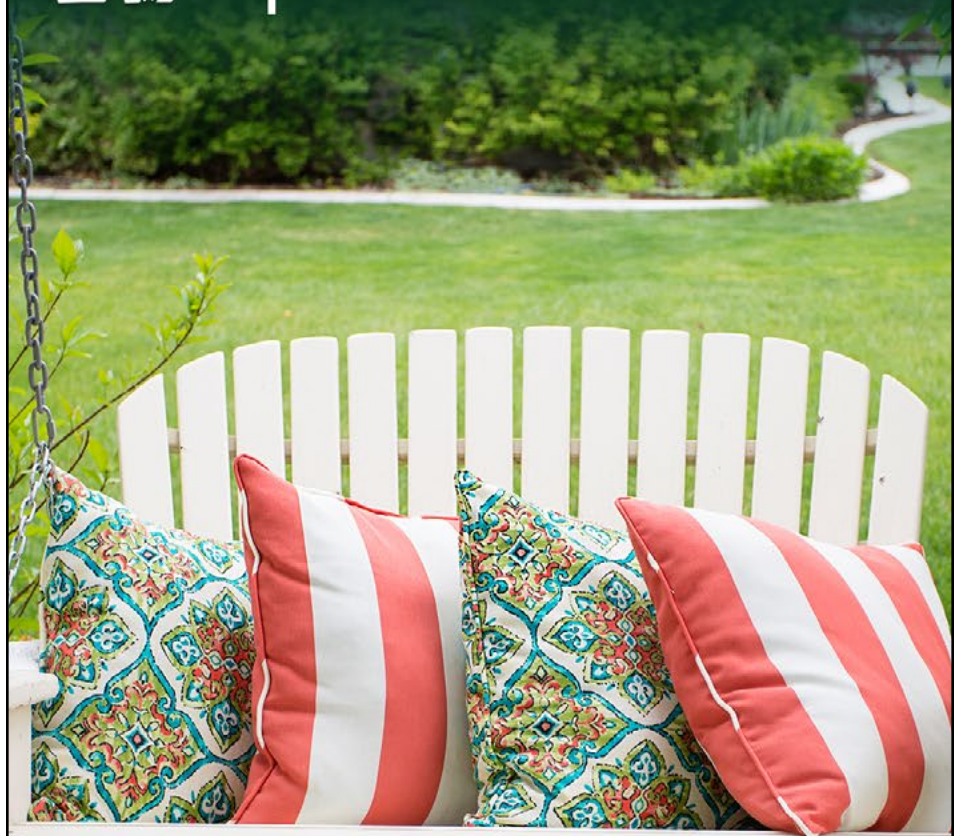

Hamilton County, in cooperation with the cities of Carmel, Fishers, Noblesville and Westfield is an entitlement jurisdiction participating in the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD's) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Hamilton County's CDBG program covers the unincorporated areas of the County and the cities of Carmel, Fishers, Noblesville and Westfield collectively known as the "Urban County" for CDBG purposes.

The CDBG Entitlement Program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons.

For Program Year 2021 Hamilton County will receive \$1,092,260 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). In addition, Hamilton County will be reallocating \$100,085 in unspent CDBG funds from prior years. Total funds to be allocated in the PY 2021 CDBG Action Plan will be \$1,192,345. The Program Year begins October 1, 2021 and ends on September 30, 2022.

In addition, Hamilton County will receive \$1,055,950 in CDBG CV funds from CARES Act funding in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. Projects to be funded with the CDBG CV funds will be part of the amended PY 2019 Annual Action Plan.

Hamilton County estimates at 100% of the program funds will benefit persons of low- and moderate-income. Hamilton County is seeking applications for eligible activities from 501(c)(3) or government entities that have an active registration in the U.S. General Services Administration's System for Award Management (SAM), are able to provide audited financial statements, and comply with all other CDBG regulations. This application process is intended to identify and secure contract(s) with non-profit agencies or government entities who demonstrate experience, commitment and capacity to carry out one or more of the proposed services defined in the following Funding Priorities. Hamilton County is prioritizing the following activities to allocate PY 2021 and CDBG-CV funds:

- Homeless Assistance
- Affordable Housing



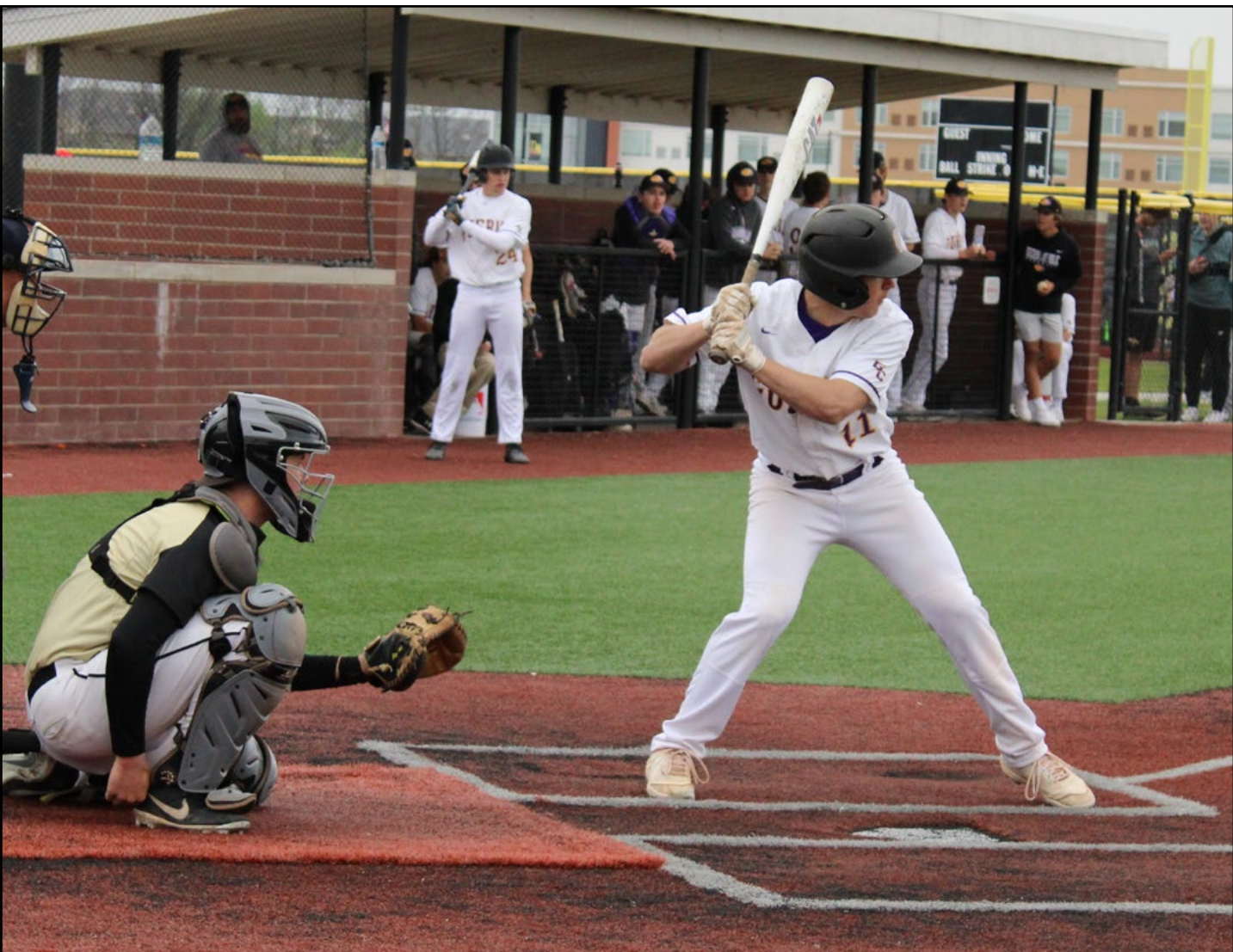

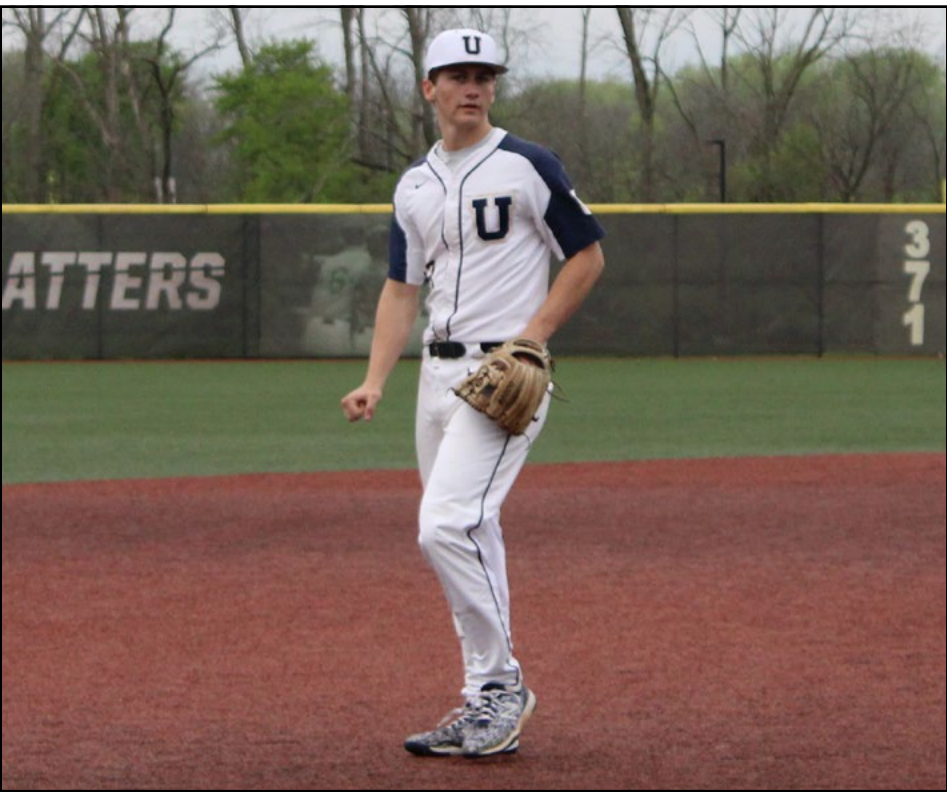
