



Rep. Spartz, Sen. Young hold local law enforcement roundtable in Noblesville

At a roundtable discussion last Wednesday, Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) and Congresswoman Victoria Spartz (R-Ind.) met with Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen, Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush, and other law enforcement officials from throughout the county.

The roundtable was held in anticipation of National Police Appreciation Week, which this year takes place May 9-15. In 1962, President Kennedy proclaimed May 15 as National Peace Officers Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 falls as National Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special recognition to those law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others, and is also dedicated to honoring America's law enforcement community.

During the law enforcement

roundtable, Rep. Spartz, Senator Young, and local law enforcement experts discussed police reform legislation, mental health challenges, and some of the

all-encompassing local initiatives for public safety, such as Noblesville's NobleAct.

"Providing public safety is one of the core government func-

tions," Rep. Spartz said. "I appreciate the critical duties our men and women in uniform perform to protect our communities. It was a productive discussion with

Senator Young, Mayor Jensen, Sheriff Quakenbush, and the department officers on some of the best practices, innovative ideas, and interagency collaboration on the ground."

"Our brave men and women in uniform play a crucial role in keeping our state safe," Sen. Young said. "As we approach National Police Week, I was glad to visit Hamilton County with Congresswoman Spartz, Sheriff Quakenbush, and Noblesville Mayor Jensen to hear from local law enforcement officials working in the area and thank them for their service."

"These conversations are key in keeping the dialogue open between our elected officials and our men and women in law enforcement that are putting in the hard work day and night here in Noblesville," Jensen said. "I'm grateful to have been a part of the dialogue today to cover mental health, substance misuse, proactive training and our NobleAct program."

Blueher named to fill Russell's seat on Cicero Town Council

Behavioral needs assessment will help fight addiction, mental health, issues in Hamilton Co.

The Hamilton County Community Foundation, an affiliate of Central Indiana Community Foundation (CICF), has partnered with Hamilton County and Aspire Indiana Health to conduct a comprehensive assessment of behavioral health needs with the hopes of creating a Community Action Plan that will increase accessibility and affordability for those who need it most.

"Our community already has a wealth of knowledge and behavioral health programs, but we're working in silos," said Jeena Siela, Community Leadership Officer at Hamilton County Community Foundation. "A community action plan will allow us to work more collaboratively and deliberately in an effort to create sustainable change."

Community Solutions has been hired to conduct the needs assessment. Its two-phased approach will start by assessing community needs, resources, and gaps. It

will do that by partnering with state and local public health agencies, health systems, criminal justice, and law enforcement partners, as well as township trustees, paramedicine agencies, and service providers to help determine the county's priority populations and health issues. Community Solutions will also develop a comprehensive listing of behavioral health partners, programs, and services already available in Hamilton County.

"Gathering this information will be critical to informing the second phase of the project," said Lena Hackett, President of Community Solutions. "Development of a Community Action Plan will help the county identify strategies to reverse the negative trends in mental health and substance abuse in Hamilton County and to ensure that all residents are mentally healthy and free of addiction to drugs and alcohol."

Noblesville launches wellbeing coalition during Mental Health Awareness Month

The City of Noblesville, in partnership with Noblesville Schools, has officially launched the Noblesville Wellbeing Coalition. The group is focused on the enhancement of wellness across the spectrum of health including mind, body, and emotional wellness by improving community-wide resources and processes.

The Noblesville Wellbeing Coalition, chaired by Mayor Chris Jensen and Noblesville Schools Superintendent Beth Niedermeyer, has been convening on a regular basis since early March.

"May is Mental Health Awareness Month, and we knew it was a great opportunity to announce that we have been working diligently with our community partners toward a healthier city and we are ready to officially launch our Noblesville Wellbeing



Coalition," Jensen said. "We understand this past year has been a struggle for many people and the focus on wellbeing is more important now than ever before. With the help of our community partners, we are collecting actionable data to allow for us to create lasting changes in the realm of wellness."

A community-wide survey will be launched in July to capture Noblesville-specific data about the state of wellbeing in the city. The survey will serve as a baseline to measure efforts and identify key strengths and weaknesses that currently ex-

ist in the community in relation to overall wellness.

"We are thrilled to be a part of the Noblesville Wellbeing Coalition to make a measurable difference in our community and provide key resources to people in need," Niedermeyer said. "This collaboration is a huge effort and we don't take this task lightly. We understand the need we have in the community to provide a full spectrum of wellness resources and make them accessible across the board, from our students, to staff, to families. We have the right team in place to gather the data we need and work together toward a happier, healthier Noblesville."

The initial 23 members of the Noblesville Wellbeing Coalition have been tasked with soliciting feedback from the entire community. Four action teams have been formed to focus on the Culture of Wellbeing, Easy Rapid Access, Crisis Prevention, and Youth Support & Families.

"This is a true community partnership and we wouldn't be able to accomplish our goals without the cooperation and collaboration of our many close community partners," Jensen said. "Our coalition is made up of leaders from every sector including public safety, school, faith, non-profit, business and healthcare organizations."

Fishers council vacancy filled by appointment

It was supposed to be a caucus, but it became simply an appointment.

Fishers Democratic precinct committeemen in the North Council District were called to fill a city council vacancy when Samantha DeLong resigned her seat due to a planned move out of state.

The caucus vote was planned for April 25, but party officials found that committeemen had not been certified as required by state election law.

In the absence of properly certified committeemen, the county chairwoman, Dayna Colbert, was entitled to appoint a replacement for Ms. DeLong. She appointed Crystal Neumann and forwarded the paperwork to County Clerk Kathy Williams.

Whether there would have been a caucus contest for the seat was not disclosed.

Both DeLong and Neumann are Democrats, and under state law the party which elects a local official is allowed to pick a successor when a vacancy occurs.

Westfield Playhouse reaches for the stars

Main Street Productions, in conjunction with Grand Universe, is currently staging *Silent Sky*, a play about science and love and women's struggles in the year 1900. The play runs through May 16 at Westfield Playhouse, 220 N Union St., Westfield.

Silent Sky gives audiences a chance to not only learn about the history of women in science, but also to get some hands-on experience with modern astronomy.

According to Director Max McCreary, "*Silent Sky* is the story of Henrietta Swan Leavitt and the Harvard observatory 'computers.'"

The term "computer" originally meant "one who computes," or a person performing mathematical calculations.

In his 1950 paper titled, "Computing Machinery and Intelligence," Alan Turing described the "human computer" as someone who is "supposed to be following fixed rules; he has no authority to deviate from them in any detail."

Teams of people, often women from the late nineteenth century onwards, were employed to undertake long and often tedious calculations.

"They were effectively the first recognized female astronomers in the United States," McCreary said.

McCreary told The Reporter *Silent Sky* is at its core a love story.

"It is the love story of Henrietta's relationship with her work, with the night sky, with science, and also with her family and her romantic love interest, Peter Shaw," McCreary said. "It is a heart-warming play about what it means to be curious."

One of the foundational themes in the works of playwright Lauren Gunderson is an emphasis on the stories of women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math).

"This was the first one of her works that got big national recognition because of the story it was telling," McCreary said. "This is about a department of truly brilliant mathematicians without whom Harvard Observatory would never have been able to make the discoveries that it made. We use their data – their research – every single day now in contemporary astronomical sciences. But back in 1900 they were all relegated to a small office building just off the side of the observatory working for \$0.25 an hour just to effectively crunch the numbers for the men who were in the other rooms. Despite being in those circumstances, Henrietta Leavitt's work, her publication – particularly the period luminosity relation – became the document that allowed us to measure the distance to stars. understand of where Earth is in our galaxy and in relations to everything else that's in our night sky."

In addition to the play itself, Grand Universe will have telescopes available outside the playhouse for an introduction to both night and day astronomy.

"The folks at Grand Universe have just been terrific," McCreary said. "They are so excited to be partnering with us because they, like I do, just share a love for the night sky, for space and for astronomical science. They will be bringing a special set of telescopes and experts from their center to Westfield Playhouse for experiences that they've curated after the show, once it's dark enough to actually see the sky. For the matinee performances they are even bringing in a special telescope that was built for us to safely look at the Sun."

No walk-in seating will be available. Reservations will close TWO hours prior to curtain.

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Heights raises over \$1,500 for Ryan White Scholarship Fund

This year’s Ryan White Walk at Hamilton Heights High School raised \$1,577 for the Ryan White Scholarship Fund.

One day a year in the spring, students pay \$1 to miss each period and participate in specialty activities outside such as walking around the track, FFA Farmer Olympics and the Senior/Staff Basketball game among a few. There is music, food, and camaraderie to help raise awareness to continue to preserve Ryan White’s legacy – “*Help me beat the odds and together let’s educate and save the children of tomorrow*” – while raising funds for the scholarship fund created in his memory in 1991.

The Ryan White Scholarship began when money from all over the country was sent to Heights in Ryan’s memory. The school and the AIDS Council created The Ryan White Scholarship to award seniors planning to pursue careers in fields that were important to Ryan – education, health and medical. The Walk began as a community event, but after about a decade, it was taken in-house as a fun and engaging day for students to learn more about Ryan and

his impact on the school and community.

Since the scholarship program’s inception, Hamilton Heights High School has awarded over \$66,000 to 82 students. The Hamilton Heights High School Student Government organization play host to this annual fundraiser.

Ryan White, a 14-year-old boy from Kokomo, was diagnosed with AIDS in December 1984 after contracting the virus from a contaminated hemophilia treatment. He faced intense discrimination from his school and community in a time of fear and misunderstanding about the disease. Ryan and his family moved to Cicero, where he was embraced by Hamilton Heights High School and the community. Ryan lived for over five years after his diagnosis. He lost his battle to the disease in April 1990, one month prior to his high school graduation. His story, which has become an integral part of Hoosier history, still resonates with people around the world and his legacy continues to raise awareness on AIDS.

An Indiana historical marker commemorating his contributions was installed during a special dedication at Hamilton Heights Middle School (formerly the high school) on Aug. 30, 2019.

COVID didn’t stop Noblesville Schools from making improvements to its energy efficiency

While remote digital learning during the pandemic has challenged parents, teachers and students, it opened the door for energy-efficient improvements on school campuses.

With no classrooms to disrupt for multiple months, schools have had a unique opportunity to make updates that students and teachers have been able to benefit from since returning to campus.

Noblesville Schools in Indiana jumped at the opportunity.

“We’re pleased to have been able to partner with Duke Energy and Facility Solutions Group to upgrade our lighting to LED flat panels in all 10 of our schools, as well as our administration building,” said David Mundy,

dy, associate superintendent of Noblesville Schools.

This project will result in an estimated 4 million kilowatt-hours saved across schools including Hinkle Creek Elementary, Noblesville High School and Noblesville East Middle School.

The Noblesville Schools project was completed in about a year. The end result: An enhanced environment for teachers and students. The savings created by LED lighting should help offset any natural increases in energy rates.

For Noblesville Schools participating in the program, Mundy said, “This is part of our overall energy-savings strategy that allows us to direct more funding to teachers and classrooms while reducing environmental impacts.”

Cities may follow county lead on hazard duty pay

The Hamilton County Reporter has learned that officials of the county’s four cities will consider extra pay for essential municipal employees who worked during the COVID-19 pandemic, thereby risking their own health.

This follows county officials’ decision to grant extra pay to essential coun-

ty employees who had to work during the health crisis. Checks of up to \$3,000 will go out on May 21 to several hundred county employees.

Cities and towns also received millions of dollars in COVID relief funds from the federal government. Many municipal employees will apparently be paid extra compensation for potentially hazardous duty although amounts may differ from what the county is granting.

Decisions must be made fairly quickly because the federal guidelines provide that money must be given by May 27 in an effort to get more money into the economy sooner than later.

There is also a \$13-per-hour limit on the pay rate that local government may give in extra wages during the pandemic period.

Many other uses for the money are allowed including reimbursing departments

of local government for lost revenue because of the pandemic. Funds can also be granted to non-profit charitable organizations and even small businesses who lost potential revenue.

But, local governments cannot use the money for capital projects. County government was granted \$65.5 million while cities got as much as \$20 million for Carmel, the county’s largest city, and \$14 million for Noblesville.

to cost \$30,000. The Hamilton County Community Foundation has committed \$20,000 to the project with Aspire Indiana Health and Hamilton County each contributing \$5,000. The goal is to finalize the Community Action Plan by August.

“There are so many behavioral health needs and barriers in our community that people aren’t aware of,” said Barbara Scott, President and Chief Executive Officer at Aspire Indiana Health. “This community-led, community-driven project will provide the framework we need to work efficiently and collaboratively together in mitigating mental health and substance abuse issues in the county.”

State awards over \$2.7 million to help drive Hamilton County road projects

Indiana recently awarded more than \$2.7 million in state matching grants to local communities for road and bridge improvements, according to Hamilton County lawmakers.

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said through the Community Crossings Matching Grant program, 218 Hoosier cities, towns and counties received a combined total of over \$100 million.

"Indiana is on a roll with its continued investment in critical infrastructure, which spurs economic development and job creation," Huston said.

This program was established in 2016 and expanded a year later in 2017 through laws State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) and other local

lawmakers supported.

"Our roads are an integral part of our state's infrastructure, with Hoosiers using them every single day to travel to work, school or visit loved ones," Cook said. "We must take steps to keep up with maintenance, and these dollars can help local communities continue this much-needed investment."

The Indiana Department of Transportation oversees and distributes these grants twice each year, according to State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville).

"When it comes to doing business, having solid roadways and bridges is a vital resource for employers moving to Indiana to establish and expand their operations," Goodrich said.

Hamilton County received \$715,452 for local

road and bridge projects. In addition, the following communities were awarded a grant:

- Westfield: \$1 million
- Atlanta: \$338,643
- Noblesville: \$313,973
- Arcadia: \$191,524
- Sheridan: \$155,297

State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) said communities can use these funds for road and bridge preservation, road reconstruction, intersection improvements, guardrail replacements and signage.

"I've noticed the completion of construction projects in our area has helped shave minutes off my commute," Schaibley said.

Smaller municipalities must provide a 25 percent match in local funds, while large communities must provide a 50 percent match, according to State Rep. Chris

Jeter (R-Carmel).

"Almost all of us know the sinking feeling we get when we hit a pot hole and hope it doesn't give us a flat tire or damage our vehicles," Jeter said.

State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel) said more than \$931 million in total has been awarded throughout the state since 2016.

"This is one of the many strategic investments our state is making in our infrastructure to ensure it stands the test of time and continues to be a valuable resource for both Hoosiers and visitors," Torr said.

FISHERS - The Hoosier Crossroads Conference girls track and field meet took place last Wednesday at Fishers, after a one-day weather delay.

It was worth the wait, as each Hamilton County had reason to be happy after the meet. Hamilton Southeastern won the team championship, while Noblesville's young talent led the Millers to a runner-up finish. Fishers placed fourth and won the most individual events with six. Westfield placed fifth and had several solid finishes.

The Royals totaled 134 points, using their trademark depth to take a lead by the middle of the meet and keep it to the finish. Southeastern scored points in every event, winning three of them.

Halle Hill led the way by taking first in the 1600 run and also placing second in the 800 run. The Royals also finished first in the 4x100 and 4x400 relays. Alyssa Barker ran on both relay teams, joined by Jadyn Durden, Jocelyn Davis and Daniela Rios-Rojas on the 4x100, and by Annice McFarland, Madisyn Etheredge and Regan Wans on the 4x400.

Wans also placed second in the 400 dash. Ally Elsbury was the 100 hurdles runner-up and Makenzie Loftin took second in the 300 hurdles.

"We had a lot of places that we came through with some big PRs," said Royals coach Julie Alano. "Big PRs in the hurdles today. That was huge in both hurdle races with some great times there."

Southeastern now has one more meet to go before it hosts the sectional on May 18. That would be the Ham-

ilton County meet, scheduled for Tuesday at Carmel.

"We'll work on some things, make sure we got everybody situated for the sectional, because the entries are not due until the next day," said Alano. "We might try some different things, make sure we got who we want in for sectionals."

Noblesville scored 112 points to take second place, also winning four events. Kiana Siefert swept the hurdles events, winning both the 100 and 300 hurdles by comfortable margins.

Freshman Hannah Alexander continued her great start to her high school career by winning the discus with a throw of 128 feet, 4 inches. Rylee Hassan won the high jump, while Malina Miller took second to give the Millers a 1-2 sweep.

Zionsville finished third by scoring 88 points, just ahead of fourth-place Fishers' 87 points. The Tigers won the most events at the meet with six, three of them thanks to Ella Scally. The junior easily won the 100 and 200 dashes, and also won the long jump.

"I'm pretty confident about where I'm at," said Scally. "I've been hitting pretty consistent PRs, so hopefully I'll continue to do that."

Fishers began the meet with a win in the 4x800 relay; Anna Runion, Megan Mybeck, Mia Yates and Elizabeth Barrett ran that race for the Tigers. Alison Casey finished first in the pole vault and Grace Carroll was first in the shot put.

Westfield scored 78 points to place fifth. Princess Campbell took second for the Shamrocks in the 100 dash.

HCC boys track and field meet

Millers, HSE, Fishers get multiple wins

ZIONSVILLE - The Hoosier Crossroads Conference boys track and field meet took place last Friday night at Zionsville.

The HCC's four Hamilton County teams all made an impact at the meet. Hamilton Southeastern had the highest team finish by taking third, with Fishers and Noblesville joining the Royals in winning multiple events and Westfield having strong performances as well.

Southeastern scored 89 points and picked up two event victories. Gage Pratt won the 200 dash in a new conference meet record time of 21.44 seconds. Pratt's time was six-tenths of a second faster than the IHSAA state standard of 22.04, which is significant since the sectional is only two weeks away.

Another athlete looking to peak as the tournament approaches is the Royals' Xan Cluff. He won the pole vault event with a best effort of 13 feet, 6 inches, doing so in windy conditions.

"I think I vaulted pretty well with the wind going," said Cluff. "It was a weird crosswind, at 20 mph, really on and off."

Still, Cluff managed. He said during windy conditions, many vaulters do is "jump in from a shorter step" so that

the wind doesn't affect them throughout the entire run.

The Tigers scored 74 points and had two event wins as well. The 4x800 relay team of Jonathon Roth, Alec Foster, Ben Greiwe and Keefer Soehngen won that event in a time of 8:00.69. Soehngen later won the 400 dash in 49.94 seconds, taking the race by 1.39 seconds over second place.

Noblesville placed fifth with 73 points, but had three

individual victories. Mac Smith took the 100 dash and also had a personal achievement: He broke 11 seconds for the first time, finishing the race in 10.98 seconds. Afterwards, Smith said he was "very ecstatic" about reaching that goal.

"I just had to focus on holding that drive phase, really pumping the arms to the finish line," said Smith. "It was tough competition from Brownsburg, which really pushed me, so

that was great."

The Millers' distance runners also stepped up. Andrew Anderson won the 800 run in a time of 1:55.56, and Cole Kimmel placed first in the 3200 run at 9:31.10.

Westfield finished third in three events: Kai Connor in the 1600 run, Jonathan Frey in the pole vault and the 4x100 relay team of Jayden Bernavil, Dylan Walker, Frey and Carson Voorhis.

Brownsburg won the team championship by scoring 128 points, with Zionsville the runner-up with 101 points.

Hoosier Conference track and field meet

Maria Mitchell sets new 3200 record

Hamilton Heights’ Maria Mitchell was truly a marathon woman last Friday night when the Huskies track and field team competed at the Hoosier Conference meet at West Lafayette’s Staley Field.

It was worth it, however, as Mitchell won three events and helped the Heights girls team to a second-place finish. The Huskies scored 103 points, while host West Lafayette won the meet with 124.5 points.

Mitchell began the meet by joining Morgan Guthrie, Teegan Madara and Allyson Dinwiddie for a second-place result in the 4x800 relay. Mitchell then won the 1600 run, came back to take first in the 800

run, then cruised to victory in the 3200 run, in a new conference and school record time of 10:53.97.

Taylor Standridge finished second in the pole vault, with the 4x400 relay team of Camryn Runner, Kelsey Smith, Victoria Lopez and Morgan Guthrie placing second as well.

The Heights boys team tied for fourth place, scoring 63 points. Nate Jozsa placed second in the 100 dash and joined Lukas Knepper, Trey Ehman and Daniel Collier on the second-place 4x100 relay team.

Huskies clinch Hoosier Conference East Division championship

Hamilton Heights baseball coach Ryan VanOeveren has a simple goal for his team.

“Every day that we show up here, our goal is to be better than we were the day before,” said VanOeveren.

The Huskies have been achieving that goal throughout the season. After an 0-6 start to their campaign, Heights has not lost a game. The Huskies have won 11 in a row, including a 16-0, five-inning victory last Thursday over Northwestern in a rainy home game.

“I’m proud of the way they played the entire season, even when we started slow,” said VanOeveren.

Heights’ win over the Tigers is significant because with the victory, the Huskies won the Hoosier Conference East Division championship. Heights finished division play with a 7-1 record, the same as Western, but the Huskies get first place on the tie-breaker. They will play at Lafayette Central Catholic, the West Division champion, on Friday for the conference championship.

“Even in the off-season, they had a great attitude, good work ethic,” said VanOeveren. “It’s starting to kind of come together right now. Even when we were getting spanked early in the season, they had a great attitude. I knew we still had a chance. I didn’t know if we would get here, but we’re here now and we’re excited.”

Heights lost its first conference game of the season to Western 11-10, and that was the game that dropped it to 0-6. But the Huskies rebounded in their next game, turning the tables on the Panthers to win 1-0. They haven’t lost since.

“I think we hit a rhythm in Game 2 of the conference when we won our first conference game here at home,” said VanOeveren. “We hit a confidence in each other at that moment and we haven’t looked back.”

Against Northwestern, Heights got off to a 3-0 lead in the first inning. Sam Allen scored the first run on a wild pitch, then the Huskies hit back-to-back sacrifice flies for the next two runs. Nate Hulen sent Jared Michael home, then Drew VanOeveren scored Erik Malott.

Isaac Tuma scored in the third inning on Dean Mason’s RBI groundout, giving Heights a 4-0 lead. The Huskies then added 12 runs in the fourth inning. Brayden Elkin got on base with a double, then was sent home on Harrison Hochstedler’s RBI groundout.

Erik Malott cracked a two-RBI double, then Drew VanOeveren smacked a triple to add two runs. VanOeveren later scored on a wild pitch. Hochstedler batted in two more runs on a center field single, Elkin scored on Allen’s sacrifice fly, Malott batted in one more run and Hulen singled home two runs.

Tuma came in as a courtesy runner three times during the fourth inning, and scored all three times, giving him four runs for the game. Malott, Hulen, VanOeveren and Hochstedler all drove in three runs, while Michael scored three times.

Lucas Letsinger pitched all five innings, striking out 10 against one hit and two walks.

Heights earned a Hoosier Conference sweep of Lewis Cass to begin last week.

Drew VanOeveren pitched a no-hitter for the Huskies in the first game last Tuesday, and Height took care of business at the plate to score a 10-0, five inning win.

VanOeveren pitched 11 strikeouts and allowed only three walks in the game. He also helped out on offense as well, leading off the second inning with a single and scoring Heights’ first run of the game.

Elkin scored the second run; both he and VanOeveren went home on Dean Mason’s right field single. The Huskies then added five runs in the fourth inning and three more in the fifth. Mason and Hochstedler both batted in three runs, Elkin scored three times and Allen was 3-for-4.

Heights completed the sweep last Wednesday, winning 5-2 at the Kings’ field. The Huskies got on the board in the third inning when Guy Griffey scored on Jared Michael’s RBI groundout. In the fourth inning, Dean Mason got on base with a double, then later got home on an error.
