Transportation (INDOT). On Monday, Council President Mike Johns introduced a proposed ordinance that would terminate the interlocal agreement that outlines funding responsibilities between Westfield and INDOT for the project.

Johns wants to know why federal funding has been removed from the project, and he also wants answers on how potential cost overruns will be handled between Westfield and INDOT.

"Introducing this ordias a threat," Johns said. "In my opinion, we do not in fact have an agreement. I believe the agreement that was approved by the previous city council in October 2018 was in fact breached by INDOT in November 2020 when it arbitrarily removed the federal partici-

Hamilton County tax rate drops

Property taxes remain among lowest in Indiana

Property taxes for residents in the State of Indiana were due Monday. The good news for Hamilton County residents is that they will see their county tax rate decrease this year.

"The county's tax rate has either decreased or remained stable since 2014," said Ken Alexander, a member of the Hamilton County Council, which has the exclusive power to fix the tax rate and impose the tax you'll see a higher tax bill," said levy. "That's not by accident, but rather by design."

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





The Guerin Catholic girls tennis team last won a Circle City Conference championship three years ago, when the Golden Eagles' senior players were freshmen.

Those seniors wanted the conference title back, and they got it back on Monday. Guerin Catholic clinched an undefeated conference title that afternoon by beating Bishop Chatard. The Golden Eagles finished conference play with a 5-0 dual meet record.

"I'm really excited. I think it's great that we were able to come together and really just work hard to win the championship," said Ellen Gardner, Guerin's No. 1 singles player.

"They've played really, really well during the conference competitions," said GC coach Becky Ragsdale. "They've stepped in and played and cheered for everyone. They've done great."

The Golden Eagles had to play several tough teams in order to win the title. That includes teams that are currently ranked in this week's Indiana High School Tennis Coaches Association poll, such as No. 25 Brebeuf Jesuit and No. 29 Heritage Christian. But those wins have gotten Guerin Catholic noticed: The Golden Eagles are in this week's poll at No. 23.

Guerin Catholic has played other ranked teams as well, such as No. 13 Cathedral, No. 14 Plainfield and No. 30 Zionsville. Still, the Golden Eagles compiled a 10-4 record for the season after their Monday victory.

"I think they've played up to the level of their competition," said Ragsdale. "Every match, they've improved. We haven't had a lot of days of practice to work on things we really need to practice on, but I think for the most part, our girls have played very, very well, so I'm proud of them."

In addition to its on-court success, Guerin Catholic has been making a difference outside of tennis as well. The Golden Eagles have done service projects during the year, including its Serve to Serve Tournament, which wound up


