

Making sense of property tax assessments

Property assessment and its effect on taxation is a somewhat complicated subject for many folks, but I will give you my understanding of it.

Thousands Iamilton County res idents and business owners received reassessment notices last

week notifying them of changes in the taxable valuation of their property. Most properties have had assessments increased and there have been more increases on structures than land this year.

The increases are based on the recent sales of comparable properties in the immediate area of a subject home or property. The real estate market is "hot" in Hamilton County, and assessments reflect this.

Countywide, the increase in the total gross taxable valuation (the tax base)




