



Noblesville initiates diversity, equity and inclusion discussion

Last Thursday, Noblesville Schools conducted the first of four scheduled meetings that discussed how diversity, equity and inclusion is addressed in the classroom.

Noblesville Schools Superintendent Dr. Beth Niedermeyer opened the meeting discussing why the district is involved with diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives, how the district defines those terms in Noblesville Schools, and what the district is doing and not doing in these areas.

“We created this opportunity for our public to hear about what’s happening in OUR schools and to share their questions and input,” Neidermeyer said. “Noblesville Schools respects the role of parents and believe it is their job to teach their children their family’s personal, political, spiritual and social values. The role of the district is to ensure we meet the academic needs of students,

prepare students for future success, and serve all of our 10,600 students. Noblesville Schools does not promote political groups or agendas.”

Following Dr. Niedermeyer’s comments, the nearly 140 people in attendance were invited to participate in breakout groups and given the opportunity to submit questions and receive feedback.

“We’ve had over 500 people register and have filled all four sessions we are offering through the end of the school year,” said Marnie Cooke, Director of Marketing and Communication for Noblesville Schools. “We are no longer accepting registrations at this time. After sessions are complete, we will be making a video of Dr. Niedermeyer’s presentation available to those who were unable to attend in person and inviting their questions and feedback.”

Cooke said all questions posed at each of the four meetings will be compiled and answered on the district website this summer.

County tax rate drops

Property taxes were due May 10. The good news for Hamilton County residents is that they will see their county tax rate decrease this year.

“The county’s tax rate has either decreased or remained stable since 2014,” said County Councilor Ken Alexander. “That’s not by accident, but rather by design.”

Residents should not confuse the tax rate with their tax amount however.

“If property assessments go up, you’ll see a higher tax bill,” said Mike Reuter,

the county’s financial consultant. “But if your property assessment has gone up, that means the value of your property has increased.”

Hamilton County maintains one of the lowest tax rates in the state, and yet one of the strongest bond ratings.

“That’s due in part to a strong tax base as well as conservative fiscal management,” said County Councilor Fred Glynn.

“The county has been very deliberate about structuring its debt and managing the tax rate to avoid increases.”

Noblesville to consider wheel tax, excise surcharge

At last Tuesday’s Noblesville Common Council meeting, Deputy Mayor Matt Light introduced two proposed ordinances that will increase vehicle registration fees in the City of Noblesville.

Light presented to the council a proposal that would implement a Motor Vehicle Wheel Tax and an Excise Surcharge for all vehicles registered within the city limits.

Light said the taxes are the first significant financial

steps the council would take regarding the funding of the Pleasant Street Project.

The Pleasant Street Project is expected to exceed \$113.5 million in cost and serve as a bypass around downtown Noblesville, with an expected result of a 24 percent reduction in traffic on State Road 32 through the downtown area.

Light said the Pleasant Street Project is Mayor Jensen’s

number one road infrastructure priority, and the passing of the fees are critical in terms of moving the financial funding strategies forward.

“We’ve looked at a

Westfield City Councilor Mike Johns: “INDOT breached SR 32 project contract”

Westfield City Council members remain at odds regarding a project that would widen State Road 32 through the downtown area.

The project is estimated at \$15 million to be split 50/50 by Westfield and the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT).

On May 10, Council President Mike Johns introduced a proposed ordinance that would terminate the interlocal agreement that outlines funding responsibilities between Westfield and INDOT for the project.

Johns wants to know why federal funding has been removed from the project, and he also wants answers on how potential cost overruns will be handled between Westfield and INDOT.

“Introducing this ordinance should not be seen as a threat,” Johns said. “In my opinion, we do not in fact have an agreement. I believe the agreement that was approved by the previous city council in October 2018 was in fact breached by INDOT in November 2020 when it arbitrarily removed the federal participation and federal funding from the agreement.”

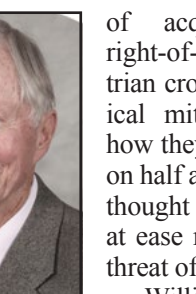
Johns continued, “I’ve asked our attorney to review this document. I also note that I asked the administration to remove the pedestrian bridge from the agreement, and that

should cover some additional cost. All of these issues are significant changes to the agreement, and is the reason I believe, at the very least, the agreement needs to be amended to take these changes into consideration.”

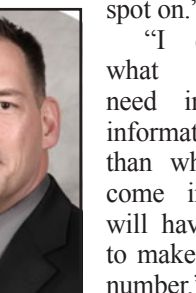
Following Johns’ statements, council members Jake Gilbert and Scott Willis commented.

Gilbert said he does see the proposed ordinance as being a threat and encouraged other councilors to vote it down if it would appear at an upcoming council next meeting.

“I respectfully disagree with Councilor Johns. I believe INDOT has went above and beyond,” Gilbert said. “I certainly have always been in support of this project, but I absolutely welcomed the questions about costs in the wake of the [State Road] 37 overrun . . . I thought that was good governance by the council to ask certain questions. I was never afraid of that scrutiny nor alarmed by those questions, but I felt like INDOT has stepped up to the plate and talked about what they will cover in terms

of acquisition of right-of-way, pedestrian crossing, historical mitigation, and how they will chip in on half any overrun. I thought they put me at ease regarding the threat of an overrun.”

Willis agreed with Gilbert. “I think he is spot on.”

“I don’t know what else we need in terms of information other than when the bids come in [and] we will have a decision to make on that final number,” Willis said. “There is a process that plays out that we follow. I think it is appropriate for us to be concerned because that final number hasn’t been disclosed. I feel very comfortable with the data they shared around their confidence and where we are at currently around the budget that it is going to hit the mark and possibly come in below what we’ve budgeted.”

Willis continued, “This is the third time it’s popped on our agenda. I feel like in the spirit of transparency, why aren’t we communicating clear with the community in what we want with this? When are we going to vote on this? How long are

GOAT Restaurant & Tavern files petition against City of Carmel, Carmel Board of Zoning Appeals

Carmel residents and business owners Kevin and Megan Paul have filed a petition with the Hamilton County Superior Court requesting the court reverse a recent decision by the Carmel Board of Zoning Appeals to deny The GOAT Restaurant & Tavern a use variance to permit it to operate in its current location.

“All we want is to operate our family’s business under the same rules as everyone else in Midtown Plaza, including our neighboring restaurants and taverns,” said Kevin Paul. “Legal action is the last thing we prefer, but until this is resolved, our doors are closed and nearly 30 people are wondering how they will support themselves and their families.”

Prior to pursuing plans for The GOAT, Paul worked with city representatives regarding necessary zoning variances. City officials told Paul there were no problems with its applications, and that zoning should be approved without difficulty. In June 2019, the City Council passed an Ordinance granting Paul a three-way alcoholic beverage permit to operate at the location.

Prior to the Carmel BZA’s April meeting, the city’s planning department provided a favorable recommendation for the zoning variance.

Paul hopes the matter can be addressed quickly and prefers to avoid an ongoing battle with the city.

“Carmel is our forever home. It’s where we raise our kids and dedicate our lives’ passions,” Paul said. “We love this community and are proud to be part of its heartbeat.”

Boot brush station unveiled as part of county’s first-ever Invasive Species Awareness Week

A local group is working to make invasive species management as easy as a walk in the park.

The Hamilton County Invasives Partnership (HIP) launched the first of what will be dozens of boot brush stations across the county. The stations include educational signage and an easy-to-use boot brush that is intended for use as you enter and exit walking paths on local trails.

The Hamilton County Invasives Partnership is working to install boot brush stations at trailheads throughout the county where trail users can learn about invasive species and wipe their boots before entering the trail and at the end of their

walk. This action to limit the spread of invasive species can keep quality natural areas invasive-free and limit introduction of new invasive species between parks.

The boot brush launch was held in celebration of the first ever Hamilton County Invasive Species Awareness Week to be held May 15 to 22. The awareness week will include “Weed Wrangle” volunteer invasive species workdays, an educational webinar at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, May 18 and a variety of educational resources available on HIP social media channels.

Growing our local workforce: The Hamilton County Career Center

This month's Hamilton County Council meeting was longer than most. The agenda was mostly filled with common items I've written about before, but we did feature the introduction of a passion project of mine and others.

Hamilton County has many attractive attributes to businesses wishing to expand or relocate: Exemplary schools, professional and dedicated public safety personnel, a healthy economy. But what we don't have is a trained workforce for the jobs that are open. As Bob DuBois from the Noblesville Chamber said, "The real struggle of our community growth is meeting workforce demands."

In my professional career, I have witnessed these concerns firsthand. I firmly believe how we respond to workforce challenges will be the catalyst to our sustained success as a county.

Working with a broad, county-wide coalition that includes every school district and chamber of commerce, Ivy Tech and Invest Hamilton County – which is our county's Economic Development Corporation – we are launching an initiative to provide Career and Technical Education (CTE) with the goal of developing pathways for HamCo students that offer successful and sustainable careers. This is not an alternative path to college; it is about allowing students the opportunity to experience and see careers that they may wish to pursue.

Currently, about 2 percent of high school students in Hamilton County receive some CTE at their schools. Of that group, more than 300 students travel outside of the county to get specific technical training that they cannot find in their own school. That training comes at a hefty price with our schools projecting to spend more than \$5 million over the next four years. By comparison, the launch of a Hamilton County-focused CTE program will cost less than \$800,000 over the next 2.5 years.

We are missing a huge opportunity by not providing this kind of training in our own backyard. Closer proximity of these programs will help drive additional participation by interested students, keep our school dollars closer to home, and expand offerings to meet the demands unique to Hamilton County. Our goal is to engage more than 10 percent of our students in CTE when the program is initiated and then seek to grow.

What kinds of programs need to be served? Our partnership with the chambers can provide consistent data to the schools to determine

business needs and in-demand occupations such as ag science, construction management, hospitality, energy, biotechnology, Information Systems and others. The strategic partnership with Ivy Tech is

a game changer as it allows even greater access to CTE opportunities. Further, by working with the chambers and local businesses, we can begin to provide internships and co-op programs to allow students to get real world experience as they contemplate their futures.

This is the first step in a multi-step approach and Hamilton County Council's seed money will fund the Career Center's coordinator position to lead these efforts. We are not talking about a bricks and mortar investment – we are talking about investing in human capital who will help define the vision, work with the school districts and Ivy Tech, support development of curriculum and align resources to make this vision a reality.

In addition to training an attractive workforce pool to prospective employers, models show that our Career Center will be self-funded after only two years, thereby becoming a sustainable educational program that meets needs currently not met throughout our county.

I was so excited to help bring this project forward. I have worked and supported the construction industry for my entire career and have participated on industry educational boards that work to inform students of the opportunities in this Industry. I see firsthand the demands and that is only one industry in need. We have many and to help realize this vision is truly a satisfying step.

This collaboration is a transformational project for Hamilton County that will support our growing business needs and provide a pathway to professional and economic success for our young people. This will be back on the Council agenda next month and it is my hope that we commit to that partnership. As cited by several speakers, this project is overdue, and took the right, collaborative, forward-looking leadership to get it done. The time is now.

New state program aims to help people with mental health challenges improve their lives

Governor Eric Holcomb recently signed into law House Enrolled Act 1118, which aims to facilitate the sharing of mental health safety plans with first responders to ensure the safe transition of patients back into a community.

Former judge and current Hamilton County Councilor Steve Nation collaborated with local lawmakers to help craft this new law to help more Hoosiers struggling with mental health challenges. According to Nation, this would allow a representative of a mobile integrated healthcare program or a representative of a mental health community paramedicine program to request a patient's individualized mental health safety plan from a psychiatric crisis center, psychiatric inpatient unit, or psychiatric residential treatment provider if certain conditions are met.

"As it is, those who are transported by police or paramedics to a psychiatric center are evaluated, given a mental health safety plan, and sent on their way," Nation said. "This law allows the transporting agency to request a copy of that safety plan so it can follow up with the

patient and offer them the services and support they need to get back on their feet."

State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R) carried the bill across the finish line to the governor's desk during the 2021 legislative session. She said this new law is a step in the right direction to help endangered adults get follow-up care and connect them to services to improve their quality of life.

"This is a community-based solution to help our state's most vulnerable Hoosiers through a crisis situation and beyond that immediate emergency care," Schaibley said. "Allowing these trained paramedics access to the individual's safety plan will ensure the person in need will get the proper treatment and care."

"Oftentimes, we have no way of identifying the folks in our community who need mental health support until they've committed a crime or are arrested," Nation said. "We need to figure out how to identify these folks before that happens."

Nation estimates up to 800 people in Hamilton County could benefit from the act, which will become law on July 1, 2021.

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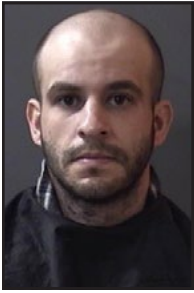
Sheridan Fire showing off EMS service with new ‘Braun’

First dealer to be charged in overdose death now sentenced

A Noblesville man, Justin R. Yeary, has been sentenced for Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death.
Yeary was arrested in April 2019 in connection with a drug transaction that took place in Noblesville in which he sold drugs to Tyler Humphrey, which resulted in Humphrey’s death.
Yeary was the first person to be charged and convicted in Hamilton County on a charge of Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death.
The relatively new statute was created during the 2018 legislative session and signed into law by the Governor Eric Holcomb.
The statute provides police and prosecutors with an additional tool to combat the opioid crisis – charging drug dealers with the death of the person to whom they sold drugs.
Dealing in a Controlled Substance Resulting in Death is a Level 1 felony and is the most serious drug offense in the Indiana Code.
Hamilton County Superior Court 1 Judge Michael Casati sentenced Yeary to 35 years in the Indiana Department of Correction with 28 years executed with the Indiana Department of Correction and three years as direct and open commitment to Hamilton County Community Corrections.
Following his prison term, Yeary will be placed on probation for a period of four years under the standard conditions and the following special conditions:
1. Successfully complete any community corrections placement imposed; and
2. Evaluation by, compliance with, and completion of CARE or equivalent drug/alcohol treatment program, including compliance with recommendations and payment of costs associated with assessment, referral, and recommended education/treatment.
Yeary will be granted accrued time and good-time credit for 484 actual days served (April 15, 2019 to Jan. 13, 2020, and Oct. 8 2020 to May 5, 2021) prior to sentencing for a total of 645 days toward the executed sentence after the addition of 161 credit days.

number of different strategies and options for funding this project,” Light said. “A new user fee or excise surtax isn’t something we undertake lightly, but we think it is an appropriate component to the overall funding strategy for this very important project for Noblesville.”
Mayor Chris Jensen told the Reporter the Wheel Tax and Excise Surcharge could be used for any road construction project; however, the funds would be specifically earmarked for the Pleasant Street Project.
“We are projecting it to generate approximately \$1.8 million per year, or an estimate

\$30 million over a 20-year funding plan,” Jensen said.
According to Light, 12 cities throughout the state have implemented a wheel tax and excise surcharge, including Fishers.
If approved by the council, the taxes would begin being collected in 2022 with each individual’s registration renewal.
Jensen said the first opportunity for the council to vote on the proposal would be May 25, and the public would have an opportunity to comment prior to the vote.

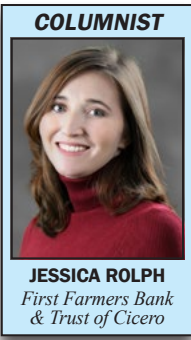

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Hamilton County track and field meets

HSE girls pull away for team title; 'Hounds, Millers, Tigers win multiple events

CARMEL - With the girls track and field sectional taking place on Tuesday, last week's Hamilton County meet at Carmel was a good way to help teams figure out their plans for the start of the post-season.

The county meet, of course, always provides good competition, and everyone had something to celebrate. Six different schools won at least one event, and there was a good back-and-forth between Hamilton Southeastern and Noblesville for the team championship last Tuesday.

"They had some really good performances and then we stepped up and had some really good performances there at the end," said Royals coach Julie Alano.

That helped Southeastern to win the team title, finishing with a score of 154.5 points. Carmel also asserted itself in the later stages, rising to second place with 126.5 points, with the Millers a strong third by scoring 123.5 points. Fishers picked up two event wins, Westfield and Hamilton Heights both had one victory, and Guerin Catholic had solid performances as well.

The tide began to turn the Royals' way at the 800 run. Southeastern finished 1-2 in that event, with both runners clocking under 2 minutes, 20 seconds for the first time. Olivia Brown led the way with a 2:19.46, followed by Allie Latta in 2:19.98. Both were personal bests.

"To battle together and finish that way was just amazing," said Alano.

Next up was the 200 dash. Jocelyn Davis came up big for HSE, winning that race in 26.55 seconds.

"Without (Fishers') Ella (Scally) in there, it was wide open as to who would win, and she stepped up and ran a great race there," said Alano.

The Royals then won their third consecutive event when Halle Hill placed first in the 3200 run. All in all, it was a solid

effort for Southeastern.

"I think we had some good breakthroughs in some areas that are going to help us do well at the next level," said Alano.

The Greyhounds had four event wins, including both the first and last running events of the meet. Carmel started with the 4x800 relay, in which Mahalet Zeruesenay, Annie Christie, Abbey Grogan and Jasmine Klopstad finished first, clocking in at 9:30.08.

Grogan would later take first in the 400 dash, then later join Ellie Marsella, Claire Swigart and Ashlyn Guerrant for a victory in the final running event, the 4x400 relay. Tristan Barr won the pole vault.

Noblesville's Kiana Siefert got three of the Millers' five victories. She swept the 100 and 300 hurdles, then also took the long jump. All of that earned her the high-point award at the end of the meet. She scored 31.5 points, also accounting for her part in Noblesville's third-place finish in the 4x100 relay.

"I just wanted to do the best I could," said Siefert. "It was so much fun. I just come in and I try to get my PR. It's not really about beating other people, it's more just the fun of it, like, can I get my best time or can I get my best jump. Just doing it for myself and just having fun the other girls here and my teammates and cheering them on and everything."

Malina Miller also won for the Millers, leading a 1-2 finish in the high jump. Rylee Hassan placed second. Freshman Hannah Alexander continued her solid season by winning the discus.

Fishers' two victories came from Ella Scally in the 100 dash and from Grace Carroll in the shot put. Westfield scored a win in the 4x100 relay, with the team of Kierstyn Ballard, Lucy Hauser, Jadeyn Hammes and Princess Campbell finishing in 50.73 seconds.

Hamilton Heights' Maria

Mitchell won the 1600 run in 4:56.60, a Huskies school record and the first time she finished that race in under five minutes. Mitchell also placed second in the 3200 run with a 10:47.03. That is another school record, and over six seconds faster than her Friday time at the Hoosier Conference meet.

Guerin Catholic's Emersen Jennings placed third in the 100 dash, while the 4x800 relay team of Sophia Woods, Allison Wozniak, Rosie Barrett and Bridget Gallagher also took third.

Carmel boys win team title, three new records set

NOBLESVILLE - Last Thursday's Hamilton County boys track and field meet turned out to be one for the record books.

Carmel ran away with the team championship, scoring 171 points, while Noblesville edged out Hamilton Southeastern for second place, 116-113.5. In addition, there were three new meet records set at the meet, which took place at Guerin Catholic.

The Greyhounds set one of them, in the 4x100 relay. The team of Desmond Duffy, Colton Parker, Anthony Iskander and Thomas Maurer cruised to victory in that event with a time of 42.25 seconds. It was the second win of the evening for Iskander, who earlier won the 100 dash in a photo finish over the Millers' Mac Smith. Iskander won in 11.09 seconds, Smitch came in at 11.10 seconds.

Overall, Carmel won nine events. James Philpott took the 110 hurdles, while Zach Cox led a 1-2 finish in the 300 hurdles, with Parker placing second. Greg Gottlieb paced the 200 dash, and the 'Hounds completed the meet with a win in the 4x400 relay, done by the team of Curran Eastes, Andrew Willman, Shammah Dosunmu and Kole Mathison.

Seth Hutchison was first in the pole vault, and Carmel also took first in both throwing events, with Nolan Ring winning the discus and Evan Brehl triumphing in the shot put.

today," said Greyhounds coach Ken Browner. "Obviously, we were trying to work on things, getting ready for sectional, so we didn't run a lot of the guys in multiple events. But we did run them in some of their key events just to make sure we stayed sharp and got ready for sectional next week."

Noblesville won three events, including one in new meet record time. Andrew An-

derson sailed to victory in the 800 run, holding off a surging Mathison and winning in a record time of 1:53.78. It was part of a distance sweep for the Millers: Cole Kimmel won the 1600 run, getting a close win over the Royals' Nolan Satterfield. Kimmel finished in 4:19.93, Satterfield in 4:20.05. Travis Hickner was first in the 3200 run, leading a 1-2 sweep as Asher Propst took second. Noblesville's Tan-

ner Gibson won the high-point scorer award; he placed second in the 200 dash, third in the 100 and ran on the Millers' third-place 4x100 relay.

Southeastern picked up field event victories. Manraj Grewal dominated the high jump, as his winning leap of 6 feet, 5 inches was five inches ahead of second place. Lamine Sall finished first in the high jump.

Fishers finished in fourth

place with 93.5 points and had two event wins, including a record-setter. The Tigers began the meet with Jaylen Castillo, Will Clark, Alec Foster and Ben Greiwe setting a new mark in the 4x800 relay, clocking in at 7:46.40.
