## **Educator power couple**

How is kindergarten like grad school?

The students are surprisingly similar, according to a couple of married teachers who moved to Westfield during the pandemic. Dinner conversations at the Schubert household reveal that the challenges of elementary school students and those pursuing post-graduate degrees may not be so different.

Yvette Schubert is a 28-year veteran of Indiana schools and teaches at the Rosa Parks Kindergarten Academy in Perry Township. Last week, she was awarded Teacher of the Year by her principal. She also received flowers from two of her students, but that was before the announcement. Her number one concern with five-year-olds? Telling them over and over to stay focused on their task.

Most of us don't consider added sugar in canned fruits and vegetables – ves, even vegetables. Manufacturers' goals are to make us "happy consumers" which includes what I consider to be the addiction of sugar.

icans were overweight in 2000, up from 46 percent in in the average 1980. Twenty-seven percent of adults were so far overweight that they were classified as obese (at least 30 pounds above their healthy weight) – twice the percentage who were classified as such in 1960. When told by the Paris High School basketball coach that he was too small for the team, Bill trained hard to make up for the deficit by being fast. Really fast! He excelled as a Paris Tiger, going on to play 6-foot guard for Indiana Central University. It was there that Bill met his beloved wife Jane and together they joyfully decided to give their lives in service to their Lord.

Bill attended Evangelical United Brethren Seminary. They pastored several United Methodist churches in Illinois: Potomac, Naperville, Danville and Henry. Moving to Indiana in 1975, Pastor Bill continued fruitful ministry with the Free Methodist Church in Terre Haute, Indianapolis Ritter Avenue, and Washington. Upon retirement, he gladly filled in as pastor for several congregations throughout Wabash Conference.

As a humble servant leader, no job was too small or insignificant for Pastor Bill, who could be found shoveling snow, cleaning church bathrooms and driving the church van. 

Guerin Catholic went 1-2 at the tournament, as Leo Wessel was the individual runner-up with a two-under par 68. Wessel has six birdies for the meet.



Kelsey Mitchell led all Fever scorers again with 19 points on 7-of-18 shooting. Mitchell is currently third in points per game (16.8 ppg) for players who have played at least four games already this

For Atlanta, second-year guard Chennedy Carter led all scorers with 23 points and tied a team-best four assists. Courtney Williams and Tiffany Hayes each added 16 and 14 points each as the Dream tallied its first win of the 2021 regular season.
