



# County Council funds career center, moves forward on domestic violence shelter

## Career Center project to be funded over three years

Creation of a cross-community Hamilton County Center for Career Achievement advanced last Wednesday night when the Hamilton County Council agreed to fund \$425,000 over three years to support early implementation stages of the program.

Positioned as “an aspirational partnership to support the county and our workforce challenges,” the career center

will expand school offerings, provide pathways to diverse opportunities, help meet the workforce needs of local employers, and keep students inside the county to take Career in Technical Education (CTE) classes now traditionally offered in Marion County. The Center will not be housed in one school but in numerous systems throughout the county.

# Fishers announces Megan Schaefer as new Director of Planning & Zoning

The City of Fishers has announced Megan Schaefer as the new Director of Planning & Zoning. Formerly the department’s Assistant Director, Schaefer will now lead the city’s five-year update to the Fishers 2040 Plan, the comprehensive plan that outlines the roadmap to reaching the city’s projected population of 135,000 residents by 2040.

Schaefer will also lead the department’s efforts on new parks and trails projects, including the Nickel Plate Trail, Geist Greenway, and Geist Waterfront Park.

In her new role, Schaefer will identify gaps and priorities in the city’s trail network and potential funding sources; streamline and update the department’s review processes; educate the public and development community on land use and zoning regulations; and gather local data that will assist policy makers and community officials in making informed decisions regarding the city’s future.

“My goal is to make sure Fishers continues to thrive as a community,” Schaefer said. “There is so much opportunity here, and it’s great to work under leadership that is committed to looking at the facts and making the best decisions for the community. My goal for our department is to modernize processes, reduce inefficiencies, and continue to use data to inform decision making. As Fishers begins to reach buildout, our focus will be to plan for possible scenarios, and be proactive in our planning efforts. My passion has always been focused on public service and I could not be more excited to take on this new leadership role.”

# Funding approved for domestic violence shelter project

The Hamilton County Council approved a \$14,500 request by Councilman Fred Glynn to fund a project development agreement with RQAW. The engineering firm has been tasked with imagining a domestic violence shelter for Hamilton County. RQAW presented preliminary findings and renderings at last Wednesday’s council meeting.

“There is no safe emergency shelter located in the county for families fleeing domestic violence,” said Susan Ferguson, executive director at Prevail, Hamilton County’s comprehensive non-residential services provider. “Because of this, victims are staying in, or returning to, unsafe and abusive situations so that they have housing for themselves and their children.”

In 2020, Prevail served 3,783 clients – 52 percent of them victims of domestic violence. Since there is currently no shelter available in Hamilton County, victims and their children are often sent to shel-

ters in Madison and Marion counties.

# Health Dept. discovers vaccination discrepancy Residents in northern third of county slow to get vaccinated

Hamilton County is the second-most vaccinated county in the state with 59 percent of its residents now fully vaccinated. That equates to 165,112 residents age 12 and older. However, a closer look into those statistics reveals a discrepancy that the Hamilton County Health Department is working to correct.

“When we break our vaccination numbers down by zip code, we see considerably

fewer people getting vaccinated in the northern, more rural area of our county,” said Chris Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the Hamilton County Health Department. “We need to reevaluate how we’re reaching residents in the Atlanta, Sheridan, and Arcadia areas.”

The Westfield zip code of 46074 currently tops the coun-

ty’s list with 76 percent of its residents fully vaccinated. That zip code is closely followed by 46290, a small pocket south of Carmel, and 46037 in Fishers. At the other end of the spectrum is 46031 in Atlanta with 33 percent of its residents fully vaccinated, 46069 in Sheridan with 39 percent,

“The numbers shouldn’t surprise us,” Walker added. “There are 49 vaccination sites in Hamilton County, but only two north of State Road 32. As we start to wrap up our mass vaccination clinic at the 4-H Fairgrounds, we need to find ways to ramp up vaccinations in the northern third of the county. How we do that remains to be seen. It could be a sustained vaccination clinic or pop-ups at summer festivals. We’ll know more soon.”

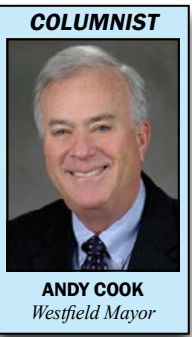
# Mayor Cook: Every city needs a heart

# Carmel teams up with Volkswagen to optimize city traffic

Volkswagen Group of America, Inc. and the City of Carmel have joined together on a research project that uses existing city cameras and Volkswagen machine-vision software to help optimize traffic flows, analyze street usage patterns and support emergency response. This joint project is the first of its kind for Volkswagen globally. The company believes that its software could have applications in various multi-modal transportation solutions in cities worldwide.

“The future of transportation will require more data connections and sophisticated analysis than ever before,” said Johan de Nysschen, chief operating officer at Volkswagen Group of America. “We see our tool as an opportunity to provide cities with more usable data on mobility to help shape their

# Liam & Reece Kelly honored with trailhead marker in Westfield’s MacGregor Park

MacGregor Park in Westfield will serve as the location for a trailhead marker to honor Liam and Reece Kelly, who died in a plane crash in September 2020. Liam and Reece were members of the Westfield High School (WHS) cross country team and enjoyed running on the trails at MacGregor Park.

The memorial will be located at the start of the trail on the east side of the back parking lot by a grouping of three trees.

The dedication of the memorial will take place at 6 p.m. on Thursday, June 10 at MacGregor Park.

Danielle Carey Tolan, Westfield Washington Township Trustee and Park Governor, noted, “We know that Reece and Liam enjoyed running at MacGregor Park and we are honored to be able to partner with the community to place a memorial at a location that was meaningful to the entire WHS cross

country team.”

The idea for the memorial came about last fall after the WHS cross country team placed an ornament with a photo of the Kelly brothers on the “Christmas Tree” at the back of MacGregor Park. Kyler Koning,

cross country teammate and friend, realized that there should be a larger presence to honor the boys. Kyler and his father, Brian, presented an idea to the parks board asking to place a memorial plaque at the trailhead.

“Once we got the approval, I created a design and we began working with a plaque company out of Michigan”, Brian said. “Kyler and I then started a GoFundMe and raised the \$3,700 needed to purchase the plaque.”

Aaron Sherrick, a longtime family friend of the Kellys, designed and created the structure to hold the plaque.

The Kelly family has seen an outpouring of love by the community.

“It is so meaningful to us that our community is working together to keep the memory of Liam and Reece alive,” Kesha Kelly said. “We are grateful for this community of friends who love our boys and continue to support us in our grief walk.”

future transportation needs, from pedestrians and vehicle drivers through public transit. We’re grateful to the City of Carmel for partnering in this shared research effort.”

The project grew out of an advanced machine-vision software that Volkswagen experts developed in-house to help optimize production. In Wolfsburg, Germany – Europe’s biggest automotive factory – and Volkswagen’s EV hub in Zwickau, the software is used in cameras for quality checks on vehicle assembly and in logistics. The developers realized the software could have applications in a city environment.

“With enhanced software from Volkswagen, Carmel can more easily expand our view of traffic flow throughout the city,” Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard said. “As we plan for public transportation needs in our future, our ability to capture more sophisticated information will help us make better decision.”

Using cameras already in place around key Carmel intersections, the Volkswagen software will analyze traffic flow of cars and bicycles, pedestrian movement and other data like parking spot utilization to help city planners identify new trends in mobility and usage. It can also provide an automated data snapshot of an intersection or street location to support emergency responses and reaction on natural disasters. It could eventually help with immediate needs such as the flow of traffic before and after major events. An efficient traffic flow could also help to reduce environmental impact of transportation.

The city will have a dashboard that gathers data from various locations and highlights key learnings. The software does not track individuals or individual vehicles; it automatically pixelates faces and license plates. The software also does not store images, but only the counting data it generates, as a further form of privacy protection.

Teams at Volkswagen Group in Germany have been in discussion with other cities around the world about deploying machine vision software, and believe it could have applications in various multi-modal transportation solutions.

# Fishers Comp Plan update moves on to City Council

The Fishers City comprehensive plan is now five years old and is nearing the end of a review process. The document, called the 2040 Plan, has had online sessions for resident comments and the Fishers Plan Commission held a public hearing at last Wednesday night's monthly session.

The major changes to the plan can be found at [tinyurl.com/ux9r46ue](#).

The revisions received a unanimous positive recommendation from the plan commission, with a few amendments made by Pete Peterson. He says the housing task force created by the plan should not have certain specific items for future actions because the task force members should decide which actions to study and recommend.

The items removed due to the amendment include:

- Organize an education effort on affordable housing including needs for various demographics, housing

types, and city programs. Target messages to the general community as well as potential housing developers.

- Update the UDO to

expand where these types are permitted.

- Identify feasible incentives to promote development of "Missing Middle Housing" types, affordable or workforce housing, as well as ADA and accessible housing units.
- In the development review process for new neighborhoods, encourage the integration of a variety of different types and price points of housing so that someone can afford to live in Fishers starting out and stay until retirement.
- Expand the matching grant program or establish separate grant programs to fund home repairs, including exterior repairs for owner occupied and rental properties; to developers to provide new affordable housing or to renovate existing housing that meets affordability criteria; and to retrofitting of existing housing for ADA or universal access.

The Fishers 2040 Plan now goes to the Fishers City Council for final approval June 21.

I know that this big step will continue to test my heart in the months to come, but I'll continue to see the blessings and know that I'm lucky to still have them close by.

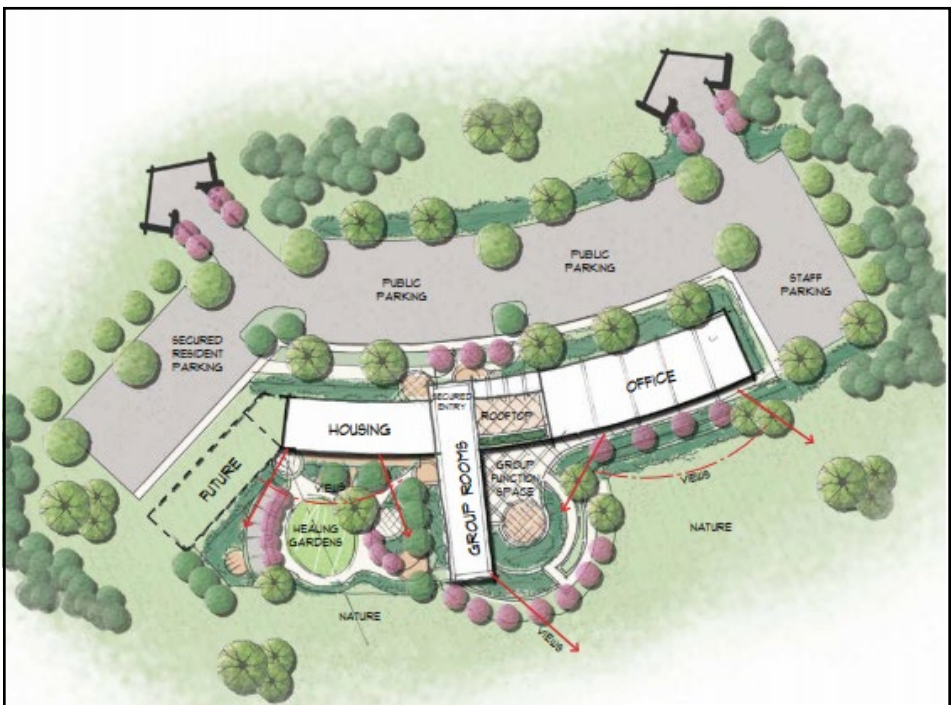

# Body recovered from Fishers retention pond

Fishers police recovered a body found floating in a retention pond last Wednesday.

Police discovered the person after receiving a report of a body floating in a retention pond just south of 116th Street near Allisonville Road and Easy Street.

According to Hamilton County Chief Deputy Coroner Thurl Cecil, the person has been identified as Adam C. Louie, 35, Indianapolis. Louie was reported missing on May 31.

Investigators are awaiting autopsy results to determine cause of death.

## CAREER CENTER

Economic Development Corporation (HCEDC), will enable the hiring of a Career Center Executive Director, who will coordinate research and development, logistics, and alignment across county school districts. HCEDC currently manages Hamilton County's 21st Century Talent Region initiatives through partnership with governmental, corporate, education and non-profit leaders.

The Career Center Executive Director will build on these relationships and work closely with county leadership, the school districts, chambers of commerce and other Hamilton County Economic Development Corporation (HCEDC) stakeholders to create a five-year plan that, when paired with a Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA), will detail what opportunities are currently available for

high school Career and Technical Education (CTE) and ensure offerings at the new Center meet the needs of students and employers. Ivy Tech Hamilton County is expanding, becoming an independent campus this July, and will be an asset to these efforts.

The development team believes, based on local enrollment trends in CTE offerings at independent districts, that closer proximity to programs and expanded

course offerings will raise the current level of 2 percent participation by students in these courses to a much higher number.

"We have already seen this happen at Hamilton Heights," said Hamilton Heights Superintendent Dr. Derek Arrowood. "Three years ago, we started our own construction trades program with seven students. This fall we have 130 students enrolled in the same program. If we can

offer these programs locally, we can dramatically increase the opportunities for our students locally."

"Economic development is the life blood of our communities and with the growth of the county and increased need for a skilled workforce to support our local companies, this cross-community model will allow our schools to partner with the business community and Ivy Tech to best support the needs

of each community and the County as a whole," added Councilman Ken Alexander. "The vote tonight was a vote for our local businesses and a vote for the families and businesses that wish to come to Hamilton County."

The proposed opening of the "career center" program offerings is school year 2023-24. After two years at full student capacity, the Hamilton County center will be self-funded.

## Local organizations launch campaign promoting hospitality careers in Hamilton County

To address the labor shortage in the hospitality industry, Hamilton County Tourism and Hamilton County Economic Development have launched a local advertising campaign to inspire individuals to consider hospitality as a future career choice. The organizations have created a hospitality job board with current positions in restaurants, hotels and more.

The need for job candidates to consider careers in the attractions, event, food service and lodging industries is greater than ever as the county's hospitality industry emerges from the travel depression caused by the pandemic. In Hamilton County, pre-pandemic tourism and travel supported almost 10,000 direct local jobs.

“The pandemic and its ripple effects seriously impacted this critical local industry,” said Hamilton County Tourism President/CEO Brenda Myers.

Two in five American workers who began their career in travel and hospitality now earn more than \$100,000 a year, making it a very vertical industry with a career path that can start as early as high school.

“The tourism and hospitality industry career pathway is very vertical,” said Hamilton County Economic Development Corporation Vice President of Workforce Strategy Michael Thibideau. “A front desk clerk at a hotel can move into general management or sales fairly quickly with or without a college degree. These jobs also provide valuable soft skills training that can be used throughout an individual's career.”

Most workers in the travel industry earn middle

class wages or higher.

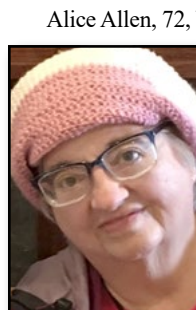

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Boys track and field state meet

Greyhounds boys cruise to state championship

Tigers take 4th, win 4x8 – Four medals for NHS – HSE's Sydnor is long jump runner-up

**INDIANAPOLIS** - As of last Friday night, the Carmel boys track and field team has won five state championships.

The fifth one may be the sweetest of them all.

The Greyhounds were the favorite coming into the meet, and they performed like it, getting stronger as the meet went on to claim the state title, which was awarded at the conclusion of Friday's meet at Ben Davis. Carmel scored 68 points, which ties the highest number of points the 'Hounds have scored at the state meet. Carmel also totaled 68 points in 2017, the year it last won the state title.

"I couldn't be happier for the way these kids performed," said Greyhounds coach Ken Browner. "I got to thank (Commissioner) Paul Neidig and the IHSAA, because last year we didn't get to have this. And you can tell by the pure emotion of these guys that this really means something, being back here on this stage and having an opportunity to compete for a state title."

In addition to the team championship, Carmel also claimed two individual events. Owen Schafer was part of two of them. First, the senior won the 400 dash, finishing that race in a time of 48.36 seconds.

Later, Schafer joined Andrew Willman, Thomas Maurer and Colton Parker in the final race of the day, the 4x400 relay. The Carmel team placed first in 3 minutes, 18.90 seconds. Schafer, Maurer, Parker and Anthony Iskander had earlier run in the 4x100 relay, which finished third.

"We got third in that and we expected to win, but I think at the end of the day, that motivated us and me to win the 400 and our team to win the 4x4,"

said Schafer.

The Greyhounds began the meet with a runner-up result in the 4x800 relay, which William Anderson, Shammah Dosunmu, Kole Mathison and Bingham Hudson ran in 7:44.83. Parker placed second in the 300 hurdles, clocking in at 38.53 seconds.

In the 3200 run, Mathison was the runner-up with a time of 9:01.55. He was followed by teammate Jacob Fisher, who placed third in the race. That 2-3 finish scored 15 team points and helped Carmel to clinch the team title.

"He PRed two weeks in a row," said Browner of Fisher's performance.

Zachary Cox placed third in the 110 hurdles and seventh in the 300 hurdles, scoring 10 team

points for the Greyhounds.

Carmel finished 28 points ahead of runner-up Brownsburg, which scored 40 points. It was the Bulldogs' highest-ever finish at the state meet, besting their third-place performance in 2019, the last time the big meet took place. Center Grove took third with 38 points.

Fishers finished in fourth place with 32 points, matching its best-ever finish at state. The Tigers also finished fourth in 2008.

Fishers began the meet with a victory in the 4x800 relay. The team of William Clark, Keefe Soehngen, Alec Foster and Jaylen Castillo sailed home in a time of 7:42.46.

It was a productive meet for Castillo, the Indiana Univer-

sity-bound senior. He followed that up with a third-place finish in the 800, with a time of 1:54.18.

"I was pretty happy with the 4x8," said Castillo. "I split at like a 1:53, low. I came back in the open 8. I wanted to win, but I still got third, so I'm not mad about that."

Castillo teamed up with Tyler Tarter, Soehngen and Robert Seay to take third in the 4x400 relay.

"I can't complain about getting three medals," said Castillo.

Soehngen also got three medals, as he was the runner-up in the 400 dash.

Noblesville tied for 15th place by scoring 13 points. The Millers picked up four medals, including two fifth-place finishes in the longer distances.

Senior Andrew Anderson placed fifth in the 800 run, while Travis Hickner finished fifth in the 3200 run. Both have also committed to Indiana University; Anderson was a recent commit for the Hoosiers.

"I think I did pretty good," said Anderson. He said while he usually starts his closing kick with around 300 meters left, he backed off this time "and saved a little bit more for the last 150, 200 to really get that kick at the end and I think that's what helped me."

Another Noblesville senior Mac Smith, finished with two medals. He was part of the Millers' eighth-place 4x100 relay team, joining Brayden Colon,

Christ Degni and Tanner Gibson. Later, Smith finished ninth in the 200 dash.

Hamilton Southeastern junior Stephen Sydnor placed second in the long jump, accounting for all eight of the Royals' points.

"I think I could've done better," said Sydnor. "I had a lingering injury, so that prevented me from doing a lot more than I should've. But second place is always okay."

Westfield scored seven team points and had two medalist performances. The 4x800 team of Kai Connor Jacob Beene, Colin Lakomek and Joshua Springborn finished fourth, while Christiaan Huisden took ninth in the 300 hurdles.

Greyhounds reclaim state trophy

For the first time in three years, the Carmel girls tennis team is a state champion.

The No. 1-ranked Greyhounds started out as a relatively young team, but they grew up throughout the season. That increasing maturity culminated in a 4-1 state championship victory over No. 2-ranked South Bend St. Joseph in last Saturday afternoon's final at North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center.

Carmel has now won 11 state championships in program history and finds itself just one away from the Panthers' long-standing record of 12 state titles. It was a happy occasion, as coach Bryan Hanan said he thought his team had a good chance last year, but never got that opportunity because the season was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We worked really hard for this," said Hanan. "This was a goal from day one this year."

The deciding point came from No. 1 doubles. The team of junior Hallie Reeves and sophomore Alexa Lewis won a tough first set by the score of 7-5, then took the second set 6-3. Reeves did the honors, smacking a passing shot on match point.

"I was like, 'I hope this goes over,'" said Reeves. "Right when it went over, it was just an awesome feeling and I can't describe it. It was just awesome."

Reeves and Lewis are now 26-1 for the season. Since they went through the post-season undefeated, the duo now advances to the individual tournament, where they will be the top seed. The state level of the individual tournament begins on Friday.

"It was definitely a fight the whole season," said Lewis. "We had some really tough matches. "But I'm really glad we pulled through. I knew we could do the whole time."

"They play relaxed," said Hanan. "They don't get too tense. They're two happy girls. They're happy to be out here. Sometimes when things get tense, they just look at each other and smile, and I think that relaxes them. It's nice for them to have some of that type of attitude, enable to overcome some negative things that happen during a match and they can just smile at each other and move on to the next point."

Another young player that showed toughness was No. 3 singles Nora Perkins. The freshman came from way back to win her match; after dropping the first

set 6-1, Perkins took the second set in a tiebreaker, 7-6, with the tiebreak going to 8-6.

Since the other matches had already finished and the team championship had been decided, the match finished with a 10-point super tiebreak. Perkins won that 10-8.

Carmel's other wins came from its seniors. No. 2 Leila Antony picked up a 6-3, 6-1 victory, while the No. 2 doubles team of Katelyn Conley and Anjali Natarajan won 6-4, 6-0.

The Greyhounds were making their 18th appearance at the state meet, closing in on North Central's record of 21. It also marked the first girls tennis coaching state title for Hanan;

Royals tie for 7<sup>th</sup>, Carmel wins 4x8

**INDIANAPOLIS** - If you attended last Saturday's IHSAA girls track and field state meet at Ben Davis and thought that just about every team there was in contention for the state title – you were right.

It was a remarkably close meet, with the team champion not determined until the final race, the 4x400 relay. Cathedral won that event, and that pushed the Irish over the top, as they scored 39 points to win the state championship. Cathedral edged out runner-up Warren Central by one point, as the Warriors scored 38.

The Hamilton County teams stayed in the mix as well. Hamilton Southeastern finished in a three-way tie for seventh place by scoring 26 points. The Royals matched Center Grove and Lake Central, both of which also scored 26.

Southeastern picked up five medals at the state meet. The highest finisher was senior Halle Hill, who was the runner-up in the 1600 run. Hill clocked in at 4 minutes, 49.87 seconds, behind only Huntington North's Addison Wiley, who finished in 4:45.27.

"I think I ran it pretty well,"

said Hill. "We went out really slow, which isn't great, but we came back really strong the third and fourth lap, which ended up for a really good finish."

Hill also ran in the 3200 run. She placed 10th, just off the podium (the top nine receive medals), but with a pretty good time of 10:56.05. It was an incredibly fast 3200, with Bishop Chatard sophomore Lily Cridge setting an outrageous new state record of 10:03.16, which was over eight seconds off the old record.

"It was really difficult coming back from the 16," said Hill. "The first mile, I just tried to chill and the second mile, I just tried to catch up to all-state. I didn't get it, but I just tried to give it what I had the second mile."

Hill has committed to the University of Illinois, where she got to meet distance coaches Nolan Fife and Sarah Haveman.

"It was one of the few colleges I got to visit before the pandemic and everything happened," said Hill. "Coach Fife and Coach Haveman are just absolutely amazing and I'm so glad that I get to be coached by them next year."

Millers overwhelm Raiders for regional championship

WEST LAFAYETTE - It's always fun when a team surprises itself in a good way.

Noblesville softball coach Deke Bullard had been going through scenarios for the Millers' Regional 4 game last Tuesday at Harrison. A 9-1 rout for Noblesville was not one of them.

"I told the girls that I had played this game 50 times in my head in the last three days," said Bullard. And that was not the outcome that I was thinking."

But the Millers will take it, as they are regional champions for the first time since 2018. Noblesville won its fourth regional title in program history.

Noblesville got up early, as it led off with back-to-back singles by Reis Sjoholm and Abby Harvey.

Later, Cameron Grayson batted them both in with a center field hit.

That gave the Millers a 2-0 lead. The Raiders got a run back in the second inning, but Noblesville responded with three runs in the third. Ella White blasted a triple to score Sjoholm and Harvey, then Grayson's RBI groundout sent White home.

The Millers put up three more runs in the fourth inning. Harvey singled in Erin Clark and Sjoholm, then later scored on Grayson's double. Harvey struck again in the sixth inning, cracking a triple into left field to bring in Myah Stuckey.

"Here's the thing: We have hit well all season," said Bullard. "And we showed up early with our bats and we kept them going through the whole game. When you hit the way we did, good things can hap-

Tigers junior Ella Scally had a terrific meet, starting with a runner-up finish in the 100 dash. Scally clocked in at 12.22 seconds, then later placed sixth in the 200 dash. Mitchell will run for Grand Valley State University.

Guerin Catholic softball heading to state

The Guerin Catholic softball team went through so many firsts last week, that it may have been hard to keep up.

The No. 2-ranked Golden Eagles began their historic week last Monday by winning a first-ever sectional championship. It was unforgettable game, as Guerin Catholic was locked in a battle with No. 1-ranked Yorktown at the Class 3A Hamilton Heights sectional that ran well into extra innings.

It took 10 innings for a team to score, and that team was Guerin Catholic. Aliyah Dorsey doubled in a run in the top of the inning, then pitcher Izzy Kemp took care of business in the bottom of the inning, and soon the Golden Eagles were celebrating a 1-0 victory over the Tigers.

Guerin followed that up the next day with its first-ever regional title, a 12-1 win at Norwell. That sent GC to the Twin Lakes semi-state, and it cruised past Bishop Dwenger and Kankakee Valley to claim that trophy and the Golden Eagles' first-ever trip to the state finals.

Guerin Catholic plays No. 10-ranked Boonville at 8 p.m. Friday at Center Grove for the 3A state championship.

**PITCHER'S DUEL**

The GC-Yorktown sectional title game was a true pitcher's duel between two dominant throwers: Guerin's Izzy Kemp and Yorktown's Alanah Jones. Neither one gave an inch during

last Monday's game.

"The stats have been kind of equal for both teams as far as pitching goes," said GC coach Jeff Buckner. "And she's pitched a lot more innings and things, as we've been splitting between Izzy and Alicia (Flores). If we could score a run, or whoever was going to be able to score a run, that was going to go a long way today."

By the time the 10th inning had rolled around, Jones had thrown 22 strikeouts. At the beginning of the 10th, she induced a flyout for the first out, getting the lead off batter.

Sarah Dilley came up next, and hit a single to get on base. It was the fifth hit of the day for the Golden Eagles. Dilley then moved to second on a groundout, then Ana Macha drew a walk.

That brought up Dorsey. She took a 1-2 pitch into right field, sending Dilley home.

"On that last pitch, I just thought, 'I have to put the ball in play to score my teammates right here and help Izzy out in the defensive end,'" said Dorsey.

"We hadn't had a lot of good, productive at-bats in terms of putting the ball in play," said Buckner. "But we did some things to make her work a little bit. We had some runners on all throughout the game. And Aliyah has just been lights out for us at the plate all year. For her to strike out the three times and come back, that's a senior leader right there who just was waiting for the chance

and she delivered."

Guerin flew out for the third out. That brought Kemp back up to the mound, with three outs between the Golden Eagles and the trophy. Kemp got a groundout for the first out, then issued her only walk of the game. But that was just a speed bump, as she tossed strikeouts for the next two outs, finishing the game with 19 strikeouts.

"I was just ready to go whatever extra mile I needed to for my teammates. I knew I had to be ready to go as long as possible, as long as it took," said Kemp.

Kemp only allowed one hit in the game. Dilley and Macha both went 2-for-4 for the Golden Eagles.

**REGIONAL WIN**

Guerin Catholic followed up its first-ever sectional championship the next day with its first-ever regional championship last Tuesday.

The Golden Eagles traveled to Norwell and cruised to a five-inning victory for the Regional 12 crown. Guerin was in control early, scoring five runs in the top of the first inning. Kemp and Kirsten Mascari both hit two-RBI doubles, Schenk batted in Kemp, and Dilley singled in a run.

Alicia Flores led off the third inning with a solo home run. The Golden Eagles then added six more runs in the fourth: Dorsey cracked a two-RBI double, Victoria Flores singled in a run, Alicia Flores sent a two-run double into

After a few well-deserved days off, Guerin Catholic traveled to Twin Lakes last Saturday for the semi-state, and steamrolled its way to a first-ever championship at that level.

The Golden Eagles shut out No. 7-ranked Bishop Dwenger 12-0 in the semi-finals and Kankakee Valley 7-0 in the championship game.

Guerin led Bishop Dwenger 7-0 after five innings, then poured in five runs in the top of the seventh. Dilley was 3-for-4 at the plate, including a double, and batted in four runs. Dorsey and Kemp also had three hits, including a double.

Kemp put together another perfect game, striking out 20 while allowing no runners on base.

In the championship game, Guerin scored two runs in the first inning. Victoria Flores singled in Macha, then later scored on Schenk's RBI groundout.

Flores again singled home Macha in the second inning, then Dorsey scored on a passed ball to make the score 4-0. Flores then smacked a three-run home run in the fourth inning, also sending Macha and Dorsey home.

Flores and Macha were both 3-for-4 in the championship. Meanwhile, Alicia Flores dominated in the circle, throwing 21 strikeouts against one hit and no walks.

The Golden Eagles are 25-2 for the season.
