Boice, a licensed marriage and family therapist and owner of Pathways to Healing Counseling, is being honored for her work with mental health in the City of Noblesville through her roles on the Mental Health Mondays live streams and the Noblesville Wellbeing Coalition.

At the start of pandemic,

Westfield city data at risk?

Clerk-Treasurer alleges computers have spyware installed at city's expense

Westfield-based attorney William Webster, representing City Clerk-Treasurer Cindy Gossard, has sent a letter to the Westfield City Council and Mayor Andy Cook notifying them the Clerk-Treasurer's Office has discovered that alleged spyware purchased by the City of Westfield has been placed on the clerk's office computers.

The letter states the alleged spyware, identified as BeyondTrust Jump Technology, has the potential to compromise Westfield's banking and payroll systems as well as city employees' confidential information.

Gossard and Webster have also provided the mayor and council members with paid invoices confirming that the city's IT department purchased the alleged spyware.

The letter continues as follows:

"Throughout the beginning of this year, while we were focused on the litigations brought by the Mayor, the Clerk-Treasurer's staff began to notice occasional oddities and/or glitches with their

computers. At first the Clerk-Treasurer's staff assumed this may have been related to the fact their computers are older models and that these glitches were innocuous. However, the problems not only persisted, but also began to grow increasingly suspicious. Staff members have reported seeing the mouse icon on their screens occasionally moving without their input, in a manner similar to when a remote user remotely access a computer and takes over input control. However, this was puzzling because in the past whenever city IT personnel have needed to troubleshoot issues with remote access, an authorization pop-up requests precedes the remote access session, and the employee allows the access. Another example of oddities that have been noticed include being unable to find previous emails in staff member email inboxes that staff members are certain were sent or received."

Clerk-Treasurer's office also discovered a saved web browser login ID of "svieth@bk d . c o m ."

According to Webster and Gossard, Sandon Vieth works for Bryan Callahan, one of Mayor Cook's appointed examiners.

"Though we are not IT experts ourselves, it seems that someone had to type this email address into the staff member's computer and that it was saved to her computer," stated Webster in his letter.

According to Gossard, a review of invoices submitted by the city's IT director has disclosed three such invoices submitted for reimbursement to SHI International Corp. for the purchase of six software licenses from BeyondTrust. Webster's letter pointed out the Clerk's office has exactly six computers, which matches the number of licenses purchased on the invoices.

According to Webster,

Cook refutes spyware claim, says software is "standard in almost all industries"

Editor's note: The following is a response sent last Wednesday from Mayor Andy Cook's office to The Reporter.

Mr. Webster's letter is troubling and the Administration has taken action to confirm that no breach of the city's computer network, which is backed up daily, has occurred.

In addition, the Administration is confident that, based on the security platform of our systems, we will be able to specifically determine if what is contained in Mr. Webster's letter is factual.

Prior to the financial investigation commissioned by Mayor Cook, the Clerk's office never raised any concerns about the security of the city's computer network. The BeyondTrust

software (or predecessor) is a program that the Clerk is well aware of and has used dozens of times. It allows the IT department, upon request and with permission, to remotely access a computer while it's in operation to assist with issues raised by individuals throughout the city. It's on every city computer and has been used for 10 years. This technology is standard in almost all industries.

It is strange that this is coming at a time when the Clerk has, after months and months, provided BKD with most - but not all - of the financial documents that have been requested.

The letter also implies wrongdoing from BKD, a well-respected and accomplished accounting firm that is part of the financial examination.

Fishers moves down to Level 2 COVID community risk category

The Fishers Health Department has moved the city into Level 2 (Yellow) COVID-19 Community Risk Category due to decreased cases. A total of 64 percent of city residents are fully vaccinated.

The seven-day positivity rate in the city of Fishers was 2.65 percent, compared to 5.4 for the rest of Hamilton County.

Ages 12+ now eligible

Everyone ages 12 and older is eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine (ages

12-17 can only receive the Pfizer vaccine). Walk-in and prescheduled appointments are available at the Fishers Mass Vaccination Site, and all three vaccine types are available for ages 18 and up.

Power line issues lead to extra costs for Deer Creek Elementary construction

The construction of Deer Creek Elementary School is moving along, but there are some issues that Harry Delks, Facilities Director for Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools, explained to the school board last Wednesday night.

This school building will be within the city boundaries

of Noblesville. HSE schools other than Durbin Elementary (which Deer Creek is replacing) are located in the city of Fishers.

According to Delks, Noblesville would not issue the required permits to begin construction on Deer Creek Elementary unless HSE Schools agreed to foot the bill for Duke Entergy

power line and pole relocations. Noblesville plans to expand Boden Road in the future and wants the poles and lines relocated in anticipation of that project.

Delks says he is hoping the cost of the relocation will be in the range of \$400,000 to \$500,000. If an unforeseen emergency were to happen, such as

New development seen at 236th & 31 Perhaps happiness can be found in the hard times

A planned interchange at U.S. 31 and 236th Street will likely mean new development near the increasingly busy intersection, predicts County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt.

Anticipating potential development in the area around the new interchange, Martin Wessler Engineering Company requested to meet with county commis-

sioners on June 14. The firm, located in Carmel, will speak to commissioners about a possible wastewater plant at Bakers Corner, just west of 31. They will also seek to have the county cooperate in conducting a water available study.

Both water and sewers would probably be needed

for any major development. The county could, if officials wish, likely use COVID relief funds to assist in a study which involves finding locations of underground water supplies in the county.

Heirbrandt also noted that the county is in the process of improving 236th Street between Cicero and

Sheridan, which will further ease access to U.S. 31.

The commissioner said the Wessler firm asked for the meeting with commissioners, and “we will just be there to learn what they have to tell us.”

The presentation followed the regular meeting on June 14.

The Indiana Department of Transportation is gradually converting all grade-level intersections on 31 to modern interchanges.

BeyondTrust allows for very sophisticated and advanced remote access into a computer system. The company’s website states Jump Technology far surpasses traditional remote access, in that it allows for remote access into a computer without authorization from the computer’s end user.

“Whoever installed this software and further whoever has been using this software to access the Clerk-Treasurer’s information is unknown,” Webster said in the letter. “However, the installation and use of this software without the Clerk-Treasurer’s knowledge, is disturbing and unacceptable. This software

gives whomever that is using it the ability to covertly spy on the Clerk-Treasurer’s office.”

Two other items that concern Gossard and Webster are: Whomever is using the software can make changes to city data, and it appears the changes were made by a staff member; and the software user may have viewed email correspondence between Webster and Gossard, circumventing attorney-client privilege.

Gossard has asked for the city’s IT department to remove the software and is exploring purchasing new computers and segregating their systems from Westfield IT networks.

According to my husband, the more people asked her this question, the

more irked she became. For some odd reason, Mom truly believed she didn't fall. I guess this was a good thing! When I came home that evening and told John I'd be taking Mom for a blood draw on Tuesday, the first thing he said was, "Don't you dare ask how she's doing after her fall!" We had a good chuckle over it and I was relieved to see Mom that morning looking and feeling just fine.

We were lucky last Sunday. According to the American Academy of Family Physicians, falls are the leading cause of injury-related visits to emergency departments in the United States. They are the primary cause of accidental deaths in persons over the age of 65 years.

I'm sharing this because, as members of the sandwich generation, we need to do all we can to help our elderly parents prevent falls. The CDC, Mayo Clinic, National Institute on Aging, and other institutes have excellent suggestions and resources to guide us.

Property abatements, nonprofits, Career Center, women's shelter discussed at this month's County Council meeting

that is part of the Council's budget process. When I started on the Council, we did not have a formal process and I began asking questions, like: Why are we supporting this charity versus another, what is the money being used to support, and how do we know if they are using the money to support the initiatives that the grant was to support?

Previously there were no controls and all we did was fund pet projects and the nonprofits that people were affiliated with. There are multiple examples, and clearly – that is not a healthy strategy. There are so many nonprofits in Hamilton County doing tremendous work. My goal would be to create a structure to help understand the impact of nonprofits and then focus spending on nonprofits that either provide functions the county would have to provide or minimize the financial impact that we would have to spend money on.

I worked for several months behind the scenes to develop a formal application that would help us understand the return on this investment. My fellow councilor Sue Maki took that application and completed it. We made some minor tweaks

but, in the end, the new process will not expand the funds or the process but we will now collect information that supports these investments with periodic updates from the nonprofits. I was pleased to be involved in this effort for the last 18 months. Our previous process was truly unwieldy and lent itself to councilors awarding pet projects, and I hope this moves us in a stronger direction with this program.

The next topic was a project that I identified last month, the Hamilton County Career Center. As stated last month, this program is a collaboration between all the Hamilton County schools, all the county Chambers of Commerce and Ivy Tech. This initiative will be a transformational project for the county as we fight the demands of workforce development. While this did not get an unanimous vote, it did receive a positive 6-1 approval.

Some detractors will say that the county should not be in the business of education, which I believe misses the point. This was a vote similar to the abatement incentives the Council supported for Beck's and others; it was a vote to help support economic development that will keep a trained and accessible workforce here that can support the ever-growing demands of Indiana's and Hamilton County's economic development. This vote was

While our June meeting was brief this week, it was packed full of productive business and conversation and included four agenda items that consumed most of the meeting.

The first topic was a follow up regarding "real property" and "personal property improvements" abatements. When the Council provides these abatements, it is generally done to support economic development and investment in our county. Mike Scholer of Beck's Hybrids in northern Hamilton County shared that Beck's recent expansion and hiring was in compliance with the terms of the abatement. Their recent expansion is important as it keeps good paying agro-tech jobs in Hamilton County. They are a tremendous employer, and we are always pleased to see our local companies succeeding.

The second conversation was about the nonprof-

SUV collides with motorcycle, leaving Cicero man dead

At approximately 9:12 p.m. on June 5, Noblesville police officers responded to the intersection of Boden Road and 146th Street to a report of a crash involving a motorcycle and SUV.

A 2021 Chevrolet Equinox was facing northbound on Boden Road in the left turn lane and was preparing to turn left (west) onto 146th Street just prior to the crash. Witnesses said the driver of the Chevrolet turned left into the path of a southbound 2009 Harley Davidson motorcycle traveling through the intersection. The driver and passenger of the motorcycle were thrown from the vehicle as a result of the crash.

The driver of the motorcycle was identified as Matthew D. Cooper, 37, Cicero. Cooper suffered life-threatening injuries and was transported by ground ambulance to I.U.

Health Saxony Hospital in Fishers. He died a short time later.

The driver of the Chevrolet Equinox was identified as Deborah A. Dunn, 65, Noblesville. Dunn did not suffer any injuries in the crash.

The passenger on the Harley Davidson was identified as Mya D. Cooper, 29, Cicero. Cooper sustained non-life-threatening injuries and was transported by ground ambulance to Ascension St. Vincent Hospital in Indianapolis and was reported to be in stable condition.

The intersection of Boden Road and 146th Street was closed until approximately 12:41 a.m. as investigators from the NPD Accident Reconstruction Unit collected information for the crash investigation.

At this time, it does not appear that alcohol, drugs, or weather contributed to the cause of the crash.

a tornado outbreak where Duke would need to send their own crews to respond, the project would be outsourced and could cost as much as \$1 million.

HSE Schools agreed to pay for the Duke relocations because Noblesville would not approve the nec-

essary permits without that assurance. "We really had no choice," Delks told the school board.

Mike Holtkamp of the Hagerman Group told the board the Deer Creek building project is currently on budget. However, the expense of moving the Duke

poles and lines was not included in the original budget.

"There has been work from the team to make sure that this comes in under budget," said HSE Schools Superintendent Allen Bourff. "In order to do so, we've had to adjust our design plans ... it's still going

Comeback Tigers are state bound again

Consecutive sixth-inning RBI singles send Fishers past Munster

KOKOMO - Even after trailing the entire game, the Fishers baseball team never stopped believing it could win.

The Tigers were stuck behind Munster for almost six innings last Saturday at the Class 4A Kokomo semi-state at Kokomo Municipal Stadium. But Fishers kept battling, almost as if the team was living up to its nickname - just waiting for the right time to pounce.

The Tigers did that in the bottom of the sixth inning, nailing back-to-back RBI singles to take the lead. Fishers then took care of the Mustangs three up, three down in the top of the seventh, and the Tigers were celebrating a 3-2 semi-state championship win, sending

them back to the state finals.

Fishers will play Jasper at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, June 22 at Victory Field in the 4A state championship game. It will be the second time the Tigers play in the state finals. The first time was in 2018, when Fishers beat Cathedral for the big trophy.

"These guys have taught me that they're just never out of it," said Fishers coach Matt Cherry. "We had chances early. We didn't get a runner in with a guy on third and less than two outs. It was getting a little tight, but these guys, all year long, have just never quit. They just keep doing it. They taught me that just to keep fighting no matter what."

"We never stopped believing," said junior Zach Cox, who hit the game-win-

ning RBI. He was at Victory Field in 2018 as an eighth-grader, watching the Tigers win state. Now he will get to be on the field.

"That's one thing we always rely on is believing," said Cox. "We always have each other's backs and we had each other's backs and we got the job done."

Munster scored both of its runs in the top of the first inning. Denham Kozy batted in the first run, with a sacrifice fly to score Ben Greiner. Later, Bryce Schaum's base hit sent Brady Ginaven home.

The Tigers cut into the Mustangs' lead in the second inning. Zach Cox singled on to base, moved to second on Gavin Clayton's single, then



Boonville's defense holds off Golden Eagles in 3A championship game

GREENWOOD - Coming into the Class 3A softball state finals, Guerin Catholic was averaging 8.5 runs per game.

It would take an incredible defensive effort for a team to stop the No. 2-ranked Golden Eagles. And that's just what No. 10-ranked Boonville did in the weather-delayed state championship game, which started last Friday night and finished Saturday morning at Center Grove.

The Pioneers held off Guerin Catholic for the entire game, then scored a walk-off run in the seventh inning to claim the 3A state title 1-0. Boonville thus won its second state championship, while the Golden Eagles had to settle for the runner-up trophy.

The game didn't begin until 10:30 p.m. due to weather delays that also affected the previous game, the 1A championship between Northfield and Clay City. Northfield won that game 3-1.

While Guerin wasn't able to score any runs, its offense still looked solid. The Golden Eagles got seven hits on the night, and loaded the bases in three different innings. But in each of those innings, the Pioneers made big plays to keep Guerin Catholic from scoring.

"They made plays when they had to and their pitcher stepped up when she had to and make some big pitches in some crucial situations,"

said GC coach Jeff Buckner. "All year, we were able to push one or two of those across and tonight we gave it a good try, but we just couldn't get one across. And they did."

The game began with leadoff hitter Ana Macha hitting a single to get on base, and she would eventually get to third base after Victoria Flores reached on error. Alicia Flores drew a two-out walk to get on base, but a groundout ended the scoring threat.

Julia Hartley led off the fifth inning with a single, then moved to third after Aliyah Dorsey and Izzy Kemp were both walked. Boonville pitcher Ariel Thomasson ended that one by making a groundout.

The Golden Eagles tried again in the sixth inning. Sarah Dilley and Hartley both got on base by separate fielder's choices, then Macha laid down a perfect bunt to load the bases. But a center field catch by Boonville's Madison Hill stopped Guerin Catholic from getting a run.

Kirsten Mascari caught a certain base hit to begin the bottom of the sixth inning, then Kemp threw two strikeouts to finish the inning. The Pioneers took care of business in the top of the seventh, inducing a double play to get the second and third outs.

Boonville then made quick work of the bottom of the seventh. Jayce Purdy smacked a triple into right field, and Randi Jo Pryor got her home right away with a

Guerin Catholic graduates seven seniors, including Macha, Alicia Flores, Victoria Flores, Dorsey, Dilley, catcher Lucy Schenk and Olivia Labus, who came in to run for Schenk in the sixth inning. They have left quite a

legacy for the Golden Eagles in this historic season. At the same time, three key underclassmen will return next year: Kemp, Hartley and Mascari. "Izzy and Julia and Kirsten all were in this championship game and are all back," said Buckner. "Our leadership will be fine and they'll be focused."

Royals, Golden Eagles pick up regional wins

Before Thursday, Hamilton Southeastern sophomore golf player Tyler Marcinko had yet to play an 18-hole varsity match.

Marcinko finally got to do that last Thursday, in a tournament that just happened to be the Muncie Central regional at The Players Club in Yorktown. Marcinko played outstanding, emerging as the Royals' low man and helping Southeastern to its first regional championship in six years.

Marcinko finished with an even-par 72, which tied him for fifth place individually. He had four birdies in his round.




This will be Guerin Catholic's second appearance at state. The Golden Eagles made their first trip to state in 2019.

Starnes was right behind Zedrick with a 72, giving him individual runner-up honors.

Starnes also had three birdies in his round. Lacy carded an 83, with one birdie.

Noblesville finished fourth as a team by scoring 320. Peck scored 77 and Decker 78 to advance as individuals.

Perkins and Alex Peck (83) both totaled three birdies for Noblesville, while Decker and Rory Bushong (82) both had one.

Hamilton Heights finished fifth as a team with 347. Garrett James was the Huskies' low man with an 82. Ethan Millsaps had two birdies, while James, Lance Jones and Nathan Cox all had one.


