County EMA to hold Amateur Radio Field Day next Saturday

Amateur radio operators from the Hamilton County Emergency Management's Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) and the Central Indiana Amateur Radio Association (CIARA) will participate in the national amateur radio exercise on Saturday, June 26, and Sunday, June 27. The event is part of the national Amateur Radio Relay League's Field Day (arrl.org/fieldday), an annual event organized since 1933.

Hamilton County's Field Day will be held at River Road Park, 12575 River Road, Carmel. Emergency Management will use the event to conduct a proof of concept with new shelter systems. Three tent systems will be deployed to allow radio operators to use equipment off-grid, set up a temporary emergency operations center or incident command

Fishers Arts & Culture Commission enhances community vibrancy with new public artworks, grant program

The Fishers Arts & Culture Commission (FACC) continues to work to expand the city's public art landscape and invest in local artists and art organizations.

The FACC aims to foster a community where arts and culture activities are a vital component of everyday life. Since its formation in 2018, the Commission has helped to fund new art projects around the city, including the Wes Montgomery traveling mural, honoring the late Hoosier jazz guitarist who served as inspiration for Jimi Hendrix; the dynamic Seasons Nouveau banner series currently on display

at The Edge Parking Garage, 8890 E. 116th St.; and a large-scale interactive artwork to debut in the new entrance plaza for Fishers' Hamilton East Public Library, set to open early next year.

One of the Commission's latest funded projects – a 1,000 square-foot mural along the Nickel Plate Trail on the rear wall of the Fishers Police Department Parking Garage, 4 Municipal Drive – is currently underway. *Blazing the Trail* by Terre Haute-based artist Becky Hochhalter showcases local community life and will serve as a key activation point along Fishers' Nickel Plate Trail.

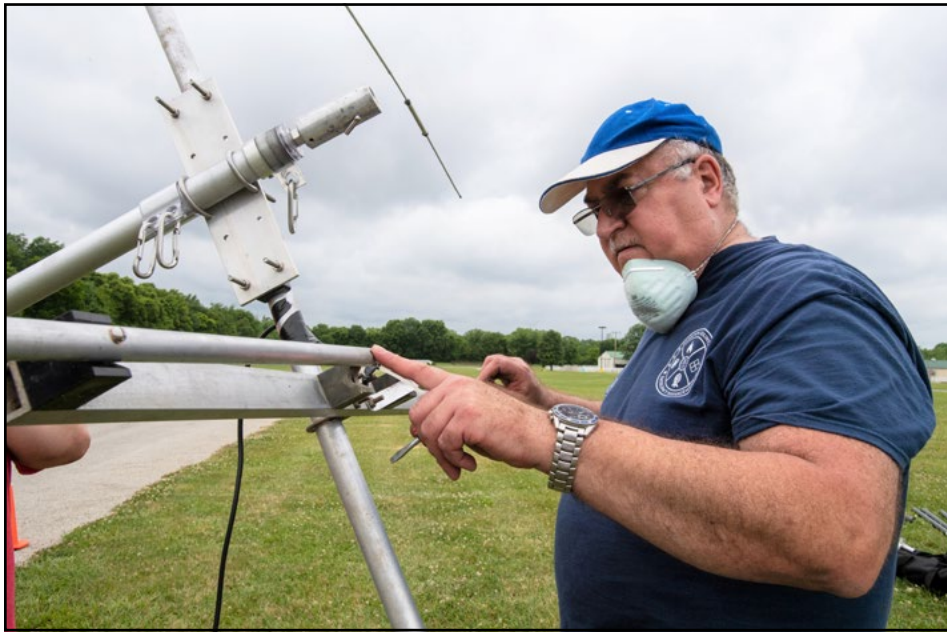

Emergency Management supports CIARA to foster coordination and support among the Hamilton County amateur radio community.

Field Day is open to the

public as an opportunity to learn more about amateur radio and view disaster response equipment.

“We are excited to not only demonstrate emergency communications capabilities but new emergency response resources,” said Booker. The public can stop by from 2 to 5 p.m. on Saturday and from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Sunday to tour the disaster response setup.

Hamilton County Emergency Management’s RACES team and CIARA hosts quarterly amateur radio testing sessions to provide

A basic license and a radio enable individual and family level communications when cellphones and the internet are unavailable. INDOT, ICRF launching innovative partnership to train future roadbuilders

The REPORTER Roundtable Foundation training preparing individuals for careers in the highway and road construction industry. The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) and Indiana Construction bringing Hoosiers cost-free

“BY Roads” uses a nationally recognized construction curriculum to provide students with opportunities to learn directly from industry professionals and be placed into high-paying jobs in highway construction. Students that complete BY Roads will earn NCCER Core, OSHA-10 Certifications, and receive hands-on training in highway construction safety, heavy equipment identification, excavation math, and crane safety and emergency procedures. “Often people are hesitant to pursue jobs in construction because they don’t feel they’re qualified or don’t have the right employer connections,” ICRF President Chris Price said. “BY Roads removes those obstacles by providing people the skills, confidence and connections they need to pursue work in highway construction. Beginning June 21, Central Indiana residents can participate in an 11-week training program focused on skills and safety training needed to succeed in a career in highway construction. Classes will be held in the evenings twice a week. The program is free to students, thanks to funding made available through INDOT. Supportive service funding has also been made

available to eliminate student barriers. The program also includes a hiring fair, that will take place near the midpoint of the program. Students will have the opportunity to hire on with a strong group of employer partners, while completing the second half of the program. “INDOT is grateful to partner with ICRF to bring this program to life to diversify and support the growing needs of Indiana’s highway workforce,” INDOT Workforce Development Director David Dalton said. “We’re also grateful for the support of Indiana’s highway contractors and community-based organizations in supporting unemployed and underemployed Hoosiers in skills attainment leading to a career in highway construction.”

Based on current projections, Indiana will need to fill an estimated 19,000 highway construction industry positions by 2028. With highway construction happening at historic levels in Indiana, employers are challenged to find qualified workers to meet the demand. INDOT and ICRF’s partnership on BY Roads will connect people with skills and employers with qualified workers to fill positions in highway construction that typically start at \$19 per hour or higher. Services (FDS provides Head Start and Early Head Start programming to children and families in Marion and Hamilton counties) and I am also part of the Breathe Easy Tobacco Free Alliance (an alliance that promotes tobacco free living and smoke free air). Our partnership and collaboration efforts have supported the vision and mission of FDS by educating the families and staff on the Breathe Easy Campaign and being tobacco free via trainings, classroom activities/center events and at our FROG Father and Families Conferences.

I encourage fathers to celebrate a tobacco-free life and set the example of being tobacco free.

If you do smoke, you can still be a wonderful role model. First,

let your child know you made a mistake by starting to smoke. Be direct – tell them that if you could do it all over, you never would have started smoking. Second, make a quit attempt. It might not be easy and it may take you several attempts to quit, but your child will see you and will hopefully model your healthy lifestyle.

Added resource: There's a wonderful free resource to help break the addiction to nicotine – 1-800-QUIT-NOW. I share it with my families, please use this if you are ready to try to quit smoking.

Dentino wins Northern Open, county makes impact at Women's Amateur

On Wednesday, Carmel graduate and current Purdue golfer Nick Dentino was at Prairie View Golf Club to cheer on the Greyhounds at the IHSAA state meet.

Dentino was the defending IHSAA state champion, having won as a senior for Carmel in 2019. Now a sophomore for the Boilermakers, Dentino picked up another significant title by winning the Indiana PGA Northern Open, which took place Monday at Ackerman-Allen Course in West Lafayette.

At the one-day event, Dentino finished with a four-under par 67. That included six birdies. Another Carmel graduate, Clay Stirsman, tied for third with a one-under par 70, making two birdies. Stirsman just completed his freshman season at Wake Forest.

Meanwhile, former Noblesville and Ball State star was busy throughout the spring, with solid finishes in a handful of Indiana PGA tournaments. Steger began the season on April 5 by tying for second place at the Club Car Stroke Play Championship at Franklin's Hillview Country Club.

That was the first of three top 10 finishes for Steger this spring. He tied for eighth place at the Indiana PGA Southern Open, another one-day event that took place April 19 at Sultan's Run Golf Course in Jasper.

Steger then finished third at the Indianapolis Open, a 36-hole event on May 17 and 18 at Carmel's Woodland Country Club. Steger finished with a two-day score of 138, six under par, and made 10 birdies during the tournament.

In women's play, county golfers had a strong showing at the Women's State Amateur Championships, which took place last week at Prairie View. Carmel's Haylin Harris, now at Michigan State, finished second at the three-day event with a two-under par 214. Harris drained 10 birdies in her round.

Westfield's Gabriella Gilrowski (now at Georgetown University) and Jocelyn Bruch (at Purdue), placed third and fourth respectively, both making nine birdies each. Another Westfield golfer, the University of Indianapolis' Cailyn Henderson, tied for fifth. She totaled eight birdies in her three rounds. Samantha Brown, a sophomore-to-be at Westfield, finished in 10th place, making seven birdies.

Another important tournament was the IWGA Indiana Championship, which was June 6 at Ackerman-Allen. Fishers' Kristinni Hunt and Westfield's Adrienne Montalone (now at University of Illinois at Chicago) tied for eighth place.
