Businesses, philanthropists invited to take part in regional collaboration

The mayors of Anderson, Carmel, Fishers, Indianapolis, Noblesville, and Westfield and the commissioners of Hamilton and Madison counties have announced a regional collaboration to apply for Governor Eric Holcomb's Indiana Regional Economic Acceleration and Development Initiative (READI) planning grant and funding.



Cities' share of federal COVID relief slashed

While Hamilton County officials are considering ways they are allowed to spend \$65.5 million in federal COVID relief funds, cities in the county have gotten bad news from U.S. government authorities.

Noblesville, for example, was advised in April that the city could expect about \$13.5 million. But, more recently the amount was reduced by the Treasury Department to \$6.2 million, according to City Clerk Evelyn Lees.

Carmel was informed of an even more dramatic reduction from an anticipated \$20 million to \$7 million, according to one city official. Fishers and Westfield apparently also saw their

Fishers will get \$6.9M in ARP funds, not \$19M

Fishers will not receive the roughly \$19 million initially expected from the American Rescue Plan (ARP). The city is now projected to receive \$6.9 million. How did this happen?

City Controller Lisa Bradford told the Fishers City Council Finance Committee last Wednesday that the answer lies in the details of regula-

tions issued May 10 by the United States Department of Treasury. It boils down to whether Fishers is an entitlement city or a non-entitlement city.

The difference between the two can be very technical, but Bradford told the Finance Committee that Fishers, Carmel and Noblesville saw a big reduction in the ARP money allocation.

Sheridan Schools seeking families to share American culture with exchange students

Sheridan Community Schools (SCS), along with AFS Intercultural Programs/USA (formerly the American Field Service), is looking for local community members who would like to participate in a joint project called Global Readiness in Indiana Towns (GRIT).

SCS seeks host families in the Sheridan area for between five and 10 international high school exchange students arriving this fall. These young people represent a variety of countries, including Argentina, Brazil, Egypt, Finland, Germany, Italy, Lebanon, Portugal, Switzerland, Thailand, Tunisia, West Bank and more. They are among the more than 2,000 international AFS students hosted in the U.S. each year.

SCS is participating in this project along with Indiana University, AFS-USA and the Center for Excellence in Leadership of Learning (CELL) at the University of Indianapolis. Sheridan teachers will receive professional development throughout the summer and academic year at no cost to the district as a part of the project, which will benefit the students throughout the community. Local residents are also encouraged to volunteer as liaisons with the students and families. These new volunteers will also receive complimentary professional development as they learn more about these students and their home countries and cultures.

Sheridan High School Principal Rick Davis said, "Having the opportunity

participate in the Global Readiness in Indiana Towns (GRIT) project is a terrific win for our students, staff, and community. We are excited to bring more students to Sheridan from culturally diverse countries, and the associated professional development is just an added benefit to the whole program."

"Hosting our AFS daughter from Thailand was a great experience for our blended family and for our local school," said Greg Pugh, an AFS Host Dad in Westfield. "The conversations over dinner and the things we learned about each other's cultures were fascinating. Playing family games, watching movies, and even running errands took on a new light as we were able to show our

ages. Programs are available to more than 80 countries, and for durations ranging from two weeks to 10 months. Participants do not have to know another language to study abroad, and merit- and need-based scholarships are available.

shares reduced.

The reason for the change in dividing of the \$2.9 trillion government relief fund is a decision to consider Hamilton County cities as urban rather than non-urban. There is apparently no appeal process for the change.

Meanwhile, county commissioners met Monday with County Council representatives to discuss ways they can spend their massive grant. Lost income suffered by various county agencies will be submitted to commissioners for potential reimbursement, according to Commissioner Steve Dillinger.

That’s why the amount of ARP cash coming to Fishers is \$6.9 million, not the roughly \$19 million that was expected earlier.

Bradford said 142 cities nationwide were reclassified from entitlement to non-entitlement cities, based on Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines, which factor in income and poverty levels to the determination. That’s why Fishers, Carmel and Noblesville were reclassified and will receive millions less than originally projected in March.

As to what Fishers can do about this, the city controller says not much.

“We beat down a lot of doors, explored a lot of avenues,” Bradford said. “Unfortunately, there’s not a lot you can do within the authority contained in the guidance.” The city does plan on submitting comments to federal authorities about this decision.

According to Bradford, the city is disappointed that the number was unexpectedly reduced, but reminded the Finance Committee members that, on the bright side, Fishers will receive nearly \$7 million that was not anticipated before ARP was signed into law.

Frank Earl Miller, Sr.

October 12, 1933 – June 14, 2021

Frank Earl Miller, Sr. was born on October 12, 1933 to Frank A. and Alverta M. Miller. Frank grew up on the old westside of Indianapolis and attended Arsenal Tech High School and played baseball as a pitcher on a semi-pro team. He was a U.S. Army veteran, having served overseas in Japan where he helped bring telephone service to the rural areas of postwar Japan. While in the service, he learned to speak Japanese and was always happy to teach others a few key phrases.



On a blind date in 1958 he met Carolyn Everett – the love of his life. After a whirlwind courtship the couple married about two months after that first date. They were blessed to celebrate their 60th anniversary just before Carolyn passed away in 2018.

After living briefly in the city, the couple built a home in the southern end of Boone County near Fayette. While there over the next 30 or so years, they raised their three children and countless litters of beagle puppies. Frank worked many years as an executive for the Aero Drapery Company and spent countless volunteer hours coaching travel teams for Little League and Babe Ruth baseball at Whitestown and Lebanon.

In 1950, Frank joined in on what became an annual tradition with several of his boyhood friends. Each fall a group of about three dozen guys “from the old neighborhood” traveled to Lake of the Woods, Ontario, angling for the coveted Musky. The group became legendary for their catches each October. Frank earned the nickname and title “The Champ” for the many Muskies he caught year after year. In 1974, he was winner of the Molson’s Big Fish Contest when he landed a record sea-Musky that was 54” long and weighed in at 46 pounds. The fall fishing trips to Canada continued for more than 50 years only interrupted by border closings in the wake of 9/11.

Most years, Frank also loaded up the family and headed north for summer vacations to Lake of the Woods. In addition to fishing, he enjoyed sharing the wonders of the Canadian wilderness with Carolyn and the kids. Everyone learned to watch for eagles, appreciate the pensive call of Loons near sunset, and to watch the shoreline for bears, moose, and other wildlife. Shore lunches were always a part of the fun while visiting the north woods.

After the children were raised, Frank and Carolyn purchased a hobby farm in rural Hamilton County near Cicero because it “just looked like a Grandma and Grandpa’s farm.” Around this time, they also opened their own custom window treatment company, finally retiring about a decade ago when the travel bug took hold of them and they purchased a motor home.

Over the next several years they hit the road and visited the “lower 48.” They over-wintered several years at Silver Lakes Camp near Naples, Florida, where they made many friends. Always in tow was their beloved West Highland Terrier, Duffy.

During the last two years of his life, Frank made his home at Sunrise Senior Living in Carmel where he made many new friends among both the staff and his fellow residents. He never quit “working on things,” and was always tinkering with this or that using the tools he kept stashed in his bedside table.

Frank leaves behind his three children, Kathryn (Kassie) Ritman, Frank Jr. (Catherine Strong), and Sharon (JJ Flynn). He had seven grandchildren who put a twinkle in his eye – Shawna Ladner, Caitlin White, Courtney Rector, Carrie Kersh, Mallory Ritman, Thomas Ritman, and Erin Flynn. Additionally, he has four great-grandchildren, and newly, one great-great-grandson.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his beloved uncle Earl Newberry, his sister Faye Wright, and brother Tom Miller.

A committal service with military honors took place following the service at Hamilton Memorial Park, Noblesville.



Noblesville PD pledges to advance more women within police force

The Noblesville Police Department (NPD) has signed on to the 30x30 Pledge – a series of low- and no-cost actions policing agencies can take to improve the representation and experiences of women in law enforcement. The activities help policing agencies assess the current state of a department regarding gender equity, identify factors that may be driving any disparities and develop and implement strategies and solutions to eliminate barriers and advance women in policing. These actions address recruitment, assessment, hiring, retention, promotion, and agency culture.

The Pledge is the foundational effort of the 30x30 Initiative – a coalition of police leaders, researchers, and professional organizations who have joined together to advance the representation and experiences of women in all ranks of policing across the United States. The 30x30 Initiative is affiliated with the Policing Project at NYU School of Law and the National Association of Women Law Enforcement Executives (NAWLEE).

The ultimate goal of the 30x30 Initiative is to reach 30 percent of women in police recruit classes by 2030, and to ensure policing agencies are truly representative of the jurisdiction the agency serves. While 30x30 is focused on advancing women in policing, these principles are applicable to all demo-

graphic diversity, not just gender.

“This pledge means that the Noblesville Police Department is actively working toward improving the representation and experiences of women officers in our agency,” NPD Chief John Mann said. “We are honored to be among the first in the nation to make this critical commitment, and we look forward to working with and learning from agencies across the country who share our priority.”

More than 80 agencies – from major metro departments including the New York City Police Department, to mid-sized, rural, university and state policing agencies – have signed the 30x30 Pledge. The Pledge is based on social science research that greater representation of women on police forces leads to better policing outcomes for communities.

Currently, women make up only 12 percent of sworn officers and 3 percent of police leadership in the U.S. This underrepresentation of women in policing has significant public safety implications. Research suggests that women officers:

- Use less force and less excessive force
 - Are named in fewer complaints and lawsuits
 - Are perceived by communities as being more honest and compassionate
 - See better outcomes for crime victims, especially in sexual assault cases

HSE Schools approves property transfer for new Fishers fire station

A new fire station on the northeast side of Fishers is one step closer to happening following action on June 9 by the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board. The school district is agreeing to transfer three acres of land to the city at 136th Street and Prairie Baptist Road for the fire facility.

In exchange, the City of Fishers has agreed to partner with HSE Schools to provide "experiential" learning programs for elementary students at city facilities, such as the Agri-Park, Ritchey Woods and the new Hub & Spoke complex. The city agreed to fund two teaching positions for these programs, 100 percent in the first year and 50 percent the second year, while the school corpora-

tion agreed to fund the third year of the program.

A resident of the nearby Britton Falls neighborhood spoke in favor of the proposal because Britton Falls has been urging the city to build a fire station in that area for some time.

The school board voted unanimously to approve the memorandum of understanding.

Attorney David Day, representing the school district in the talks with the city, said Fishers officials have told him construction on the fire station could begin this fall.

The Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety was scheduled to vote on a design and construction management agreement last Tuesday afternoon with Delv Design Studio and BW Construction for the fire station project.



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County EMA to hold Amateur Radio Field Day this Saturday

Amateur radio operators from the Hamilton County Emergency Management’s Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) and the Central Indiana Amateur Radio Association (CIARA) will participate in the national amateur radio exercise on Saturday, June 26, and Sunday, June 27. The event is part of the national Amateur Radio Relay League’s Field Day (arrrl.org/fieldday), an annual event organized since 1933. Hamilton County’s Field Day will be held at River Road Park, 12575 River Road, Carmel. Emergency Management will use the event to conduct a proof of concept with new shelter systems. Three tent sys-

tems will be deployed to allow radio operators to use equipment off-grid, set up a temporary emergency operations center or incident command post. Several different radios with different antennas will be used to make contacts across North America. Shane Booker, Executive Director of Hamilton County Emergency Management, said, “When a community is devastated by a disaster, amateur radio operators can communicate when others cannot. They send critical information to coordinate life-saving emergency response and recovery efforts, completely

independent of the internet and phone systems. Hamilton County is extremely fortunate to have several technical resources, but more importantly, dedicated individuals who stand ready to serve their community.” Field Day is open to the public as an opportunity to learn more about amateur radio and view disaster response equipment. “We are excited to not only demonstrate emergency communications capabilities but new emergency response resources,” Booker said. The public can stop by from 2 to 5 p.m. on Saturday and from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on

Sunday to tour the disaster response setup. Hamilton County Emergency Management’s RACES team and CIARA hosts quarterly amateur radio testing sessions to provide the public with an opportunity to obtain their license. In addition, there are several resources to help prepare for exams, such as hamstudy.org. A basic license and a radio ensure individual and family level communications when cellphones and the internet are unavailable. Quake reportedly felt in Carmel, Sheridan

MONTEZUMA, Ind. – A minor earthquake in West Central Indiana shook the Midwest last Thursday afternoon.

The U.S. Geological Survey says the 3.8 magnitude quake at 3:18 p.m. Thursday was centered four miles northeast of Montezuma, a town of 980 in Parke County.

Tasha Griffin, a clerk with the town’s utility office, said no earthquake damage has been reported in the town, but that “It scared everybody.” Quakes with a magnitude from 3.0 to 3.8 are of-

ten felt, but only cause minor damage.

Former WISH-TV News 8 anchor David Barras tweeted from his home in Carmel that he felt the quake, and others in Sheridan, Fountain County, and even Muncie told him they experienced it.

Cynthia Stewart of Peru in northern Indiana was upstairs in her three-story home when the building “creaked.” She thought a strong wind had moved through at first.

“The house was creaky outside. Some of our furniture made a rubbing noise, a creaking noise, like the drawers were moving in the frame,” Stewart said.

Golden Eagles finish 2nd, Carmel 3rd

CARMEL - There was not much separating the top three teams at the IHSAA boys golf state meet, which concluded last Wednesday at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel.

Guerin Catholic, Carmel and Center Grove were trading the lead during the final day. The Golden Eagles held the advantage as the teams played the final holes, but the Trojans surged ahead at the end to win the state title by one stroke. Center Grove totaled a two-day score of 606, while Guerin Catholic finished with a 607. The Greyhounds were right there as well, placing third with a 612.

This was the second appearance for the Golden Eagles at the state meet. Guerin made it for the first time in 2019, placing fourth. Last year's meet, of course, was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Golden Eagles' program is still very much on the upswing, but it was a tough finish for GC after being so close.

"We had a great season," said Guerin Catholic coach Mark Matthews. "I'm very proud of them. Sometimes you just don't play your best on the day. But, got to be very proud of them. They're great kids and they work very hard. Second place is hard to take sometimes, and that's where they are right now."

Sophomore Jacob Modleski led the way for the Golden Eagles. He carded an even-par 72 in his second round, including four birdies. When combined with his first-round score of 74, Modleski finished the two-day event with a 146, giving him individual runner-up honors.

"Today was definitely a solid day," said Modleski. "Got off to a little bit of a rocky start on the front nine, but I really turned it around on the back and I was really happy with even par."

Andrew White scored a 77 for his second day, mak-

ing two birdies. He also finished in the top 10 as part of a four-way tie for eighth place. White's two-day score was 150; both he and Modleski were named to the All-State team at the conclusion of the meet.

All five of Guerin Catholic's players made at least two birdies during their second round. Leo Wessel drained three birdies, while Christian Hein and Connor McNeely both made two.

Sam Booth was Carmel's low man during the second day, finishing with a score of 76. He made one birdie and was also named to the All-State team.



Noblesville, Sheridan hire new coaches

Two Hamilton County boys basketball teams started last week with new beginnings.

Sheridan and Noblesville both announced new head coaches at their respective school board meetings. The Blackhawks went first, approving the hiring of Chip Flemmer, a successful coach in the Atlanta, Ga. area last Monday night. The Millers then hired their new coach last Tuesday: Scott McClelland, a familiar name in Central Indiana basketball.

LARGE SCHOOL, SMALL TOWN

McClelland has been a head coach for 18 years, with the majority of those years spent at Morristown. In 13 seasons, McClelland guided the Yellow Jackets to nine winning campaigns, including a Class 1A state championship in 2018. Morristown finished 28-2 that year.

The experience of coaching at a small town actually provided some attraction for coming to Noblesville, which McClelland said has “a tradition of great players and great coaches,” plus a passionate fan base.

“I’ve often said that Noblesville is one of the largest schools in the state, but it’s a small town,” said McClelland. “So, I think with the tradition of coaches, great players, the success the program’s had through the last 25, 30 years, I think it’s something that there’s a small-town feel to it with the big-time school atmosphere and I think they’re just on the cusp of winning. I feel like I can help us get over the top.”

McClelland’s first stint with the Yellow Jackets was from 2003-2010; the team won a sectional in 2007. He then coached at Brebeuf Jesuit for two years (2010-2012) and at Western Boone for three seasons, (2012-2015) before returning to Morristown. The Yellow Jackets followed up the 2018 state title with another sectional championship in 2019.

In all, McClelland has 246 wins to his credit. He

noted that in the past four years at Morristown, the Yellow Jackets have produced one 2,000-point scorer (Hayden Langkabel) and four 1,000-point scorers.

McClelland is a home-grown Hoosier, having graduated from Yorktown High School in 1993 and Ball State University in 1998, from which he earned a Bachelor’s degree. He will teach wellness at Noblesville High School.

“What sets Scott apart from others is his ability to not only teach the game of basketball, but to use basketball to teach lessons about life,” said NHS athletic director Leah Wooldridge. “His coaching makes teams stronger because he builds unique relationships with each player, learning what they most need from him to bring out the best in themselves. I’m excited to see what’s next for this team.”

McClelland will meet with his new Millers players today and already has plans for what he wants to bring to The Mill and Noblesville boys basketball.

“We want to try to develop a collaboration of skill development, principles for success, competing, being a great teammate, being coachable, accepting your role and just trying to build a program that the community can be proud of,” said McClelland.

A LONG PATH

Flemmer’s path to Sheridan was definitely a long one for someone who grew up on the West Coast. He taught and coached at schools in Washington State, California and Texas before landing in Georgia.

After two years as a coach and teacher at West Forsyth High School, Flemmer was hired at Cambridge High School, a brand-new public school that opened in 2012 in the Atlanta suburb of Milton. He was the head boys varsity basketball coach and graduation coach, a position he will also have at Sheridan.

Flemmer said his role as a graduation coach is to help students in whatever capacity to get them to Graduation Day. That may mean credit recovery in order to pass a class required for graduation, helping any students that are struggling and monitoring their grades to “make sure they don’t fall through the cracks.” He also works with students taking early college classes, helping them get a head start.

“You really are a coach from the academic standpoint,” said Flemmer. “Working with them, coming up with different strategies to help them be successful.”

In basketball, Flemmer’s Cambridge teams were the Region 7-6A champions in 2018 and 2019 and qualified

for the Georgia state tournament four years in a row from 2017 to 2020, making the “Sweet 16” in 2019. He was named the Region 7-6A Coach of the Year in 2018 and 2019 and has had nine players earn college scholarships.

ELEVATE THE PROGRAM

Flemmer and his assistant came up to Indiana in 2019 to watch all four of the boys basketball state championships, “and that kind of planted the bug,” he said. When the opportunity came to coach in the Hoosier State, he took it. Flemmer said he liked Sheridan’s location, being so close to Indianapolis and in Hamilton County.

“It’s the perfect location,

smaller school,” said Flemmer. “It was everything I was looking for.”

Flemmer has already met with the players, doing so at a meet-and-greet after the hiring. He was already impressed with them.

“They look like a very close-knit group,” said Flemmer. “They’re a hard-working group. You can tell there’s definitely some talent there.”

The coach was practicing with his new players on Tuesday. He’s aware of the school’s history and its towering football success.

“We’re also hoping that we can elevate the basketball program,” he said, hoping to put it in the same sentence as football. “That was some-

thing we talked about today in practice. Respect the history, but we also want to create our own history.”

“We are very excited to welcome Coach Chip Flemmer and his family to our Blackhawk family,” said Sheridan athletic director Beth DeVinney. “When looking for a Coach it was important to our team that we found someone passionate, committed, and with high character. Coach had great success at 6A Cambridge High School (41-7) and his passion for Indiana Basketball makes him the perfect fit for our school, our team and our community. We are looking forward to Coach Flemmer building a program for years to come.”

Two Carmel swimmers qualify for the Olympics

The United States has known about Carmel swimming for years. It’s really good.

Next month, the world will find out how good the Greyhounds are.

Two Carmel graduates, Drew Kibler of the University of Texas and Jake Mitchell from the University of Michigan, both earned spots on the USA Olympic team that will compete at the Summer Games in Tokyo starting next month after their performanc-

es at the Olympic Trials last week in Omaha. Both men were multiple state champions for the Greyhounds.

Kibler punched his ticket with a third-place finish in the 200-meter freestyle finals. He swam the race in a personal-best time of 1 minute, 45.92 seconds. That earned him a spot on the 800-meter freestyle relay.

Mitchell earned his spot on the Olympic team in a dramatic way. He finished second in the 400-meter

freestyle in a time of 3:48.17. A good time, but quite the FINA Olympic Standard of 3:46.78.

But Mitchell would get a second chance. He was approved for a time trial after all the races were finished. With a loud crowd cheering him on, Mitchell dove into the pool and tried again.

Things went much better the second time. Mitchell blasted through another 400 meters, where he finished in 3:45.86, nearly a second

faster than the standard.

“I’m really grateful to get a second chance, to get a time trial,” Mitchell said in a story on the NBC Sports Olympics website ([tinyurl.com/wy5zypny](https://www.tinyurl.com/wy5zypny)). “I just spent the last couple of days training to execute as best I could.”
