New fire station coming to northeast side of Fishers

Fishers Fire and Emergency Services has announced the construction of a new fire station on 136th Street, just east of Moorcroft Drive. Located in the northeastern section of Fishers, Station 397 will be an estimated 13,600 square feet, have three drive-through apparatus bays, accommodate 10 career firefighters, and will be located on approximately two acres of land.

"Establishing the seventh fire station in one of Fishers' fastest growing areas allows us to provide improved service to those residents living on the east-

ern portion of our community," said Fishers Fire and Emergency Services Chief Steven Orusa. "We look forward to continuing our services to these residents and joining the neighborhood."

Fishers Fire and Emergency Services will operate a fire engine and a transporting ALS am-

balance out of Station 397.

Bids will be requested on Aug. 23, 2021. Groundbreaking is anticipated in the fall of 2021 with completion a year later, in the fall of 2022. The design will be very similar to Station 93, located by the Metropolitan Indianapolis Airport on Allisonville Road.

Fishers Fire Department is an "All Hazards" department with 140 career firefighters. Currently, the department responds with six ALS engines, three ladder trucks, three transporting ALS ambulances, safety officer, EMS duty officer, and a Battalion Chief.

Attorney General Todd Rokita releases 'Parents Bill of Rights'

A roadmap for Hoosier parents to engage in their children's education

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita on Wednesday released a Parents Bill of Rights, providing a roadmap for Hoosier parents and caregivers to exercise their legal right to have a voice in their children's education.

"Education policy and curriculum should reflect the values of Indiana families while meeting the mandatory requirements set forth in law," Rokita said. "The single most effective

The Center for the Performing Arts has selected a longtime concert industry professional to be its new Vice President of Programming.

Carmel resident Dan Kemer served over a decade as Vice President Midwest for Live Nation Entertainment and more recently as President of Live Nation Indiana, responsible for booking, promotion,

artist relations and other functions for major concert venues throughout Indiana and the eastern U.S. In his new role, he will oversee booking and other programming operations for the Center's three venues: The 1,600-seat Palladium concert hall, the 500-seat Tarkington pro-

engage in meaningful civic dialogue that will ultimately benefit Indiana schools, parents, and students.

The Parents Bill of Rights outlines the following rights that Hoosier parents and caregivers are entitled to exercise:

- To question and address your child's school officials and school board members at publicly designated meetings with proper notice of the meetings provided

- To question and review the curriculum taught in your child's school by questioning local school boards and school administrators

- To expect that the academic curriculum taught in your child's school aligns with Indiana and federal law

- To participate in the selection and approval of academic standards for the State of Indiana

- To obtain educational materials and curriculum taught to your child in the classroom

- To run as a candidate for your local school board

"As I've traveled throughout the state of Indiana, I've heard firsthand the concerns of parents who are deeply troubled by ideologies being imposed in

their children's school curriculum," Rokita said. "The first line of defense to hold school districts accountable lies with active and engaged parents. The Indiana Attorney General's Office will stand in their corner every step of the way as they exercise their individual liberties in the interest of our children."

The publication of the Parents Bill of Rights is the first in a series of forthcoming installments regarding parents' role in their children's education, including medical rights, religious rights, and school choice rights.

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


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Zachary DePue named Concertmaster of Carmel Symphony Orchestra

DePue was a CSO guest artist earlier this year, joining the orchestra for its performance of Vivaldi's "Four Seasons."

"I am incredibly honored and thoroughly delighted to join Carmel Symphony Orchestra as Concertmaster," DePue

said. "The CSO has a decades-long reputation of musical excellence, and I cannot wait to contribute to this nearly 50-year tradition of quality. Rep. Spartz helps lead passage of Elder Abuse Protection Act through U.S. House

Led by Representatives Victoria Spartz (R-Ind.) and Sylvia Garcia (D-Texas), **H.R. 2922**, the Elder Abuse Protection Act, passed in the House of Representatives Wednesday.

"I am very happy to see that the House can come together on an issue important to our seniors and pass bipartisan legislation. I am proud to co-lead this important initiative," Rep. Spartz said.

The bill makes permanent the Elder Justice Initiative (EJI) within the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice. The

EJI will focus on criminal enforcement and public engagement efforts to combat abuse, neglect, and financial fraud scams that target the elderly.

The bill also makes permanent a hotline to address calls from the public concerning elder abuse and elder justice. The National Elder Fraud Hotline can currently be reached at 1-833-FRAUD-11 or 1-833-372-8311.

Background

The EJI was established

by the Trump Administration. Through this initiative, the Trump Administration charged nearly 1,000 defendants with fraud – totaling over \$2.2 billion.

The Elder Abuse Protection Act is endorsed by the Center for Medicare Advocacy; Social Security Works, Elder Justice Coalition; National Council on Aging; the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees; and the National Academy of Elder

Law Attorneys.

H.R. 2922 now goes to the U.S. Senate where it awaits further action. The full bill text is available [online](#).

Young helps reintroduce bill to establish Housing Affordability Task Force

The REPORTER

On Wednesday, U.S. Senators Todd Young (R-Ind.), Angus King (I-Maine), Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.), John Kennedy (R-La.), and Jon Tester (D-Mont.) reintroduced the Task Force on the Impact of the Affordable Housing Crisis Act, which aims to better understand and respond to America's housing affordability crisis by creating a bipartisan housing task force.


The task force would evaluate and quantify the impact of housing costs on other government programs, and provide recommendations to Congress on how to increase affordable housing options in order to improve life outcomes.

"I've seen firsthand in Indiana how a lack of affordable housing has negative and lasting consequences. The inability to access safe and affordable homes leaves Hoosier fam-

ilies with fewer dollars to spend on important expenses like health care and groceries, and the pandemic has only exacerbated this problem," Sen. Young said. "Our bipartisan bill would assemble a group of experts to better understand the housing affordability crisis so that we might take legislative action to end the cycle of poverty for millions of struggling Americans while decreasing overall taxpayer expenditures."

Specifically, the task force will:

1. Evaluate and quantify the impact that a lack of affordable housing has on other areas of life and life outcomes for individuals living in the United States, including education, employment, income level, health, nutrition, access to transporta-

tion, and poverty level in the neighborhood in which individuals live, regional economic growth, and neighborhood and rural community stability and revitalization.

2. Evaluate and quantify the costs incurred by other federal, state, and local programs due to a lack of affordable housing.

3. Make recommendations to Congress on how to use affordable housing to improve the effectiveness of other federal programs and improve life outcomes for individuals living in the United States.

Three Hamilton County volleyball players were part of an Academy Boiler Juniors team that won an AAU National Championship earlier this week.

Reese Resmer, an eighth-grader at Noblesville West Middle School, Madi Miles, an eighth-grader at Fall Creek Junior High School and Berit Van Beynen, a freshman at Carmel High School, joined the Academy Boiler Juniors 13 Gold team in winning the 13 Open National Championship at the 2021 AAU Junior National Volleyball Championships, which finished Monday in Orlando, Fla.

This is the club's third national championship and adds to an impressive list of accolades for the program. Overall, the team has a record of 81-14 for the season. Along with an AAU National Championship, the girls have won many big tournaments this season including Bluegrass, JVA Summerfest, and the Northern Lights Qualifier.

The team is coached by John Shondell and Chandra Hepler. Shondell is the Associate Head Volleyball Coach at Purdue University. Chandra is a former division one player at the University of

The Greyhounds made their biggest impression in the MIC's All-Conference boys track and field team. Carmel, which won the state championship in boys track, had 13 athletes named as All-Conference, easily the most. Those athletes are: Kole Mathison, Zach Cox, Owen Schafer, Colton Parker, Tommy Maurer, Seth Hutchison, Nolan Ring, Jacob Fisher, Tony Iskander, Drew Willman, Shammah Dosunmu, Will Anderson and Bing Hudson.

At the MIC meet, the Greyhounds won eight events. Cox swept the 110 and 300 hurdles and Mathison was first in the 1600 and 3200 runs. Ring won the discus while Hutchison took the pole vault. Schafer won the 400 dash and joined Parker, Maurer and Cox to place first in the 4x400 relay.

Carmel's girls track and field team also did well in the MIC, with eight athletes making the All-Conference team: Ellie Marsella, Abbey Grogan, Annie Christie, Claire Swigart, Mahalet Zeruesenay, Jasmine Klopstad, Tristan Barr and Cambell Wamsley. At the MIC meet, Christie won the 1600 and 3200 runs and joined Marsella, Klopstad and Grogan to take the 4x800 relay.

In girls tennis, Carmel took care of the conference meet, winning with a score of 55 points. Center Grove and Lawrence North tied for second place with 31 points each. The state champion Greyhounds had six players make All-Conference:

The Greyhounds' boys golf team finished second at the MIC meet with a 286; Center Grove won with a 274. Three Carmel players earned All-Conference honors: Sam Booth, Shoji Fujita and Owen Sander.

In softball, the Greyhounds finished in a three-way tie for second with Ben Davis and Lawrence North, all of whom had 5-2 records for the season. Center Grove won the MIC title with a 7-0 record. Three Carmel players earned places on the All-MIC team: Megan Nichols, Kylie Cunningham and Ella Ohrvall.
