The Carmel Police Department (CPD) has announced the release of its Crime Watch Mapping Dashboard. This webbased portal gives citizens the opportunity to view burglary, criminal mischief, damage to property, residential entry, theft and motor vehicle theft crime statistics within the city.

The Crime Watch Mapping Dashboard was created in order to allow the citizens of Carmel to see near real-time statistics related to property crimes. The dashboard data is updated daily and is searchable up to the last 365 days. It also allows users to filter by the type of crime and victim type. Additionally, users can filter by Crime Watch For more information on neighborhood, which empowers those residents to see a snapshot of potential criminal activity that may be occurring in their area.

flag display, thrown up against the night sky in explosions of blue and red, one that seemed to linger after the final booms had drifted away to silence.



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
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Von Earl Pitts




