Noblesville Schools announced on June 21 that Noblesville High School (NHS) has been nationally recognized for the fourth year in a row as a Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Distinguished School for providing broad access to transformative Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) learning opportunities for students.

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in an elite top 1 percent group nationally. Noblesville East Middle School, Noblesville West Middle School, Hazel Dell Elementary, Hinkle Creek Elementary, North Elementary and White River Elementary were also recognized, with Noblesville East the only middle school in the state to receive the honor four years in a row. Noble Crossing Elementary and Promise Road Elementary are not eligible for consideration as they utilize their own

STEM programming rather than curriculum through PLTW. Stony Creek Elementary has been recognized previously. Noblesville Schools offers 16 different PLTW courses for middle and high school students including classes like robotics, biomedical, cybersecurity and aerospace engineering. It is also one of only a few districts in the state to offer PLTW programming for K-12, with elementary students exploring flight, energy, robotics and more. The Distinguished School

Carmel PD releases crime mapping tool

The Carmel Police Department (CPD) has announced the release of its Crime Watch Mapping Dashboard. This web-based portal gives citizens the opportunity to view burglary, criminal mischief, damage to property, residential entry, theft and motor vehicle theft crime statistics within the city. The Crime Watch Mapping Dashboard was created in order to allow the citizens of Carmel to see near real-time statistics related to property crimes. The dashboard data is updated daily and is searchable up to the last 365 days. It also allows users to filter by the type of crime and victim type. Additionally, users can filter by Crime Watch neighborhood, which empowers those residents to see a snapshot of potential criminal activity that may be occurring in their area. The addition of the Crime Watch Mapping Dashboard is part of CPD's ongoing effort to share information and ensure transparency to the public. Biotech firm selects new HQ space in Fishers

Quantigen is latest in series of life science firms growing in city

Quantigen Biosciences, a specialty contract research organization focused on medical diagnostics and device development through pharmaceutical and biotech industry partnerships, has announced its plans to relocate and expand its headquarters from its existing location to a 40,000 square-foot state-of-the-art facility located at the Round Room building in Fishers, 10300 Kincaid Drive. Accompanying this announcement, the firm plans to add 30 new, high-wage jobs in the areas of quality and regulatory compliance and research by the end of 2023 and will invest \$2.5 million into new lab

and office space. "The Fishers community has been home to Quantigen since our founding, so we are thrilled to have been able to find a facility that can support our expansion and allow us to continue operations in the city where we have been welcomed and supported," Quantigen CEO Jami Elliott said. "Mayor Fadness and his team have been incredibly supportive throughout our relocation search process. We

are bullish for Quantigen's future, as we are for the biotech prospects for our city and the region as a whole." Quantigen plans to double its workforce, a result of efforts in three strategic areas: • Increased demand from pharma and biotech companies to develop new diagnostic tests and platform technologies. • Support for grant sponsored research through the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in

the areas of high throughput test development for soil transmitted helminths, COVID-19 and tuberculosis. • A recent U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services MolDx coverage decision award for a novel genetic test that is used to aid health care providers in medication selection and to improve medication safety. "Jami and his team at Quantigen are working on next-generation technology for the life science industry right here in Fishers," Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness said. "Quantigen's commitment to staying and

Westfield, Grand Park launch Research & Development HUB

The City of Westfield and the Grand Park Sports Campus last Tuesday launched the new Grand Park Research & Development HUB. The HUB will serve as a center of innovation for entrepreneurs, businesses and universities that are developing new technologies, services and research projects related to facilities and activities within the sports tourism industry. "Grand Park is the largest sports complex of its kind in the country," Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said. "There is no better place for ideas, technologies and research opportunities around sport to be originated, vetted and eventually launched into the marketplace." "Our goal is for the HUB to use our 400 acres for advancing every aspect of sport," Grand Park Director William Knox said. "With the proliferation of competitive and recreational sports, there is opportunity to innovate in the areas of safety, technology, marketing, nutrition and under-

standing. Youth sports, specifically, is now a \$19 billion industry. We can play a part in making it safer and more accessible." The HUB will accept business and research partners focused on the areas of professional, youth and recreational sports clubs and teams, accredited universities and educators, national governing bodies and local hospitality and sports tourism partners. "The breadth of opportunity for partners is broad," said Jessi Stas, Partner Coordinator for the Grand Park Research and Development HUB. "Whether focus groups are needed to vet an initial concept, a product is in its beta testing phase, qualitative and quantitative data needs to be aggregated or if there is an opportunity to take a product or service

to the next level, the HUB will accommodate all iterations of research and development." The HUB has two key tracts, commercial innovation/development and institutional research. In the area of commercial innovation and development, the HUB is announcing its Phase 1 partners including Spotz, Sport Aware, RefReps and ZoneIn. Each company is housed or has deployed its products on campus. "Our partnership with Grand Park and its new Research and Development HUB provides us with an opportunity to expand on a foundation of software that will change

the way sports are consumed," said Rob Corsi, Sport Aware Co-owner. "We are excited to work with Grand Park to test our newest features and deliver them to all who visit the campus." The HUB will also be a center for institutional research. The IUPUI Sports Innovation Institute is the first partner university working with the HUB. Along with research projects, the HUB will develop educational and internship opportunities at the high school, college and post-graduate levels. Additionally, Hamilton County Tourism, with its robust data analytics program, will contribute toward research as it relates to the growing sports tourism industry. "Our goal is to set the industry standard for how universities partner with sports businesses to

benefit students, communities and participants," said David Pierce, Ph.D., IUPUI Sports Innovation Institute Director. "Hamilton County Tourism regularly uses geo location data, research panels, impact studies and other forms of intelligence to provide insights and number-driven data to help inform our decisions," said Jordan Musall, Data Intelligence Manager for the organization. "Our goal is to work with the HUB to use this data to better understand the visitor profile and enhance the overall visitor experience at Grand Park and see how that can be applicable across the global sports hospitality landscape. We have been a strong tourism and business development partner of Grand Park's since the beginning, and now are excited to dive into this new research avenue with them." A good writer shows in her words a picture of a barn.

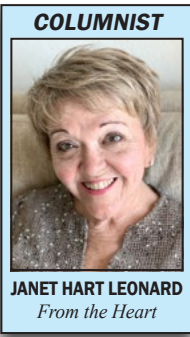
A better writer takes you inside the barn.

investing in this community is exciting as we continue to see catalytic growth in this cluster that's ripe for Fishers."

The Indiana Economic Development Corporation offered Quantigen LLC up to \$350,000 in conditional tax credits based on the company's plans to create up to 23 new jobs by the end of 2023. These tax credits are performance-based, meaning the company is

eligible to claim incentives once Hoosiers are hired.

This comes on the heels of recent life science firms announcing their growth and investment in the city, including Stevanato, a foreign-direct investment equating to \$145 million and 230 jobs; INCOG BioPharma, investing \$60 million and 150 jobs; and Genezen, investing \$7.8 million and 36 employees. The City of Fishers

provided Quantigen with a \$50,000 grant toward its buildout and moving expenses. The Redevelopment Commission approved the Economic Development Agreement at the Feb. 2 meeting with the abatement approval being presented to City Council at the July meeting.

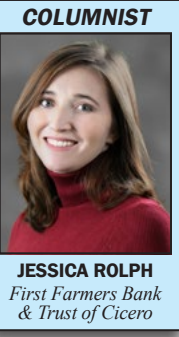

Jerry worked closely with Purdue University to grow and modernize the farm into a hog and grain operation, which at its peak was producing over 6,000 head of farrow to finish hogs and grain farm planting and harvesting nearly 1,500 acres of owned and rented land. The farm became known as Ottinger Livestock Farms in the 70s.

Other than farming and family, one of Jerry's lifetime passions was traveling. His enlistment in the Navy during peacetime operations allowed him to see a big chunk of the world including Greece, Italy, Spain, and many Middle Eastern countries. An avid photographer, he had the slide shows to prove it. He and Judy continued to travel via awards won through a feed vendor. They were able to visit Hawaii, England, Canada, and Mexico. Attorney General Todd Rokita releases ‘Parents Bill of Rights’

A roadmap for Hoosier parents to engage in their children’s education

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita last Wednesday released a Parents Bill of Rights, providing a roadmap for Hoosier parents and caregivers to exercise their legal right to have a voice in their children’s education.

“Education policy and curriculum should reflect the values of Indiana families while meeting the mandatory requirements set forth in law,” Rokita said. “The single most effective way to ensure school accountability is for parents to engage in their children’s education. The Parents Bill of Rights empowers them to do just that.”

National discourse around political and social issues has created negative and polarizing effects on teachers, school administrators, students, and families. Since January, par-

ents and state legislators have turned to Attorney General Rokita for legal interpretations of educational rules and statutory requirements. The Indiana Attorney General’s Office created the Parents Bill of Rights to serve as a resource for parents to engage in meaningful civic dialogue that will ultimately benefit Indiana schools, parents, and students.

The Parents Bill of Rights outlines the following rights that Hoosier parents and caregivers are entitled to exercise:

- To question and address

your child’s school officials and school board members at publicly designated meetings with proper notice of the meetings provided

- To question and review the curriculum taught in your child’s school by questioning local school boards and school administrators
- To expect that the academic curriculum taught in your child’s school aligns with Indiana and federal law
- To participate in the selection and approval of academic standards for the State of Indiana

- To obtain educational materials and curriculum taught to your child in the classroom
- To run as a candidate for your local school board

“As I’ve traveled throughout the state of Indiana, I’ve heard firsthand the concerns of parents who are deeply troubled by ideologies being imposed in their children’s school curriculum,” Rokita said. “The first line of defense to hold school districts accountable lies with active and engaged parents. The Indiana Attorney General’s Office will stand in their corner every step of the way as they exercise their individual liberties in the interest of our children.”

The publication of the Parents Bill of Rights is the first in a series of forthcoming installments regarding parents’ role in their children’s education, including medical rights, religious rights, and school choice rights.

Budget-making for 2022 is coming soon in every Hamilton County city, town, township and school system as well as county government. Elected officials who adopt these budgets later this year have an opportunity to slightly reduce property tax rates enough

to offset the significant increases in property assessments experienced this year by many local homeowners.

Even with reasonable rate reductions, local governments can still see increases

in revenue sufficient to adequately cover growing costs of public services. This is

because of record increases in assessed valuations estimated to be at least 10 percent countywide.

For the average property taxpayer, this can be an advantage of living in the wealthiest county in the state, but only if officials choose to hold spending plans (budgets) to modest increases.

But, administrations in the county's fastest growing communities will reap

a windfall in tax revenue if they maintain current property tax rates. That would be convenient for providing more amenities which some politicians love to offer, but not very thoughtful of our taxpayers.

This is all pretty simple, but without the public speaking out we can assume at least some officials will not resist the temptation to make the most of the situation.

Fishers Fire and Emergency Services has announced the construction of a new fire station on 136th Street, just east of Moorcroft Drive. Located in the northeastern section of Fishers, Station 397 will be an estimated 13,600 square feet, have three drive-through apparatus bays, accommodate 10 career firefighters, and will be located on approximately two acres of land.

"Establishing the seventh fire station in one of Fishers' fastest growing areas allows us to provide improved service to those residents living on the eastern portion of our community," said Fishers Fire and Emergency Services Chief Steven Orusa. "We look forward to continuing our services to

these residents and joining the neighborhood."

Fishers Fire and Emergency Services will operate a fire engine and a transporting ALS ambulance out of Station 397.

Bids will be requested on Aug. 23, 2021. Ground-breaking is anticipated in the fall of 2021 with completion a year later, in the fall of 2022. The design will be very similar to Station 93, located by the Metropolitan Indianapolis Airport on Allisonville Road.

Fishers Fire Department is an "All Hazards" department with 140 career firefighters. Currently, the department responds with six ALS engines, three ladder trucks, three transporting ALS ambulances, safety officer, EMS duty officer, and a Battalion Chief.



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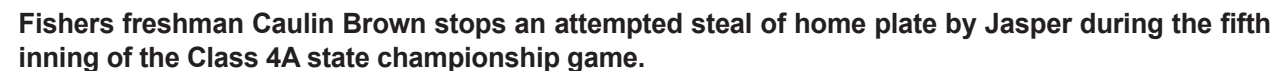
Jasper ends Tigers' run

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 75 OF ARTICLE VII OF THE TOWN OF ARCADIA'S CODE OF ORDINANCES CONCERNING ONE WAY STREETS**

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Arcadia, Hamilton County, Indiana ("Arcadia") has adopted certain ordinances governing traffic flow within Arcadia.

WHEREAS Schedule IV of Chapter 75 of Article VII of Arcadia's Code of Ordinances establishing one-way streets within Arcadia has been amended from time-to-time to accommodate growth and development within Arcadia;

WHEREAS, the Traffic Engineer has determined that the relocation of the Hamilton Heights Middle School and other related activities have reduced traffic demands and usage on North Street eliminating the need for one-way traffic to ensure public safety; and

WHEREAS, the Traffic Engineer has determined that the planned splash pad and other community activities on West Street have created the need for one-way traffic to ensure public safety; and

WHEREAS the Traffic Engineer's recommendation for the change in one-way traffic designations has been reviewed and accepted by the Town Council

WHEREAS, in response to such questions, the Arcadia Town Council desires to amend Schedule IV of Chapter 75.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Arcadia meeting in regular session as follows:

Section 1. Schedule IV entitled "One-Way Streets" of Chapter 75 is hereby amended as follows:

Section 2. All ordinances not specifically changed by this amendment shall remain in full force and effect.

Heights girls finish first in Hoosier Conference All-Sports standings

The Hamilton Heights athletic programs had consistently solid results all throughout the school year whenever they took on teams from the Hoosier Conference.

Now that the school year is finished, the Huskies are getting some recognition. The Heights girls finished first in the conference girls standings, while the boys placed second. Each school receives points for its placing in a conference sport (10 for boys, nine for girls), with first place scoring 10 points and second place scoring nine, on down to 10th place receiving one point.

The Huskies girls came out on top of a close three-school race for first place. Heights finished with 67 points, West Lafayette scored 65 and Northwestern scored 63.

While the Red Devils won conference championships in three events (cross country, tennis and track), the Huskies placed in the top two in five sports, and two more fourth-place finishes.
