Westfield wants to help local heroes, their families

The City of Westfield last Wednesday announced applications are now being accepted for the Hometown Hero Program. The purpose of the program is to recognize and assist Westfield residents deployed serving in our country's armed forces or public safety personnel injured in the line of duty by providing snow removal and lawn care services.

"This program is just another example of the spirit and compassion of our community," said Mayor Andy Cook. "I am proud of city leaders and community organizations that answered this call to action as a small token of gratitude for our Westfield friends and neighbors who selflessly commit to serve and protect."

"After deploying to Iraq for 12 months and leaving a wife and two babies behind in Westfield, I experienced firsthand the impacts service to this nation has on families," said Westfield City Council member Scott Willis, who originally proposed the program. "I thought it was important to create a program that took care of not only military members mobilized, but also public safety personnel who put their lives on the line each and every day for our community."

The program was created to marshal the community's public and private resources in order to alleviate the practical burdens that families of deployed servicemen and servicewomen and public safety personnel injured in the line of duty will face. Lawn care services including mowing and trimming will be provided on an as-needed basis and driveway and sidewalk snow removal will be provided within 24 hours of a snow event.

To qualify for the program, the family must live in Westfield and identify as city public safety personnel on a service-related disability or immediate family of military personnel serving in a branch of our country's armed forces and currently deployed out of state. The household is eligible for the program for the duration of deployment.

The Westfield Board of Public Work & Safety will manage the application process and administer the program. Businesses and organizations interested in becoming a partner of the Westfield Hometown Hero Program should email Public Works Director Jeremy Lollar at jlollar@westfield.in.gov.

Carmel BZA considers appealing court order in GOAT zoning variance case

On July 12, the Hamilton County Superior Court issued an order vacating the vote of the Carmel Board of Zoning Appeals' (BZA) decision to deny a use variance for the Greatest of All Taverns (GOAT).

Judge Jonathan Brown held that the BZA's written

findings of fact were made outside of a public meeting, which he stated was a violation of the Indiana Open Door Law. In his order, Judge Brown essentially repeated the position taken in the advisory opinion of the Public Access Counselor.

According to city officials, the BZA's decision to deny the GOAT's use variance was made at a public meeting after

a full and open public hearing. While the Indiana Code requires the BZA to make written findings of fact, it does not specify how those findings are to be made. The order remands the matter to the BZA to hold a new hearing in compliance with Indiana's Open Door Law.

The BZA is weighing its options about how to proceed

and has 30 days to appeal Judge Brown's decision. The order stated that while waiting for the new hearing, the GOAT is subject to the existing zoning laws for 220 2nd St. SW, which is currently zoned R-2 Residential. A business such as the GOAT cannot be operated on a property that is zoned Residential until a use variance is granted by the BZA.

County officials set session to consider relief applications

Hamilton County Commissioners and Council members will meet July 27 to pursue discussions on spending federal COVID relief funds. The county was granted \$65.5 million. The meeting will be at 1:30 p.m. at the Government and Judicial Center Conference Room.

So far, something over \$3 million has been spent on bonus pay for county employees who were considered essential workers during the pandemic last year. Officials have the next two years to consider disbursements.

The meeting will consider the application process for seeking the funds. Public agencies, small businesses and non-profit community support organizations which suffered financial losses are eligible to receive funds under federal guidelines.

Drainage improvements will be a focus of allocation of some funds. But, otherwise capital projects are generally not eligible. Agencies, business leaders and community assistance groups will be notified of how and when they may apply.

Mark was known by many for his generosity of spirit, love of his work, and engaging presence wherever he was. He was dedicated to his students and genuinely cared about their development and success. He will be sorely missed by his extended family and all those whose lives he touched along his wonderful journey through this world.

In addition to his parents, Mark was preceded in death by his son, Mark F. Uchida IV.

Ron Ackles

Ron Ackles is a 1962 graduate from Jackson Central High School. He played three sports (football, basketball, and baseball) throughout his high school career.

Ackles was best known for his basketball accomplishments, but many who watched Ron described him as one of the best all-around athletes they ever saw.

Ackles was an All-Hamilton County basketball player in 1960, 1961, and 1962. He scored 1,052 career points and held all of Jackson Central’s scoring records upon his graduation. He was inducted into the Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame in 2015.

Ackles joined the United States Marine Corps upon graduation.

Alicia Bundy

Alicia Bundy, a 1996 graduate, is one of, if not the most prolific and accomplished athletes to come through Hamilton Heights.

Bundy was a state qualifier in 10 events over her four-year career. She qualified for the state track and field meet in each of her four years of high school. She was a sectional champion nine times in four different events (100-meter, 200m, 400m, and long jump). She was a regional champion five times in three events. She had four top 10 finishes in the state meet. In the 1993-1994 school year, she had a fifth-place (400m) and sixth-place (200m) finish in the same state meet. She still holds records in the 200m and 400m dash.

Bundy continued her track and field career at Indiana University upon her graduation.

Dennis Lockhart

Dennis Lockhart, a 1995 graduate, was a four-sport athlete while at Hamilton Heights. He participated in football, track and field, cross country, but was best known for his success as a wrestler. He was a two-time conference champion, two-time sectional champion, two-time regional champion, and was a semi-state champion in 1995.

Lockhart went on to the West Point Military Academy, where he was a member of the wrestling team. He was a team captain his senior year (1998-99) at West Point. He served 21 years as a pilot in the United States Army and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Rick McCoskey

Rick McCoskey graduated from Hamilton Heights High School in 1971.

Rick was a multi-sport athlete at Hamilton Heights earning 10 varsity letters during that time. He was a four-year starter on the basketball team. He was on the All-Hamilton County team three times throughout his career. He was an honorable mention All-American in the Coach’s Athlete Magazine in the 1970-71 season. He scored 1,741 career points, which is the third best of all time. He still holds the single-season scoring record with 719 points.

Upon Mr. McCoskey’s graduation, he went on to the University of South Alabama where he played basketball for the Jaguars for four years.

2012 Hamilton Heights Football Team

The 2012 Hamilton Heights

Football Team was the first team in school history to make it to the state championship game in the modern system. They were a team whose sum was perhaps greater than its parts, but played a physical, tough, and disciplined brand of football. They finished the regular season 8-1, winning a conference championship.

The team won the sectional with a 52-16 home win over Western Boone. The Huskies then went on the road to win a tight 19-14 win over Eastbrook to win the regional. They then earned the right to vie for a state championship with a 42-13 win over Mishawaka Marian, in a game where many people considered them an underdog. The team fell short in the state championship, falling to Indianapolis Bishop Chatard 30-13. They finished the season with a 13-2 record and were ranked 21st in the state (1A-5A), according to the final Sagarin ratings.

The induction ceremony and banquet are set 1 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 11 at Hamilton Heights High School, 25802 State Road 19, Arcadia. Inductees will be given a metal display and their names and pictures proudly displayed in the Athletic Hall of Fame located in the new Athletic Center.

The Hamilton County Health Department will hold a town hall on Thursday, July 22 to help answer many of the common questions parents have about getting their kids vaccinated against COVID-19.

Dr. Christopher Belcher, a pediatric infectious disease specialist at Ascension Medical Group in Carmel, and Dr. Shobana Pandian, a pediatrician at Community Health in Fishers, will lead the discussion and be available to help answer questions.

“I’m a mother of four and completely understand the concerns and anxiety parents may feel surrounding the pandemic and the COVID vaccine,” said Dr. Pandian. “But I had my kids vaccinated and feel strongly it’s in our kids’ best interests to do so.”

Drs. Belcher and Pandian plan to discuss the issue of myocarditis, the inflammation of the heart muscle; the potential long-term side effects of the vaccine; and the speed of development. They will also spend time answering any questions participants might have.

“There’s a lot of bad information out there – we’re here to set the record straight,” said Dr. Belcher. “As someone who has treated kids gravely ill with COVID-19, I’m here to assure you that the risks associated with the vaccine far outweigh the risks associated with contracting the virus.”

County’s talent attraction effort delivers 5,000 prospects

More than 5,000 high-skill professionals across the country expressed interest in relocating to Hamilton County, according to an innovative talent attraction initiative of the Hamilton County Economic Development Corporation (HCEDC), dba Invest Hamilton County. The initiative will connect these individuals to interested employers throughout Hamilton County.

HCEDC signed a partnership agreement with TMap in 2020 with funds granted by the Hamilton County Commissioners and County Council. Founded in 2017 by Angie’s List Co-Founder Bill Oesterle, TMap uses big data and targeted marketing to recruit talent for the state of Indiana.

The initial partnership identified

individuals who graduated from the county’s high schools and used the TMap

platform to find information regarding their current city of residence and profession, as well as solicit interest in returning to the county. The publicly available data helped identify more than 21,000 local graduates. TMap also works with universities throughout the state to bring graduates back to Indiana.

“Hamilton County is an amazing place to live and thrive as a professional and a family. In January 2021, we put out an initial marketing push to assess interest and test what type of

Strategy. “The results were promising.”

The pilot project identified more than 5,000 high-skill professionals that had an interest in being connected with an employer and potentially relocating to Hamilton County. Software engineering, engineering, sales, operations, data and analytics, finance and information technology earned hundreds of positive responses.

The partnership is identifying additional local employers who would like to participate.

response we would receive,” said Mike Thibideau, HCEDC Vice President of Workforce

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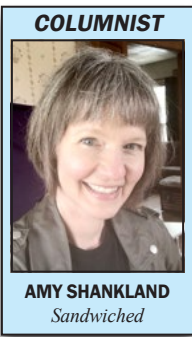
Palliative care is a relief for many in the Sandwich Generation

Emotional stingers

I’ve learned many things throughout my mother’s cancer journey. One is how wonderful palliative care can be for our loved ones.

When Mom’s diagnosis was confirmed, my siblings and I were in a whirlwind. We had more conference calls in three months than I’ve ever had for my work in the same time period. When my brother Mark said the term “hospice,” I cringed.

We all know what that word means. Hospice provides relief, peace, and care to patients and their families. But once you bring in those wonderful hospice workers, you know



someone you love is dying.

However, there’s another side to hospice companies – palliative care. I’ll be honest, I’d never heard of this term before. I didn’t even know how to say it! I do now: PAL-ee-uh-tiv. In my head I’ve repeated, “Nurse Practitioner Gigi is our PAL” to help me remember.

Palliative care is specialized medical care for people living with a serious illness (getpalliativecare.org). This type of care is focused on providing relief from the symptoms and stress of the illness. The goal is to improve quality of life for both the patient and

the family.

And oh, has that goal been reached! All three of us researched companies and found Paradigm Health in Indianapolis. We learned that it’s important to start palliative care even before a patient begins to feel symptoms of their illness. That way you can be “ahead of the curve” to prevent a little bit of pain from turning into a lot of pain.

In May, Mom and I sat down with Gigi for the first time. Calling her “thorough” is an understatement! When she left Mom’s apartment, both of our brains were twirling – in a good way. Gigi thought of things I never would have.

Up until recently, Mom hasn’t felt anything from her cancer, which is a Godsend.

However, in the past few weeks, she’s started to feel itchy due to the rash from her breast cancer. Gigi to the rescue! Mom’s been feeling better and we’re all relieved.

It’s wonderful to have Gigi on our team knowing she’s just a text or a call away. She works closely with Mom’s oncologist and visits Mom every month. She can visit her more down the road if need be.

The leading causes of death for seniors are heart disease, cancer, and chronic respiratory disease. If your elderly parent is facing one of these, I want to encourage you to research palliative care. I’m happy to add that Medicare covers it.

Hopefully, you’ll have a “pal” like Gigi – an angel who provides relief for all.

Oh, those words stung. Now Buttercup, whatcha gonna do?

What do we do when someone says something to us that hurts our feelings?

Chances are the hurt was not intentional. But ... it still hurts.

Emotional stingers hit the heart. They consume our thoughts for a bit, sometimes a much longer bit. I’ve been known to bury them and then feel them rise up from their burial place.

They can be prefaced or followed by a quick, “I’m sorry.”

Chances are the person who hurt us feels some guilt and may tell us they do. We often respond “it’s okay” when it really isn’t.

We struggle with making it out to be not a big deal. We question why they said it. We even question our value to the person who said it. And of course, there is the “how would they feel if it were said to them?”

We don’t want to drive an emotional wedge between us. Lord help us not to carry a grudge either.

Emotional muck and yuck is the worst. We wrestle with our thoughts and feelings.

Words cannot be unspoken. They can be forgiven.

Actions cannot be undone. They can be forgiven.

Offenses cannot be unoffended. They can be forgiven.

Hurt cannot be forgotten. It can be forgiven.

Yes, there is a lot of forgiveness there.

It’s a decision we need to make for our mental health as well as the health of the relationship.

While we think we may have thickened our skin over the years, the words can still break through the wrinkled skin of even a veteran survivor of hurtful words.

A discussion may eventually be needed. I hate confrontation. I’d rather just suck it up.

Most likely we just have to move on and convince ourselves that the person feels bad about what they said, even if they never apologize. We hope they feel really bad. Just telling the truth.

Grace and mercy are a big deal in relationships. Sometimes they are sprinkled. Sometimes they are slathered.

Life is too short to live in a state of constant hurt.

So, here’s the other thing. If a person is constantly throwing out emotional stingers our way there may have to be boundaries set. Sometimes those boundaries involve a communication distancing.

Just FYI – no one has thrown emotional stingers towards this buttercup in quite a while. But let’s just say, I do know how to suck it up and slather on the grace and mercy.



Busy past month for County Council

I trust everyone is having a joyous and productive summer. It was nice to see the July 4th gatherings, parades, and fireworks as we celebrated our nation’s birthday. It was a special time.

For those that traveled like my family, we got the chance to see how other states have adapted in this post-pandemic world. Absence can make the heart grow fonder. Our separation only reinforced the truth that we live in an amazing county in a great state. Adult vaccine rates are above 75 percent here in Hamilton County, which is 25 percent more than Indiana overall. Businesses are open to full capacity. Mask mandates are gone with businesses making their own policies.

The County Council agenda for last week was rather involved. Much of the activity was follow-up from events and subcommittee meetings over the past month. There were the typical grant appropriations, funding for revisions to employee pay and the project appropriations. I’m going to take this time to talk about all three and want to end with a statement with regards to what others are stating in the paper about roles and responsibilities.

One item that was on the agenda is a reoccurring appropriation that we have every July. It involves a six-month additional appropriation for the state grant to support pretrial supervision. The question you might ask is why can’t this be done during budget time? The fiscal calendar for the State Supreme Court and Hamilton County are not aligned. This means that every year we appropriate the remaining half of the grant from the year before and wait for the next year to fulfill the balance of that grant. I’m sure for counties not in as strong a financial



position as Hamilton County that this can be frustrating.

I reached out to Stephanie Ruggles, Director of Pretrial Services, before our council meeting and asked if this was ever going to change because the new agreement attached indicated an extra six months. I am happy to report that starting in 2022, the State Supreme Court will revert to the same fiscal calendar as our county. The lack of coordination is sad but inevitable without better collaboration with other government entities. More on that later.

The sheer amount of 144 amendments (payroll and employee classification changes) is frustrating for every county councilor. Most are reclassification of employees that changes budget projections, but there are others that are done to hire new people or create new positions.

This month, we had one that was directly tied to succession management. The Clerk’s office sought to create a new Office Administrator role which will be funded primarily with a vacant position. This request is a welcome one as the Clerk recognizes that she has some senior people retiring in the next few years. This new administrator will work alongside the Chief Deputy until her retirement so the transition is seamless. This is great, but how does the county deal with succession management? I’ve asked this in previous articles, and it starts with thinking like a business and recognizing that leadership is about planning, not reacting.

The last major conversation regarded the funding of two highway projects. One was tied to an awarded federal grant to support pavement preservation and covers the resurfacing of 146th Street.

The second was more con-

tentious. My career outside of the Council has provided me with experience regarding construction. I understand the grant process and the length of time it takes to get things approved and then constructed. The request was for \$800,000 to fund engineering of a new intersection at 146th Street and Hazel Dell. This is being expedited because we understand that a federal infrastructure package is coming out to support major projects. Hamilton County wants to have a few projects queued up for when this is released.

This all makes perfect sense, but in absence of a project priority list, the Council is faced with making decisions with limited information. 146th Street had four intersections listed in the top 50 worst intersections in the entire metropolitan area, with the Hazel Dell intersection listed as the worst. The Council overwhelmingly supports the project, but we need to have a better plan in place to support projects going forward.

A former Councilor chastised our current Council at pursuing responsibilities outside of its purview. He stated that the Council “has always operated under the philosophy of not originating spending but acting on requests from the Commissioners and county departments.” This same former councilor sought to grant \$3.5 million to the Humane Society for their new building – which was in need. The idea that several councilors are seeking to lead, and influence, is somehow “new territory” is incorrect. This kind of status quo thinking gets us nowhere and this non-collaborative approach is why our Council and the Commissioners could not seem to work together in the recent past.

As an elected leader in Hamilton County, I stated early on that I ran to help change the status quo, not rewrite Indiana

Code. With Councilor Steve Nation’s support, I led the support for the creation of a collaborative career center, including the schools and workforce development leaders. I am supportive of the efforts of Councilor Fred Glynn to fund the design of a desperately-needed domestic violence shelter. I authored the initial drafts of the rules for managing our funding of non-profits that Councilor Sue Maki carried across the finish line for adoption by the Council. I also helped drive the funding of a county business audit to help create better efficiencies, provide for business plans, create KPIs and establish a better budgeting process with Councilors Fred Glynn and Amy Massillamany.

These are efforts to help us plan better, budget departments appropriately and create priorities to support major projects. This is how businesses’ plan and strategize, and I believe these principles are essential to maintaining our presence as one of the best counties in the country to live and work and be a leader in how government works.

As this July 4th passes, I can assert that I am proud to be an American and I am proud to represent the citizens of Hamilton County, District 4. Thank you again to the Hamilton County Reporter. I hope you find these articles helpful and informative.

Carmel establishes Sidewalk Repair Grant program for residential property owners

The City of Carmel has established a new Sidewalk Repair Grant program to help keep residential sidewalks across the city in good shape and safe for walkers, bicyclists and anyone using sidewalks on a regular basis. This program is supported and funded by a \$50,000 non-reverting fund established by the Carmel City Council in 2020.

The Sidewalk Grant program will be administered by the Department of Community Services in a partnership with the Carmel Street Department and Carmel City Engineer, who administer the city’s annual sidewalk maintenance program. The fund’s primary purpose is to help facilitate the upkeep and repair of sidewalks in residential neighborhoods by assisting homeowners with their responsibility of maintaining the public sidewalks adjacent to their property.

The new Sidewalk Repair Grant fund will assist residents who own and occupy their homes with the expense of repair/replacement of sidewalks and for removal of trees located on their private property that are affecting sidewalks by reimbursing up to 50 percent of the project cost, up to \$3,000. The cost of sidewalk grinding, where heaving or slumping of sidewalks can be eliminated through mechanical grinding, is also a cost that can be reimbursed through the grant.

Social Security, Medicare are sisters, but no longer twins

For decades, the retirement age was commonly thought of as age 65. Over 30 years ago, during the Reagan Administration, the age to receive full Social Security benefits was raised from 65 gradually to 67, but most Americans still think it is 65.

Do a quick Google search and you can find your Full Retirement Age (FRA). If you



were born in 1956, your full retirement age is 66 and four months. It goes up in two-month increments. Everyone born in 1960 or thereafter will reach their FRA at 67.

You can choose to take Social Security as early as 62, but you can’t choose to take Medicare early. Medicare still begins at age 65. The only people who get it earlier are on Social Security Disability.

Many people know they can “retire early” and gleefully quit their job. They sign up for Social Security at 62 and then they call to get their Medicare started. Only to find out that they must purchase an Affordable Health Act plan. These plans average \$500 to \$1,000 per month or more, depending

on which plan you choose and where you live. Since the average American collects about \$1,500 per month in Social Security, paying one-third of it or more for health insurance is not going to work, and they quickly call for a SOS.

Luckily, you can withdraw your application for Social Security as long as you haven’t been on it over 12 months. You must pay it all back, but then your Social Security will continue to grow until you decide to retire again.

While you can choose to retire anytime from age 62 on, there is no benefit to waiting past age 70.

Medicare, on the other hand, has strict late penalties if you don’t enroll when you are first eligible. For most people, that is at age 65. That age hasn’t changed from when it was established in 1966. More

and more Americans, however, are choosing to work past age 65 and delay Medicare. There is no penalty if you are still on a group health plan from work as long as the group has at least 20 people on it. But if you are self-employed or in a small group, you must take Medicare at age 65 or face a 10 percent penalty per year that you delay. That penalty never expires!

You could stop working at 68 and take Medicare but delay Social Security till age 70. You might be on your spouse’s health plan and not working yourself. You could take Social Security at 62 and delay Medicare until your spouse stops working. Or many different combinations of the two.

There is no right time to retire. It’s a very individual decision, and 65 is often not the magic number.

Four Hamilton County players chosen in MLB Draft

HSE, Miami star goes in the first round: Sam Bachman selected by Angels

During a Zoom press conference after Sam Bachman was drafted by the Los Angeles Angels, a reporter asked the Hamilton Southeastern graduate and Miami University (Ohio) junior how much of a roller-coaster ride it was to get to where he was now.

“It’s definitely an emotional roller-coaster ride, I think that’s pretty well-put,” said Bachman. “You got to really handle the hills and the valleys. Going through it, I think baseball can be a pretty emotional game, so I think the mental toughness aspect is huge, and Miami preaches a lot of this stuff and so it’s really easy to roll with the punches and keep grinding and keep going.”

Bachman’s ride is taking him to Southern California, as he was selected by the Angels in the first round of the Major League Baseball Draft last Sunday night. Bachman, who graduated from Southeastern in 2018, was selected ninth by the Angels, easily the highest draft choice ever for the Royals, and the first-ever Miami player to get taken in the first round.

Bachman was there celebrating with his parents, Kevin and Suzanne Bachman, and around 120 to 130 people who were cheering as the official announcement was made.

“It’s a tough one, it hits you pretty hard,” said Bach-

man. “Didn’t think I was going to cry or show much emotion, but after hugging some of the folks that really sacrificed a lot, it gets pretty emotional pretty quick.”

Bachman got his start at Southeastern, where he was a two-year letter winner for the Royals. He had 21 career appearances and totaled 100 strikeouts.

Ken Seitz, the longtime baseball coach for Southeastern, told The Reporter that Bachman “was a high school player with a strong desire to detail and with the attitude of wanting to be the best pitcher possible.”

Bachman battled arm issues during his junior year, but Seitz said he “still showed up to work each day.” As for his senior season, Bachman “started slow, but finished strong,” said Seitz.

“His last game at the sectional on a very hot day he fought off heat exhaustion and dehydration late in the game,” said Seitz. During the last couple of innings, Bachman talked his coaches into sending him back on to the mound.

“He finished the game and pitched great,” said Seitz. “That showed me the character and toughness that make him Sam Bachman.”

Once on the Miami campus, the 6-1, 235-pound Bachman made an immediate impact for the Red-Hawks. He had 14 starts in 15 overall appearances, go-

ing 7-1 with a 3.93 earned-run average. Bachman struck out 75 batters, while allowing opponents to bat only .229 against him. He was named the Mid-American Conference Freshman Pitcher of the Year, First-Team All-MAC and Freshman All-American.

During his sophomore season, Bachman had four starts. He totaled 31 strikeouts, including 12 in a game against Purdue Fort Wayne. In his junior season, Bachman started 12 times and compiled a 4-4 record with a 1.81 ERA. He struck out 93 batters, holding them to a .147 average. A [story on the Miami website](#) pointed out that his fastball “routinely surpassed 100 mph.”

Seitz noted that Major League Baseball is “a tough business,” but also pointed out that Bachman seems to have all the tools to go pretty far.

“He has the big body, strength, and that 100 mph fastball,” said Seitz. “No doubt Sam will do what is asked of him and will be very coachable. Hopefully

the Angels will find a good fit for Sam.”

Seitz said that a lot of making it in professional baseball “is being in the right place at the right time - being the right fit for what the organization needs from upcoming players.”

That could spell good fortune for both Bachman and the Angels. In an [article on the MLB website](#), Angels beat reporter Rhett Bollinger said that the team has “an organizational need for pitching,” and Bachman will help to fill it. Bollinger said that Bachman “is considered close to reaching the Majors and could make his debut as a reliever,” but the team is looking at him as a starter in the long term.

Also in the article, Angels scouting director Matt Swanson told Bollinger that it’s important to get Bachman signed and into the team’s system quickly.

“He’s going to have the opportunity to move at his own pace and hopefully impact the Major League roster soon rather than later,” said Swanson.

From Carmel to the South Side: Tommy Sommer chosen by White Sox

Tommy Sommer’s senior season at Carmel High School also happened to be Matt Buczkowski’s first year as the head coach of the Greyhounds.

But Buczkowski had been the coach at fellow Metropolitan Conference school Lawrence Central before coming to Carmel, so he was aware of just how special Sommer was – “I had known about Tommy long before I got to Carmel,” he said.

Flash forward to 2021, where baseball fans across the nation will soon get the chance to know about Sommer. The Indiana University pitcher was chosen by the Chicago White Sox in the 10th round of the Major League Baseball Draft early last week.

Sommer had committed to the Hoosiers by his junior year at Carmel, a season he helped the Greyhounds win a sectional championship. He earned All-State honors and was a three-time All-MIC player as well.

“It didn’t take long to realize the intangibles that he possessed to set him apart, even from a talent perspective,” said Buczkowski.

When Sommer got to

Bloomington after graduating from Carmel in 2017, he settled in for a long run as a solid, consistent player for IU, a school at which his father Juergen Sommer played soccer, helping Indiana to a national championship in 1988.

During his four years for the Hoosiers, Sommer compiled a record of 13-9 and an earned-run average of 3.71. He got right into the swing of things as a freshman, where Sommer was 2-1 in 13 appearances with a 3.07 ERA.

Sommer finished this past season with a 5-4 record, tossing 69 strikeouts and holding his opponents to a .237 batting average. Highlights of Sommer’s season included three games with at least 10 strikeouts: Sommer threw 12 strikeouts against Purdue on March 19 and 11 against Minnesota on April 21. In his first game of the season, which took place March 5 at Minnesota, Sommer struck out 10 and allowed only two hits in eight innings.

In addition to his success on the mound, Sommer

Luke Albright, Grant Richardson both chosen in the MLB Draft

Three years ago, the Fishers pitching duo of Luke Albright and Grant Richardson led the way for the Tigers as they romped to the school's first-ever baseball state championship.

Albright and Richardson were reunited in a sense early last week, as both joined the ranks of professional baseball players: Both men were chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft. Albright, who has been playing college ball at Kent State, was selected in the sixth round by the Arizona Diamondbacks, while Richardson, playing at Indiana University, was taken by the New York Yankees.

Albright was the 168th pick in the draft, becoming the Golden Flashes' highest draft selection since 2017, when Jake Latz was

picked in the fifth round of MLB's entry draft.

The 6-4 right-hander led the Kent State pitching roster this season, making 15 starts in 15 appearances. Albright recorded a 6-4 record and had a team-leading 3.40 earned-run average. He struck out 102 batters and allowed opponents only a .211 average at the plate. His success earned him Second Team All Mid-American Conference honors.

Over his three years for the Flashes, Albright was 12-7 in 33 appearances, with a 2.98 ERA and 178 strikeouts.

"Luke Albright is one of the hardest workers we've ever had at Fishers High School," said Tigers coach Matthew Cherry. The coach said Albright was a physical presence as a freshman, as well as a tireless

worker all four years at Fishers.

"Luke has a relentless desire to improve and has never been satisfied," said Cherry. "His mental makeup on the mound and his work ethic between starts is off the charts. He will constantly learn and work to improve. We are very excited for him to reach his dream of playing professional baseball and excited to follow his career."

Richardson was also a great pitcher for Fishers, but moved to the outfield when he played for the Hoosiers. He also became one of their top hitters, especially during the 2021 season.

Richardson led the team with a batting average of .320, getting 55 hits during the season. That included nine doubles, seven home runs and two triples. Richardson bat-

ted in 33 runs and scored 32. In five different games, Richardson collected three hits. In the field, Richardson was error-free for the season.

For his career, Richardson averaged .312 at the plate, totaling 123 hits and 21 home runs. He scored 90 runs and batted in 87.

"Just like Luke, Grant Richardson is a special young man," said Cherry. "His talent is unbelievable! You hear people say that the ball sounds different off a professional bat and that is definitely true when Grant hits. Obviously, he was also a special pitcher for us as well, but he showed everyone at IU what he is capable of at the plate. We are excited to follow him throughout his professional career."

also earned Academic All-Big Ten honors during the 2019 and 2020 seasons.

Buczowski felt that getting drafted was a "strong possibility" for Sommer. The coach said Sommer "clearly had the stuff and ability," as long as he didn't get hurt and continued to make progress for the Hoosiers.

Sommer was one of six Indiana University players that were drafted this week. That included three pitchers: Normal (Ill.) West's McCade Brown went to the Colorado Rockies, Jeffersonville's Gabe Bierman is headed to the Miami Marlins and Lake Central's Matt Litwicki was chosen by the Boston Red Sox.

Fishers' Grant Richardson was selected by the New York Yankees (see related story), while Yorktown's Cole Barr was chosen by the Seattle Mariners.

Noblesville girls basketball star Ashlynn Shade has numerous Division I offers at her doorstep, and one of the most successful programs in the country has joined that list.

The University of Connecticut, winner of 11 NCAA national championships, has given an offer to Shade, it was announced last Tuesday night. The news was posted on a tweet from the Nike Lady Gym Rats account, a youth baseball league team on which Shade plays.

The Millers junior-to-be has seen her stock go up considerably after a remarkable sophomore season that saw her average 23.9 points and 8.1 rebounds per game. Shade helped Noblesville to its first sectional title since 2015.

Shade's rapid improve-

ment during her sophomore year vaulted her to No. 5 in the espnW Class of 2023 rankings. In a May [story on the ESPN website](#), Shade was listed as "the biggest stock riser in the 2023 class." It noted her ability to "catch fire" from 3-point range and inside the arc, her quickness and versatility, and her "knack for creating space and finding an opportunity to get her shot off."

Before UConn threw its hat in the ring, Shade already had offers from over 10 schools, including in-state programs Indiana University and Notre Dame, other Big Ten schools such as Maryland, Iowa and Michigan, and storied programs like Louisville and Tennessee.

Shade is one of four Indiana players on the espnW Top 60 list for the

Class of 2023. The others are two players from South Bend Washington, No. 15 Amiyah Reynolds and No. 53 RaShunda Jones, and No. 57 Laila Hull from Zionsville.

Two Hamilton County incoming seniors are listed on the Top 100 roster for the Class of 2022. Westfield's Alyssa Crockett is No. 47, while Carmel's Kate Clarke is No. 96. Both are committed to the University of Michigan.

Meanwhile, another Noblesville player has received several offers. Incoming sophomore Reagan Wilson is being recruited by a handful of Division I schools, including Indiana State University, Oakland University (Rochester, Mich.), IUPUI and the University of Toledo.
